



Sea Prize Returns to U. S.

Bar Harbor, Me.—The North German Lloyd steamer, Kron Prinzessin Ceclile, carrying more than \$10,000,000 in gold and whose whereabouts have been a mystery since she salied from New York, Tuesday of last week, arrived in the harbor here Tuesday.

The Ceclile dropped anchor here at 6 a. m. after a forced run of four days, her officers fearing capture.

With a cargo of ten millions in gold and million in silver, consigned to French and English bankers, with an eatimated value of over five millions in herself, the Kron Prinzessin Ceclile has constituted probably the finest sea prize ever open to capture.

As she crept along the Maine coast and into the harbor under the cover of night, each deek, at every port hole, was blanketed with canvas, so that not a gleam of light betrayed her whereabouts. Her four stout stacks had been tipped with black paint so that she resembled an English steamship.



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
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
