She was born on January 10, 1869, the daughter of the late George Northrup and Jane Westfall Northrup, pioneer residents of Salem township. She was the widow of Edward Boyle, who preceded her in death almost 17 years ago. For the past 15 years she resided in Northville where she had many friends and acquaintances. Funeral services were held Tuesday at 2:30 p.m. at the Wilkie Funeral Home by Rev. H. J. Walch, pastor of the Presbyterian Church. Two beautiful hymns were rendered by Mrs. Carl G. Shear accompanied on the organ by Mrs. W. Kelson. Active pallbearers were: Elmer and Delbert King, Glenn Renwick, Eural Clark, Sylvester Kainz and Kenneth Rich. Interment was on family lot in Riverside cemetery.

Jerome E. Mettetal, husband of Elna C. (Heide) father of Jerome Jr., Mrs. Doris Wittemore, Clara and Myra brother of Raphael, Donald and Mrs. Della Kuster died suddenly Feb. 13 of a heart attack at Jennings, Elmwood, Detroit. Buried Feb. 17 at Highland cemetery.

He was raised to the third degree in Redford Lodge, F.A.A.M. July 30, 1910. Demitted to Army and Navy Lodge No. 512 after World War I, was worshipful master of that lodge in 1923 (the first master under their present charter). **Civil Service Positions Open**

The Civil Service Examiner for the Veterans Administration Hospital in Dearborn is accepting applications until March 3 for positions of electrician, painter, plumber, steamfitter, sheet metal worker and helpers in these classifications. Salaries for these positions range from \$2,020 per year up to \$2,469 per year.

Hospital attendants and kitchen helpers are also needed at the Veterans Administration Hospital. These positions are restricted to those having veteran preference, although applications will be accepted from non-veterans, such persons can be considered for employment only in the absence of eligibles entitled to veteran preference. Salaries in this group range from \$1,680 to \$1,934.

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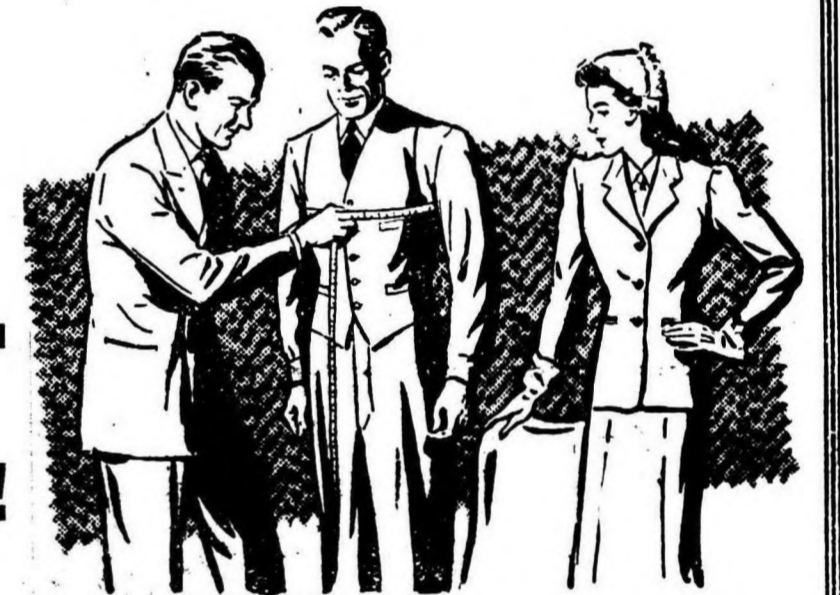
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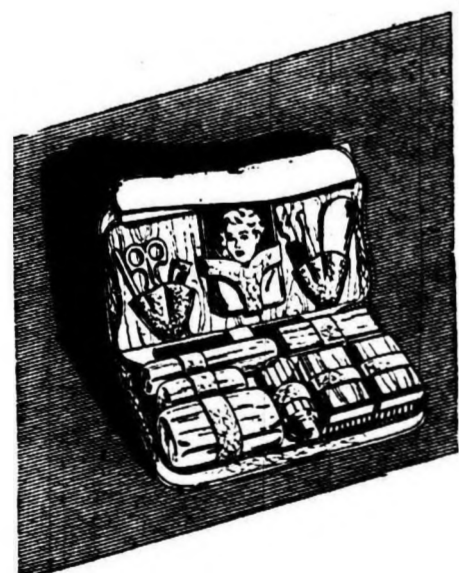
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**Products Made In High School Shop Displayed In Local Store Window**

Shop classes of the high school have a display in the windows of the Plymouth Hardware store on South Main street. On display are tools, cutters, sine bars, V blocks, arborers, arbor spacers, small tools and a host of other precision made parts of machines and tools to be used in tool rooms. Workmanship is outstanding, and comparable to any professional tool room products.

Comment by men who work in the business of machining (and Plymouth has many of them) is highly complimentary. The greatest wonderment to the professionals is "How is it possible to do this work in a school shop?" Investigation of the "How?" shows there are several reasons. Following is a partial report by people who have visited the school shop:

First, the equipment available to the pupils has been assembled over a period of years with a definite end in view. The school board and Superintendent H. A. Nelson have expended a great deal of effort in acquiring the proper machines for the shop. In 1938 the Ford Motor Company loaned to the school through the efforts of George Smith several units for use over an indefinite period of time. These included a 16" Shaper, a Browne & Sharpe Horizontal Miller, a Hendy Lathe and a surface grinder. Total value of these units was about \$8,500.00. In the early part of 1946 Henry Ford II was contacted by school officials relative to permanent possession of the machinery. In May 1946 the gracious executive of the Ford organization caused his company to make a complete donation of the originally loaned machinery to the needy Plymouth school shop so that title is now held without encumbrances.

In 1945 and 1946 the Michigan Schools Surplus Property board, formed by schools of the state, and including an exceptionally aggressive Plymouth delegation, was in action to secure for school shops surplus machinery in disuse after the war.

Plymouth was designated as a part of group No. 1 of the seven state divisions. This group was

in an area that included metropolitan Detroit and surrounding communities. Through the diligent efforts of local school officials Plymouth was able to secure one-seventeenth of the unit points allotted to the entire district. This large share of the available surplus machines is now in the high school shop, and Plymouth has been thus benefited at a cost of only slightly over \$200. Valuation of each unit point, of which Plymouth received 83, was \$2,297.19.

The shop now owns three shapers, one of which is powered by a line shaft (the better to teach the use of this type of powering), one O. D. grinder, one surface grinder, six lathes, two power hack-saws, one radial drill, three motor driven arc welders, one resistance arc welder, three milling machines, several drill presses, including an hydraulic drill, and one turret lathe. Total valuation of the machinery is about \$190,000.00 states the shop instructor. In addition to this value of small tools is about five thousand dollars, and there are approximately two-thousand dollars worth of mill cutters, drills etc.

SECOND, (and very important), reason for the shop's success is the instructor, William Campbell. His experience in teaching, plus his actual work in production and tool shops, is being utilized to the fullest to conduct a program that is of value to all. Several of his pupils told of the safety practices that their instructor insists upon. A direct result of this safety program is that during Campbell's thirteen years here there have been no accidents of note. Goggles and shields are a must for everyone operating machines where dust, chips of other matter could produce eye injury. Wrist watches, long sleeves and loose garments are also taboo in the department. Switches are always cut during the changing of cutters or gears. Accidents are practically impossible under this plan, especially when every participant in the course is constantly being reminded about the merits of good safety practices by instructor Campbell.

THIRD reason for the results shown is the complete industrial curriculum offered in the school. Realizing that a great many high school students do not continue into college, but rather need practical instruction in subjects pertaining to jobs that they will hold, the school officials feel that this complete shop program is of great importance. The actual operation of the machinery is only one of the integral parts of the over all course. Three hours daily are devoted to shop work, one hour to correlated mathematics, one hour to correlated drawing and one hour to academic work.

Tool crib operation is taught in conjunction with the shop work. Besides the day sessions, veterans and others are enrolled for regular night classes, thus showing a full measure of benefit from the facilities of the shop.

The course is approved and comes under the Smith-Hughes Act, an act of congress providing funds for special education or vocational training.

A local shop foreman was as-tounded at the record of no-cutter-breakage compiled by the students. William Campbell, of the school, stated that breakage over a period of years was only one cutter and a few small drills. The foreman pointed out that

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# In the Legislature

There was a joint meeting of the taxation committees of both the house and senate the other day over in the senate chamber. It was called for the purpose of considering an income tax bill that has been introduced into the senate by Senators Tripp of Allegan and Bonine of Cassopolis.

The measure provides a one percent tax on the income of every person who makes more than \$1,000 per year. It does grant exemption up to \$2,000 per year for a married man, but if the measure is to be passed, this exemption would have to come out.

The Michigan constitution is set up in such a way that all taxes in Michigan must be uniform, and that is the nigger in the wood-pile.

But don't become too alarmed about new taxes. The senate can pass a dozen tax bills, if it so desires, but there is a mighty high fence to jump in the house of representatives before any new taxes can be imposed upon the people of Michigan.

The house taxation committee is not at all friendly to any new tax and it is going to take a mass of facts and figures to change its attitude, if the writer correctly reads the minds of the members of the committee.

In other words "they have got to be shown". There is nothing in the picture at the present time which indicates that any "pressure" group can round up enough facts to convince the members of the house tax committee that the state needs new taxation, except for the soldiers' bonus.

The highly intelligent state commander of the American Legion was before the joint taxation committee meeting the other day. He asserted that it was the opinion of many veterans that this bonus should be paid by a cigarette and possibly a liquor tax.

Michigan is one of the few states in the nation that does not have a cigarette tax.

One member of the house taxation committee pointed out that a cigarette tax would fall heavily upon the women of Michigan, as they have become, from all appearances, the heaviest users of cigarettes. If a cigarette tax bill should be introduced, it would also include a cigar tax as well as taxes on other forms of tobacco products.

Before the week is over daily newspapers will tell you of the final outcome of the Governor's proposal to provide additional aid for public schools. It is indeed unfortunate that questionable tactics have entered into consideration of an issue as to which is the best of two proposed methods to aid public schools. It does not reflect credit upon our state to get in such a mess as this over a highly important educational matter.

It has been a pleasure for me to hear every president of our three great state educational institutions declare that the returned veterans are ranking in first place in educational work among all of the students attending these schools. Dr. Ruthven of the University of Michigan, President Hannah of Michigan State College and Dr. Henry, president of Wayne University, have all stated that the school work of the returned veterans is outstanding. The vets didn't fail to do their job when confronted by armed enemies and they are not now failing in the opportunities offered them to prepare for civilian careers.

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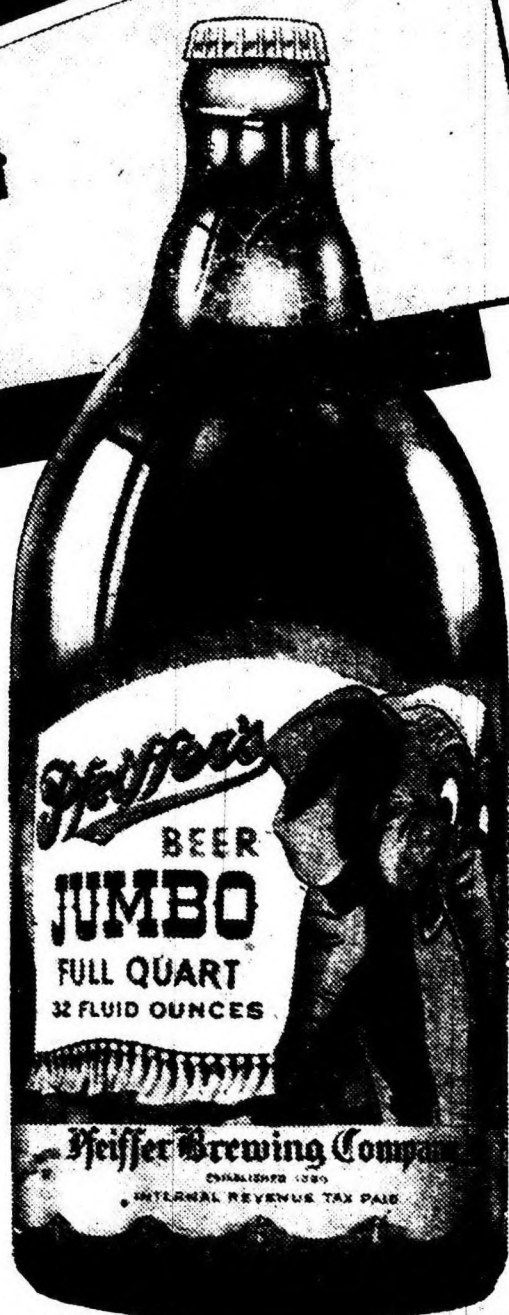

Fair in the Light of Memory Skins



BY • ELTON R. EATON

It was not so many years ago when Michigan was famed for the amount of walnut, hickory and butternut lumber it produced. Not much thought at the time was given to the value of the nut product of these trees as it pertained to the support of wild-life in Michigan, or to the market value of walnuts and hickory nuts.

Now that these trees have nearly disappeared from the state, many are suggesting that it would be a good idea for the Michigan Conservation department to start a re-planting campaign, especially along highways and established fence rows that will remain through the years.

The Wisconsin conservation department recently announced that it would have available this spring some 50,000 black walnut seeds for tree planters in that state this spring.

The Wisconsin department has obtained 100 bushels of black walnuts through the American Walnut Manufacturers Association. A total of 50,000 of these nuts have been placed in moist sand for the winter, a process to speed sprouting when the seeds are planted in the spring, and a factor in cutting down losses to squirrels after planting.

The treated walnut seeds will be sold in Wisconsin at the rate of \$2.50 per thousands to cover the expense of hulling, cleaning, stratifying and packing the nuts for shipment. The seed will be shipped in bags of 200 and 400 each and in bushel baskets.

Fur prices in Michigan have taken a terrific "skid" in the last year and may even go much lower than the prevailing prices. Coyote pelts that brought as much as \$8.55 in 1943 went for 77 cents apiece in a lot of 550 at the conservation department's January sale of share-cropped, bountied and confiscated furs. Prices offered for other furs were as low or lower than those trappers have had to take since early last fall.

A lot of 1,067 muskrat pelts brought \$1.27 each, where the last year ago got the \$2.30 OPA ceiling. Ninety bobcat skins were sold at \$1.56 each, 10 raccoon at \$1.36, one badger at \$1.05, nine mink at about \$9, 15 beaver at \$15 each.

Governor Kim Sigler demands repeal of the sales tax diversion amendment as the solution to erase the state's \$83,000,000 impending deficit.

Let's study his mathematics. The sales tax diversion amendment provides for one-sixth of the sales tax to be distributed to cities, villages, and townships on a population basis. He recommends that this money all be given to cities and villages because some townships don't need it. What about the fringe town-

ships with 5,000 or more population that are badly in need of water, sewers, fire protection, etc? At least he is not having any money for the state by this proposal; he is just selling out the townships for the support of cities—where there are more votes.

Another one-sixth of the sales tax plus forty-two to forty-five per cent of it is to be distributed to school district according to the amendment. This will amount to an estimated \$111,000,000. Sigler says, "Repeal the amendment and appropriate \$83,000,000 to the schools." This would save the state an estimated \$25,000,000. This is the only place in his eight-point program that he proposes to save the state money by repeal of the sales tax diversion amendment. How does Governor Sigler expect to erase the \$83,000,000 impending deficit with this \$25,000,000 that he wishes to take from Michigan school children after the voters had promised it to them last November by such an overwhelming majority?

Even though his mathematics doesn't appear to be too good, Sigler certainly must be credited with some clever political moves. He recommends \$10,000,000 for "immediate salary" increase for teachers and a provision that a "major portion" of state aid be earmarked for teachers' salaries. He offers the cities \$7,000,000 more a year than they would get if the amendment were left as it is. (He would naturally expect the support of mayors of cities by this proposal.)

He threatens the legislators: "In

the event you decline to adopt the necessary legislative action to place repeal of the amendment upon the spring ballot, then in your hands alone will rest the problem of solving our financial problems."

He threatens the people: "Should the voters refuse to repeal the amendment, then on their shoulders will rest the responsibility for added taxes and increased cost of governmental services."

He refuses to accept responsibility: "You and I (speaking of legislators and himself) did not create this problem. Virtually inherited it."

He challenges legislators to pay no attention to their constituents by saying, "Shall we weaken under the pressure of this group or that?"

Sigler said nothing in his message to the legislature about submitting to the people in the April 7 election an amendment that would permit school districts to bond for a period of fifteen years instead of the present five year limit adopted in 1932. This kind of action would help local districts to help themselves with the badly needed school building problem.

Sigler's first recommendation to create a Constitution Revision Commission whose "co-ordinated system of taxation" would be submitted to the people in 1949 is a sound bit of advice. Michigan does need many changes in this tax structure. The people of Michigan must not be fooled into believing that amendment No. 2 has been solely responsible for the present crisis in state finance. Neither should the people be led to believe that the state tax problem will be solved by the repeal of the sales tax diversion amendment.

If Kim Sigler's eight point program should be carried out exactly as he has outlined it, the state would take \$26,000,000 from school children toward erasing the \$83,000,000 impending deficit. Where will the other \$57,000,000 come from?

Let's keep amendment No. 2 until the total tax structure can be studied and revised.

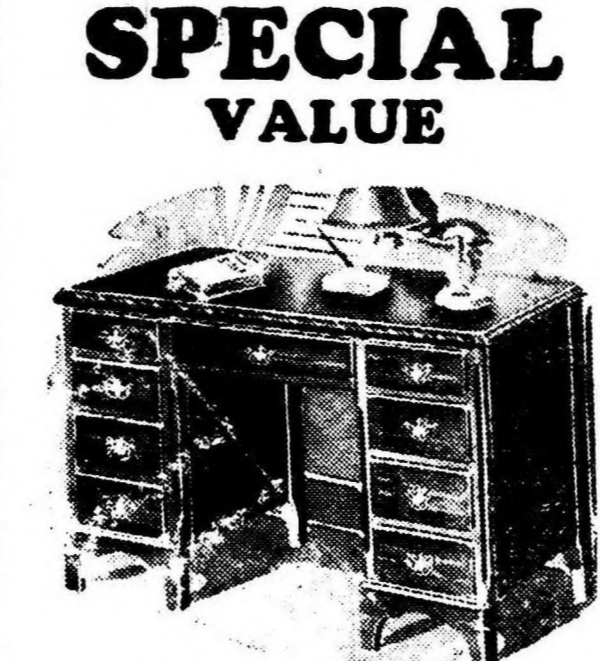

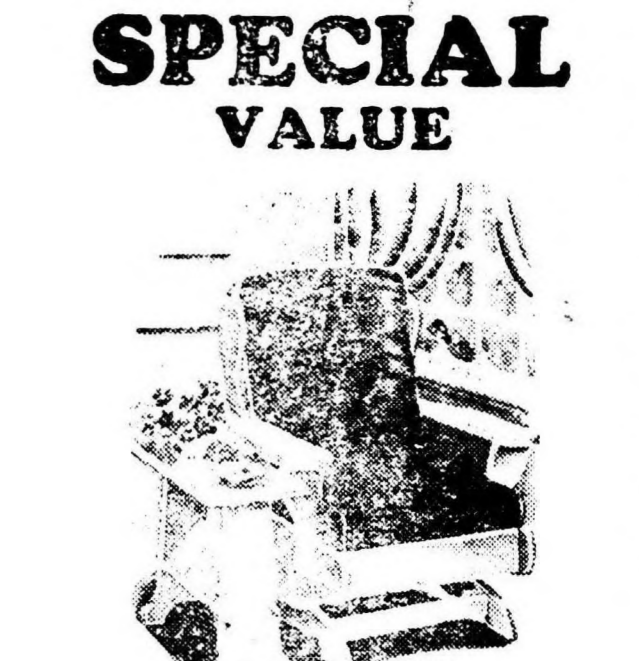

**Detroit A City Of Young People**

Detroit has the highest proportion of people under 45 years of age of any major city in the United States, according to the annual report of the Detroit Edison company, which has just been issued. This accounts for the relatively large labor supply and a viewpoint which is quickly responsive to changing conditions. The company now serves more than 96 per cent of all farms in its 7,600 square miles of service area and since the war started has added 116,000 residential customers. Within a year the company expects to have electric service available to every potential customer in the area.

The report shows that 32 per cent of the company's gross revenue for the year was paid to the operating employees; 37 per cent went for maintenance and operating expenses to serve 850,000 customers; 15 per cent to taxes and 13 per cent to interest and dividends. After all costs, 3 per cent of revenues remained in the business to be used for expansion of service.

More than two - and - one-half million tons of coal went required to produce the five billion kilowatt hours of energy made in the past twelve months.

Under rate reductions put into effect January 1, 1946, charges to electric customers were reduced by \$3,500,000 during the year. Near the close of the year, when it became evident that earnings would permit such action, charges to residential, farm and commercial customers were cut \$1,500,000 more through discounts on November and December bills. At the same time rates to industrial customers were reduced, effective January 1 this year, which will cut about \$1,000,000 from their 1947 bills.

The report, which is signed by Prentiss M. Brown, chairman of the board, and James W. Parker, president, concludes with the sentence: "Present indications are that the company has several exceptionally busy years ahead of it."

The company has recently announced a large construction program for the next several years based on its conviction that the use of electricity will continue to increase in homes, farms, stores and factories.

**License Plate Deadline Near**

Manager Frank Rambo of the Michigan Department of State License Bureau in the Hotel Mayflower building urges auto owners who have not yet purchased plates to do so before the last day, Feb. 28, at midnight. No extensions will be granted this year for the use of old plates. Sales of licenses to this time have been normal, with no long lines. The local bureau will be able to accommodate all applicants quickly except in the event that too many wait until the last minute, thus causing an abnormal rush.

No, half-year licenses are being issued this year for passenger cars. However, commercial and commercial farm vehicles may carry half-year tags.

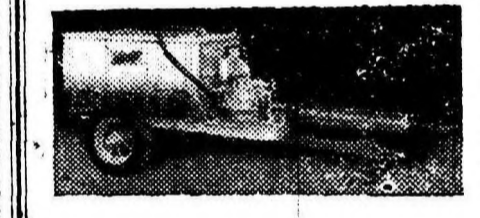

improved meat-type chicken. Slade urged Michigan poultrymen to continue their efforts to develop superior meat-type chickens which, he said, are paying increased dividends to the entire state. He pointed to the Chicken-of-Tomorrow contest as an outstanding example of the poultry industry's determination to provide consumers with better chicken dinners.

The importance of poultry farming in Wayne County, Slade said, is reflected in the latest report from the Census Bureau which shows that 79 per cent of the county's farmers received income from poultry. These producers, according to the report, have more than 628,000 chickens and sell nearly 1,875,000 dozen eggs.

**Conferences For Gardeners**

The vegetable growers of Wayne County will have an opportunity to meet together and discuss their problems on Tuesday, Feb. 25. The meeting will be held from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the Federal Recreation Building, Washington Street, (North Wayne road), Wayne.

Specialists from Michigan State College Horticultural Department will discuss varieties, fertilizers, packing and marketing, new insecticides and the use of hormones. There will be a question and answer period so growers may have their personal growing problems answered. This will be the only vegetable grower's meeting this winter so all growers should plan to attend.

Treating seeds is one way Michigan farmers can cut losses from smut, blight, root rot and various other fungus diseases. County agricultural agent, E. I. Besemer, says that treated seed usually gives higher yields because less grain is lost due to disease. New Improved Ceresan is one material to treat seed grain with this spring. It should be applied at the rate of one-half ounce per bushel for all small grains. There are many different ways of treating the grain. Some farmers run grain through auger elevators so that the auger will mix the ceresan with the seed. Or, with a combine, the seed can be passed through it and the combine auger will mix the seed and ceresan. Farmers can make their own seed treating equipment with an old oil barrel. Plans for this treator can be obtained at the county agricultural agent's office. Ask for Extension Bulletin 176.

You don't have to be "born with a green thumb" to grow and enjoy house plants, Emma Durbord, county home demonstration agent, believes that following a few simple suggestions will increase your success with plants. Place your plants in window where they will get sunlight for at least half the day. Temperatures are important, too. At night 55 to 58 degrees and during the day 70 to 75 degrees should be about right. Keep them out of drafts.

Apply a complete fertilizer at the rate of 1/2 level teaspoonful to a 6-inch pot every two months. Keep your plants away from gases.

Water whenever the plant soil becomes dry and never let them wilt. You might try wick watering so that the wick supplies water from the saucer in which the plant is set. Keep the humid-

of the air as high as possible. Bugs can be kept under control by spraying or dipping as needed. Pyrethrum or rotenone sprays or dips will control most common pests. When plants become root-bound, move to a larger pot.
