This pictures meets every demand of the most critical. It is clean. It is wholesome—and

above all, it is inspiring! Never before have recording sound machines reproduced music more beautiful. And still the attendance reord of the local theatre for the four showings of the picture was exceedingly low.

Critics might say it was because of the Christmas season—but such is not the case because it was only a few weeks ago when Grace Moore, another one of the world's delightful singers, was started in a picture that commanded but small attendance.
