But there were enemies around her, and her am-bitions were learned, with the result that gueen Lil was thrown into prison. That settled it. In eight days she reiconced forever all claims to the throne. The government evidently did not place implicit trust in her, for al-though she was reicased from prison she was kept under close survellance in her own plabece for practically a year. Then on New Year's day, 1800. She was allowed full freedom. after signing a paper in which she declared her intention henceforth to live in all-solute privacy and to avoid even the

solute privacy and to avoid even the appearance of being concerned in pub-

appearance of being concerned in pub-lic affairs. The remaining years of her life were murred by not the slightest deviation from this promise. She allied herself with no party and kept her political opinions to herself. Sue devoted her-self to the writing of songs in her na-tive tongue and traveling extensively in this country. On November 11, 1917, while other thrones were breaking she passed away at the age of seventy-nine.


Steeplejacks Defy Death.


