Aged Pedestrian Struck by Auto; Both Legs Broken

While walking in the roadway on Mill street just north of Liberty street at dusk last week Friday, Fred Stachel, 66, of 297 Farmer street, was struck and seriously injured by an automobile.

He was admitted to Wayne County General hospital suffering from compound fractures of both legs, multiple bruises and contusions of the body, arms and face and possible internal injuries. His condition is termed serious.

Plymouth police said they were unable to secure the services of any of four physicians who were called, all stating that they were busy with patients.

Meanwhile, the injured man was lying in the street in agony, begging for aid. He was rushed to the hospital screaming in pain.

Police said the motorist who struck Mr. Stachel was Joel M. Lind, 64, of Highland Park. He told the officers he first noticed Mr. Stachel when about 25 feet from him. He slowed up, he told police, and noted that the pedestrian (Mr. Stachel) seemed to become confused.

Mr. Lind, traveling north, said three cars also were approaching him from the opposite direction. He said if he had swung too far to the left he would have crashed into one and perhaps two of the oncoming cars. He tried to avoid the pedestrian and the cars too but the right fender struck Mr. Stachel.

Mr. Lind stopped almost immediately upon striking Mr. Stachel. He attempted to render all the assistance possible. After hearing his story and checking with the driver of the other cars, police released Mr. Lind. He agreed to appear at any future date they might want him.

Chance Remark Leads to All-Out Aid for War Stricken Dutch Church

Plymouth Presbyterians Carry On Energetic War Relief Program

For the past year the ladies auxiliary and later the entire congregation of the Presbyterian church has been quietly carrying on a very successful relief project for a war-torn group of fellow religionists in The Netherlands.

This local project has grown larger and become more successful with each shipment. Best of all it has been accomplished without a single line of ballyhoo or any type of public plea or announcement.

What announcements have been made were made within the church and only to members of the congregation. Yet the success of the effort has gone beyond all expectations.

It all started a year ago during the holidays when Mrs. Russell Daane mentioned something about the fine work the American Relief for Holland chapters throughout the country were doing. She was speaking with authority as her brother-in-law at Holland, Mich., is very active and directs the work of the chapter in that city.

Mrs. Daane's chance remark struck the fancy of Mrs. David Mather and she prepared cards to be mailed members of Circle No. 4 of the ladies auxiliary, suggesting that the group adopt a church in Holland to aid.

Members of that one little circle responded so well to the idea of adopting a Dutch congregation to rehabilitate, that the Rev. Henry J. Walsh was consulted and he too expressed a liking for the proposition.

He told the members of the circle to go ahead with their attempts to collect clothing and shoes. Meanwhile, Rev. Walsh contacted the American Relief for Holland headquarters at New York and advised them of what his church women wanted to do.

Back came a letter telling the good pastor that the Wilhelmina Kirk, The Hague had been assigned the Plymouth church.

A month later, in a large wooden box donated by Edwin Schradler, the ladies of Circle No. 4, Presbyterian church, sent 700 pounds of clothing and footwear to that stricken congregation in The Netherlands.

Many anxious months passed before word was received of its safe arrival. The only cost had been efforts of the women to collect the material and the shipping charges from Plymouth to New York. The letters of gratitude the church circle received were payment in tenfold for the efforts of individual members and the ship-

School Boiler Fails Temporarily

Failure of the oil to properly feed into the burner from the storage tank forced a shutdown of the new oil-burning boilers at Plymouth High school at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday.

Classes in both the high school and Central grade school were dismissed for the remainder of the day. Supt. Helmer Nelson reported. The trouble was remedied by Tuesday night and the boiler returned to service.

Firemen Save 2 Homes From Destruction

Prompt action by Plymouth firemen saved two homes from almost certain destruction last Sunday and Monday.

On Sunday, firemen reported, a defective chimney at the Lloyd Kennedy residence, 530 South Harvey street, ignited floor joists and had spread to the walls before it was discovered.

Unlike firemen of large cities, Chief Robert McAllister and his men did not hack the Kennedy home to pieces although smoke was pouring from numerous places.

Chief McAllister directed his men to wait until they could find where the flames were and then direct all their efforts to that area. The men quickly found the flames were centered behind a mopboard on the first floor. They ripped out a small piece of the board and had the flames extinguished in short order. Damage from the flames and water was less than \$100, firemen reported.

Chief McAllister discovered where a brick had been left out of the chimney, he said, and a joist was resting in that niche. He believed the fire began Saturday night and smoldered for hours before breaking out enough to attract the attention of the Kennedy family. He said Mr. Kennedy reported having a hot fire Saturday night.

Luckily, the family was home all day Sunday. Otherwise the house might have been destroyed. Fortunately too, the damage was kept very low.

Shortly after noon, Monday, the department was summoned to the home of Vern Burden, 906 Irvin street, where an overheated furnace had ignited flooring and walls. Mrs. Burden was just returning home when a baby-sitter rushed out to meet her and said the house was on fire.

Mrs. Burden summoned the department and then began throwing water on the flames until firemen arrived. He undoubtedly saved the home, Chief McAllister said. Damage was held to \$100, firemen reported.

Chief McAllister issued a warning to Plymouthites at the same time to be careful about overheating stoves and furnaces.

Trooper Burley Helps in Capture

Harold Burley, a Plymouth resident who has made an outstanding record with the Michigan State Police, was one of the state troopers who last Friday took part in the capture of four Detroit bandits who made their escape from Ionia prison, kidnapped two Ionia girls and drove part way across the state in a stolen car before they were captured.

Trooper Burley and his companion chased the escaping convicts from Ionia to Owosso before they were able to take the desperate felons.

The troopers explained that they had not dared shoot at the fleeing car because of a fear that the bullets might hit one of the girls.

After their capture, the convicts were returned to Ionia by Trooper Burley and his associate, where they now face possible life sentences.

Fire Hydrants Painted Yellow

Plymouthites will have no excuse now for parking in front of or near fire hydrants. City workmen each and every hydrant a bright gleaming yellow. So unless you are color blind you can't miss seeing them.

City Manager Harold Cheek said the city decided that yellow was the one color that showed up best in the darkness and also would enable firemen to find the hydrants quicker in case of fire. The color also should serve to caution motorists against parking within 15 feet of the hydrants.

Food Handlers Must Take Tests

Dr. Luther H. Peck, Plymouth health officer, yesterday advised that all food handlers in Plymouth eating places must take a physical examination, including blood Kahn, before January 1. While it is not compulsory that the health department issue this notice, Dr. Peck has deemed it advisable to serve this warning so that employees in all local eating places will be fully advised as to the final date for examination under the new regulations. Any additional information needed can be secured from Dr. Peck.

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Plymouth's ballots were among those rechecked Tuesday at the official vote recount proceedings in the county building at Detroit. The ballot boxes were delivered by Fire Chief Robert McAllister. City Manager Harold Cheek was present when they were opened. Results of the recount of Plymouth's ballots were excellent. Only one precinct however, was without error. In the other three, four uninitiated ballots were thrown out and another ruled void because it bore a distinguishing mark.

City Manager Cheek said he was very pleased with the results and thought it reflected commendable work on the part of Plymouth election boards. "It shows careful and accurate counting," he said.

More Honors For Simmons Corn

George Simmons has just been named 1946 Wayne county corn growing champion for producing a yield of 92.96 bushels of corn per acre in a five-acre plot on his farm near Belleville, according to a bulletin just received from headquarters of the 1946 National DeKalb corn growing contest, states Robert Wakefield of Canton township, Plymouth representative.

This record yield wins for Mr. Simmons the coveted County Corn King Plaque presented each year to the farmer producing the County's largest officially measured yield in the DeKalb contest. This also makes him eligible to participate for state and national corn growing contest awards, as well.

Mr. Simmons' winning corn field was checked by disinterested parties, and the information gained by the study of growing practices he used will be utilized to help other farmers improve their corn yields. The corn growing contest was inaugurated eight years ago and has been entered by thousands of farmers in over twenty states and Canada each year.

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Daisy Workers And Officials In Get-Together

Over 460 were present last Friday evening when employees and officials of the Daisy Manufacturing company held a get-together in the Methodist church house at Newburg. The event was arranged under the joint auspices of the Independent Daisy Employees' Association and the Daisy company.

Following the turkey dinner the second distribution of earnings under the new profit-sharing plan announced by the Company last last summer, took place. Nearly \$51,000, before tax deductions, was distributed to those who had been employed long enough by the company to come under the terms of the profit-sharing arrangement.

The average total paid to each qualified worker was around \$200 before tax deductions.

Col. Cass Hough explained in detail the plan which has made possible this generous distribution of earned profits. It will be recalled that when the plan was first announced in July, a substantial distribution also was made at that time.

President Charles Bennett of the company, following one of its old established customs, presented gold watches to two employees who had been associated with the Company for more than 24 years. They were Floyd Reddeman and Leo Hollis. Formerly it had been the practice of the Company to present watches to employees who had been on the payroll for a quarter of a century, but now the presentations are made to those with the longest continuous service records. Mr. Reddeman and Mr. Hollis began working for the Daisy in the same month 24 years ago.

To Guarantee Doctor's Pay

So that people badly injured in traffic accidents or other serious mishaps may be assured of immediate medical aid, the city commission Monday night advised the police department that in future accident cases they can tell doctors that the city will guarantee payment of charges up to \$10.

The action was brought about when City Manager Harold Cheek reported to the commission that there had been several cases where doctors had been called to care for people injured in accidents and they did not respond.

The more recent case involved a pedestrian who had both legs and one arm broken when hit by an automobile. Police made an effort, it was reported to the commission, to get some doctors to come to the accident and do something to relieve the pain of the injured man, but no one responded.

Commissioner Davis moved that in cases where police or firemen called for the aid of a doctor that the city guarantee payment up to \$10. It passed without a single no vote.

It has been known for a number of years that many people injured in accidents after having the best of medical care, have not only refused to pay doctors who treated them, but for hospital and ambulance services as well. It is for this reason that it has become difficult to induce medical people to answer accident calls.

William Davis, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Davis, of 1941 Gorman Road, last week joined the Michigan State Troopers and is now stationed at the barracks in Detroit. He has enlisted for the three year period, and as a result will not complete his high school course.

Ralph Pentecost New Master Of Masonic Lodge

Ralph Pentecost, an employee of the Burroughs Adding Machine company and one of Plymouth's most enthusiastic Masonic lodge members, has been honored by his Masonic associates by election as Worshipful Master of Plymouth Rock lodge.

Master Pentecost and the other newly advanced officers have all recently been installed in their positions.

The other officers are: Senior Warden, Manley Smith; Junior Warden, Leslie Evans; Secretary, Oscar E. Alsbro; Treasurer, A. K. Brocklehurst; Chaplain, Harry Mummy; Senior Deacon, Melvin Michaels; Junior Deacon, William Michaels; Steward, Louis Jacobs; Steward, Walter Gregory; Marshal, Edwin Ottensman; Tyler, Merritt W. Crumbe.

The Plymouth lodge now has a membership of 430, the largest number it has ever enjoyed. During the last year 40 new members were given the sublime degree of a Master Mason, seven were received into local membership from other lodges and a number asked to be restored to membership.

The new officers hope to make the ensuing year as successful as the past one has been.

Mrs. Alexander wishes to express her appreciation to the ladies who assisted at the various booths as well as all others who helped to make the drive such a success.

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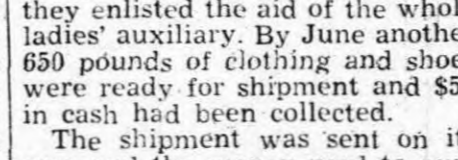

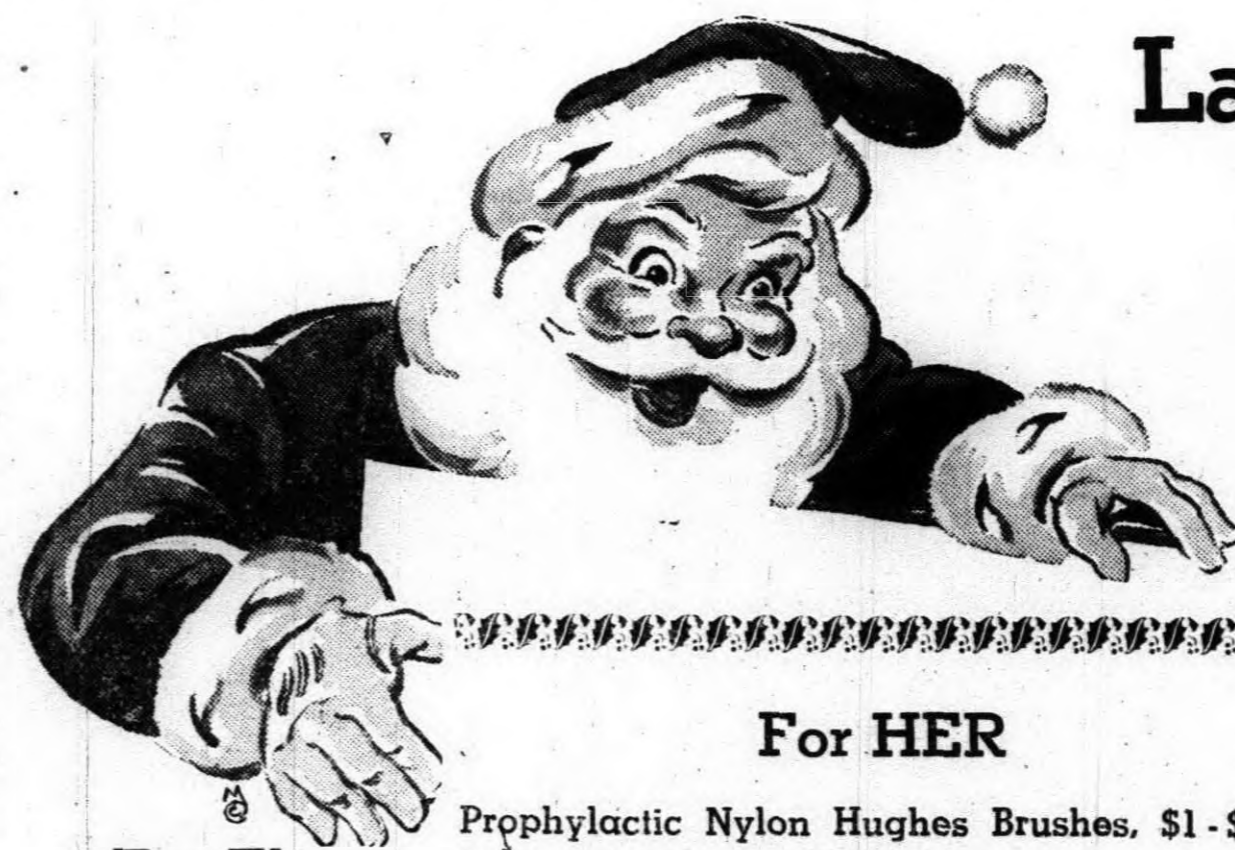

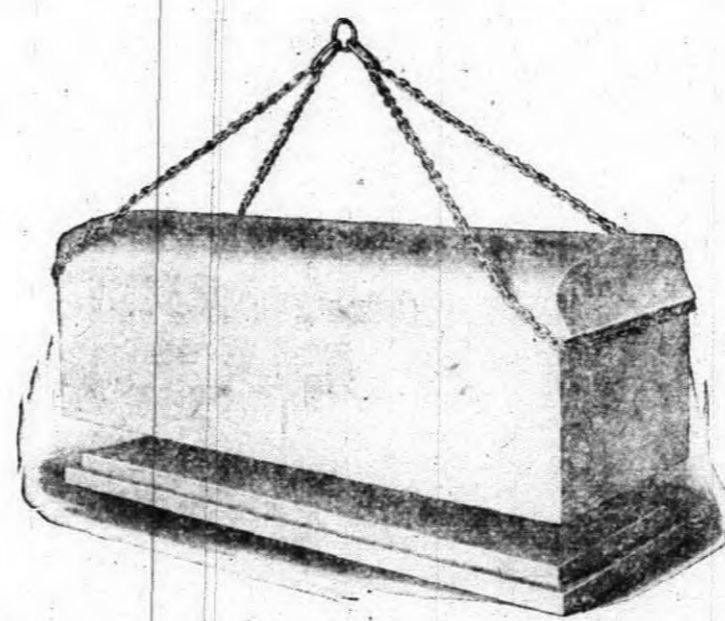

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MICHIGAN MY MICHIGAN — By Elton R. Eaton Probably the most wicked, wanton, law-defying army of illegal game killers ever to invade the north woods has now returned to the home-front to gloat over the slaughter of thousands and thousands of protected deer that were left to decay in the woods and be devoured by hawks, stray dogs, wolves and coyotes. How many thousands of does and fawns were killed by the biggest band of armed marauders masquerading as deer hunters, will never be known, but many honest sportsmen do not hesitate to declare that they believe there were more illegal deer killed than here were legal deer.

One game station attendant in the heart of a good deer hunting area said a woman hunter who was waiting while the car she was in was being filled with gas had declared, "You know I shot five deer but not one of them had horns."

No, not all the deer hunters were killers of illegal deer. Thousands of them were ashamed of what they saw and heard in the north, and they are demanding that something be done about it. Residents of the north country are frank to declare that the law violations were of such an extensive nature that another deer season such as the one just ended, will about clean out all of the deer in Michigan.

One citizen of a northern county states that he saw 17 illegal deer that had been killed on the opening morning, taken by game wardens out of the woods.

A hunter in a nearby community reported that he counted nine dead does that had been shot and left in the woods where he spent one day hunting.

Another hunter stated that he reported to a game warden over in western Michigan the location of a dead doe he had come across in the woods. He traveled seven miles in his car to make the report. What happened?

Because he did what he thought he should do, he was accused by the game warden and threatened with arrest for killing the doe he had found dead in the woods.

Many other hunters make similar assertions about the tactics of some of the game wardens.

Has any one heard a peep out of one of the so-called sportsmen's organizations in the state, or from self-styled guardians of the state's wild life about this unlawful slaughter?

No, not one word has been said aloud in protest to the slaughter of thousands of protected deer, even though there is barely any other subject of such general discussion up north as the illegal kill of deer this year by alleged sportsmen from "down state."

These loud-talking hunters from the metropolitan centers who swagger through the streets of the little communities up north often talk about how the "natives" live off venison the year round. Maybe—but we never believed it. Possibly some poor cuss will kill a deer now and then when his family is in need, but they don't slaughter dozens of does and fawns and leave them to rot in the woods, just for the sake of killing something.

It's a difficult problem for the Conservation department to work out a system whereby the killers of does and fawns can be caught, but there must be some way and if the Conservation department doesn't have some sort of a recommendation to make to the next session of the legislature it is entitled to severe censorship.
