The newly organized Seventeenth Congressional District of which we are a part is keenly disappointed in the first vote of its new congressman, George Dondero. He was one of the Republicans from Michigan that voted against President Roosevelt's economy measure. We do not profess to know why Congressman Dondero voted against it. We do not care for his reasons, or those of any other congressman who voted against the President's economy program. 
