

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Schools set Feb. 28 bond vote date

The Plymouth-' Canton Board of Education approved forwarding an election- date request of Feb. 28, 1980 to the Wayne County Election Committee Monday night.

This is the first step toward setting an election date for voters to approve or deny a bond request for housing the schools' increasing student population. If the committee OKs the request and the school board sets the election date, voters could go to the polls Feb. 28.

To pare down the final components of the bond proposal, the board will meet for an informal workshop on Monday, Dec. 17 at 7:30 p.m. at board offices, 454 S. Harvey St., Plymouth. Formal approval of the bond request may be slated for the next board meeting Jan. 7.

Because the board has not determined the final amount of the bond proposal, some board members objected to the move to petition for the election date. "Why not ask for a date in March or April?" asked Treasurer Steve Harper. He made a motion to postpone sending the request to the election committee, but that motion was defeated by a 3-3 vote. It was a confusing vote, said Carolyn Sellman, schools' stenographer, because it sounded as though three board members did not vote on the motion. After she reviewed the tape of the vote' Tuesday morning, she said that the vote was recorded as a tie.

It was unclear whether they were abstaining or voting 'yes' (to postpone), said Sellman. However, since board by-laws require all school board members who are present to vote, the vote was a stalemate, said Florence Beier, administrative assistant.

Following that motion, Secretary

Elaine Kirchgatter moved to petition the request from Wayne County. Her motion was supported by Flossie Tonda.

"Let's leave the date open. If we need more time for the campaign, we can postpone the request in January," Kirchgatter said.

Sending in the petition for a February election date would make Wayne County aware that the district's getting ready for an election, said Beier.

The motion passed by a 5-1 vote with Harper dissenting. President Tom Yack was absent.

Canton mulls new farm effort

Although no firm direction was plotted for Canton's efforts to preserve its farmland, the Board of Trustees agreed Thursday to meet more frequently with the Planning Commission on preservation issues and problems.

The pledge came during a joint meeting between the board and commission on a number of township issues, including goals for the 1980's, the need for industry in the township, and the future of the agricultural - preservation program.

Speaking on behalf of the planning commission, Chairman Bob Padget told the board that not enough progress had been made on the preservation program, which hurts its chances to succeed.

"As time passes, we lose support (for the program)," said Padget. "Development pressure has been mounting. And the land is in limbo. Many senior citizens (who own land in the western half of the township) can't afford the (high) taxes.

"If it will ever fly, the program has to be kept as a front issue," he continued "It has to be kept alive."

He added that Trustee Robert Greenstein, the director of the township's farmland - preservation program, has not done enough on the local level, although he praised the trustee's pursuit of funding for the preservation in Lansing and Washington, D.C.

In sum, Padget recommended that the board of trustees appoint a new panel, called the farmland preservation board, that would carry out the program with specific deadlines and specific tasks.

Greenstein, who launched the farmland - preservation program during his term as supervisor (1974-76), agreed that a preservation board should be established, but added that it should not report to the board of trustees. "It should advise the farmland director, not the other way around," he said.

Twp. joins in Super Sewer plan costs

The Plymouth Township Board of Trustees approved spending \$104,714 for paart of the planning and design of the Huron Valley Waste-water Control System, also called the Super Sewer, last Tuesday night.

Although current plans for the Super Sewer which have been OK'd by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) don't include Plymouth Township, the board's approval gives Wayne County the go-ahead to plan another facility, said Thomas Hollis, water and sewer superintendent for Plymouth Township. "Another facility could include the township," he added.

If Plymouth Township is not included in the final plans, the township could be reimbursed about \$71.000. said Hollis.

According to figures from Wayne County, Plymouth Township is 42.9 pe present sewer capacity, said Hollis. Duane R. Egeland from the Wayne County Public Works Department spoke to the board for more than an hour last Tuesday night. He has also asked 18 other communities in the area for support for interim financing agreements. July, 1981 has been earmarked as the completion date for both the plans and specifications of Super Sewer, said Egeland. He added that bids for state and federal grants the project will be submitted in January, 1980. Currently, the EPA plans for the Super Sewer is divided into two parts: the first plan calls for a treatment plant and interceptors south of Joy Road, the second part plans for the area north of Joy Road. County officials will submit the financial

agreements from the area communities to the county's Board of Public Works before Dec. 18, said Egeland. The township's contract calls for payments to be made in eight installments of about \$13,000 each beginning 30 days after the grants are approved by the state and federal governments.

The total cost of the Super Sewer will be funded by 80 per cent state and federal grants and 20 per cent by local communities, said Egeland.

"By participating in this study, the township becomes eligible to receive a state grant for funding," said Supervisor Tom Notebaert. To dispose of the increased sewage flow, the



township can eilther ask residents to install septic tanks, buy more sewer capacity from other area communities (whose flows are diverted to the Super Sewer) or get increased capacity from the Super Sewer itself, said Notebaert.

"We're being asked to participate in a study which we may or may not benefit from" commented Trustee Maurice Breen.

"In effect, if a community doesn't benefit from the Super Sewer then they can be reimbursed in part," replied Egeland. Futhermore Egeland said a sewer plan for the next 20 years would be mapped out for each township Cont. on pg. 16

Another member of the planning commission, Bart Berg, said that the board should go to voters in 1980 and ask them to fund the program. In November, 1978, Canton citizens defeated a \$16 million request to pay for the preservation.



Does your 18 year old know how to rent an apartment, buy car insurance, or open a checking account at a bank?

Dubbed "life-skill competencies" by Dale Yagiela, Growth Works dirctor, these skills have been included in the agency's youth employment programs since 1978 and taught on an informal basis since 1971, Yagiela says.

"Young people want to achieve and be successful. We want to make sure they can do that," he continues.

Nearly 100 persons turned out to tour the Growth Works building, 271 S. Main St., Plymouth, Thursday night. They came to see the recently completed renovations.

Stationed at the doorway of each office in the building were students who had worked on the renovation project as part of their youth employment experience. Because they had measured the new-drop ceilings, hammered in the nails, and put up the ;new dry walls themselves, the students who participated in the program could explain first-hand each step of the work to residents who toured Thursday evening.

Hundreds of Plymouth-Canton teenagers have participated in Growth Works since it started in 1970 under the name "Youth Inc." said Yagiels.

Two employment programs are Youth **Community Conservation and Improvement** Project (YCCIP) and the Michigan Employment Program. Thirty persons, aged 16-19, wccip from Nov. 1 through Aug. 31 for 20 hours each week during the school year and 40 hours each week during the summer.

The YCCIP program, divided into six training areas, teaches basic skills such as construction, landscaping, money management and responsible behavior. Most importantly, the program is geared toward providing youth with skills that can be used in the working world of adults, say Yagiela.

Getting a job is a critical issue for young persons--particularlyu when they are getting out into the work world and fending for themselves right out of high school or for some, before high school ends, said Yagiela.

Yesterday, (Tuesday,. Dec. 11), representatives of the Department of abor came to Plymouth to observe the youth employment programs in action. "Our program was chosen from among hundreds," says Yagiela.

Conduct codes reviewed

Review of the student code of conduct for the Plymouth-Canton community schools began Dec. 6 with the organizational meeting of an advisory committee to the Board of Education. The 38 member committee was divided into three sub-groups to study elementary, middle, and high school codes.

Official appointment of the Student Code of Conduct Committee was set for the regular Board meeting Monday, Dec. 10. Members represent students, citizens, staff, parentteacher organizations, special education, school administration, and district administration.

The committee has been asked to review the code of student conduct, advise the board on philosphy of student conduct and compliance with state school laws, and suggest revisions to the present policy.

Student conduct and discipline is now covered by Board of Education administrative procedure Number 3206. The 30-page document is part of the school district policy and procedures manual, which covers all phases of school operations. It was developed by a 15 member representative committee and adopted in July, 1971.

The Student Code of Conduct Committee sub-groups will meet for four weeks. The entire group is expected to discuss recommendations on Wednesday, Jan. 18, and report to the School Board on Jan. 28, 1980:

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
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Canton takes 'final' cable vote again

Canton's Board of Trustees was scheduled last night to finally select a cable-television firm to serve the township.

Three firms are still in contention for the franchise, according to Supervisor Noel Culbert: Omnicom, Metrtovision, and Maclean-Hunter.

Up to last night, the board had seemingly taken a zig-zag course in granting the franchise. First, Omnicom was tentatively awarded the right to wire the township, but that action was later rescinded in favor of a Canadian firm, Maclean-Hunter.

Now, says Culbert, the board may rechoose Omnicom. "The early objections to Omnicom seem to have been overcome," said the supervisor. Omnicom had been criticized for apparently having inadequate financial backing; but recently the firm acquired the support of Capitol Cities Broadcasting, which among other things, owns WJR radio station in Detroit.

Also, said Culbert, objections to Maclean-Hunter, raised by Trustee Stephen Larson, have not been answered. Larson, after the board tentatively granted the franchise to Maclean-Hunter, called community leaders in New Jersey who dealt with Maclean and heard that the firm's performance was poor.

"Maclean has done nothing to rebut Larson's argument," said Culbert. "It looks like they've sidestepped the issue.

Lorenz gets \$11,000 sewer

A sanitary sewer hook-up for resident Ralph Lorenz, 45885 Ann Arbor Trail, and four of his neighbors, was approved by the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees last Tuesday night.

According to township engineer Michael Bailey, the installation of the eight-inch sewer line will cost the township about \$11,000. Lorenz and the four other homeowners seviced by the hook-up will have to pay additional charges for the connection from the "There is another sewer line more readily available (Byron Tonquish Sewer) and the township board has set a precedent in allowing him to hook up to a different one," she added.

He denies link Did Pugh's city vote conflict with appeal?

City Commissioner David Pugh has denied any connection between his making a motion for the city to accept the non-low bid on a tractor an; the fact that the bidder was chairman of the city's zoning appeals board where Pugh had a case pending.

"I didn't really connect the two," Pugh said.

At the Sept. 17 City Commission meeting, Pugh argued in favor of purchasing a riding mower from Saxton's Garden Center for \$4,875 rather than from the lowest qualifying bidder, a Birmingham company for \$105 less. Pugh's motion stressed the local availability of service as a reason for taking a higher bid and was unanimously approved by the City Commission.

Saxton's Garden Center, of Plymouth, is owned and operated by William Saxton, who is chairman of the ZBA.

At the time of Pugh's motion, he had pending an appeal to purchase parking credits for the Penniman Avenue Shops, of which he is co-owner. That item was scheduled for the Oct. 4 ZBA meeting where Pugh appeared on his own behalf. Saxton chairs the ZBA meeting and voted with three other ZBA members (the fifth opposed the issue) for Pugh's request.

Observers of the city political scene agree that neither Pugh's parking credit request nor Saxton's vote were inconsistent with past records.

But should Pugh have either disqualified himslef or entered a disclaimer into the record as he has done on other occassions where matters before the City Commission affected his property or business interests in town?

"Maybe I should have," he said Monday night after the commission's committee - of - the - whole meeting. "But the two actions in my mind were

completely mutually independent of each other.

"My application for parking credits is really so automatic. It really shouldn't involve any controversy," Pugh said.


Saxton said, "I was totally unaware that he (Fugh) had made that motion. I didn't even think about that bid award when we were considering the case.

"The case has to stand on its own merits," Saxton said. "This may have been to him (Pugh) the same as it was to me — he never gave it a thought.

"I have complete confidence in Dave Pugh and I don't think he'd ever do anything that would compromise his position," Saxton concluded.

The garden center owner, who learned of the timeing connection between the tractor vote and the ZBA case from The Crier, said the issue is even more ironic because when the city's bid tabulation on the tractors was made, it did not compare the quotes accurately and that in fact the Saxton's bid has since turned out to be the low bid.

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How can the city accomplish anything without someone at the helm?

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Historically, viewing the interaction between the city commission and the city manager, either one or the other takes command. Never mind that the charter bars the commission from monkeying in the city's day-today operations (as it did during Fred Yockey's doomed days) and the city manager from making policy decisions (as the Mayor Bev McAninch commission let Yockey do on annexation). The point is, the temptation (and perhaps the responsibility, even if by default) is for one or the other to grab the rudder.

With Hank Graper settling into the office on the northeast corner of City Hall, the watch is on to see how he'll fare.

But as to who'll end up on the city tiller, don't watch Graper -- he'll get down to business quickly and efficiently. Instead, watch the city commission chambers -- where the business of running the city falls apart just after the pledge of allegiance and the invocation under Paper Mayor Mary Childs. Maybe it's just the contrast having recently

seen how a mayor should lead the commission when Tom Turner held the reigns. Or Maybe it's just that a lack of direction

is so evident and Mayor Childs catches the blame for a less-than-average commission. Whose fault is it that the commission,

at the request of Commissioner Mark Wehmeyer, schedules a committee-of-the-whole meeting on the Cultural Center operation for the week Wehmeyer's on vacation? That type of floundering is typical of the curent commission.

Mayor Pro Tem Bud Martin has, on occasion, presented the commission with lists of items he'd like to see tackled. Last week's list included finalizing the annexation actions pending since 1974 (which the commission could easily finalize by withdrawing them) and establishing a charter commission to revise and update the charter before the next city elections (if it's done, let's hope this charter commission faces the real problems, unlike the last one which offered useless, cosmetic changes).

Commissioner Dave Pugh made a lengthy study of parking revenues and costs and submitted it to the commission.

Martin's and Pugh's reports are examples of how the commissioners stepped into administration during the absence of a city manager.

But what has happened to these types of suggestions placed before this commission? They languish and die. Take for example the studies of providing police protection to the township.

And with such inaction on the part of the commission, expect Graper's hand to assume the rudder by the Rule of Default for Captainless Ships at Sea.


Have you ever tried to look up a woman's phone number only to realize that you don't know her husband's name nor do you know her address?


Lacking that basic information means calling every identical last name in the book; The search is usually tedious and time-consuming. Worst of all, it's unnecessary.

Contract talks stalled

EDITOR:

It is about time the Plymouth-Canton Community is made aware that the Plymouth-Canton Community School Secretaries have not settled their contract. We have been trying to negotiate a contract since April to no avail.

Mr. Bartnick refuses to budge from his original offer of five per cent per year for the next three years with no mention of renewing the cost-of-living clause which was in our previous contract. Other groups that have settled have been given an eight or nine per cent increase and these groups start with a much higher base salary than the secretaries.

A five per cent increase to the average secretary would only amount to about twentyfive cents an hour. This is very down-grading as most of the secretaries in the system have had college backgrounds.

Do you realize the secretaries are the backbone of the school system? We are the ones that keep things running smoothly. We are the assistant principals. We are the ones parents, teachers, administrators, students, the general pupil, etc. always contact first. We are the PR people of the school system. We feel it is about time we are recognized as the professional people we are.

Are you aware there are executive secretaries at the borad office that are not a part of the Plymouth Canton Community Secretaries Association? These executive secretaries are paid a much higher wage than the rest of the secretaries, plus they receive a higher fringe benefit package. We feel this is very unfair as we are all doing the very best we can to do a super job.

We are told the reason the executive secretaries are paid a higher wage is because of the confidential work they do. We ask you, who handles more confidential information than the school secretaries in the school buildings? We deal direct with the parents and teachers and have a great great deal of confidential information to keep. Are you aware that over two-thirds of the

secretaries, who have been in the school system 10 years or more are paid less than a beginning custodial person. We ask you -is this fair?

The morale of the secretaries is at a very low ebb at this point. When the schools did not open on time this fall because of the teachers' strike we were on the job taking the blunt of the whole thing. We worked through the turmoil and kept things running smoothly.

Yet the teachers' contract, economic wise, was settled and with a fairly good wage increase and here we are still carrying the load, and working without a contract. We ask you -- is this fair?

Please let your school board know how you feel. We would appreciate your help.



Eleven-year old Gian-Carlo Vellutino will come to Plymouth to play the lead role in "Amahl and the Night Visitors" on Sunday, Dec. 16 at 4 p.m. The opera, composed by Gian-Carolo Menotti, will be presented by the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Carl St. Clair, professor of music and a member of the conducting faculty at the University of Michigan.

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It's not simply a coincidence that Vellutina, a sixth-grader at Westlake Middle School in New York, has the same first name as the composer of "Amahl." He was named after Menotti in honor of this opera which his parents had oten directed.

The performance, to be presented at the Salem High School auditorium, includes Rosemary Kuhlmann, who plays Amahl's mother, and David Aiken, from Indiana University, in the role of King Melchior. Aiken is also in charge of production.

Amahl is a crippled shepherd who lives with his mother, a poor widow. Three Wise Men, on their way to Bethlehem, stop at their home and ask to stay the night. Amahl and his mother welcome them, but when his mother sees the expensive gifts to be given to the Christ Child she becomes bitter and envious.

When the three kings are asleep, she steals some of their gold. She's caught red-handed and tells the kings that she needs the gold to feed her starving child. The kings explain to her who the newborn babe is and the widow returns the gold and wishes to give a gift of her own.

Amahl comes to her rescue and impulsively hands over his wooden crutch, his most precious possession, which he had carved by hand. By giving that present, Amahl is cured of his lameness. When dawn breaks, Amahl joins the kings on their journey to worship the babe.

As a young singer, Gian-Carlo began his professional career two years ago when he was singing with the Boys Choir of Westchester, N.Y. He played Louis in the Broadway production of "The King and I" starring Yul Brynner. The show's composer is Richard Rodgers. His parents have performed professionally in stock productions and are members of the Actors' Equity.

"Amahl and the Night Visitors" was the first opera ever written for television. "It's a delight suitable for both adults and children," said Oliver Wagner, symphony publicity director.

In addition to the opera, the symphony will perform three shorter works by Beethoven, Debussy, and Brahms during the concert.

Tickets are \$5.50 for adults and \$2.75 for students and senior citizens. They can be purchased in advance from: Beitner's Jewelry and Heide's Flowers, both on Ann Arbor Trail, Plymouth; Plymouth Book World, in Forest Place Mall and on Penniman Avenue; and, Arnoldt Williams Music, Inc., Canton Center at Ford Road.

30 school heads given 8,9 per cent raises

About 30 school administrators who aren't represented by a union were given a nine per cent raise for 1979-80 and an eight per cent raise for 1980-81 at Monday night's Board of Education meeting.

The employes include the director of transportation, executive secretaries, administrative assistants, and other program directors in the school district.

Board members also approved a nine per cent raise for the school district's three assistant superintendents, Norm Kee, Michael Homes, and Raymond Hoedel. The increase, which makes their salaries \$41,353, was OKd for the 1979-80 school year, but an eight per cent raise was denied for the following year. "Let's not OK their salaries beyond this year until we've had a chance to evaluate their job performances," said Treasurer Steve Harper.

Also included in the assistant superintendents' new salaries is a \$25 increase in their expense allowances (from \$75 to \$100 per month) and an improved life insurance policy.

Scores of school secretaries crowded into the board meeting Monday night. They had come to protest the lack of progress in contract negotiations, but at the meeting Loretta Olson, union president, reported that their team had met with school negotiators "all day Monday and we're meeting again tomorrow (Tuesday, Dec. 11).

"So I won't make the 30-page speech that I had prepared. We're very close to a settlement," said Olson. The secretaries responded with a round of applause.

In addition to the secretaries, four employe groups haven't had their contracts ratified by the board. They are teachers, cafeteria workers, bus drivers, and teachers' aides.

According to Norm Kee, assistant superintendent for employe relations, "we're continuing to make progress with the aides, bus drivers, and cafeteria workers."

Bus drivers have submitted an economic package to the board's team; the cafeteria workers will meet to negotiate again on Dec. 15; and, negotiations are continuing with the aides, too, said Kee Monday night. "We're hoping for a settlement with the aides soon," he ádded.

Meanwhile the teachers' new contract remains unsettled until bargainers meet with an administrative law judge in January to settle the compounding factor in the new salary scale and a grievance filed at the table during negotiations.

The Board of Education has ratified new contracts for school principals and janitors. Groups without a contract are working under a contract extension.

Cont. from pg. 3 expensive," he said. "We can't have everything."

Two other communities in the nation have funded farm preservation programs, King County, Wash., and Suffolk County, N.Y., he said. But the cost per capita in these communities is far below the projected price in Canton, said Shefferly.

"In King County, the voters approved \$50 million, which works out to \$43.13 per person," he said. "And in Suffolk County, they've paid \$8.87 per person.



Canton's projected cost is \$400 per person. Even if the federal government matched our funds, it would still cost \$200 per person.

"Instead, we need an intelligent growth management plan, so Canton will develop harmoniously. People will get the shaft with this (farmland) program."

Greenstein replied that studies have shown that in the long run it is cheaper to pay the landowners to preserve the land than to pay for urban services, such as school, roads, and police, in the developed area.

Trustee Carol Bodenmiller summed up the discussion by saying, "We've got to work together. Going off in different directions just won't work."

After this, the board decided, by a straw vote, to meet more frequently with the planning commission to discuss the program.

The planning commission had sought Thursday's meeting with the board

The board approved the expenditure unanimously after Egeland said two revisions in the contract would be agreed to by the county. The first revision calls for a clarification on the township's liability during construction and the second calls for more local input from local communities in setting up the water rate charges in the county. Schoolcraft roads. The township board tabled the preliminary plat approval by a vote of 5-2, with Supervisor Tom. Notebaert and Treasurer Joe West dissenting.

Some residents from the Lake Pointe Subdivision have complained that by extending Greenbriar to Haggerty Road a traffic problem would be created by drivers cutting through the subdivision. Greenbriar does not connect with Haggerty now, but the Planning Commission approved a motion to extend Greenbriar to Haggerty. The matter was tabled until the second meeting in January. 

DNR eyes Twp. hunting

Should hunting west of Beck Road in Plymouth Township be banned?

The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) will re-evaluate that question, according to a resolution passed unanimously by the Board of Trustees last Tuesday night. The DNR has the final authority on whether to allow the sport or not.

Some residents have requested the hunting ban because: the M-14 expressway has opened; construction of new subdivisions west of Beck Road; and, the problems caused by hunters who trespass on others' properties.

In 1977, DNR recommended that hunting be allowed west of Beck Road. The sport has been banned east of Beck Road for ears. Also in 1976, township residents approved a hutning ban in the entire township when asked that advisory question at the polls.

Representatives from the township, Wayne County Sheriff's Department, State police, and DNR will study the question and report back to the township board.

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

Knollwood Cemetery agrees to probation

BY W. EDWARD WENDOVER A Canton cemetery, Knollwood Memorial Park of Ridge Road, agreed to be placed under probation by the Michigan Cemetery Commission and to appoint a trustee to administer its legally controlled funds.

A consent agreement reached in Wayne County Circuit Court before Judge John D. O'Hair, Knollwood Park, owned by Sam Tocco, and the state's Cemetery Commission, which oversees Michigan cemeteries stipulates:

[•]The Cemetery Commission amends its Feb. 27, 1978 order revoking Knollwood's registration to a three-year-and-30 day probation.

*Knollwood agrees to make deposits as required by law into its Endowed Care Trust Fund and Merchandise Trust Fund as sales of burial rights and cemetery merchandise, goods and services are made.

*The Commission shall undertake an

•Knollwood shall appoint a corporate trustee to oversee its trust accounts. (According to Gary Eppolito, Knollwood administrator, a Detroit bank has been chosen, although details were incomplete.)

•Knollwood agreed to maintain the cemetery according to "industrystandards" during the probationary period.

*Knollwood agreed to begin an accelerated repayment to the make up a shortage of \$129,452.20 in the merchandise trust fund and of \$41,642,28 in the endowed care fund and to make up those shortages before the probation ends.

*Knollewood will pay a penalty of 10 percent on shortages occuring after April 6, 1978.

•Knollwood agreed to deliver all merchandise already sold within 60 days of requests by its customers.

•If Knollwood is sold, it agreed to have the new buyer made aware of, and agree to the consent order.

•If Knollwood violates the agreement, the state cemetery commission, on four days notice, may modify the probation to a suspension of the cemetery's registration and appoint a temporary receiver for the operation.

The cemetery commission has been investigating Knollwood for at least threeyears. George Bruce, secretary of the commission, said last week the state was preparing an audit of Knollwood's books.

During a hearing held by the cemetery commission last March 29, Tocco and Eppolito testified that Knollwood's operations were unfairly hampered by state laws governing trust funds and that no money had been taken from the cemetery operation.

Tocco, who described himself as a "vegetable merchant," has faced other difficulties with Knollwood, when his bank filed suit to foreclose on the undeveloped portions of the cemetery for non-payment of his mortgage.

Canton pledges to seek industrial expansion

-BY CHAS CHILD

A strong effort to lure industrial development to Canton Township was pledged by the Board of Trustees Thursday night.

The resolution is not a new policy for the board, rather a rededication to relieve residents of an ever-increasing tax load.

Among the initiatives planned by the board to boost the township's tax base include paving Haggerty Road south of Joy Road, which will enable the development of an industrial subdivision, and compiling an inventory of industrially zoned parcels.

How to pave Haggerty attracted most of the attention at Thursday's meeting of the board, the township's Economic Development Corporation (EDC), and Industrial Commercial Development Committee (ICDC).

The township board has tentatively decided to develop some industrial land it owns along Haggerty, south of Joy, once the road is paved.

However, the Wayne County Road commission says it is too strapped for money to pave Haggerty soon. Furthermore, the project is low on the commission's paving priority list, according to township officials.

The only way to speed the project up is to help the road commission pay for it, said Clerk John Flodin. If the township will supply \$125,000, the paving can be done much sooner, road commission officials have told Supervisor Noel Culbert. "If we wait for the road commission to pave it the world will pass us by," said the clerk, urging the board to commit the \$125,000.

Trustee Robert Greenstein replied, "How can we be sure that after we've paid for the paving that we have takers (for the industrial subdivision?)

"I think it (paying for the paving) is without a doubt a sound investment," said Harold Fischer, a member of the ICDC.

"If we don't get industrial development now, in three or four years we'll be in real trouble," added Bob Schaetzl, chairman of both the EDC and the ICDC.

however, the township decides the paving question, Treasurer Jim Donahue said, "We are going to have to give a lot to get what we want (more industry in Canton). It may have to be zoning and money."



The board has also talked about hiring an industrial coordinator to actively recruit industries looking for a site, although no action was taken at the meeting.

"We need an inventory of industrial parcels done and then we could hire an aggressive industrial coordinator," said Greenstein.

At the end of the discussion, Flodin said he would prepare a resolution for the board's sconsideration that would define the township's direction and goals for industrial expansion.

Budget squeeze may curtail trash pick-up

Monday's Plymouth City Commission meeting will be a lot of rubbish.

The commission is scheduled to vote on solving the budget squeeze felt by anticipated increases in garbage collection costs with the expiration of the current city contract with Midwest Sanitation.

At a committee-of-the-whole meeting Monday, the commissioners discussed the possibility of extending the current contract with Midwest Sanitation until July 1, allowing the city go negotiate a new contract.

When bids on the contract were solicited two weeks ago, Midwest's bid was thrown out for not meeting specs and the lone remaining bidder's price was far in excess of the amount budgeted for refuse disposal.

City Manager Henry Graper will make a recommendation to the commission Mondayprobably to extend the current contract while negotiating a new bid for the service.

Among the possibilities facing the commission are some cutbacks in refuse collection service (such as cutting back to every other week residential pickup and once or twice a week commercial pickup) to stay within the city's budget.

The commission meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m. Monday in City Hall.

. . .and Cultural Center reports added costs

Adding to the other woes seen by the City of Plymouth budget this year, City Recreation Director Chuck Skene has sent a report showing that operational expenses of the Cultural Center were \$20,600 more than anticipated thus far this year.

The City Commission was scheduled to discuss Skene's report last week, but has not rescheduled the discussion.

Schools borrow \$2.3 million

To meet cash-flow needs, the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education approved borrowing \$2.3 million in a state aid note on Monday night.

The low bid will be awarded at a special meeting on Jan. 7, 1980. It is necessary to borrow money as a direct result of the Headlee Amendment, Supt. John M. Hoben told. board members Monday night. He said that school districts are required by Headlee to earmark the first tax monies received in a separate fund until the money and interest ahas accumulated.

The result is a cash-flow problem to meet operating expenses, Hoben added.

He also said that the school district "will probably make some mony on the deal. We'll borrow the money at 8 per cent rates and then invest the money at 12 or 13 per cent

In 1978, John Jawor, Hilltop Glen manager signed a five-year contract with Plymouth Township to operate the nine-hole course. The lease will expire in October, 1983; However, Jawor is asking the township to shorten the lease by two years so that it will expire in October, 1981.

Jawor's attorney, William Hopp, requested that change and others at the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees meeting last Tuesday night.

According to Hopp, some problems, "which turned out to be much worse than originally anticipated," have emerged since Jawor signed the contract. They include: a two-month delay in moving and constructing installation and correct operation of the November.

Canton second in growth

Despite a slump in the housing industry, Canton Township is still ranked as the second-fastest growing community in the Detroit metropolitan area.

In figures released by the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, (SEMCOG), Canton issued permits for 553 housing units in the first six months of 1979. This ranked second behind Farmington Hill's 820.

By comparison, Canton issued permits for 1,183 units in all of 1978, well ahead of 1979's contract calls for the operation of a nine-hole course.





Some thoughts on basketball, officiating and tournaments.

It always amazes me when I watch girls basketball teams in action. They have that emotional spark that is sometimes lacking in the boys games.

Salem and Redford Union's regional championship game is a case in point. Obviously it was a big game and obviously the girls were psyched for it. But to watch their joys and sorrows so openly expressed on the court -- that's something different. Intensity is the watch word with girls sports and that was the case Friday in the title clash.

Unfortunately both teams' hard work was hampered by a lack of good officiating. It is assumed that for such a major contest as a regional final the men and women officials (in this case two women) would be of the highest possible quality. Not so.

Without taking away from RU's victory or addin to Salem's defeat, the officials just down right poor. The constant traveling violations were by far the most upsetting thing to yours truly.

Pattý Weidman, for example, had just completed what loked like a perfect turnaround jumper when she was called for traveling. That's a first and there were many more. The referees found too many mistakes in the foot-work of both squads.

And then there were fouls that would come out of the blue. It was amazing that only two girls fouled out. The end result of poor officiating, score withstanding, is that it usually shatters the whole tempo of the game and slows the pace down without cause or reason.

As for improving the officials lot, all I can say for the moment is that they should be trained as hard as the athletes. Officials can ruin an outstanding game.

It seems to me that the whole key in most basketball efforts is a team's ability or inability to work the ball inside. Everything offensively depends on it. The ball must be worked by passing until an opening is found.

Once an opening is found it is up to the individual player to go for it. There seems to be a fine line of team work and individualism in the sport of basketball. The Salem girls, as an example, would work the ball around the outside of the lane until one of them decided to go for broke, so to speak. It is like a well-time dance step. The moves have to be right and must be performed

in generally the same fashion with variations on the actual step. I like that. I like the idea of both teamwork and individual effort. It makes the game

I like that. I like the idea of both teamwork and individual effort. It makes the game for the players.

I am looking forward to watching th4e boys in action. I wonder if they dance as much as the girls Boys basketball is a demanding sport. take and double all the ingredients in the girls version of the game and you have the boys version.

I really enjoy high school tournaments. All the sports have their own tournaments though different they still have one thing in common, atmosphere.

The intensity of the players is complimented by the intensity of the crowds. The whole gym becomes on electric place. From a reporters view, I tend to study the game much harder. My own intensity picks up and I find myuself actually wishing to be more closely involved. Strategy and tactics are a big thing with me and tournaments seem to bring out those finer elements of each.

A final thought. This is only my second column in my entire journalistic career and to tell the truth I have that sophomore jinx. But stick with and I'll stick with it. Basically I'm still the new kid on the block.

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


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Rocks finish tournament with class


points.

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

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


