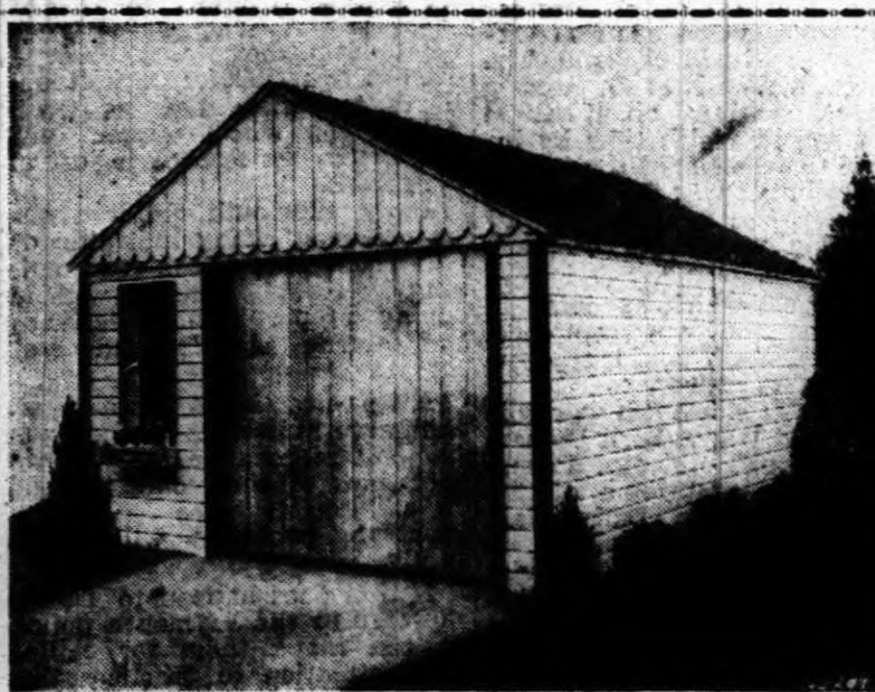

Vandals Ransack Hilltop Golf Club

Sometime during the night last Sunday, thieves or vandals broke into and ransacked Hilltop Golf Club. According to Max Todd, the owner, those responsible apparently were searching only for money.

Todd reports that although the clubhouse was literally turned upside down he has been unable to find anything missing.

The juke box was smashed in what Todd termed a "frenzied attempt to get the cash drawer out" and the door lock on a small utility building adjacent to the clubhouse also was broken.

Entrance to the clubhouse was gained, Todd said, by smashing in the front door.

DeHoCo To Get New Laundry

Despite a 228 per cent increase in the cost estimates of the building and a service tunnel, the Detroit City Council has decided to build a new laundry at the House of Correction, three miles west of Plymouth.

Two years ago when a new laundry was first proposed the building estimates to construct and equip the addition were set at \$290,000.00. When bids were opened recently the cost had increased to \$661,798.

The W. E. Wood Company has been awarded the construction contract for the laundry and service tunnel for \$506,459. Equipment will cost almost \$115,000. Inspection and other expenses will amount to \$40,000 the council was told.

However, when in operation, the new laundry at the institution will do Detroit's annual 4,500,000 pounds of washing for approximately 2.01 cents per pound, it is estimated. This project most likely will offer considerable employment to unskilled and skilled labor in an around Plymouth.

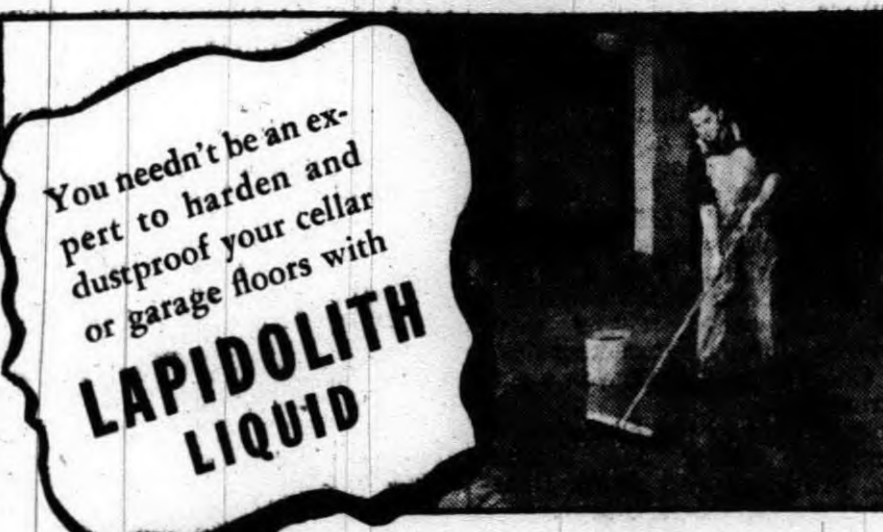





Fire Chief Tells Of Severe Losses In State

Two hundred and eight Michigan persons died in fires during 1945 and eight Michigan firemen were killed in the line of duty.

This and other important information about the 49,167 fires in the state last year is contained in the state fire marshal's annual report...

Of the total number of Michigan blazes last year, 14,323 were in dwellings, the report shows.

Carelessness rated tops as the cause of the fires, according to the report. Just plain carelessness was blamed for 787 of them.

Careless smokers caused 2,666 blazes, some of which were fatal to them. A hundred and ninety-four fires were caused by careless persons using petroleum liquids to kindle fires.

Children playing with matches left within their reach were responsible for 1,434 alarms, while defective chimneys, another proof of carelessness, caused 1,461.

Two hundred persons bent on thawing out frozen pipes ended up by causing damaging fires to stores and homes, the report shows.

Carelessness in household duties also is a big factor in fires. Irons left turned on while the housewife was at the telephone or stepped outdoors caused 236 fires.

Indifference to defective appliances and wiring in homes and buildings were responsible for 1,969 blazes, according to the report.

Some fires happened even after inspectors had pointed out defective wiring and home-repaired appliances that were hazardous.

All these causes which could rightly come under the single classification of CARELESSNESS, the report states, did more than ten million dollars damage to

homes, stores and other buildings, and more than nineteen million dollars worth of contents were destroyed.

Plymouthites should remember that these figures include all local fires. It is not a report of some other state but of Michigan, of your community. The loss from fire in your state last year was the highest in its history.

Local councils for veterans affairs have been set-up in more than 160 lower Michigan cities and towns. One of their chief functions is the handling of information on how veterans can buy surplus war materials from War Assets Administration.

The Province of Ontario will within the next few years open the richest "gold mine" in the world. It is a gold mine so filled with "tourist" dollars that it will go a long way towards supporting the cost of the government in Michigan's friendly neighbor to the east and north.

Ontario for a number of years has been constructing a highway along the north shore of Lake Superior. From the east the road has already reached a point 82 miles northeast of Sault Ste. Marie. From the west it extends east of Port Arthur for a number of miles. There is a distance of something less than 400 miles to finish—and when it is finished, Canada will experience a flow of tourist dollars greater than ever before experienced by any state or country.

We have traveled over a portion of the completed highway. Nowhere in America can there be found more scenic beauty than along the north shore of Lake Superior.

When the day comes when it will be possible for tourists to start from St. Ignace, travel through to the Canadian Soo, then to the north and west around Lake Superior to Duluth, back through Superior and Marquette, along the south shore of the lake millions of people of this nation will have right in "their front yards" one of the finest motor tours that can be found anywhere in the world. For Ontario, it will mean the greatest source of tourist income of any similar project on the North American continent.

Weakness of young pheasants' jaws betrays their age, and Joe Linduska, pheasant investigator for the conservation department, is asking hunters to use this convenient index to establish the age ratio of the 1946 season's pheasant take.

In good years in good pheasant territory when both hatching and rearing seasons have been favorable, there may be as many as 16 young cocks to each old one. In poor years in poor sections the ratio may be as low as four to one.

To 20,000 sportsmen in sample areas who are being furnished with special report cards Linduska is explaining the simple age test. When an old bird is lifted by the lower jaw and shaken, the jaw will bear the bird's weight, and long sharp spurs will confirm the bird's age. "But with 'birds of the year,' pheasants hatched this spring, the lower jaw will bend or break in such a test, and spurs will be short and blunt.

Age ratio studies are expected to show the degree of hunters' dependence on good hatching and rearing weather in the five months immediately preceding hunting season.

Post offices last year sold 1,725,505 of the \$1 duck stamps required by federal law of every migratory waterfowl hunter over 16 years of age.

Since upwards of 7,000 game farm birds will be wearing them this season, the pheasant hunter's chances of collecting a bird band souvenir are greater than they have been in years. The conservation department would like the bands back, for examination. At the least, it wants a report of the number and other information on the band and the time and place the bird wearing it was taken.

Pheasants from the state game farm have been planted in 21 of the 38 counties of the pheasant's principal range, to offset as far as possible the reduction in pheasant stock following the poor hatching season of 1945. Most game farm birds already have been distributed to the fields and swales where hunters will find them, but 1,800 are being held over for next season's breeding stock and 1,000 will be used in test plantings during the hunting season and for dog trials.

Game division men stocking pheasants in the last three weeks sometimes met farmers who refused permission for releases on their farms. Some complained neighborhood talk of a release of game farm birds would bring an undesirable hunter concentration, and others grimly observed, "They eat corn just like crows, don't they?"

Boom In Real Estate Not New

Guest speaker recently at the Plymouth Rotary Club luncheon at Hotel Mayflower was Roland A. Bengé, vice president of the Detroit Bank. He was introduced by Russell Daane.

Mr. Bengé spoke on Real Estate Investments. He said as a banker he should not be in favor of such investments because they are long term credit and not desirable for secondary reserves.

However, he said, such investments had proved highly successful in Detroit and eventually proved to be asset that paid off the depositors of two large banks in full during the great depression of the 30s.

He scoffed at rumors of a "coming real estate boom" and declared that Plymouth Rotarians better than anybody else should realize that real estate had been booming the last two or three years.

Mr. Bengé said he looked upon his listeners as a group of real estate owners or potential owners, all of whom were vitally interested in real estate loans and values. His talk was very well received and proved to be educational as well as highly informative.

There were, however, funds restricted by the legislature for definite purposes, such as—the \$50,000,000 in the Veterans' Trust Fund, the \$11,453,489.05 in the State Highway Fund, the \$27,881,094.15 in appropriation balances for uncompleted buildings and improvements, the \$14,417,250.03 in the Primary School Fund, etc. THESE BALANCES WERE NOT AVAILABLE FOR GENERAL PURPOSES.

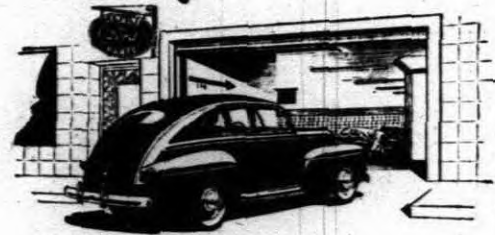

Traffic Warning To Plymouthites

From now on Mr. and Mrs. Plymouth had better watch their step whenever they visit Detroit. For pedestrians in that city now have a new worry.

Plymouthites when in Detroit will be guilty of a crime—assuming they survive—if they "step suddenly, run or jump into the path of a moving motor vehicle."

Believe it or not, that's the new provision of the Motor City's pedestrian protection ordinance that went into effect recently.

You may not have heard of it nor received a warning ticket during the month preceding its enactment, but ignorance of a law does not excuse you from paying a fine if you're caught violating it.

Since 1942, when Detroit's first pedestrian ordinance took effect, it's been illegal to jump in front of cars at corners only.

The new directive extends the ban all along the street. Of course any Plymouthite bent on self-destruction need have no fear. Suicide is the only exception. Anyway it is all part of Detroit's odd pedestrian control set-up. Other big cities having such programs turns thumbs down on walking against red lights. Crossing in the middle of the block also is taboo. But Detroit allows its pedestrians to thumb their noses at red lights and dash across the street wherever they choose. But they must not jump in front of any moving vehicles; if they do and don't get killed they'll get a ticket.

Generally speaking however, the new ordinance establishes the principle that pedestrians have prior rights to crosswalks and that motorists in turn have prior rights to the rest of the street.

Drivers are strictly forbidden to pass other vehicles that are stopped for pedestrians in a crosswalk. They also are prohibited from forcing pedestrians to wait until cars have turned. On turns the pedestrians have the right of way.

Pedestrians can walk against red lights in Detroit if they do it without causing a traffic jam or without getting injured. They can run across the street in the middle of a block too providing they don't "step suddenly, run or jump into the path of a car or street car."

If you do and live, a ticket will be issued calling for your appearance in traffic court.

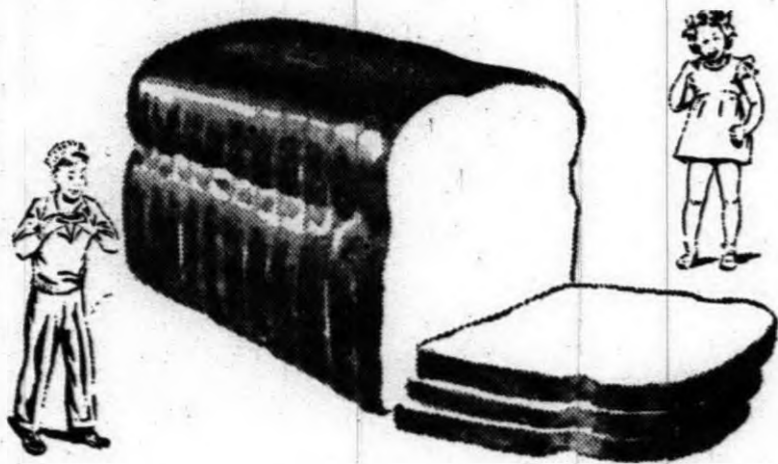

The best situations should be self-contained communities with populations under 25,000 and located away from the seacoast.
In a report of the Civilian Commission to President Truman on the results of the Bikini tests, it was clearly stated that "distance is the best defense" against attack by A-bombs. Our present setup of production, concentrated in huge centers of population makes us as vulnerable as a "sitting duck" to the attacks of any enemy.
ATOM WAR INEXPENSIVE
Let no one be fooled into thinking that other nations will not soon be well stocked with A-bombs. Russia is reported to be holding her first "tests" in April. It is my own view that the obstructionist and delaying tactics of Russia at the Paris Conference are due to her desire to hold up the final peace treaties concerning the Dardanelles, etc. until she is able to manufacture atomic weapons. Until Russia can turn out a satisfactory A-bomb, she surely is at a "trading" disadvantage.
It might take only about 1500 of the A-bombs to wipe out our capacity to carry on war! Compare that figure of 1500 bombs with the air raid efforts of World War II. Daily and nightly raids of 1000 planes were made. Each plane load ran from 3-8 tons of TNT bombs. Yet, many European cities were only partially destroyed. If A-bombs should cost one million dollars each, the total bomb cost for some enemy to wipe out most of the productive capacity of the United States would be only about a billion and a half dollars. It cost us that much to fight less than one month in the last war!

ductive capacity. That is why I have advised my clients and my grandchildren to move to small interior cities and there set up their businesses. To be sure the area chosen should be self sufficient for an extended period of time. Transportation will be cut off in the next war. That means that access to water, fuel, food, etc. should be very handy.
In answer to my pleas to decentralize I have received many letters. Most of these have been most constructive. One of the most constructive was from a good friend in Oswego, Kansas, Editor of the Democrat. He points out the desirable features of his community for all who are sincere about protecting themselves against an A-bomb war. I am leaving here this week to call upon him.
CONCRETE SUGGESTION
If people write me about other places they should stress the ready availability of large food supplies from adjacent farms, plentiful spring water supply, standby electric power, easily mined nearby coal veins, and the number of natural gas wells, all in the immediate vicinity! This is exactly the type of opportunity that I have in mind when I say "Decentralize before it is too late." There must be many such attractive spots in America that would appeal to men of vision and courage. I should like to hear from such localities.
