Plymouth Ready for Big Loan Drive

The Big Volunteer Day Campaign Begins Saturday, September 28, and Continues Sunday and Monday, September 29 and 30.

Liberty Loan Headquarters Will Be in a Tent in Kellogg Park and at the Beyer Pharmacy, Where Workers Will Take Subscriptions.

The Millard Band Will Furnish Music Saturday Afternoon and Evening; Rev. Lloyd C. Douglas of Ann Arbor, and F. C. O'Meara of Detroit Will Speak in the Afternoon.

Dr. M. S. Rice of Detroit, Will Speak at the High School Auditorium in the Evening. It's going to be a Big Day for Plymouth.

An Aeroplane from Selfridge Field, Mt. Clemens, Will Make an Exhibition Flight During the Afternoon.

The stage is all set in Plymouth for the opening day of the Fourth Liberty Loan campaign, Saturday, September 28th. Plymouth will have three volunteer days, Saturday, Sunday and Monday, September 28, 29, 30. As has been stated in these columns previously, the purpose of Volunteer Days is to do away if possible, with the work of a soliciting committee. It is believed by the local committee that the people of Plymouth and vicinity realize the need of subscribing their full quota to the coming loan, and that it will be unnecessary to solicit them for subscriptions. After all the pledges are received on the three Volunteer Days, the list will be checked up by the sales committee, and all who have not purchased will be visited by a soliciting committee, which will endeavor to take the pledge from the delinquent. The posters for the Fourth Liberty Loan have been put up, and they are attracting considerable attention. There are four different kinds. The most prominent is the same as those in the last drive, bearing on the same subjects, but in a different way. The Hun is more prominent than before, and those posters are more realistic. Christy has used his same model as the one he used for the last drive, but this time it is with the Marine instead of the army, and it is very handsome. The President Lincoln poster is dignified and impressive, while the navy posters are as attractive as ever.

Although the family has received no official notification, a letter from a friend in France, tells of the death of Arthur D. Farrand, Co. F, 128th Infantry, the first Leslie boy to make the supreme sacrifice. Private Farrand's death was caused by machine gun wound in the stomach. He is survived by his mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Farrand, a brother, Philip, who is in France, three sisters, and two brothers-in-law, who are in the army. The young soldier was a nephew of Mrs. A. D. Wright and William Farrand of Plymouth.

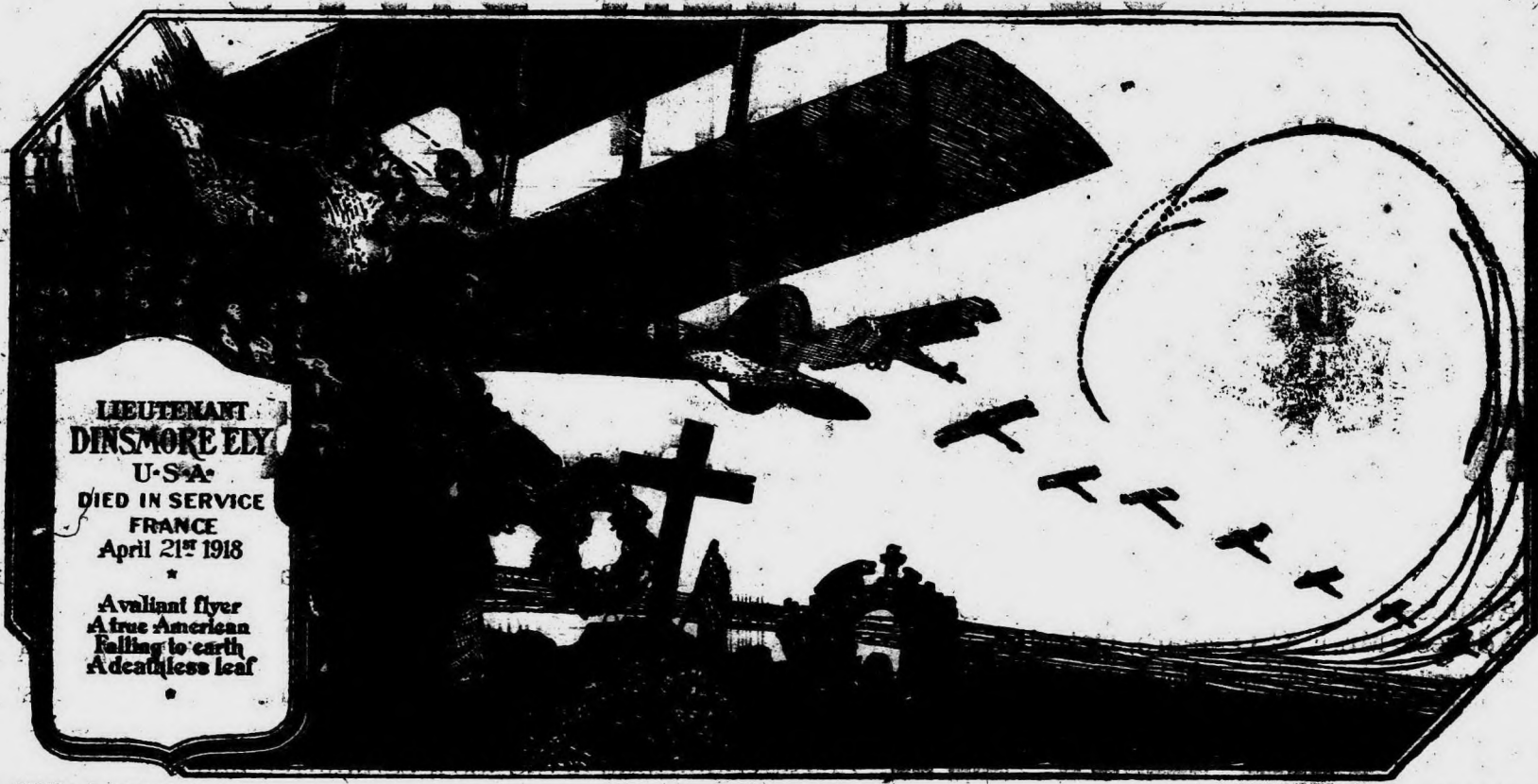

LIEUTENANT ELY, it is ours reverently to acknowledge the service you have rendered.

To your country and ours, you gave all you had to give, a life, young and buoyant, offered when you had but just arrived at life's fullest understanding—and more than this no man can give.

But in the giving, sir, you gave as well the outpour of your stout young heart—that all of us to whom you pass along the touch might offer prayer, and carry on in better understanding of that ennobled cause for which no sacrifice shall be in vain.

Some of us are far behind the fighting lines of France today. For circumstance has made two battle lines, and there must be therefore those gone to fight, and others kept behind to carry on at home.
