The railroad company uses a lot water and the rate made by the counou is cheaper than they can afford to pump it themselves. But there is some criticism, and a just one, in that the council makes a flat rate for the railroad and exacts a meter tax from our factories, institutions that should be faored, if anything, instead of being discriminated against.

At the same meeting of the council when this action was taken, an amendment was offered to the ordinance which soverns the rate of water meters. 




