When Mayor Robert Lidgard and members of the city commission met Monday evening it became publicly known for the first time that Mrs. Bessie Dunning of 994 Penniman evenue, lifelong resident of this locality, and her daughter, Margaret, of The Plymouth United Savings bank, had taken steps to purchase the present city library for presentation to the city of Plymouth.

Mrs. Burgess, owner of the library property, originally gave the option to the Wayne County Library board, which operates the Plymouth library and the purchase will have to be made by the city through that board. City officials at their regular Monday meeting officially accepted the Dunning gift.

Mrs. Burgess, of Detroit, who now owns the property, extended the option recently in order to enable the city to take such steps as may be necessary to secure possession of the ibrary building and grounds.

The present library location is regarded as one of the most ideal in the city. The fine old residence on Main street was for years used as the district office building of the Michigan Highway department. Some two years ago when the highway district offices in this part of the state were consolidated in northwest Detroit, the Wayne County Library board was able to secure a lease from Mrs. Burgess as well as an option to purchase the property for library purposes. Recently when the option was about to expire, Mrs. Burgess through her attorney, Paul W. Voorhies, a former resident of Plymouth, extended the option to the board until the city could make arrangements to purchase the property.

A few days ago Mrs. Dunning and her daughter quietly took steps to buy the property for presentation to the city as a permanent library. Not until Monday night's commission meeting did any one outside of the parties directly involved know of this proposed outstanding community contribution.

Both Mrs. Dunning and her daughter have long been interested in a Plymouth library and it is not surprising to those close to them that they have decided to purchase this property for the purpose of giving it to the city for permanent library use.
