





INCOME TAX FACTS YOU SHOULD KNOW

Births, deaths and marriages dur-ing the year 1920 affect materially income tax returns for that year. Millions of babies were added to family circles during the year, each of whom brings an exemption of \$200 in the parents' income tax re-turn.

3200 in the parents' income tax return.
Widows and widowers who lost their husbands or wives during the year are especially affected. They are single for the purposes of the income tax law, and are granted only an exemption of \$1,000, unless the head of a family.

Persons who were divorced or separated by mutual agreement during the year, also must consider themselves as single persons.

The status of the taxpayer on December 31, 1920, determines the amount of the exemptions. If on that day the taxpayer was married and living with wife or husband, claim may be made for the \$2,000 exemption.
