The present reservoir, which stands some eighty feet above the city on a hill just this side of Waterford, holds 1,900,000 gallons daily, so there is less than a three day supply of water in the reservoir when entirely filled.

RELIEF MILKING MICHIGAN

For every \$9 poured into the federal treasury by citizens of Michigan, only \$1 was returned to the state for relief, a fiscal report for the year ending June 30 discloses.

During the year a total of \$38,000,000 was spent for relief in Michigan. Of this sum Michigan state and local governments contributed \$16,500,000. The federal government received from Michigan \$180,000,000 in internal revenue taxes and returned but \$20,-000,000 for relief.

As far as Michigan is concerned, the report shows that if the federal government, which continually praises itself for the lavish manner in which it has handled the relief problem, paid the entire relief costs of Michigan, it would still be returning only a fraction of the money it took out of this state, and that Michigan, under a Republican administration, is among the nation's leaders in bearing its share of the relief burden.

Many states, particularly those in the South, pay less than 8 per cent of their relief costs. Michigan paid 45 per cent, a record equalled by only five other states.—Adrian Van Koevering in The Zeeland Record.


