

The Lieutenant Governor — What Are His Duties?

By Elton R. Eaton Editor and Publisher, The Plymouth Mail

The segond most important place in the Michigan state government is the Lieutenant Governorship. The position became vacantire than a year ago when through the untimely death of the Governor, it became necessary, under the constitution, for the Lieutenant overnor to become Governor.

What are the duties of the Lieutenant Governor? What are the icial responsibilities of the office?

These are questions asked many times by the citizens of Michigan means than ever at the present time, because Michigan does tright now, have a Lieutenant Governor.

The constitution of the state fixes certain definite responsibilities this official. The state legislature has added considerably to these notitution of duties.

United States at least five years and a residence of that than two years.

In case of the death of the Governor, or his inability to serve, his resignation or absence from the state, all of the powers and duties of the governorship devolve upon the Liceutenant Governor.

Under the constitution the Liceutenant Governor is made president of the senate. But he does not have the right to vote upon any question pending before the legislature.

As president of the senate he appoints all senate committees.

Of the governorship devolve upon the constitution the Lieutenant Governor is made upon the governorship devolve upon any question pending before the legislature.

As president of the senate he appoints all senate committees and presides at all sessions.

He occupies a position where he can do much to maintain friendly relations between the two branches of the legislature and the executive office.

Outside of the Governor, he is probably one of the busiest officials in Lansing during a session of the state legislature.

It is not frequent that a Governor spends much time away from his position, but it will be recalled that a few years ago the Lieutenant Governor served so much time as Governor because of the rabsence from the state of the Governor that he asked for the Governor's compensation. The constitution fixes the compensation of the Lieutenant Governor the same as that of Governor while he is carrying on the duties of the executive office.

Sometime ago the legislature deemed it advisable to make the Lieutenant Governor a member of the state administrative board, delegating to him the same powers and responsibilities as possessed by other members of the board. The legislature took this action because it believed that the second highest official in the state should be in close touch with all state activities and problems at all times.

The duties of the Lieutenant Governor under the acts of the legislature will be discussed in the next article of this series.






