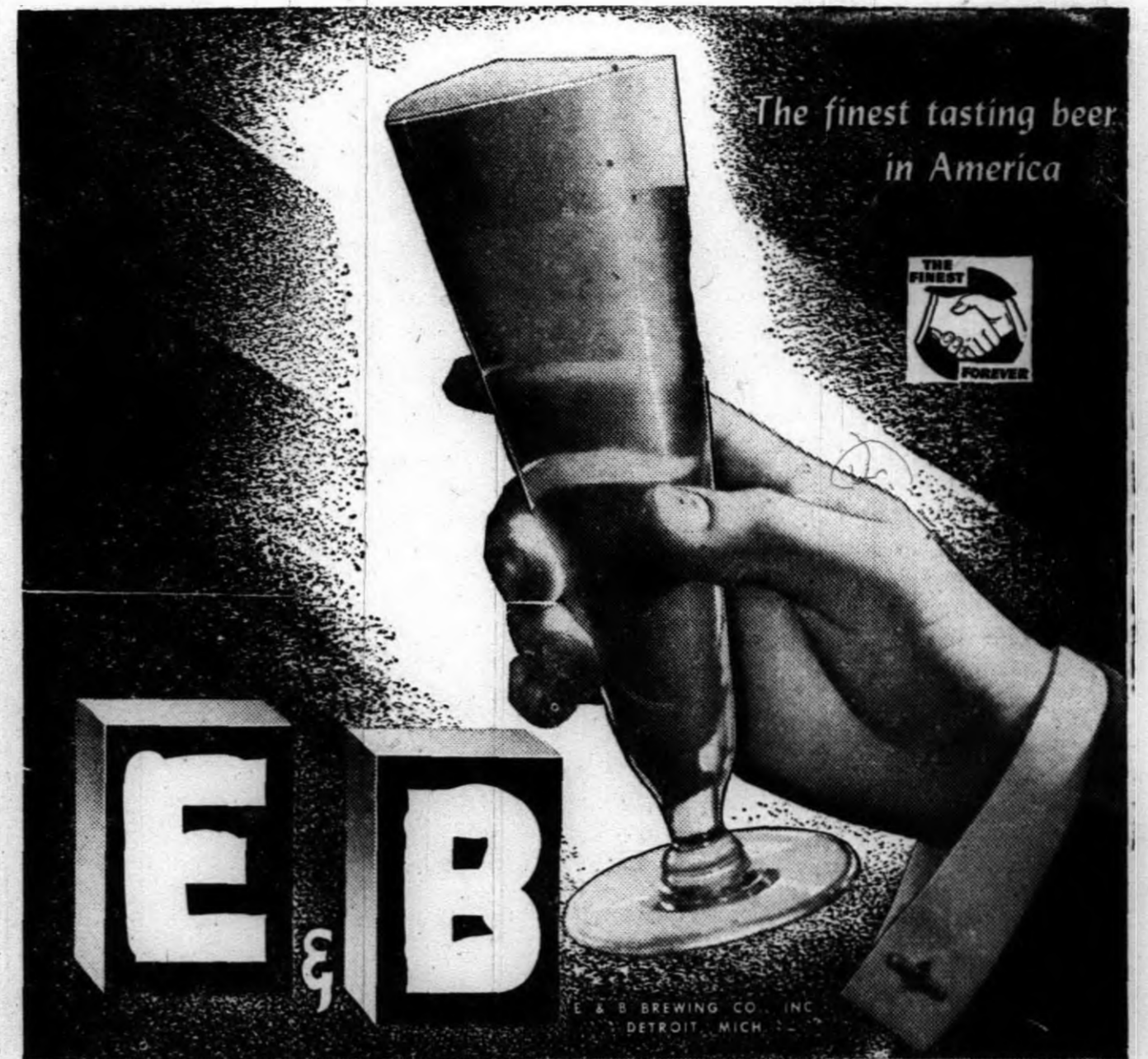

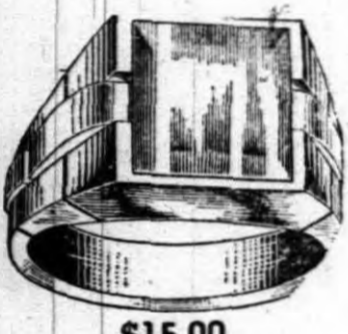

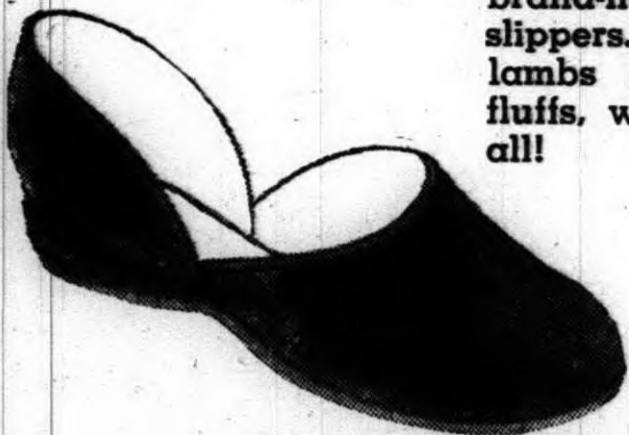

Stepped up production plans for 1947 were announced when John H. Jones, Plymouth realtor, attended a convention of distributors for Strathmoor "Factory-Bilt" homes in Detroit last Thursday. The plants are now making 30 of these pre-fabricated homes daily, and with increased demands for this type of living accommodations, the home-building company is doing all it can do to comply with the country's need.

Representatives of the company attending the convention were from Michigan and other areas in this part of the United States. Strathmoor has factories in Alabama, North Carolina, and Washington in addition to their plants in this state.

A tour of the Detroit factory was conducted Thursday morning with luncheon at the Ball club. In the afternoon they inspected the Currier Lumber company where sashes and doors are produced for the Strathmoor homes and the evening meeting was conducted at the Stockholm restaurant.

Mr. Jones said that Plymouth may expect early delivery of these homes to veterans, and civilian orders can now be taken for near future delivery. "A home of this type can do much to relieve the current housing shortage," he declared.
