WILD LIFE OF PALESTINE

All Kinds of Birds, European and Tropical, Found There, and Flates in Great Abundance.

Swarms of Ruropean birds visit Pesestine in winter and many breed there. The cranes, as in Dante's fine line, stituals the winter "trailing their long draws line draws across the sky," and in the spring the voice of the turtidove is heard in the land.

The Holy Land is appropriately a stronghold of the pigeon family; turtle doves are found, the wood pigeon comes in myriads in winter, and the common pigeon, the true dove of Scripture, is still abundant, both wild and tame, throughout the country.

As a contrast of the "wery rays as fer his kind," the crow tribe of several species is in abundance, and birds of prey, from the great giffon valure, the "sagle" of Scripture, to the sparrow hawk, are a feature of the country.

In the deep, tropical Jordan valley we find a sort of aviary of real tropical birds, which found there a refuge from the last glacial spechale lovely little sun bird, or "Jericho humming bird," the land-feeding white-breasted kingsher and a species of the gregarious thruss.






