

DATES FIXED FOR **HUNTERS TO TRAIN** DOGS IN THE FIELD

The Department of Conservation today issued a schedule for the use of persons training dogs on game this fail.

The dates mentioned in the schedule are the first days on which dogs may be trained in the woods or fields on the various species of animals and birds:
Photsamus—September 15.
Prairie Chickens—September 15.
Prairie Chickens—September 15.
Ratbills—September 1 (loper peninsula); September 1 (loper peninsula).
Opossum—October 1.
Fox Squirrel—September 1 (loper peninsula).
The 1931 legislature provided that dogs might not be trained on game birds, rabbits, squirrels and other animals during a period of more than thirty days immediately preceding the opening of the hunting seasons on the particular animals or birds.
Under the old law it was possible to train dogs for 60 days heter fore the opening of the season. It is unlawful to carry firearms while training dogs.
Field trails using trained racroons or some other method of attracting dogs is illegal, in the opinion of the Department and all conservation officers have been instructed to arrest all persons running raccoon dogs while bird and rabbit bunders have to wait for the 30 days training period. Recently the Department recountered serveral cases in which trained raccoons were used to train dogs. Arrests followed.
