Saginaw—It has been announced that the General Motors intend to spend an additional \$4,500,000 in the axtansion of the present Saginaw plants.

Republic.—The first fatal accidents in five years at the Republic from mine resulted in the death of Frank John-son, who was caught under a fall of 500 pounds of rock.

Manistee.—On their third petition for a 15 per cent increase in salaries Manistee fremen were granted that caise. Policemen were also sillowed a 15 per cent raise.

Howelt,-Mrs. Edward Papworth, 42, died of pneumonia. Mrs. Papworth; mother, Mrs. C. Abramson, while has-tening to her daughter's bedside, fell on the ice and broke her hip.

Scottville—After fighting a score of years to secure a forms and pension money due him and establishing his claim but three weeks ago, Moses Parker, 74, Civil war veteran, died.

Marquette—The new municipal aydro-electric plant, which has been ander construction here for several months, has been practically completed at a cost of approximately \$175,000.

Manistee—Two new Manistee industries have just commenced operations, They are the Manistee Transing company, capitalized at \$100,000, and the Manistee Drop Forge company, a \$200,000 concera.

Lansing.—Wayne county will name 165 of the 1,346 delegates to be seat-staged at the Republican state convention in Kalamasoo, May 5, on the basis of the apportionment fixed by axecu-tive officers of the state central com-

mittee.

During the summer months, we are restricted to half-hour periods for sprinkling purposes. Some of those living outside the village limits, supliving outside the village limits, sup-posed to have the village water for domestic needs only, may use it when and for what they please. Mighty fine people too, whom we count among our friends, we say of them, they are fortunate, indeed. They never would be using the vil-lage water under the present arrange-ment with our sanction.

Some of our citizens years ago urged that steps be taken for the laying of a larger main to the spring, yet as late as last fall, the authorities permitted connection to be made with the village main and water to be piped onto properties far beyond the southern village limits. CAN YOU BEAT IT?

Just call attention to that fact when you present a petition for ex-tension of main onto lets WITHIN the village limits.
