INDEPENDENT VOTERS ARE LOOKING FOR A PROGRAM
In three or four weeks the big guns of the coming presidential campaign will start brooming. It is a natural and proper thing for a minority party to criticize. That is needed as it always has been. It will, however, take something more than carping criticism to attract the ever noreasing number of independent voters in this country. It seems to us that it is not necessary to spend much time talking about the new and unusual. If not illegal, experiments which have been resorted to in the last three years. The Supreme Court again this week found another New Deal measure illegal—contrary to law. It is becoming a matter of passing interest to have Congress ignore the constitution it is sworn to uphold.






