Auburn Addition to Plymouth Heights

Pere Marquette Officials Visit Plymouth

Officials of the Pere Marquette railway have been under the impression lately that the relations existing between them and the village of Plymouth have not been most cordial. Arrests of train crews for violating the village smoke ordinance and for the holding of freight trains on street crossings has not tended to assuage this feeling on the part of the railway officials. To bring about a little better understanding Roy C. Vandercook, public relations department, visited the village a few days ago and at his suggestion Representative Edward Gayde called a meeting of business men and factory managers Tuesday evening, which was held in the directors' room of the Plymouth United Savings bank. Mr. Vandercook was present at this meeting as was Mr. Paul H. King, receiver for the railroad. Mr. King explained to the people present the financial situation of the railroad, the cost of running expenses, etc., all of which was interesting matter to his listeners. He also stated what was of more interest, that 92 Plymouth citizens were on the payroll of the company, and that about \$75,000 in wages was paid out here annually. He conceded that the Plymouth depot was not the most sightly or commodious structure, but promised that as soon as conditions warranted a new building would be erected. The smoke question was taken up, as was also the crossing trouble. Gentlemen present stated what they had observed and it was suggested that in case of the Main street crossing the situation could be relieved by the opening of a crossing at Union street. Mr. King promised to look into this matter and also to instruct train crews more thoroughly relative to street crossings.

The matter of a reduced fare between Plymouth and Detroit was also mentioned, it being the opinion that many Detroiters would live in Plymouth if commuters' tickets were issued and a somewhat better train service was installed, particularly a late theatre train, which should be run as far as the Main street crossing. Mr. King said he would take the matter up and see what could be done.

The meeting resulted in a better feeling being engendered all around, the railroad men being fully convinced that Plymouth and Plymouth citizens are not antagonistic to them, but on the contrary are willing to co-operate with them in anything that will promote the best interests of the village.

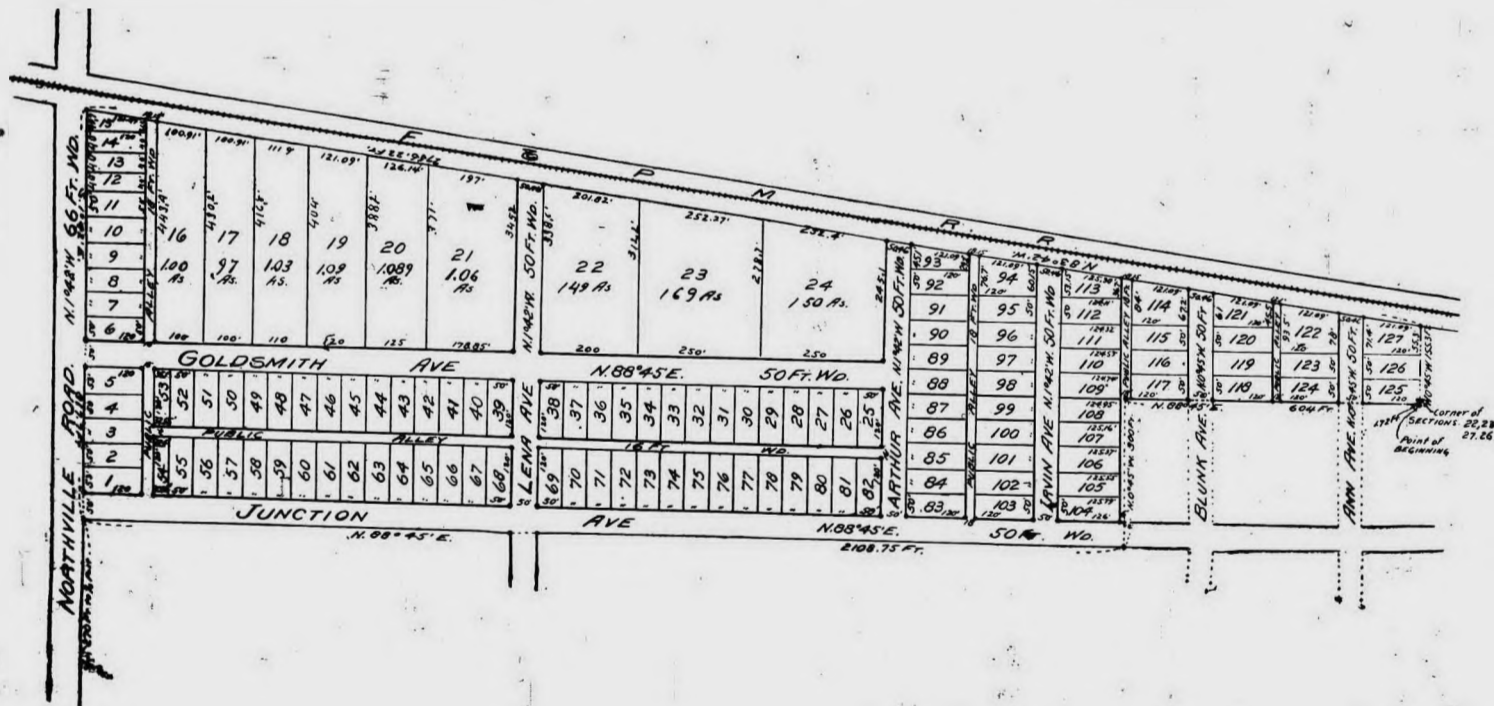

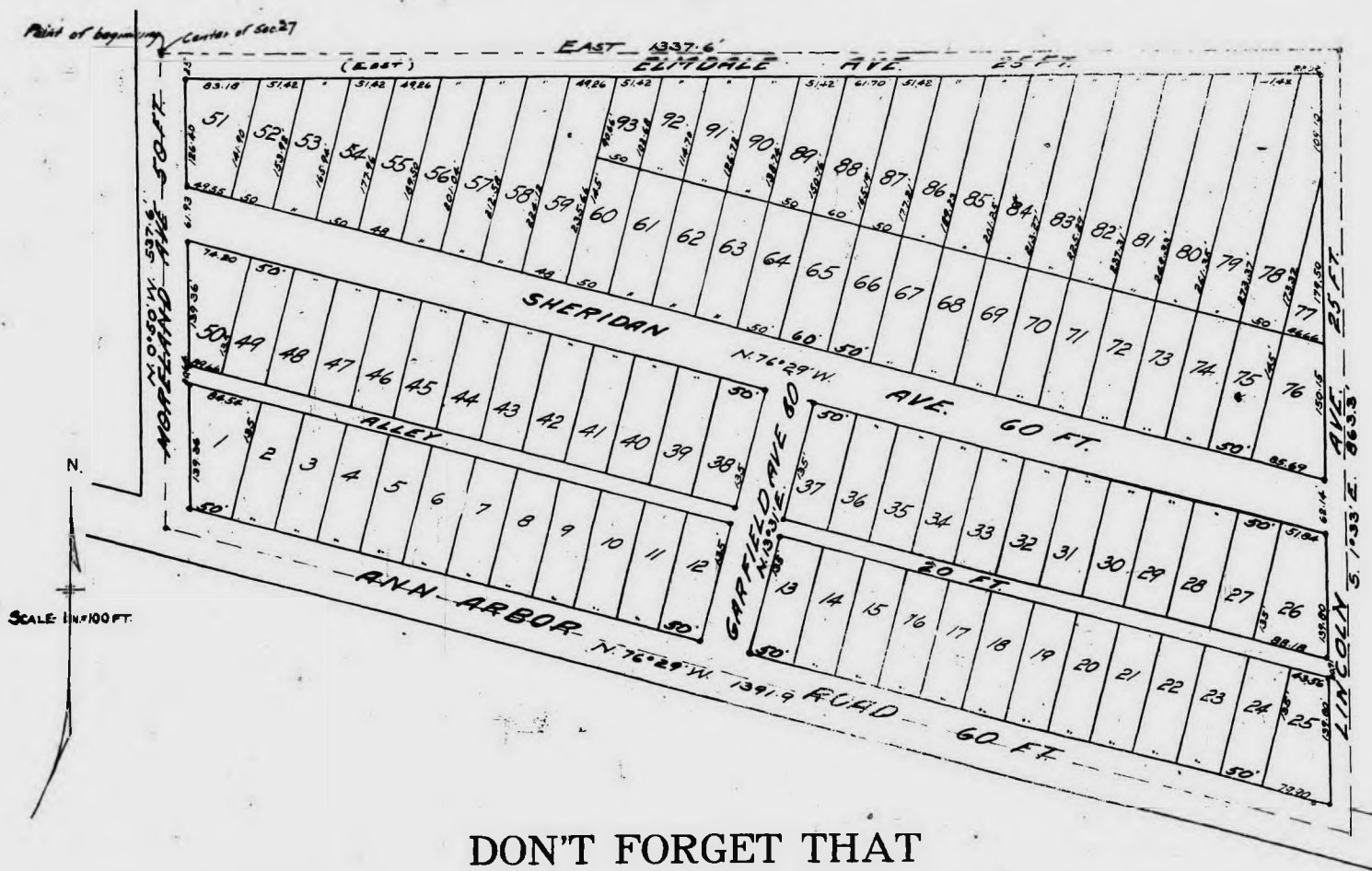
