New Canning Factory for Plymouth

George Raviler has leased the old cheese factory building in north village and will install new and up-to-date machinery for the canning of tomatoes and wax beans. Mr. Raviler has been in the canning business for several years, and the "Clover Leaf" brand of goods which he put up have gained an enviable reputation for being of the very best quality, and have always found a ready sale, and there is not a doubt but that his new factory which will be operated on a much larger scale than the one which was recently destroyed by fire at his home on the Plymouth road, will be taxed to its capacity to supply the demand for the "Clover Leaf" brand of goods. Mr. Raviler has already contracted for fifty acres of tomatoes. When the factory is in operation it will give employment to about fifty men and women and will be a welcome addition to the business interests of the village.

An Echo of the Barber Robbery

Joseph C. Matthews, as assignee of John Harvey, who with Charles Stevens, of this village, were recently acquitted in the circuit court of assaulting and robbing the late Mary Barber at her home south of town last December, has brought suit against Deputy Sheriff George W. Springer of this village to recover \$110 which the officer took from Harvey at the time of his arrest and which Harvey afterwards claimed was a part of the \$175 which Stevens gave him as his share of the Barber robbery. The money is still in the possession of officer Springer and the suit was filed in a Detroit Justice court to recover it on the ground that since Harvey had been exonerated by the jury that the money could not have been Miss Barber's, but must belong to Harvey. The case was to have been heard Tuesday, but was adjourned for one week. The outcome of the case will be watched with interest by the people of Plymouth.

For the Better Care of Cemetery Lots

For a number of years past it has been felt by those in authority that some method should be devised whereby a greater uniform care would be given to the various lots in Riverside cemetery and thus improve the looks of the whole cemetery to a great extent. In years past the care of the lots has been left to the various lot owners, and the result has been that many lots have been well taken care of and many have been neglected. This has resulted in the cemetery as a whole having a general un-kempt appearance. After a thorough consideration of the matter by the village council and the Board of Cemetery trustees, it has been decided to levy an assessment upon all lot owners, this assessment to be made at the rate of two dollars per lot and the proceeds of the same to be used in the general improvement and upkeep of the cemetery lots only.

To overcome the injustice which would arise from compelling the payment of assessments by lot owners, who for personal reasons might desire to care for their own lots, as many have done in the past, a provision has been made whereby any amount paid as assessments by such parties shall be returned to them upon obtaining a certificate from the chairman of the cemetery trustees showing that he has cared personally for his lot or lots and expended in time and money not less than two dollars per lot in caring for the same. This new arrangement will without a doubt meet with a approval of all lot owners as it is the only way in which a permanent fund can be raised for this purpose.
