





PARENTAL GUIDANCE DR. G. B. RUBY FOR CHILDREN'S EYESIGHT

This short article is written to assist parents to develop their children into normal, useful and successful adults. But having made this statement which is new to very few parents, let me ask, "How are the eyes to be well cared for?"

be well cared for?"

It is common knowledge that a well body will usually show clear bright eyes. It is well known that childhood diseases often affect the eyes severely. It is well known that if the child is unable to read the blackboart that it is time for his eyes to be tested for clear vision. It is well known that children who have frequent styes are often relieved of their trouble by wearing glasses. It is fairly well known that often children who exhibit cross-eye conditions are improved in the usage of their eyes by giving them glasses which correct a far-sighted condition.

them glasses which correct a far-sighted condition.

It is not well known, however, that there is another feature in this problem of seeing which is of equal importance and which is very generally overlooked by many, many examiners. Without this final element in the act of seeing, the situation might be likened to a chimney without a cap-stone or a house without a roof. This final achievement in the act of seeing is fusion.

counts for man's rise to dominance over all other forms of life. But let us learn more about fusion.

Seeing is primarily a sense devoted to the locating of objects. Of course colors, forms, motion, and recognition of objects are all important, but first of all comes locating the object, and the other attributes follow.

Two eyes, we all concede, are better than one, but, unfortunately, the mere possession of two eyes does not guarantee that the child as he becomes about six years of age is going to learn to use his eyes well. Seeing is an accidental process, just as walking, or chewing, or using the hands, or hearing. No parent teaches, nor can he teach to any great extent, how the child shall walk. He may be pigeon-toed. He may wear all of his shoes off on one side of the heel. He may shuffle. He may not lift his feet high enough and be prone to stumble. At any rate he finds out for himself a comfortable fashion to use his abilities, and that comfortable fashion becomes a habit. But there are efficient habits and inefficient habits. The efficient habit becomes the Johnny Weismuller or the Nurmi in the adult, and the less efficient becomes the ordinary individual, who gets along all right, but is not brilliantly efficient.

Many activities of the human body are similar to the walking act. Although there is a best manner, yet the attainment of a fair degree of proficiency.

Satisfactorily, without any great harm being done by reason of the inefficiency.

The act of seeing has today become, in our swiftly moving, densely populated nation, a social problem. Therefore parents must know that the pinnacle of seeing—fusion—is added by the child in his early years, if he is to measure up to the standard which must be exhibited, close watch over this feature of vision must be given.

The Case of A and B

Let us compare two boys and we shall imagine that A has only one cyc, while B has two eyes, and uses them well together.

Both shoot rifles equally well. Both shoot marbles equally well.

A stumbles more frequently than does B.

A has more troubles crossing crowded streets than does B and is slow.

A will have more automobile accidents than B.

A will have great difficulty in playing tennis, handball, pingpong, and similar activities.

A will be unable to gain admittance to any responsible operating job on railroad trains, steamships, or in the army or navy.

A will be greatly handicapped as a carpenter or other artizan.

Analysis of the difficulties for A shows that he is troubled in his judgment of distances between himself and objects about him. This handicap of A is very evident becuase anyone can see that he has only one eye and can therefore only use one eye. But many two eyed people are using only one eye for seeing and thereby are reduced to the condition of the one-eyed individual. Unless fusion is developed this is the case.

To be an aeroplane pilot it is necessary to pass an examination. As part of this examination it is essential to pass the "Peg Test." If you can pass the "Peg Test" it is proved that the pilot has the act of fusion well learned. This test is not available to the average person, but an equivalent test is obtained through use of Stereometric analysis cards which are in the offices of optometrists using the Tel-eye-trainer or other similar machines.

The advice of one man followed closely, is worth more than the combined advice of ten specialists followed half-heartedly and with skepticism. Having selected one man, do as he advises, and if progress seems to be slow, ask for consultations of this man with other men to see if anything more may be done to hasten good results.

The wise practitioner will be careful to exact a promise from the parents regarding their co-operation before he takes the case, and also he will be wise to let the parents read this before asking for such a promise.

Now as a summary of information for the parent, let us call these points to his attention:

(a) If the child is able to turn each eye separately and the two eyes together from side to side and up and down freely then there is little chance that paralysis of the eye muscles is the cause of the squint.

(b) If there is no paralysis, then there is a reasonably good chance that the child will be able to learn fusion.

(c) A child who for any reason has had one eye bandaged for several days before age of about six years is likely to be a squint case as he grows up.

(d) If both eyes move freely in their sockets, then it would seem obvious that the brain should be able to adjust the position of the two eyes to any position which it desires, and thereby obtain fusion. Yet, strange to relate, once the two eyes take a position with respect to each other, it is very difficult to alter such a placement. By training, it is possible to control this placement and by the selection of lenses, it is possible to change this placement, so that although the placement may still remain, there is an ability to overcome it in the interest of single vision.

(e) Cross-eyed children are more often discovered than wall-eyed, who are relatively rare, at least before about age ten.

(f) Cross-eyed children are often greatly benefited and perhaps even cured by merely giving them the strongest lens that they can accept.

(g) Wall-eyed children may be in need of lenses because of near-sightedness, and the proper lens may help such a patient to become normal.

(h) Sometimes extra plus lens power is needed for near work and bi-

(i) It is normal for all babies to be born far-sighted and with a tendency for eyes to cross.

As legs, arms, and body grow, so do the eyes grow toward a normal structure. The front of the eye changes little, but the length of the eye changes considerably in the first ten years of the child's life.

An error in development of the length of the eye of about one two hundredth of an inch will cause an error of refraction which is measurable with lenses and may cause the child to gladly accept lenses as an aid in seeing as he becomes an adult. It is no wonder that for accurate seeing, glasses may be needed to supplment any errors of development.

(j) Until about age ten the child is still in the development stage of the cycballs and is learning better habits of vision, but he has made a great deal of progress by age six and can usually be considered as a possible patient at about age six.

Gross errors where there is a manifest squint may also be corrected at ages of about four years, but no assurance of success can be expected merely from the lenses.

About age ten marks the completion of the eye structure, and visual habits should at this age be closely inspected to see that they are good and that fusion has been learned.

(k) The eyes of the average American child are just as sound structurally as were those of the preceding generations. They are just as sound as those of aborigines tribes.

There is nothing fundamentally wrong with the eyes of the American if they are given good supervision and adequate light intensity for the task in hand.


