Here are two facts for you to think over:
Eighty per cent of all taxes in this nation are "hidden"—that is they represent part of the cost of articles and services, and must be paid by the consumer.

The total net taxable income—not taxes paid—of all American corporations in 1933, was \$2.500.000,000. The total net taxable income of persons with net incomes in excess of \$5.000 was \$4.000.000.000. The total cost of government, federal, state and local, was \$15,500.000,000. The total cost of government, federal, state and local, was \$15,500.000,000 in 1933. Result: if the government had confiscated the entire taxable income of all corporations and all individuals with a net income of \$5.000 or more, there would have remained a tax bill of \$8.000,000,000 to be paid by persons and businesses outside of these classifications. The fact that the tax bill was not paid in that year, much of it being added to the public debt, makes no difference—a day of reckoning must come eventually, whether we or our children face it.

The small salaried man, the small investor, the laborer, the little business owner—these are the people who pay the major part of the cost of government. The price of a loaf of bread, for instance, includes the cost of 53 separate taxes, from the time the seed of grain is planted to when the finished, wrapped loaf reaches you, So it goes with clothing, light, tobacco—every luxury and necessity you use. Indirect taxation is one of the largest items in the cost of living and doing business.
