

Plymouth residents can congratulate themselves upon the representative citizenship it has elected to the charter commission. It is indeed a fortunate thing for aby community when its leading business and professional men and women will give their time and energy to a solution of local problems. Possibly this answers in a way why Plymouth is one of Michigan's outstanding and thriving little cities. There is no question but what in the preparation of the new fundamental law for the city we will soon be that a commission composed of such men and women as elected at the recent village election will serve the best interests of the entire community at all times.
