Our form of government shall be crushed by the war machine, that only the totalitarian form of government shall endure.

"The attack upon Pearl Harbor was a terrible thing. It cost the lives of many American boys. It destroyed the homes and property of many people who seek to live in peace and contentment."

Mr. Isbey stated, "It is the sort of thing we can expect in this war. It gives us a little indication of what the future holds."

Plymouth's first victory meeting was opened by a brief concert by the Plymouth high school band.

Father John E. Contway, pastor of St. Michael's church delivered the invocation.

A strong appeal for one hundred percent support of every step taken by our government in its efforts to keep America for Americans was made by the first speaker, George A. Smith, superintendent of the Plymouth public schools.

Mr. Smith, who knows probably more of the Plymouth boys who have been called to the front than any other citizen of Plymouth, told why it was so essential for victory to be won.

"Not only must we win the war," said Mr. Smith, "but we must be prepared for that which is to come after the war. I know of no better way to prepare for the future and at the same time help our soldiers at the front than by the investment in defense bonds," he said.

"By liberal support in this movement we, too, can help head off the danger of inflation."

The address of Mr. Isbey was followed by the presentation of a brief report by Mayor Ruth Huston Whipple who told of the activities of the city government in protecting the civilian population when war troubles come to us.

Mr. Isbey had pointed out that anti-aircraft guns and similar military equipment is for the protection only of fortifications, military bases and munition factories, not for the protection of citizens not engaged in war.

"The total war of the kind inflicted upon the world by the dictators is the kind of war in which the citizen suffers most," he said.

"It is for the protection of the civilians that the city government of Plymouth is taking the energetic steps it has in recent weeks," stated Mayor Whipple.

Members of the city commission came to the Victory meeting following a special meeting in which they had voted unanimously for various protective measures.

Rev. Walter Nichol, pastor of the First Presbyterian church was the last speaker. Seldom has one heard a more inspirational patriotic address than that given by Rev. Nichol.

"I do not favor war," he said, "and I do not like it. But it is a question of whether our form of government in which we have something to say as to how it shall be run, or the form of government in which the state tells us what we can do and what we cannot do, that now must be decided. We prefer our form of living to the form of existence they would impose upon us. Therefore I am not only giving my financial support but my moral support to our cause," he declared.

Chauncey Rauch led the group in singing "God Bless America" in closing the meeting.

worthless. But need the Christian have any scruples of conscience in the matter? We think not. Our government is ordained of God, and those in government are held responsible by God to preserve our freedom and to protect us against harm, while we have His clear commandment to obey: "Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers. For there is no power but of God: the powers that be are ordained of God. Whosoever resisteth the power, resisteth the ordinance of God: and they that resist shall receive to themselves damnation. For he is the minister of God to thee for good. But if thou do that which is evil, be afraid: for he beareth not the sword in vain; for he is the minister of God, a revenger to execute wrath upon him that doeth evil. Wherefore ye must needs be subject, not only for wrath, but also for conscience sake."

The Bible rather praises him who lays down the best he has, his life, for his fellow-man: Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends. Compared with that, the supreme sacrifice, which has been and will be made willingly by our men under arms, how can we either withhold, or boast of bringing the contributions required of us to support them?
