

holes in streets, broken curbing plugged drains, etc. The other 17 and cannot be put on "odd jobs," and cannot be put on "good jobs", the city official declared.

"We need more money with which to operate the city this year," Cheek said. "And for this reason the budget will be higher." He cited examples of higher operating costs, of having to pay more for materials and labor to compensate for the boost in funds to come out of the taxpayers' pockets this year.

As far as the assessment is concerned, he stated, we are attempting to arrive at a more fair means of personal property taxation. State laws govern this phase of city taxes; however, business men are being asked to turn in a definite figure this year, he declared, and not an estimated average inventory as has been the practice in years past.

Cheek said that the 77.2 percent "yes" vote on the water improvement question at the last election "indicates definitely that the people of Plymouth are ready for the water system change." He explained that it will take from 60 to 90 days for the engineering concern to prepare detailed plans and specifications for the Plymouth improvements. After that there will be bids and bonding before work can be started. He said, though, that the commission is going ahead with the plans and that no time will be lost in starting construction as soon as possible.

"If the city commission authorizes the issue of water revenue bonds for the entire improvement, then no additional vote will be necessary. The state law gives the city commission the authority to issue revenue bonds, such bonds not being a lien upon all taxable property, but a lien on just utility property," the city manager declared.

A recent study, conducted by the MSC farm management department, showed that very few farmers carry insurance to financially protect themselves in case of injury to hired help.

Two methods are open to farmers who wish to insure against loss resulting from injury to employees. Farmers carrying workman's compensation insurance on their employees are automatically included under the Workman's Compensation Act of 1912. With this type of policy, the employee vided under the act. The farmer, as the employer, is protected since his insurance will pay the benefits. One road can lead to War, while the other can lead to Peace; one road can hasten the Great Depression, while the other can postpone it; one road may lead to stagnation, while the other to a religious awakening. But I repeat that today no one can see where either East or West will


