Lind, 64, of Highland Park. He told the officers he first noticed Mr. Stachel when about 25 feet from him. He slowed un, he told police, and noted that the pedestrian (Mr. Stachel) seemed to become confused.

Mr. Lind, traveling north, said three cars also were approaching him from the opposite direction. He said if he had swung too far to the left he would have crashed into one and perhaps two of the oncoming cars. He tried to avoid the pedestrian and the cars too but the right fender struck Mr.

Mr. Lind stopped almost immediately upon striking Mr. Stachel. He attempted to render all the assistance possible. After hearing his story and checking with the drivers of the other cars, police released Mr. Lind. He agreed to appear at any future date they might want him.

STRIKES VERY COSTLY It is true that strikes are very ostly,-to labor, employers, and o the public. As a rule, it takes wage workers about sixty months to make up what is lost in wages in a 100-days strike which wins with a 18½% increase. This means that a 30-days strike requires twenty months to catch up; and that with the average strike

employees must work about two

ears at their average increased wages before they gain a penny. Certainly, in nine cases out of ten, labor would be far better off to accept a company offer of 10% without striking than to strike and get more. This is not figuring he loss to employers in which labor should also be very much nterested because every strike delays and postpones the time when employers can again make voluntary wage increase.
