**NEW AND DIFFERENT.**

The state of Ohio has set her sister states a good example by proving that she is a true friend of the rural housewife. She has selected from the state university an expert machinist, a man who knows all there is to know about sewing machines. He is visiting each county seat, and through the county seat newspapers housewives whose sewing machines are not working satisfactorily are invited to bring them in on certain dates to a “sewing machine clinic.” They are fixed free of charge, the state paying all costs. Today, with so many farm families boasting autos, the “sewing machine clinic” is possible in all communities. No reason appears why our own state should not follow Ohio's example. We feel sure housewives around Plymouth would welcome a chance to have their sewing machines put in first-class order, and that other communities would be as interested. Who'll wake up over at the state capital and start it?

**THE SUMMER WHITE HOUSE.**

We've read a good deal of comment on the choice of a “Summer White House,” and it is interesting to find that not one newspaper in the country has criticized President Coolidge for electing to spend his vacation in the northwest. In fact, we find one editor arguing that it would be a good idea to have a “Summer White House” in every section, with the president alternating his vacation time among them. He argues that in that way the president could keep in closer touch with every part of the country, and be in position to render still greater service. But that will probably strike the average Plymouth reader as going too far. He will agree, however, that President Coolidge has, in spending his summer in the northwest, set an example other residents can follow in the future with profit to the whole country. There is too much of this country lying west of the Mississippi river to be neglected by even a president, and too much beauty he cannot afford to miss. It is the pantry of the nation, and from it comes our meat and bread. It is entitled to a visit at least once a year from the highest official in the land; such visits serve to bring the people of the nation into a closer bond of friendship. Here's hoping that from this time on the “Summer White House” stays west of the Mississippi river.

**FOOLISH FADS.**

This is a great country for fads. Let someone start doing or saying something different from what has been previously said or done, and it spreads like wildfire. A few seasons

ago someone pasted a sticker on the windshield of his auto, and then came a fad for “bathing beauties” and slogans plastered all over the car. Motorists are pretty much the same everywhere, so Plymouth contributed her quota to the lot. Now, however, some states prohibit stickers on windshields, and several states have special ordinances against cars being operated with anything on the windshield tending in any way to interfere with the vision of the driver.

Fads are harmless as a general rule, but here is one that does not bring any real pleasure or enjoyment but that does actually endanger the lives of others driving on the same thoroughfare, as well as the life of the man sitting behind the sticker. In this day and time a driver needs to have both eyes wide open every second he is at the wheel, and he needs a clear view. Anything that will obscure his view for an instant must be classed as dangerous, and the windshield sticker is very apt to do that very thing at the wrong moment. Have your fads, if you wish, but don't follow the kind that carries even the smallest element of danger. The windshield sticker is far more dangerous than it is ornamental. Discourage its use by refusing to put it on your car or to let anyone else put it there.

**LEARNING TO SWIM.**

There is an art in swimming, but it is not the kind of art that can be indulged in by only the rich and favored. Anybody can learn to swim—and everybody ought to. It is possible the time will never come when you will need to know how to save your life by swimming. On the other hand, you may at a most unexpected moment. Knowing how to save your own or someone else's life is certainly the kind of knowledge everyone should possess. The Plymouth boy who wants to learn to swim should not be discouraged in that desire. Always there are boys or men sufficiently skilled in swimming to afford him the protection he needs while learning. There is no need in permitting him to take risks, of course. But it isn't necessary that he do so; it is an easy matter to go with him or to see that he is in the company of older boys who can look after him. But don't let him grow to manhood untaught in the art of swimming. It's a means of self-protection that he is entitled to, and a part of his education that should not be slighted.

Redford summer schools have opened with an attendance of 340.

Rev. J. W. Priest is the new pastor of the Northville Baptist church.

George Rattenbury, of Walled Lake, has purchased the Central

meat market at Northville. He is now operating six markets.

The Penniman Allen theatre at Northville will be closed from July 10th to September 4th in order to permit the decoration of the theatre.

The business men at South Lyon have arranged to give free moving picture shows at the local theatre

every Tuesday evening during July and August.

Redford's new \$500,000 theatre, now under construction, will be known as the "Kunksky-Redford." The building will include, in addition to theatre, four stores and fourteen offices.

The parcel of land known as the VanBusen farm, two miles west of Novi, on Grand River, has been purchased by Detroit parties, who are preparing to convert it into a golf course.

Territory surrounding Manchester is a great sheep-raising section. Many farmers in that community have in time past secured pure bred Merinos from Vermont, paying as high as \$1,000 per head.

If Wayne county buys the proposed airport site at Inkster, it will mean much to this part of the county. The proposed site is one mile square and lies between Ford road and Warren avenue and Gulley and Inkster roads.

Mrs. C. W. Wright and two sons, Dumie and Stanley, of Detroit, and Mrs. Henry Wright, of Plymouth, are passing the week at the Challis cottage at Sandybottom lake. Messrs. Wright will come this week-end for over the Fourth. The former Mrs. Wright is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James V. Baker.—South Lyon Herald.

The main Ford plant in Northville resumed work this week with a partial force of employees. There is additional equipment being installed in the plant, and it is probable that as soon as all new machinery has been placed the entire force will be ordered back to work. Just how soon this will be has not been announced.—Northville Record.

Homer Johnson, of Wixom, had an almost miraculous escape from death last Thursday noon when the Ford truck which he was driving was hit by a Pere Marquette locomotive at the Wixom crossing. The truck was smashed to smithereens and somehow the occupant managed to escape with only cuts on head, hand and leg.—Milford Times.

A Detroit real estate dealer had a thrilling experience while returning home from Howell the other day. Just outside of Howell a young man beckoned to him that he would like to ride, and the Detroit man stopped and took him in. Before coming to Brighton the young man drew a gun and robbed the driver of money and valuables to the amount of \$1,500, with the warning that if he made any

attempt to attract attention he would be shot.

Kravits Edgewater amusement park at Seven Mile and Burg roads opened to the public July 2nd. Included among the attractions at this million dollar play-mecca are the ball room, said to be the largest semi-open casino in Michigan; a giant roller coaster, a picturesque tea room, pretentious public picnic grounds, a large lagoon affording opportunities for boating and canoeing, flying ships, a famous Custer speedway, and numerous other mirth-provoking features.

Northville firemen are very grateful to Manager Lush of the Penniman Allen theatre for his consideration of them at the time of the recent benefit show. The ticket sale fell way below expectations, and if he had not cut out his own percentage the firemen would have lost on the venture. However, he turned over to the local department the entire proceeds of their sale, which enabled them to come out with a slight profit. The firemen are highly elated over the kindness shown them by Mr. Lush.—Northville Record.

Among the sites being considered by the city plan commission and the common council of Detroit for Stoepel park is that tract of land lying along the River Rouge between Seven and Eight Mile roads and adjacent to the new Edgewater park, according to W. H. Bucher, secretary of the city plan commission. Part of the tract is known as the Brown farm. Stoepel park is a gift to Detroit from William C. Stoepel, who left \$330,000 in trust for the purpose of presenting a park site to the city, the location of which is to be determined by the city plan commission and common council.—Redford Record.

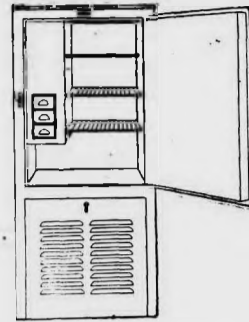

#### MICHIGAN FARMERS TO PLOW FOR HONORS

CHAMPIONSHIP M. S. C. HORSES WILL BE USED IN COMPETITION ON FARMERS' DAY.

Farmers of Michigan who compete in the plowing contest at M. S. C. farmers' day, August 4th, will have an opportunity to drive a team of championship pure-bred horses owned by the college.

The contest will be divided into three classes: two-horse walking plow, four-horse gang plow and tractor and gang plow. Horses, tractors and plows will be furnished by the college. The contest will be judged on knowledge and skill in making preliminary adjustments of plows and on the quality of plowing.

The international grand champion Percheron mare, Maple Grove Leila, and the reserve champion Percheron mare, Dunham's Marie, will make up the team that is probably best known to those who have knowledge of the prize winning horses owned at East Lansing.

All Michigan farmers will be eligible to compete in the contest. Entries may be made by applying to George Getman, of the M. S. C. agricultural engineering department. Applications will be received until 9:30 of the morning of the contest. Winners of first place in each of the three divisions of the contest will receive trophies. Second place winners will receive nickel-plated wrenches as prizes.

Two new stunts to be added to the farmers' day entertainment program this year will be a horseshoe pitching contest and a milk can throwing contest. Coach Ralph Young, athletic director, will be in charge of these two contests.

Entries are also coming in for the town and country choir singing contest, and competition is expected to be keen in this event. The Grange baseball tournament finals, to be played off during the day, are included in the entertainment program.

The afternoon open air meeting will draw a brilliant speaking program this year, the fact that farmers' day comes during the big country life week at the college making international men available.

#### MORELAND AVENUE MAY BE TRUNK LINE ROAD

ROTARY CLUB PASSES RESOLUTION ENDORSING PAVING OF HIGHWAY.

At the noonday luncheon of the Plymouth Rotary Club, a resolution was presented to the club to have Moreland avenue which bounds the village on its western limits made into a trunk line road, which would connect the Ann Arbor paved road with Grand River just west of the grade separation in Novi. This road enters Northville on Center street, and the Rotary Club of that village have passed favorably upon the resolution. The resolution was brought to the attention of the local club by Attorney Fred Cochrane of Northville. It is thought that if there was local support to the project the matter could be accomplished within the next year. It has been pointed out that this road would do away with many grade crossings between Grand River and the Ann Arbor road. There are seven crossings on the present road, and on the proposed new trunk line there is but one, and that is not regarded in a bad location. The local club passed the resolution without a dissenting vote.

Plymouth business men and our citizens in general would be greatly pleased to see this road improvement made.

The Club had the pleasure of hearing a splendid talk by Kenneth Bartlett, one of our Plymouth boys, who graduated in June from Albion College with high honors.

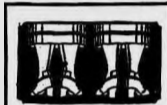

THE RETURN OF PETER GRIMM

Every so often some motion picture concern turns out a production which is set off the beaten path. A picture, as it were, that one is inclined to talk of long after seeing it.

Which is all by the way of describing "The Return of Peter Grimm," which comes to the Penniman Allen theatre, Wednesday, July 13th.

Fox Films deserves high praise for the screen version of David Belasco's great drama of several years ago in which David Warfield immortalized himself. Alec B. Francis plays Peter Grimm in a manner which should be a credit to any luminary of either stage or screen. Francis has always been a favorite of this reviewer but he has never done anything which attempts to match his performance in this great story.

"The Return of Peter Grimm" deals with life's greatest question—can the dead commune with the living? The play did not attempt to answer this question. Neither does the picture. But the great problem is presented in vivid fashion and the spectator is per-

mitted to draw his or her own conclusion.

Some of the most dramatic scenes ever recorded by the motion picture camera are incorporated into the final sequences when the kindly old Peter Grimm returns in the shadow and observes a situation which greatly distresses him. The scenes between Peter, and the little boy who had been mysteriously left on Peter's doorstep and raised under the kindly care of the central character, are touching in the extreme.

Victor Schertzinger, director of "The Lily" and other artistic productions, handled the megaphone during the filming of the Belasco triumph. The picture is vested with the director's artistry. The cast is exceptional—no argument about that—but there are certain spots in the picture which are unmistakably the result of Schertzinger's genius.

Richard Walling and Janet Gaynor have the leading romantic roles and both are a treat for sore eyes. John Roche plays the villain to perfection. The remainder of the cast fits into the picture like clockwork.

STEPPING ALONG

Johnny Hines has without a doubt broken the laugh record for all times. He deserves the championship comedy belt.

"Stepping Along," which comes to the Penniman Allen theatre, Saturday, July 16th, has more fast and furious fun to the cubic foot than any comedy that has come this way this season, besides being jammed from opening to fade-out with the color and life of New York's Broadway.

Johnny, as a funmaker, is irresistible in this number, now whimsical in his interpretation and now putting a comedy twist to a situation so that it registers with a bang, followed by a salvo of laughter.

The comedy is an adaptation of Matt Taylor's story, "The Knickerbocker Kid," and shows the many amusing situations that a New York newsboy with a sense of humor can get into when he decides to take a fling at politics.

Mary Brian, as the girl, is the best leading lady Johnny has had to date, and besides being apt at screen comedy she handles her emotional scenes with perfect understanding.

William Gaston is the villain—but a most handsome one, who scores his points easily, and Ruth Dwyer is lovely and charming as the girl reporter.

Two old favorites, Edmund Breese and Dan Mason, are splendid foils for the comedian in some of the most hilarious episodes.

Charles Hines handled the direction in his usual capable manner, never losing a chance to put over a comedy moment so that it would register.
