Norman Leslie, known to many of his Plymouth friends as "Big Red," this week sent to the Plymouth Mail a clipping from a Los Angeles newspaper telling of the first snow storm ever recorded in that city.

It happened last week Thursdoy, the very day that Plymouth and the rest of Michigan was enjoying as perfect a spring day as this city ever had. But the weather is unusual for Michigan was enjoying.

The clipping sent to the Mail by Norman Leslie, follows in part:

Shattering records of more than 14 years standing—far heyond the recollections of the oldest residents—snow covered Los Angeles with a soft blanket of dazzling white early today.

It was the first snow in measurable quantity in the 34-year records of the local weather lurrean.

Flurries of what is known technically as "white hail," a thin mixture of hall and snow, have fallen in past years, but this was a "good, old-fashinoned snow," according to Col. H. B. Hersey, government meteorologist.






