

STEEL MILL TO START SOON

The Newton Steel Co. of Monroe, has taken over the remaining work on its new sheet teel plant and it will have about 400 men engaged in completing the construction and installing the machinery. The Arthur G. McKee Co., engineering connsellors of Cleveland, who have been in charge of the work, have completed their contract. No statement has been made as to when the plant will get into production but it has been learned anofficially that the actual fabrication of Steel will begin about February 15. Construction work began last March and has proceeded at a rapid rate. It is estimated that between seven and eight millions have been spent here on the first unit of a tam year construction program. Bureau Keports. Washington.—Daily temperatures of the United States weather bureau bave been revealed as the newest we hicle for targe-scale gambling opera-tions in the Capital, backed by the operators of the "numbers" game, whose activities confined to the daily report of the New York clearing house, have been badly crippled by the Campaign recently undertaken by the United States attorney's office. Through the scores of runners, who have been collecting the bets and at tending to the pay offs for the back ers of the clearing house "numbers" game, went the word recently the sa new pool, based on the weather ke port, would be started and offers were made of prizes ranging from \$500 to a few cents for the winners in the pool. An outlay of 60 cents for a week's play was all that was asked Like Baseball Pool.

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promise to pay nandsourcely to the winner in regularly worked out sys-tems similar to those instituted in the "numbers" game. At the weather burean it was stated that this form of gambling is not a new one except as it concerns the Capital. "We have had considerable trouble in several citles, especially in St Louis, which seems to be the center of this form of gambling, where at-tempts have been made to bribe offi-cials of the weather hureau to issue taise temperature reports." William Weher, chief clerk of the bureau, de clared.

Weber, chief clerk of the burean, de clared. Attempts at Bribary Mr. Weber declared that in some cities bribes ruphing as high as 31. 000 have been affered weather bureau officials for the issuance of faise fig-ures ruphiled by persons and/ous to make's killing in the weather report gambling. In St. Louis, he said, the aitustion was such that the bureau made agree-ments with newspapers that the latter were so to accept any reports from the weather bureau that showed signs of ensures. Tampering with the tem-persture fures while they were en route from the bureau to the news-paper offices in the hands of copy boys had been uncovered from time to time "Repardless of the gambling ou these figures, we can't very well with-boid such important information from the public." 
