Dill, of Washington, will be the principal speakers during the week. On next Monday evening every Kiwanis club on the North American continent will meet at the exact hour with the opening of the convention session in Seattle. It will be a simultaneous meeting of the 100,000 members for a united expression of tribute to the unselfish service work of members and the social and civic accomplishments of Kiwanis.

"Kiwanians may well pause this week and consider the achievements of the past thirteen years," Henry C. Heitz, of Atlanta, president of Kiwanis International, stated in his message to all clubs today. "We may well look back on the past with pride. Our present is commanding, but we have many responsibilities for the future years. Our organization will continue to progress and expand international friendships as long as Kiwanians continue their many serviceable social and civic acts. "All activities of Kiwanis clubs have increased in the past year. More assistance has been given the underprivileged children, vocational guidance and placement for students has helped thousands of young people, and all other forms of social endeavors have attracted the entire membership," he said. General business sessions for the twelfth convention will start on Monday morning. Election of all officers and the selection of a 1929 convention city will come on Thursday, the final day of the convention.

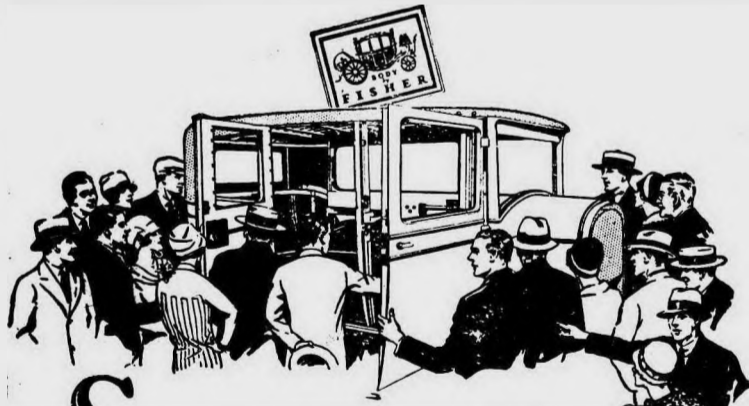

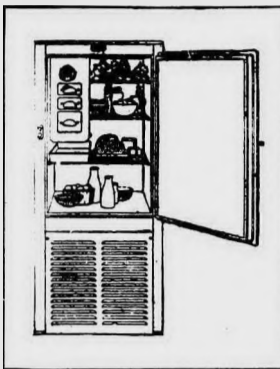

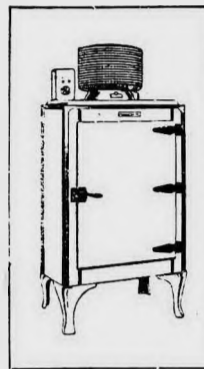

Grooves in Boulders

Formed by Glaciers?

Throughout the northern United States, from the Atlantic ocean to the far northern states, and as far south as Kentucky, huge boulders are found scattered at haphazard. The rocks and ledges are smoothed and marked with scratches varying from faint lines to broad grooves two feet deep. Some of these boulders, weighing many tons, are so balanced on a ledge that a slight touch will rock them. The Indians used them as "alarm bells."

The grooves, or scratches, on these rocks are, as a rule, parallel and extend north and south. South of the above-mentioned area neither boulders nor scratched rocks can be found.

How came the boulders in their position. What scratched the rocks?

One authority, familiar with the glaciers of the Alps, probably gave the true answer. He showed that a similar state of things is produced today by the glaciers of Switzerland. These streams of ice creep slowly down from the lofty summits of the Alps through the valleys to the plains. They bear on their surface huge rocks fallen from surrounding cliffs. The stones frozen in the bottom of the glaciers, pressed down by the enormous weight of ice above them, scratch and groove the rocks beneath as the tool of a carpenter gouges out a piece of wood.

What was the condition of America when similar effects were produced? Instead of local glaciers scattered in the valleys, the whole surface now covered with boulders must have been hidden by an immense sheet of ice. Sliding from the marks on the rocks, the sheet moved from the north toward the south, carrying with it masses of rocks.

Criminals Unable to

Disguise Their Ears

What ears are really for is at last being realized, thanks to the French police.

Criminals may disguise themselves with false eyebrows, gold teeth, derby hats and distorted facial expressions. They may even desperately burn away those famous clews to identify, their fingerprints. But the astute French detective tiptoes around for a slide-wise look, and there are the same old ears, boldly displaying characteristic curves, angles, sizes and proportions.

An individual's ears, says the Washington Star, may not be the only pair of that particular model in existence. But their value as a clew in establishing identity is being stressed by detectives, because of the complexity of ear formations, the readiness with which they can be observed and photographed and studied, and the difficulty of the individual concealing or disguising them.

Cultivate a Smile

The serious things of life are sometimes inclined to give us a set, forbidding expression. It may be possible to have too much determination, too much power of concentration. And then there are people who cling to the memories of unhappy experiences. They live over and over again the tragedies of their lives. Their thoughts are stamped on their features; everybody can read their troubles. Such a countenance is repelling and distasteful. Therefore, whatever you do, try to cultivate the smiling habit. No one can estimate the value of a smile. There are times when it is worth as much as life itself. It has even saved life in serious emergencies.—*Dream World Magazine.*

Historic Tablet

A plate attached to a large rock on the road between Newcomb and Minerva, in Essex county, New York, states that this is the place where Theodore Roosevelt became President, due to the death of President McKinley. The inscription reads: "Near this point, while driving hastily from Tahawus club to North Creek, at 2:15 a. m., September 14, 1901, Theodore Roosevelt became President of the United States as William McKinley expired in Buffalo. They drivers—David Hunter, Tahawus club to Tahawus; Orrin Kellog, Tahawus to Alden Lahr; Michael Cronin, Alden Lahr to North Creek. Erected 1908 and presented to the town of Newcomb by H. V. Radford."

Cooling Color

Tests made by engineers with instruments that measured heat flowing through a small roof showed that a white roof for a house is as cooling as the white clothes you wear in hot weather.

Shiny aluminum paint is even better, as it reflects away the sun's hot rays. A roof coated with it transmits 38 per cent less heat inward.

This probably works both ways, as in winter some heat escaping from the house may be reflected back again, resulting in a fuel saving.

AIR-OLYMPICS TO HELD JUNE 30

BALLOON RACE, AIRPLANE EXHIBITION AND MODEL CONTEST WILL BE STAGED.

Concentration of the greatest fleet of airplanes ever assembled in one city is the newest aim in the plans for the Air-Olympics, in which four major aeronautical events will be staged at the Ford Airport June 30. Letters inviting every airplane owner in the United States to fly to Detroit for the program have been sent out by Edsel Ford and William B. Mayo, chief engineer of the Ford Motor Co.

With the planes assembled for the start of the National Air Tour, which will open the Olympics program, and the exhibition of pursuit planes from Selfridge Field, the Aircraft Events Committee is certain of at least 75 planes and hopes to swell this number to 200 with the attendance of individual owners from all parts of the United States. About 5,000 private owners are being invited.

In addition to the tour, the seventeenth international balloon race, an exhibition of engine-less airplanes in flight and the National Model Airplane Contest will be features of the largest program of aeronautical events ever scheduled for one day.

1,800 INVITATIONS.

Besides the invitation to individual airplane owners, Frederick J. Hayes, president of the Detroit Board of Commerce, has issued an invitation to 1,800 chambers of commerce to attend the program by airplane. Twenty invitations have already been accepted.

Sixteen pilots from eight countries will take part in the international balloon race, including many holders of world's records for lighter-than-aircraft.

The United States bags will be piloted by Capt. W. E. Kepner, of the Army; Clarence E. Palmer, of Akron, Ohio, and William C. Naylor, of Detroit, winners of the recent National Elimination Race at Pittsburgh. SPANISH CORN PUDDING

A delicious recipe that can be made in a hurry from provisions on the emergency shelf.

Use a can (2 1/2 cups) green corn, 1/2 chopped green pepper, 2 tablespoons chopped pimiento, 1 tablespoon chopped onions, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 eggs, beaten and 1/2 cup sweetened condensed milk. Blend thoroughly, pour into buttered baking dish and bake in moderate oven 25 minutes.

WHEN MAKING BERRY JAMS

To prevent the seeds from hardening when making berry jams, observe these rules: Use only fresh fruit. Wash it first, then hull, put in a kettle on a slow fire until it boils, then add the sugar (beet or cane), and boil briskly. Cook only a small amount of fruit at a time and stir constantly. When the jam thickens when dropped on a cold plate, it is done.

A TIP BIT FOR THE CHILDREN'S LUNCH

Do not stand left-over berries and cut fruits away in the refrigerator where they will become mushy and unpalatable, but turn them into a tempting dessert for the children by dropping them into a mold and covering with flavored gelatin that has been dissolved in hot water and cooled. It takes but a moment, and seems a great treat to the little folks.

WHEN EATING FISH, REMEMBER

If a fish bone becomes lodged in the throat, a raw egg swallowed immediately after will carry the bone away.

A NOVEL POLISH FOR PATENT SHOES

Sweet milk is said to be as good as the best shoe cream for enameled shoes. Remove dust and dirt from the shoes, then wash them with milk and after a few minutes wipe off with a soft dry cloth.

EASY TO REMEMBER FOR BURNS

If equal parts of white of egg and olive oil mixed are applied at once to a burn and the spot covered with a piece of old linen, no blister will form.
