### Ferries Create A World Record

World Record

A world record never approached by any other two ships in maritime history is credited to the Pere Marquette Railway steamers, City of Flint and City of Saginaw, which have just completed 10 years of car ferry operation on Lake Michigan.

The two boats were put in service between Ludington and Milwaukee in the spring of 1930. Since then, according to R. J. Bowman, vice-president of the railroad, the boats have traveled more miles, hauled more freight per mile, given steady employment to more persons per mile than any other two ships.

In the 10-year period the boats traveled 1,986,660 miles, equal to 80 times around the world; carried 8,580,000 tons of freight; provided \$1,825,000 in wages to their crews who incidentally were served 1,614,200 meals in the decade, and carried more than 47,000 tourist automobiles and 150,000 passengers. Despite their day-and-night, winter-and-summer operations there has not been a day in the 10 years when storms have prevented either ship from making a crossing of Lake Michigan.

The ships are two of a flect of car ferry steamers operated by the railroad between Ludington and Milwaukee, Manitowoc and Kewaunee. 




### THE FIRST STEP IN NATIONAL DEFENSE

America must be ready to meet any emergency but she should go about it in a sane and methodical manner with the aid and advice of experts. America has millions, yes billions, for defense but not one cent to be wasted in a frenzied way.

War equipment has become mechanized in this mechanical age. As mechanical as America is, we should have no difficulty in mechanizing our army, navy and air force. But machines soon wear out or become obsolete. Therefore, it is only good business to build enough equipment for the present emergency and not squander a lot of money by over-preparedness.—John Lignian in The Olivet Optic.

"HYSTERIA" BETTER CALLED "REASONABLE CONCERN" While most Americans seem to be in accord with the idea that adequate defense preparations are necessary and vital to our country, there are still those who "poch pooh" the thought that any real danger exists. They refer to the present state of public mind as "war hysteria." In my opinion the application of such a term to the present state of public mind as reflected in opinions advocating preparedness is as far from the truth as can possibly be. Such a practice comes definitely under the well-known propagnad atechnique known as "labeling"—that is the art of assigning and associating a bad name with whatever is opposed. Probably the best application that might be applied to the present feeling in America is "reasonable concern" and springs naturally from a wish to be prepared against whatever the future may bring forth.

Americans have seen and realize what can happen to countries, however peaceably inclined, which allow their armed forces to fall below standard. England and France are paying the penalty right now for allowing themselves to be outstripped in preparation for war. Moreover they are paying heavily for their years of hesitancy and mistakes in not taking aggessive steps to curb the rise of totalitarianism.

The immediate advantage of a strong army, navy and air force, is that America will be able to speak powerfully and with certainty in a world that in the future is going to need a highly constructive force. And an adequate trained and equipped armed force takes time to build—as the allies have found out.

Advocating such a policy does not seem to me to be "war hysteria" but just good plain sense.—Robert Rowe in The Milford Times.
