LINCOLN DAY

Ground has been broken for the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, which is to stand in a large open area near the Potomac. The memorial is to be a temple, built to emphasize horizontal lines in contrast to the Washington Monument, within sight of the proposed temple, which accentuates vertical lines. It will have thirteen steps, representing the thirteen original colonies, and will be surrounded by a colonnade of Doric columns, typifying in number the thirty-six states in the Union at the time of Lincoln's death. The forty-eight states of today are to be represented by memorial festoons on the frieze. The statue of Lincoln will stand in Memorial Hall proper; upon the north wall of this room the entire Gettysburg speech will be displayed; and on the south wall his second inaugural address. We are glad to have this description because so much is made of this great memorial which is to be pure white marble and cost two millions of dollars. In view of the above facts we believe it will be altogether fitting and proper to observe a Lincoln Day. We will do this next Sunday.

Looks Like A Busy Year For Alter Co.

The year of 1915 is starting out most auspiciously for the Alter Motor Car Co., and the way orders are coming in for cars at the present time, the Alter factory is going to be a busy place during the year just starting.

At the automobile show at Columbus, Ohio, last week, the Alter Motor Sales Co., of Bucyrus, Ohio, sold sixty cars at retail. Mr. Choep represented the local factory at the show, and he is very much pleased with the showing the Alter cars made at the big Ohio exhibit. The cars are being exhibited at the Toledo show this week. The new 1915 model touring car, and the roadster, which made its initial appearance at the beginning of the year, seem to be meeting the popular demand for a medium priced car with many of the improvements of the higher priced cars.

There are about fifty men employed at the Alter factory at the present time, and they are turning out two complete cars each day. This will soon be increased to three and as the season advances it is expected that the output of the plant. In order to accomplish this it will be necessary to employ about 150 men, which would mean something to the village. The pay roll at the present time aggregates quite a sum each week and is a substantial addition to the large sums that are being paid to the workmen of Plymouth by the other factories here.

The body department at the Alter plant resumed operations again this week, which will necessitate the employment of a few more men. The officers of the Alter Co. are deserving of much credit for the splendid showing they have made since the organization of the company about a year ago, and the placing upon the market a car that is meeting with such universal satisfaction.



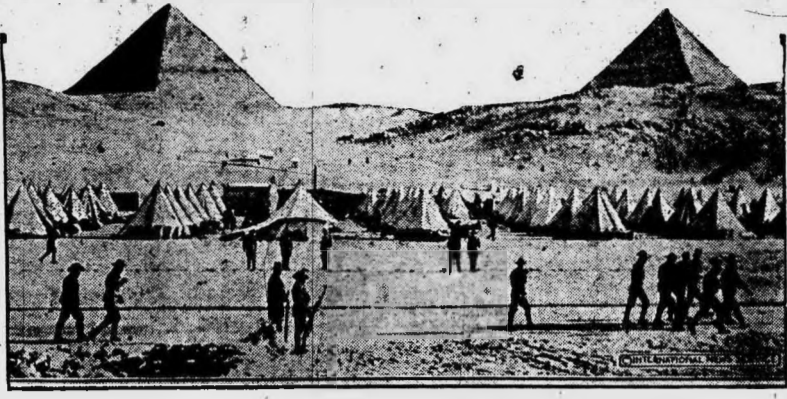

SLEEPY BRITON DEFENDS WHOLE VILLAGE ALONE

Wounded Sergeant Changes His Opinion Respecting Recruit Called "His Lordship."

NOTED FOR HIS LAZINESS

Promise of Good Night's Rest Leads Him to Distinguish Himself in Charge on Village—Defends Bad Against Whole Regiment.

London.—"Never again will I judge a man by his appearance," said a wounded sergeant, when asked for his most thrilling battle experience.

"On the moment of his arrival in our midst we named him 'his lordship,' and bets were made that he would succumb after the first day's march. Not a bit of it. It is true he looked tired at the start, but he looked no more so at the finish.

"We were finally placed in the trenches. 'His lordship' did everything ungrudgingly, but he could not sleep without a pillow, so he paid four packets of cigarettes a day to a fat fellow and rested his head on the latter's stomach.

"Well, we left the trenches—that is some of us, and some did not—and even then one day we were ordered to take by assault a village occupied by a Bavarian regiment.

"I ordered you—I started to say, but he shot his eye, turned on the other side and slept. I aided eight days to his 'lordship,' and as I could not very well carry him on my shoulders, I left him to his fate.

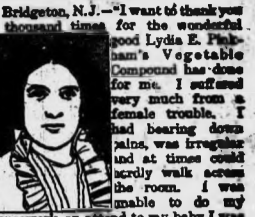

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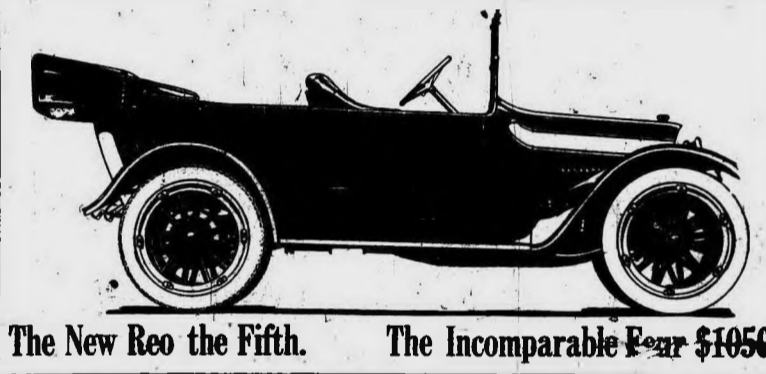

NOTE TO BRITAIN ON USE OF FLAG

UNITED STATES GOVERNMENT DISAPPROVES OF PRACTICE.

MAKES NO FORMAL PROTEST

President Wilson Wants England to Know Attitude of America in Matter of Using Neutral Flags.

Washington—The United States government will take up with Great Britain the subject of the use by British vessels of the American flag without proper authority.

The communication will in no sense merit the term of protest, but will be a most temperate explanation of the reasons why the United States government cannot view with entire complacency the prospect of a general use of the American flag by British vessels to avoid destruction by the naval forces of Germany.

The communication to Great Britain will therefore explain at some length the reasons why it is felt the American flag by belligerent vessels will tend to endanger bona fide American shipping by lessening the value of the American flag, as outward evidence of the character of a vessel.

THE THYROID GLAND.

Before the appearance of any central nervous system in the lowest organisms it is by chemical means, by so called automatic excitation through the action of products of decomposition by the organs in different parts of the body, that any co-ordination of function is determined, either among the different organs of a colony or among the various cells making up a multicellular organism such as a sponge.

The mechanism which determines the movement of phagocytic cells—a phagocyte is any cell possessing the property of absorbing and digesting—the chase of food, the escape from noxious environment or the approach of sexual cells, has been given the name of chemotaxis.

In 1856 Schiff showed that removal of the thyroid in dogs is followed usually by the death of the animals in one to four weeks.

The disturbances appearing after removal of the thyroid affect the most widely different organic systems of the body. The skin, especially that of the head and face, becomes greatly swollen because of an accumulation of mucus in the subcutaneous connective tissue.

Disturbances of the nervous and muscular system following removal of the thyroid are profound; not infrequently functional disturbances such as epilepsy ensue.

Schiff and many others have found that all these evil results of the complete or partial destruction of the thyroid in dogs might be obviated by grafting pieces of the thyroid into the body, and this knowledge was quickly applied with astonishing results to human beings in cases of myxedema and cretinism.

It is quite generally known that a motion of the hand, or a glance of the eye, will throw a certain type of weak and credulous patient into a fit; and a pill made of bread, if taken with sufficient faith, will operate a cure as well, or even better, than all the drugs in the pharmacopoeia.

In Van der Mye's account of the siege of Breda, in 1625, it is stated that the prince of Orange cured all his soldiers who were dying of the scurvy by a philanthropic piece of quackery which he played upon them with the knowledge of the physicians.

Obviously these sturdy Netherlander campaigners of that day, possessed of the stamina necessary to enable them to defy and withstand the attacks of the most powerful and brutal of monarchs, could not justly be classed as weaklings, neurosathenics or hysterics.

TELEGRAPHIC FLASHES

Washington—Postmaster General Burleson Saturday awarded an eight million dollar contract to the Middle West Supply Co., of Columbus, Ohio, which will furnish nine billion standard envelopes to the government during the next four years.

Washington—Warring European nations have bought and exported more than 75,000 horses from the United States, but there is no immediate danger that continued export will cause an acute shortage of horses in this country, according to G. A. Bell, of the bureau of animal husbandry.

Petrograd—During the half year since the sale of vodka has been prohibited there have been discovered 1,800 secret distilleries.

Washington—Iowa has wrested from Texas the title of banner crop state, the 13 principal crops grown there last year being valued at \$31,450,000, according to the Agricultural Outlook, issued Saturday.

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
