

Magazine Names Local Girl "Woman of the Year"



NEW YORK, N.Y.—Belva Jane Barnes, the only woman to help the international planning committee draw up the UN building's master plans, was named Young Woman of the Year and awarded a 1950 Merit Award for signal achievement in architecture by MADEMOISELLE magazine this week.

The awards were presented for the eighth consecutive year to ten young women in their twenties and early thirties who have already made a distinctive mark in their fields and are expected to achieve even greater heights, according to Betsy Talbot Blackwell, MADEMOISELLE'S editor-in-chief.

Miss Barnes, a former Plymouthite, joined the UN Planning Commission in February 1947 when she was only 25 and had not yet become a registered architect. The lone woman assistant to Director of Planning, Wallace K. Harrison, she worked closely with the ten eminent architects and engineers from all over the world who made up the Board of Design Consultants.

In the next four months innumerable charts and diagrams prepared, some fifty possible designs made and working with these men and watching the evolution of the "tremendous building," Miss Barnes says, "was an architectural experience to be dreamed of — except it was four months with little time for dreaming."

For the past two years, Miss Barnes has worked on the Meeting Halls, General Assembly and Secretariat under Harrison, contributing original designs and helping to develop others. The curved sculptured canopy entrance, known as "the wing," is her design and her touch appears in stairways and other features of the building.

Born in Erie, Pennsylvania, Miss Barnes grew up in Plymouth where she resided with her mother, Mildred Barnes at 413 North Harvey street. A graduate of Plymouth High School she took her Bachelor of Architecture at the University of Michigan. She is well known here and visits frequently at the home of her mother and other local friends.

Now that the UN project is near completion, she is working on houses for Marcel Breuer. "I have worked almost entirely on large projects," Miss Barnes says, "and have had little time for houses, for which, it seems to me, a woman architect is especially fitted." Her first solo house, designed in her spare time, is about finished.

Twenty extra employees, both mail carriers and handlers, have been put on to handle the extra load of letters and packages. A special night crew now works until 10 p.m. each night so that all mail going into the post office during the day is sorted and sent out that night.

The parcel post and stamp windows are now open daily except Sunday until 8 p.m. These hours will continue until December 22.

Dr. Timpona asks that all packages be carefully wrapped and tied to avoid damage to the contents. Return addresses should be used on all envelopes and parcels.

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Property Sold For 3 Stores

Announcement was made last weekend by Herbert Swanson of the Swanson Super Service Station that he had sold his property on the corner of West Ann Arbor Trail and Forest street. The 83 foot square gas station corner was purchased by John Melczek of Dearborn who intends to erect a modern business block on the location housing either two or three stores. The transaction was handled by the Plymouth Real Estate Exchange.

Plans are being drawn for the building so that all possible building delays can be avoided. Mr. Swanson will probably vacate the location by the 20th of January if weather permits the immediate construction of the new stores. Footing soundings will be taken this next week and work will get under way immediately after that.

Mr. Swanson has been in that location since March of 1929 when he moved from the Wiedman garage to operate the station for that firm. In 1942 he took over the ownership of the business and has operated it for himself since that time. At present he has no definite announcement about his own immediate future but intends to enter business again in the same kind of business near his present location.

Miss Campbell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. Fletcher Campbell of Plymouth, is a graduate student in the school of music, University of Michigan, where she is a student of Professor Arthur Hackett.

A Navy veteran of three year's service, Mr. Fudge has earned a bachelor of music degree from Westminster college. At present he is a graduate student majoring in voice at the University of Michigan.

School Board Issue Carries

Completion of School Assured by Vote

Plymouth township school electors decided Monday to have the high school gymnasium, swimming pool and band room completed by the issuance of bonds totaling \$245,000. The vote on the proposed bond issue was 580 in favor, and 161 against raising the funds.

The vote on the school district tax hike of one mill tallied 414 affirmative votes, and 164 negative.

Since the \$1,350,000 raised in the 1949 bond issue was inadequate to complete the school building program because of the higher building costs, the board of education scheduled the special election.

Win Awards at Annual Junior Livestock Show

Two young Plymouth farmers won awards at the 21st annual Junior Livestock show at the State Fairgrounds last week. Coin Hauk, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ira Hauk of Warren road, received second place for his pen of Hampshire sheep, and Jerry Salow, son of Mrs. Elsa Salow of Newburg road, won 18th and 19th place for his two heavy weight Hereford steers with 119 competing in the class.

Now the high school addition including gymnasium, swimming pool and band room can be fully completed and equipped and the necessary remodeling of existing school buildings may be done.

The one mill will be added to each property owner's bill next year but the total school tax will be up to two mills less than this year's tax. Last year district electors voted a tax schedule calling for a levy of 7.32 mills in 1951-52. This schedule will still be maintained. The additional one mill and the total tax covering the 1949 issue and the new issue will be only six mills for 1951-52. The increase in the number of property owners, particularly industrial property owners, in the district makes this possible.

Other local boys exhibiting steers in the show were Marvin Grenke with a Hereford, Kenneth Steinke with an Angus, Carl Theisen with an Angus, David Wilkins with an Angus and Kenneth Wilkins with an Angus. Most of them are members of the Plymouth Livestock club.

Paul Bagwell Tells Task of Junior Chamber

Thirty of Plymouth's young businessmen heard Professor Paul Bagwell of Michigan State college give an inspirational talk Tuesday evening. The event was the kick-off to re-activate the local Junior Chamber of Commerce and was held at Hillside Inn. Bagwell is a past president of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce and has also headed the state organization as well as his local chapter in Lansing.

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Roger Babson Says --

Babson Discusses Individual Initiative

Three stories from different sources and from different parts of the world suggest what happens to initiative in the "Welfare State."

Fair Deal Initiative

A friend of one of my associates was travelling in Europe recently. He found himself in a railroad station in the Russian zone of Austria with his wife critically ill. He immediately requested the station master to summon a doctor. The station master did so but in a few minutes returned to say excitedly, "The doctor says he won't come unless he's paid." The friend replied, "Of course I'll pay, but why do you ask?"

The doctor when he arrived pointed out that they had a system of socialized medicine, that he had already seen more than his quota of patients for the day, and that more calls meant no more for him than additional marks in the book. He, therefore, would make no more calls unless he was paid in advance. Here is regimentation in medicine. Even the professional man, long an example of initiative and resourcefulness, is deprived of his heritage.

Two More Examples

We don't have to go to Russian satellites or to Britain to find examples of loss of initiative. Recently, the director of personnel of one of the largest automobile manufacturing concerns visited Babson Institute. We were discussing pros and cons of labor unions. This particular individual was an enlightened person and pointed to many of the good things that the labor unions have done for both the worker and the automotive industry. But on one point he really exploded. Said he, "I can never forgive any union for killing the initiative of the man who wants to do eight hours work in six or to do it better than another worker."

This past summer, a neighboring school teacher had an unfortunate experience. He was mowing his lawn, and his little girl of nine was helping him rake the grass. Other children in the neighborhood came along and asked the little girl, "How much are you getting?" When she replied that she was raking the grass because she liked to help her daddy and that she wasn't getting anything but a lot of fun, her playmates chastised her with a sharp, "Stucker! What a dope you are!" The sequel to the story is that the father was so perturbed about the general attitude of the parents and children in that particular neighborhood that he moved away.

Babson Discusses Stock Markets

Perhaps when everyone is so excited as is true today, it might be well to look at past history. There certainly have been times when the American people were even more disturbed. Probably most readers have weathered four stock market panics.

Four Recent Cycles

The first scare was in 1914 when the New York Stock Exchange was closed for some months and investors were throwing over securities without rhyme or reason. Yet after the Stock Market opened again the Industrial Averages rose 113%, while many stocks rose much more. Stocks continued high for about two years.


The second scare came in 1921, brought about by an unprecedented sudden decline in wholesale commodity prices. This sent many concerns into bankruptcy. Yet, it was only a question of readjustment, after which employment increased and the Industrial Averages climbed nearly 500%, while certain stocks did much better.

The third scare came in 1929 due to the extreme overexpansion in the Stock Market, followed by the closing of thousands of banks—a situation which had never before happened. Yet, faith was re-established, and the Industrial Averages increased about 370%; while then again, other stocks did even better.

The fourth break came in 1937, and it was caused by the Roosevelt Administration attempting to put a planned economy on United States business. It was the first time this had ever been attempted; a severe market break followed, accompanied by unemployment, declining commodity prices, and general fear. This lasted until the war broke out in Europe when England and the Allies gave our corporations large war orders. Of course, during 1940, 1941 and 1942 the market fluctuated downward with the state of war, reaching the low point in 1942. When the war outlook changed for the better in 1942, the market began to pick up and the Industrial Averages went up about 130%.

The last scare came when the war was over, due to fear of unemployment. Everybody had gone to work during the war days; they liked their pay envelope, and did not want to leave their jobs. This fear of general unemployment caused merchants suddenly to cancel orders for merchandise which resulted in



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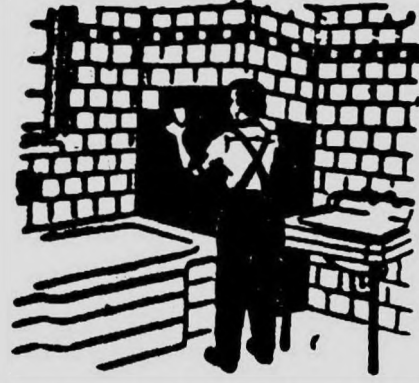
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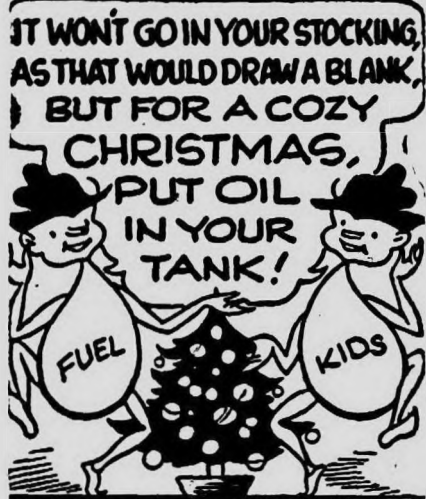
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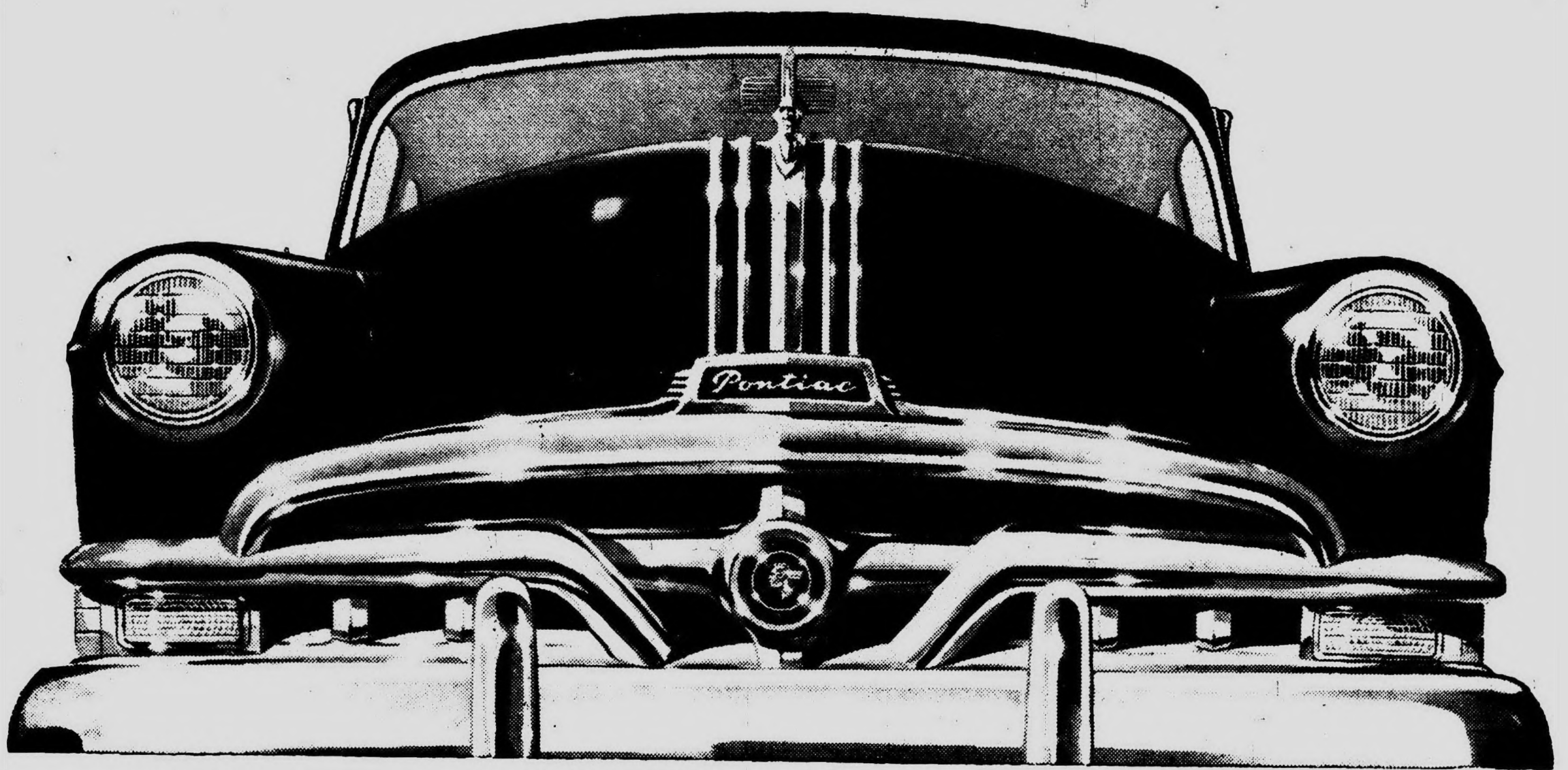
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Hints For Plymouth Homemakers

Cranberry Nut Bread One of Many Uses for Tangy Berries

Cranberries can't be beat for turning routine meals into special occasions. The Plymouth homemaker with the reputation of an outstanding cook uses them often because of their bright color, tangy flavor and the new zest they give to the family's favorite dishes.

The current crop is plentiful and it may be quite advantageous to store some for use later. You're blessed with a home freezer, pack them dry which is the best method or freeze them in syrup to speed up sauce making.



SWEDISH SWEETS
A Swedish kitchen is a fascinating place for several weeks before Christmas. The whole family helps in cracking nuts or



creaming the shortening and sugar. Swedish nut crisps may become just such a family affair at your house.

Swedish Nut Crisp

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 egg, well-beaten
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 3 tablespoons milk
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Cream together well shortening and sugar; sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Add milk to egg. Add flour and egg mixture alternately to sugar and shortening. Stir in vanilla.

Using spatula, spread one tablespoonful evenly on bottom of buttered inverted loaf pan. Sprinkle with nuts and press nuts gently into batter; mark in 1/2 inch strips.

Bake in moderately slow oven (325° F.) about 12 minutes or until lightly brown. Cut in strips and lay immediately over a rolling pin. If strips become too brittle to shape, return to oven to reheat and soften. Bake a few at a time until mixture is used.

Fattigmand is a sweet delicacy that adds variety to a Christmas cookie tray.

Fattigmand

- 6 egg yolks
- 5 tablespoons sugar
- 3 tablespoons cream
- 6 tablespoons water
- 2 to 3 cups flour

Beat egg yolks slightly. Add sugar and beat. Add cream and flour enough to make a stiff dough. Divide dough. Roll very thin on lightly floured board. Cut in diamond shapes and slash each in center.

Fry in deep fat (360-370° F.) until a light golden color. Drain and sprinkle while hot with confectioner's sugar.

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Prepare Snacks in Advance for Holiday Guests

METHODS
DRY-PACKED—Pick over the berries, discarding any that are soft or otherwise imperfect. Wash, drain and place in moisture resistant containers, leaving one-half inch of head space in each pint size container. Seal and freeze.

SYRUP-PACK—Use rigid containers, such as glass freezer jars, delimitum or unbreakable plastic "boxes" or heavily waxed cartons. Put perfect washed and drained berries in container and cover with cold syrup made of 2 1/4 cups sugar with 4 cups water. Leave one-half inch of head space in each pint container. Seal and freeze.

Strained cranberry sauce may be poured into clean, hot jars and, after the caps are adjusted, be processed at a boiling temperature for 15 minutes. Complete the seal if necessary.

For unstrained cranberry sauce, this shorter method gives satisfactory results:

CANNED CRANBERRY SAUCE

For four cups of cranberries, boil 2 cups sugar and 2 cups water together for 5 minutes. Pack washed and drained berries into clean jars, filling to top. Add syrup, filling to within 1/2 inch of top. Adjust caps according to type used. Process at boiling temperature in water to cover for 20 minutes. Remove from water at once. Complete seal if necessary.

Cranberry sauce and jelly are favorite accompaniments for meat and poultry. The fruit adds delightful flavor to the meats when baked with them and, in addition, has a tenderizing effect. They are especially good with pork chops or ham as suggested here.

CRANBERRY PORK CHOPS

Six pork chops, 1/2 teaspoon iodized salt, 4 cups cranberries, ground, 1/2 cup honey, 1/2 teaspoon cloves.

Brown chops quickly on both sides in hot fat and sprinkle with iodized salt. Place three chops in baking dish. Mix cranberries, honey and cloves. Spread half of mixture over chops. Add remaining chops and cover them with rest of cranberry mixture. Cover baking dish and bake in moderately slow oven, 325 to 350 degrees F., for about 1 1/2 hours or until meat is tender. Makes six servings.

NOTE: Two slices of ham may be substituted for the pork chops. Ruby-studded bread that makes tempting tea sandwiches when thinly sliced and put together with butter or cream cheese can also be used as the unexpected treat in the lunch box. You'll find that the flavor and texture are better if the bread is a day old before cutting.

CRANBERRY NUT BREAD

One cup cranberries, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 cups sifted, enriched all-purpose flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon iodized salt, 1/2 cup chopped walnuts, grated rind of 1 orange, 1 egg, beaten, 1 cup milk, 2 tablespoons melted butter or fortified margarine.

Put cranberries through food chopper. Mix with half of the sugar. Sift remaining sugar with the rest of the dry ingredients. Add nuts and orange rind. Combine milk, egg and fat and add to flour mixture. Stir only until dry ingredients are dampened, then fold in sweetened cranberries. Bake in greased bread pan in moderate oven, 350 degrees F., for about 1 hour.

SPECIALLY CRANBERRIES

One cup sugar, juice and the chopped rind of 2 oranges, 6 whole cloves, 2 teaspoons broken stick cinnamon, 2 cups cranberries.

Pick over and wash cranberries. Add orange juice and rind to sugar, and place over low heat. Stir until sugar dissolves, then boil for 5 minutes. Add cranberries and spices. Cook until cranberries burst. Chill and serve. Makes about 2 1/2 cups delic.

Accompanying dishes might include potato salad, green salad, radishes, carrot or celery sticks, crackers, pickles, olives or cinnamon apples. Coffee and holiday sweets would finish off a fine smorgasbord or buffet meal.

One of the advantages of such a meal is that it can be practically all prepared ahead of time and set out promptly should guests with ready appetites drop in.

Through the holidays the oven is kept busy baking those good foods ready to be enjoyed by the family and friends who drop by the home. What is more enjoyable with a hot cup of coffee or chocolate than thin slices of quick bread filled with fruits and nuts and touched with seasonal spices?

An assortment of nut and fruit bread brightens lunch or dinner as well as snack time, or, carefully wrapped in Christmas trimmings, is happily given to friends and touched with seasonal spices.

Nut bread, made with lard, will keep temptingly fresh and moist ready for any holiday occasion.

Nut Bread

- 2 cups sifted enriched flour
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- 1 egg
- 1 cup milk
- 3 tablespoons melted lard or drippings

Line bottom of a loaf pan 5x9 inches with wax paper. Sift flour, baking powder, salt and sugar together. Add nuts. Beat egg, add milk and fat. Add to dry ingredients. Stir until flour is moistened. Pour in loaf pan and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 1 hour. Yield: 1 loaf.

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FAIR IN THE LIGHT OF MEMORY SHINES

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Michigan's influential United Conservation clubs have expressed themselves overwhelmingly in favor of increased wildlife habitat restoration as opposed to expansion of pheasant hunting by the State Conservation department, according to the Wildlife Management Institute.

The Wayne County Sportsmen's club, a member of the state federation, reports the stand of its membership as follows:

"We favor extension of the farm-game-habitat improvement program in every way possible through a cooperative arrangement with farmers and that the funds now used for hunting be used for that program to extend it." With two thousand votes among 700 present at the meeting, the group approved a resolution which requests that such habitat improvement be extended to a larger degree on state-owned public lands and that the pheasant program be discontinued only to the extent deemed necessary to restore depleted or critical areas.

All affiliated Michigan clubs were surveyed to determine which of four categories of habitat improvement they favored: (1) all-out restoration and artificial propagation and all-out habitat restoration; (2) partial restoration and partial artificial propagation; (3) partial restoration and partial artificial propagation; (4) partial restoration and partial artificial propagation. Present indications are that the Michigan United Conservation clubs favor the advantages of modern wildlife management practices with the same clarity as their fellow sportsmen in Wayne county. Clubs of three clubs apparently favor extensive artificial propagation of game birds for release purposes which wildlife research workers have found wasteful and ineffective in a number of widely separated states.

State prisoners have finished fall work on the expanding ski playground in the Upper Peninsula's 40,000-acre Pictured Rocks mountains state park.

Conservation department biologist A. C. Elmer says the birds are ready for use when the season begins soon. "The concern at the moment is that we have no application to state the proposed concession to the Elmer's club."

Expert interior decorators are giving ski huts well over a million dollars worth of new use this season. That Christmas tree you are planning to set up in your home could be a major fire hazard unless you take a few precautions, Chief McAllister warns.

Tests made by Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc., demonstrated that Christmas trees of average size are easily ignited and burn furiously. The blaze could easily start a dangerous fire in the house.

Engineers of the National board offer the following suggestions for making your Christmas tree safe:

1. Choose a small tree. It will be less hazardous.
2. Wait until a few days before Christmas to set up your tree.
3. Keep the tree outdoors until ready to set it up.
4. Place the tree in the coolest part of the house.
5. If a radiator is near the tree, shut it off.

6. Do not use cotton or paper decorations unless they are flame proof.

7. Do not place electric trains around the tree.

8. Do not use candles. Use electric lights instead.

9. Make certain wires are not frayed. Choose lighting sets bearing marking which indicates listing by Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc.

10. Do not plug or unplug the lights beneath the tree.

11. Do not leave tree lights burning when no one is in the house.

12. If needles near the lights turn brown, change the location of the lights.

13. When needles start falling, take the tree down and discard it.
