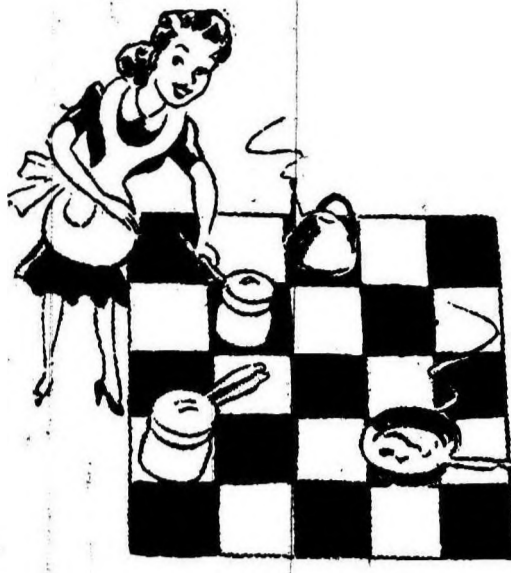

Canada Preparing Declares Baker

Neighboring Province Realizes Danger

"If any one has an idea that Canada is not doing its share in an effort to save the world from rule by European dictators, they should take a trip to some of the Canadian metropolitan centers and see what is going on," stated William Baker, who returned to his home in Plymouth early this week from a vacation trip spent in the valley of the St. Lawrence river. He was also in Ottawa a number of days.

"Every able young man in Canada is in the army or navy. If they are physically unfit for military service, they are employed in war equipment plants. No strikes or labor troubles are tying up Canada's production of war materials, because over there every man, woman and child has come to a full realization of the fact that they are engaged in a life and death struggle," he said. "The work week is 60 hours, but many factories are working 72 hours. For the overtime above 60 hours workers are paid time and a fourth. Labor is doing its part in a patriotic way, just as we will be doing it in this country when we wake up to just how serious the situation is."

"It's true they have no conscription over there, but every man of proper age is in the army, or else. Never saw so many planes in my life. When we wake up to the situation, and I think we are headed that way, we will know something about preparedness," he added.
