

YOU MIGHT TRY THIS

YOU MIGHT TRY THIS Local people who have more or less worry over their in-come tax report might try this formula, recently suggested by a Nebraska man. He lists as dependents one wife, a sedan car, three goldfish and two children. He then multiplies his grandfather's age by six and seven-eighths, subtracting his telephone number. Next he adds the size of his hat and sub-tracts the number of his auto license tag. After these prelim-inaries the rest is easy. Deducting \$1,000 for keeping his wife for a whole year, he divides the remainder by the number of holges he belongs to, multiplied by the number of windows in the house, divided by the size of his shirt. This gives his gross income which, after dividing by his chest measurement, and subtracting his blood-pressure, gives the net amount he feels he owes the government.
