State \$\$ granted to old Cherry Hill school

Gov. James Blanchard has approved a grant of \$99,500 for the acquisition and restoration of Cherry Hill School, at Ridge and Cherry Hill roads in Canton, but the money may not be used if the Plymouth-Canton School Board does not allow the school to be acquired by the township.

"This is a tremendous compliment to Canton," said Canton Supervisor James Poole. "This is fantastic. I would hope others would be a pleased as I am."


Poole, however, said the money could not be used unless the school board agreed to let the township acquire the school and designate it a historic site. Poole said it would be "sad" if the school board did not give up the school.

In a letter thanking a supporter of the Cherry Hill School project. Poole wrote, "Unfortunately, the Canton/Plymouth School Board does not support (the project) and if the money is received, we will be forced to return it to the state."

Superintendent of Schools Dr. John Hoben said the school board had not been contacted about the grant, but would be willing to deal with the Canton board. "It seems to me that we'll probably be looking for some kind of a trade-off."

Along with the grant, \$1,050 in local funds has been raised for the restoration project.

The Cherry Hill School restoration project was one of 85 Michigan Equity Fund grants awarded statewide. Seven grants were approved in Wayne County. According to the governor's office, 332 local units of government. applied for the grants, submitting 635 projects for review by the Department of Commerce. The projects asked for Cont. on pg. 46

Ist budget for new library board Bd. OK's library budget

The Plymouth District Library Board of Trustees approved its first ever Dunning Hough Library budget Monday. The 1986 budget totals \$490,307.

The document's revenues are based mostly on a .8 mill library levy voters approved Nov. 5. City and township taxpayers saw the levy for the first time on recently-issued winter tax bills.

Operating expenses total \$374,344, including, \$190,139 for salaries and benefits and \$78,475 for supplies -- books and materials.

Other expenditures are \$52,330 for retirement of bonded debt, \$7,000 for capital improvement, \$12,920 to create an equipment reserve fund, and \$40,713 for an operating reserve fund.

The library levy will raise \$403,500 for the library, according to budget estimates. State aid, fines and rentals make up the rest of the revenues.

Voters approved formation of the district and elected the nine-member board Sept. 10.

Board member Jack Bologna was absent from the meeting Monday.

Four people were injured Saturday when a car struck a backhoe as city DPW crews worked along Sheldon Road.


Police said the backhoe was backing up behind barricades in the right lane of Sheldon Road around 8 p.m. when the two vehicles struck. The DPW vehicle's front-load bucket caused heavy damage to side of the car.

All four of the injured were taken by ambulance to St. Mary Hospital. Edward John Volinski, 66, of Farmer in Plymouth, the car's driver refused hospital treatment and was released. His wife, Olga, 61, who was riding in the front passenger seat, suffered facial injuries. She was listed in fairly good condition Tuesday.

Russel Nieman, 72, of 590 Farmer, was listed in good condition Tuesday. Another passenger, Betty Harding, 62, was treated and released from the hospital.

Witnesses told police Volinski's car was in the left lane when it struck the bucket of the DPW vehicle, which was climbing a curb. DPW workers told police Volinski was in or was close to the right lane when the accident occurred.

hopping center planned for March

The Canton Planning Commission Monday unanimously recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the development of a 113,545 square-foot shopping center to be built on the southeast corner of Joy and Morton Taylor roads.

The shopping center, to be named 'Coventry Commons East,'' would be developed by The Nelson/Ross Companies, a real estate development firm from Farmington Hills.

As part of the development, onequarter mile of unpaved Morton Taylor Road would be paved, as construction on the shopping center progressed, according to developer David Nelson.

The Board may consider the development at its next meeting.

The shopping center's biggest retailers, would include an A and P supermarket, Arbor Drug store and

Aco Hardware, according to Nelson. Space is also being reserved for a bank site, he said. The remainder of the center would have specialty shops.

Construction will begin in March if the Board approves the plan.

"Overall, the plan exceeds our requirements," said Director of Economic Growth David Nicholson. Nicholson said recommendations from the fire marshall and his staff had been met by the developers, and the

homeowners associations of Mayfair and Windsor Park, which border the proposed center, had also approved.

The plan calls for an L-shaped building, in post-modern design, and a parking lot with more than 600 spaces.

The developers also own property on the west side of Morton Taylor Road, and may build a shopping center on that site in the future, according to Nelson.

Canton Clerk Linda Chuhran was to have introduced a resolution to the Board of Trustees last night "admonishing" Supervisor James Poole for voting Nov. 26 on a zoning ordinance amendment that affects some property his mother owns.

The board considered an amendment at the Nov. 26 board meeting to allow package liquor sales, through party stores, in C-3 (highway oriented) commercial districts.

Poole's mother, Kathleen, owns a piece of property zoned C-3 in Canton, which would be affected by the amendment. The amendment failed on a 6-1 vote, with Poole voting for the amendment.

"My feeling is that it is a conflict of interest," said Chuhran. "I want the board to discuss it."

Chuhran said Poole should have made public the fact that his mother owns property that would be affected by the zoning amendment. Chuhran said she had information from the Attorney General's office regarding conflict of interest cases, and that it applied to Poole's vote.

Poolé said his vote did not constitute a conflict of interest since the amend-

ment would affect all C-3 zoned property, and was not a change of, zoning for his mother's property only. **''I**t "I voted on zoning," he said.

affects the whole C-3 zoning."

Kathleen Poole owns less than onehalf acre of property zoned C-3. There are approximately 395 acres of land zoned C-3 in Canton.

George Odish, Canton, is interested in buying Kathleen Poole's property and building a party store there, according to township documents.

Trustee Loren Bennett said the zoning amendement was too broad a change to represent a conflict of interest on Poole's part. "As a matter of overall policy, I don't see that as a conflict of interest," he said.

Bennett said Poole's voting on the amendment would be inappropriate only if it would change the zoning on a specific parcel of land. Bennett added that he thought Poole's vote had nothing to do with Kathleen Poole's property, but more with the ordinance itself. "Jim has a basic belief that our current C-3 zoning is wrong," he said. Poole referred to a legal opinion on

the matter in explaining why he voted in favor of the amendment.

obtained a legal memo from the offices of Butzel, Long, Gust, Klein and Van Zile June 14 which concluded that the



"Come on, there's got to be a parking spot around here somewhere." For the second weekend in a row,

parking places were hard to come by in downtown Plymouth. But this didn't keep the crowd of shoppers away. And neither has the weather.

Ronnie Sebuck, owner of the Accent Bin on Ann Arbor Trail said her store was busy all day the Friday after Thanksgiving, all day Saturday, "and we were packed all day Sunday, even with the pouring rain. If it had been nicer weather, it would have been fantastic!"

Most merchants in The Plymouth-Canton Community agree, sales are up over last year. And even with this year's shorter Christmas shopping season, an increase, dollar-wise, is anticipated.

"Buyers are a little more selective (in what they are spending their money on) than last year," said Irv Zeidman, of Judith Anne, a women's clothing store on Ann Arbor Trail. Customers of Plymouth Hobby, located in Westchester Square on Forest Avenue, have no problems getting items they want, according to owner John Aversa. Johnson may take Chuhran complaint to court

A Union Lake woman may take her complaint of an alleged driving incident involving Canton Clerk Linda Chuhran one step further after the Oakland County Sheriff's Department completes a report on the complaint.

Ann Johnson, 35, said there was a "very good chance" she would pursue the matter in court after the Sheriff's Department reports back to her. Johnson filed the formal charge of reckless driving after an internal Canton police investigation into the complaint last month.

The Canton police took statements from Johnson and two witnesses, and from Chuhran. It concluded that Johnson would have to pursue the complaint with a law enforcement agency that had jurisdiction in the area the alleged incident occurred.

Johnson wrote a letter to the state Department of Management and Budget Oct. I complaining about a woman who was driving "like a maniac" in a state vehicle south on Haggerty Road between Pontiac Trail and 12 Mile Road on Sept. 28. The woman, Johnson wrote, was driving dangerously and "gave (Johnson) the finger" as Johnson passed the car.

Johnson reported the license-plate number to the state, and the number was traced to Chuhran's township vehicle. Canton Supervisor James Poole ordered the police to investigate after being notified of the complaint by the state.

Chuhran has denied being in the area at the time of the complaint. "I wasn't there," she answered to the allegation at the Nov. 26 board meeting.

Johnson was also at the Nov. 26 board meeting and identified Chuhran as the driver of the vehicle. "I said to my husband, 'That's the person right there," Johnson said.

The Canton police investigation included statements from Johnson and two others who were in the car with her at the time of the alleged incident, who backed up Johnson's account. Police also took statements from Chuhran, who said she was shopping in Dearborn on the day of the alleged incident and didn't remember being at the location where Johnson cident happened.

Records from the Lakeland Arena in West Bloomfield show that Chuhran's son played in a hockey game there on Sept. 28, the day Johnson says she witnessed the reckless driving incident.

Chuhran said at the Nov. 26 board meeting that she would not respond unless she was being formally charged with a driving complaint. "This is an allegation," she said. "I want a charge to be made so I can defend myself."

Johnson said she first filed the complaint because she was angry that a state vehicle was driven "dangerously" and the driver was "rude."

"I'm not trying to ruin the woman." she said. "I was mad because I thought, 'This is my money'" when the state car drove by, Johnson said.


The blood drive last week in behalf of six-year-old Devanie Weise was not in vain.

e Soccer melee uncalled for

With under 10 minutes remaining in the (Thursday, Oct. 24) soccer game between Salem and North Farmington-high schools, a fight broke out between Dave Dameron of Salem and Paul Najar of North Farmington.

In the ensuing minutes chaos broke out. Both benches joined in, as did the other players on the field. When it was all over, two players were ejected from the game.

It is true that this kind of behavior does not show much class, but it would not be fair to put all the blame on the players.

It was not their fault.

One of the major causes of the brawl was poor refereeing. This has been a problem all year for high school soccer, but I do not think I have seen any worse than that night, Oct. 24. The referees were missing calls left and right.

Twice Salem players were "brought down from behind (tripped on a slide tackle) and the lady ref didn't call anything," said Ken Johnson, Salem coach.

This causes the player who is pushed, without the referee calling it, to push back. When it happens time and time again, the retaliation gets worse by progression, until finally all-out fight begins.

"I told the referee on my side ... he better watch, that something would happen. It just went in one ear and out the other," said Cathy Cole, North Farmington coach.

The other major cause of the fight was that when a player would make an illegal play in retaliation, he would get cheers of encouragement from teammates and the fans. "One of our players elbowed a kid in the ribs on a throw-in and the crowd was screaming 'nice job.' " said Rachel Thiet, a Salem sophomore who was in the crowd.

Teammates have a partial excuse, if it was happening to them as well. The fans, however, include the parents for whom there is no excuse.

Both of these causes and their effect on the game were definite on that Thursday night.

To become a referee, all a person has to do is score 75 out of 100 on the U.S.S.F. (United States Soccer Federation) test. There is no mandatory course to take or on the job training.

The problem with the officials will have to be ultimately handled by the athletic director, but the problem with the fans (adults and students both) we can handle ourselves.

This does not just apply to soccer, but to all sports. The fans should cheer on players for doing positive things that help the team win, not for doing negative or illegal things that hurt the game and a player's development into a responsible adult.

How can teenagers be expected to grow up doing what is right if his own parents are encouraging him when he does something wrong? JOHN FLOWER

Rep. Law's immaturity keeps important information from public

The message left with state Rep. Gerry Law's secretary in Lansing goes unanswered. The message left on his answering machine brings no return phone call.

Law, the man voters elected to represent them in the state House of Representatives, is unresponsive these days. Apparently, he doesn't like to talk to The Community Crier anymore.

A few months back, around the time eight inmates had escaped from Western Wayne Correctional Facility (WWCF), a tour of the prison was arranged, with warden Emmett R. Baylor Jr. guiding local politicos through the troubled prison. A couple local newspapers got phone calls from Law's office inviting them along for the tour. The Crier didn't. Uhprofessional conduct from hold-

a-grudge Gerry? That's right.

It seems Law is a man whose overinflated ego doesn't let him forget. He ran for re-election in 1984 and won. The Crier endorsed him, in a roundabout way. We said the oft-arrogant Law was better than his unqualified opponent. But not much better.

He never forgot. Most politicians learn can cope with The Crier's political endorsements. Not Gerry.

When he was cornered about two months ago in Plymouth Township Hall and asked why he never returns phone calls, he said: "It's a free country. You guys can publish what you want and I can speak to whom I want."

Heavy stuff, eh?

Problems surface when a serious issue like WWCF is on the minds of people in the community. Prisoners escape and nearby residents are concerned. Law, as a state politician has a responsibility to try to ease residents' concern. They are, after all, his constituents.

But he's too busy carrying a grudge. We can get along fine without Law, and he may be able to get along fine without The Crier.

His constituents, who returned him to Lansing last year, are the losers in Law's immature grudge game.

Why horsetrader Hudson didn't become cowboy

"There are a hell of a lot of things they didn't tell me when I hired on with this outfit."

That anonymous inscription under the picture of a rugged looking cowboy, hanging in a local business office, personifies the life and outlook of its owner, Joseph L. Hudson. The quizzical expression on the cowboy's face seems to be saying, "What next?"

The 74-year-old Hudson, who for half a century has ben one of the community's leading Realtors, has a right to pose such a query.

Never hospitalized in his first 72 years, Joe's recent months have been punctuated with such medical trifles as corroded arteries, at least four strokes, a five-way heart by-pass, a perforated ulcer that burst, and vocal cord damage that has reduced his voice to a whisper.

Yet he's back on his feet, gets to the command post of the J.L. Hudson Real Estate Co. for a couple of hours every workday, and insists the time again will come when he can be found in his beloved great outdoors with gun or flyrod in hand, or in the saddle on a favorite horse.

"I am bound and determined to do it," he said a few days ago.

He also is determined to keep a finger in the real estate field as health permits, specializing in commercial and industrial property. He will retain an office even though his only coworker will be his secretary of 25 years, Marge Schultz.

At one time the sales staff numbered 22 just in Hudson's Plymouth office alone. And there were other employes working out of satellite offices in the Irish Hills, South Lyon, Flint, Saginaw and Northville.

Joe is a Michigan native who was raised on a farm at Clayton, over Adrian way, and there were 12 in his high school graduating class. His father turned from building houses and barns to the meat business, somewhat akin to the Koch family's sausage operation here, and as a young man Joe helped on a sales route extending to Detroit.

There he and a cousin opened a



meat freezer operation with 500 lockers in what was then Livonia Township. But times were bad and Joe would up on the WPA in Plymouth at the height of the Depression, working on sewer construction and painting bathrooms and ceilings at old Plymouth High School (now Central Middle School).

A fling at real estate followed and the first Hudson office was in a skinny structure on Main Street which had been erected originally by the city as a downtown rest room. Later it became Dave Agnew's jewelry store and now the site is a walkway between Armbruster Bootery and the John Smith 'othing store from Main to the decked parking lot.

"We did a million dollars in sales the first year," recalls Hudson. Admitedly, he had found his permanent niche in the business world.

"I love this town. I love the people," he added. "This community is going to keep right on growing."

He can talk at length about the old days and how the area has developed (with land prices soaring accordingly) and in our conversation he did. But as one looks around his office and notices the riding boots, spurs, lariat, bridle and other hints of horsemanship, the question automatically forms: "How come you didn't become a cowboy?"

The closest Hudson came to that mode of life was as owner of a 1.700acre range in Montana with 200 head of cattle, although he also had an interest in a Quarter Horse farm west of Plymouth. One thing he never really hankered to do was get into the department store business with his distant cousin, J.L. Hudson of Detroit.

Anyone who has been to the Big Sky country of Montana knows its lure.

"We used to have cattle drives out there," said Joe. "It was a small range and I worked the drives, too. We branded cattle, recorded numbers and everything, and lived on the trail. It's interesting and it's hard work. I had a roping horse and, damn, he was unpredictable. He was something else."

Then there was a tale about an older fellow, also a Realtor, out in Montana. "He didn't handle any deal under a million dollars," praised Joe. "He wanted me to come out there and join him. He offered me his house for \$20,000; here it would be worth \$120,000.

"It was only 10 acres but there was a stream where you could cast with a fly rod right out the back door and catch trout. Boy, it was gorgeous!"

So why did Hudson turn down this deal to buy a piece of paradise?

"I had a responsibility here. When you hire people, you owe them something. They're keeping their families on the money you're paying 'em. I couldn't let them down."


This trait is echoed by his long-time secretary, who said of her friend, "He

never has a bad thing to say about anyone. He's a very caring person, one who is alwalys there when someone needs help."

And maybe there is a deeper side to Joe Hudson than some acquaintances realize--one that can be seen best along the streams or on the trails. It can be detected in such words of serenity as:

"I've sat up north in Michigan and out in Montana with a high powered rifle over my knees and had a deer come up within three or four feet--a big buck--and I never pulled the trigger.

"It's the only place, the only way, you can get close to God. You might



be anywhere, but this thing comes over you and it just swamps you.

"I hardly ever tell this story to anybody because they'd think I'm nuts. Every year, except this last one, I've managed to go somewhere and maybe have sat out in the woods all night with just my horse. You can talk to God out there."

Are schools overcrowded? Will they be soon?


There is a big decision in the offing for Plymouth-Canton Schools. Next week, school administrators and the school board will entertain the Citizens Bond Committee. For the past half dozen months this committee, along with other special committees, has been trying to figure out what the district should do.

If anything.

Should we hold a millage election to build a new middle school? Should we fix up the aged, but sentimental favorite, Central Middle School? Should we realign the grade structures at the elementary and middle schools? The ninth-graders are already headed for CEP by 1990. Or should we do nothing? And just who are we anyway?

Doing nothing has never been a popular idea. It doesn't seem right. Maybe not even American. Better to



fall flat on your face then sit on your butt.

The schools seemed to get the biggest rise from folks by just hinting at doing nothing, or staying "status quo." At a school board workshop two weeks ago, David Rodwell, head of data processing for the schools, said "to do nothing was an impossibility." Teacher Carole Rundio, said, at the board's meeting Monday, the same thing.

It would be easy to do nothing.

What's the problem anyway? Classroom overcrowding that hampers the educational process. Nothing else really matters. Have we heard any complaints? Well, yes, actually. Teachers will often tell you the kids are getting short changed (too many diapers in the hamper?). Derald McKinley, a fifth grade teacher at Gallimore, told me, back in September, that he felt his classes were too big, and had been for years. The students haven't complained. "Do you think you could leave her here?" the waitress nodded to my fedup girlfriend.





<u>friends & neighbors</u> Grief counselor helps people cope

A family has lost a loved one. The loss, though immeasurable, is made worse. It's happened during the Christmas season.

Diane O'Connor is a grief specialist. It was her training, and now her job, to help people overcome a loss. She has a private practice in Farmington Hills. Now she is part of "Horizons," a free counseling program sponsored by Schrader's Funeral Home in Plymouth.

O'Connor says it's common for people, whose loss may have occurred months, or even years ago, to become more saddened when the holidays come along. On Monday nights, O'Connor holds grief workshops at the Plymouth Historical Museum. The topic for this week will be 'The Holidays--Can't I Just Turn Them Off This Year.'

"It's a time when people, if sad around the holidays, feel there must be something wrong with them," she says.

O'Connor agreed that holidays are a time of memories. Most people generally look back at them as "better times.".

For most people who have trouble recovering from the death of a loved one, the problem may amplify during the holidays, but obviously, the problem is there always.

"People grieve in different ways," O'Connor says. "It's a fallacy that after three or four months following the death, you should be fine. You never get over the hurt.

"There may be plenty of support immediately after the funeral, but then everyone is gone. It gets harder for you to see other people. Friends make a point not to talk about the (deceased) when you are around. Then you can't understand why others aren't grieving too. The others don't realize that the (deceased) is on your mind 24 hours a day."

O'Connor says she tries to develop a "coping strategy" for the bereaved.

"Ninety per cent of the people I see

say they don't want to live anymore. I don't tell them 'Do this, do that.' Often, if right after the funeral, they might tell me they don't feel like talking. Then after a couple of weeks, they call back."

Win Schrader, trained in grief counseling himself, says O'Connor can work wonders.

"She does not intrude on anyone. People talk easily with her. I can tell them that life doesn't end, it just changes. What changes -- that's where Diane comes in."

Schrader, who has sat in on the workshops, describes them as informal. Boxes of tissue are set out. If someone wants to cry, they can. If they want to get up and go, they can.

Schrader says O'Connor has not "usurped anyone's responsibilities," namely local clergy.

"Most of them think it is great," he said. "One minister wants to come see her (at a Monday workshop)."

O'Connor says she does make some referrals.

"When someone comes up to me and says they're having a hard time wondering whether their husband went to heaven or not, then I suggest they see their minister."

Schrader said he was surprised at the number of males in attendance at the last workshop. Though, still far outnumbered by women, there was more than usual.

"At a funeral you might see a man standing aside and giving all the attention to a woman or child," O'Connor says. "They've been taught they have to be strong. "Who else will pick up the pieces?" But the men hurt just as much as the women do."

Because of bottled-up emotions, O'Connor says men might need counseling more than women.

She says another fallacy is that it hurts more for a younger person to lose a mate, than an older person.

"A young couple may have been together a few years. People think of all those years coming up that they will miss. But an older person sees

everything that they have lived for suddenly end. They can't see beyond the pain.

'Over 50 per cent of the time, after an elderly mate dies, the spouse will die within the next year."

"A younger person doesn't have that built-in network an older person might. And an older person has probably seen death around them before."


O'Connor says people have to realize that positive things can come from the loss. She says many look to her as a resource.

"A crisis will make you do something. I hate to stereotype, but when a husband dies, the wife may not know how to get the car fixed. 'He always took care, of that.'


There are many facets of grieving, none of which O'Connor would back off from. She welcomes anyone who has been hurt by any significant loss, not necessarily death. Loss of limb, or eyesight, or even a job.

O'Connor also believes in "preneed" counseling, before the death occurs. The people who come see her for this, may have the steepest hill to climb. They don't want their family to suffer through an upcoming death-their own.





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Many of us are called a variety of names from time to time. Depending on the situation and the tone of voice used, a name is almost always used simply to identify someone.

To Ken Gruebel, my six year old niece, Brie and all the readers who were afraid to ask, let me try to explain why I refer to my children as the kids. I realize kids are goats and offspring are children, but when you need a name in an informal column, "the child" doesn't sound right. Besides at the ages of 16 and 18 my children are not children anymore, but they are still my kids.

I admit I didn't like the idea of saying the kid at first. It sounded cold, harsh and uncaring, but the more I thought about it, I decided it could be fun to work with. I even talked it over with both of the children (at that time they were seven and nine).

Through the years both my son and daughter have been grateful I didn't use their name in the column. Not everyone is school knew who their mom was, so only a very few friends could tease them about something stupid their mom wrote about them.

Can you imagine how embarrassing it would be at the age of 12 to have your mom write about your first pair of pantyhose? It probably wouldn't have been so bad if she hadn't described in detail grabbing the wrong pair one morning and trying to squeeze into them. Having your mom tell the whole world about the crotch of your pantyhose getting stuck on her kneecap isn't something most kids would care to identify with.

The kids and I have reached an understanding, I can refer to them as "the kid" and they can pretend not to know me the day after certain columns are printed.



Everyone tried to make their drawings as colorful as possible. Some used paint, glitter, felt markers, as well as good old-fashioned crayons.





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Schools eye buying \$272,000 phone system

Plymouth-Canton Schools has accepted a \$272,421.97 bid from American Telephone and Telegraph (ATT) to install a new telephone system for the district.

Installation should take place February-May 1986.

A study by accountants Plante and Moran, said a new system would save the district \$360,000 over the next 10 years. With more multi-line phones the number of telephone lines at the schools would be decreased from 320. to 174.

The study said money would also be saved through purchasing instead of renting phones, a choice of everyone's, after recent deregulation of the phone industry. Also considered were improved response time for incoming calls, and Data Communications capability.

Superintendent Dr. John Hoben said there were sufficient funds set aside in the General Fund Operating budget for the purchase. Ray Hoedel, associate superintendent of business for the district, agreed the move would be cost effective.


Hoedel said funds from Public Act 341, usually for energy-related projects, had been a revenue option until the schools' lawyers termed it a "gray area." \$175,000 in energyrelated "roofs expenditures," previously charged to the 1985-86 Operating Fund, would be taken instead from Act 341. The remainder of the new phone costs would be divided up in the Operating Funds for 1985-86 (\$47,421.97) and 1986-87 (\$50,000).

Bernie Nagengast, of Plante and Moran, said there would be two kinds of improved response time. Not only would the community get through to the schools faster, but service calls would be made quicker. Partially, because of an ATT warehouse on Five Mile Road.

Board president Roland Thomas said the modular phones, efficient because of transferability, might be easy theft targets. Joe Gitter, a representative of ATT, said the phones would have different jacks than home phones. Thomas also wondered if 179 lines would suffice for the district. Nagengast said most businesses never used more than 50 per cent of their lines at any one time.

The district originally asked Plante and Moran to study the project in April 1985. An advertisement for bids appeared in July. ATT met with the accountants in September.

The schools currently have a Centrex phone system. The new system calls for 25 school buildings to get ATT's Merlin 410 system. The high schools and administration building would get "System 75." The costs for the 25 buildings run between \$1,6@0-14,900 each. System 75, the central units, costs just over \$160,000 total.



P-C ain't singing those municipal bond blues

Local officials say the state's inability to issue industrial development bonds during the remainder of 1985 will have little effect in The Plymouth-Canton Community.

S

The state recently reached its allocation of \$1.4 billion for the municipal bonds used to finance private development. Companies applying after the ceiling was reached will have to wait until next year, said Larry Schrauben of the Michigan Strategic Fund, which oversees the program.

Plymouth-Canton government officials said the situation may cause



Canton's economic growth director Dave Nicholson said the situation is "an irritation and it's slowing down some people.

"As far as it being a tremendous drawback for development -- not really," he said.

Canton approved issuance of more than \$11 million worth of the development bonds this year. Nicholson said.

A building increase statewide uncertainty about the effect of spurred by a stonger economy caused the state to meet its federally-mandated \$150 per capita bond ceiling, said the commerce department's Schrauben.

"In 1985 there were many more projects, a lot more money assigned to the projects than heretofore," he said. State law stipulates the bonds mustserve "good public purpose," which is interpeted as improving the local economy and providing jobs.

Plymouth's City Commission this. month approved the issuance of bonds to four firms. The city saw a "flock" of applications recently caused by concern over the state ceiling and

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proposed overhauls to federal tax system, said City Manager Henry Graper.

"All the applications we're dealing with right now became more important

than they were before," Graper said. The four applicants will either get assigned monies turned over by other : applicants or will wait to re-apply to the state next year, he said. Graper estimated the city issued about \$15 million of the bonds since the program's beginning in the late 70s.

Plymouth Township Supervisor Maurice Breen said industrial development bonds have enhanced building in the township, especially in Metro-West Industrial Park near Five Mile and Sheldon roads.

"I'm concerned from the standpoint that it should be a fair allocation accross the board for (all applicants)," he said.

Breen said the bonds become more important when interest rates are high.

Schools want summer taxes

Plymouth-Canton Schools will make a summer tax collection in 1986. Onehalf of the district's property taxes will be collected by city and township governments.

The P-C School Board passed a resolution for the tax 7-0 at its regular meeting Monday.

Because of revisions to Public Act 333 of 1982, which outlines the summer tax. the schools are now required to make the resolution yearly. Act 333 was recently upheld as constitutional by the Michigan Court of Appeals.

School lawyers Thrun, Maatsch and Nordberg said if school districts did not make arrangements with the local governments for collection by March 1, 1986, the district could decide not to collect summer taxes in that area.

Mich. Ave. to be widened

Michigan Avenue east of I-275 in Canton will be widened to eight lanes with construction starting in August, said state Department of Transportation Director James Pitz.

The project will involve "reconstructing the entire road" and widening it to 48 feet in each direction. according to Pitz.

Michigan Avenue was originally scheduled to be widened and resurfaced starting in April, at a cost of \$3.6 million, according to Pitz. The revamped project will cost "nearly double" the original costs, Pitz wrote in a letter informing the Canton Board of Trustees of the changed plans.

Pitz wrote that the project would result in "a new, modern, eight-lane bouleyard . . . enhancing the city of Wayne and adjacent Canton Township







School may be used as meeting hall

The Cherry Hill School would be renovated and used as a community meeting hall, according to Kim Scherschligt, research associate for the Canton Community and Economic Development department.

The school was built in 1876, and an addition, funded by Henry Ford, was built in 1942, according to Scherschligt. The school was part of the Greenfield Village - Detroit Edison School District until the late 1940's, when it was returned to the Plymouth School District. The school was used for classes until the early 1960's.

Cherry Hill School is presently "in a state of severe disrepair" according to Scherschligt, and is being used as a storage facility by the Plymouth-Canton Schools.

John Hoben, superintendent of Plymouth-Canton Schools, wrote a letter of endorsement with the grant application, writing, "Although the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools and the Charter Township of Canton have not reached an agreement on the acquisition of the Cherry Hill School...

I endorse the Township's efforts in the rehabilitation of this historic school as it would enhance the cultural environment of the Canton Community and provide a location for community activities and appeared

"It was quite an accomplishment and they swam pretty good," said Olson.


Taylor finished with a low :25 in the 50 and a :55.5 in the 100 freestyle.

The Brighton players were quite a bit bigger than the Chiefs, but that's not the key.


With 61 attempts on the basket from inside, Canton sunk only 18, while Brighton made 23 of 43 attempts from inside.

"We have a balanced team," said Krueger. "We have strong juniors and our middle weights are coming through. That's why we did as well and why were beating teams."


For the season, Krueger hasn't decided on a goal yet. He will let it be a team effort.
