## How Lightning Quieted Gillies

It required a bolt of lightning direct from the Heavens to isolate and quiet Superintendent A. Blake Gillies of the Detroit House of Correction, probably for the first time in his life. This unusual event, which temporarily classed Warden Gillies with Robinson Crusoe who lived in absolute quiet and with no one around to talk to except his man Friday, took place last Saturday shortly after midnight.

When lightning flashed through the warden's residence out at the Detroit House of Correction, it didn't knock Blake out of bed, but it did burn out all of the lights and cut off his telephone service to the outside world.

A few minutes after the flash, the Warden said he smelled smoke. When he got up to see where the fire was, it was then that he discovered that all light service and telephones were out of service.

He said to Mrs. Gillies that he didn't know what to do, he couldn't see.

"Just light a match and look around" she instructed him. The Warden lit several matches in his search for a fire that couldn't be found.

"Guess it was just smoke from the wires when the lightning burned them off. Funny thing, though, I could never talk over the telephone hot enough to burn it out" he explained later.

It was early Sunday forenoon before Warden Gillies was able to talk with any one outside of his home and light service was restored when the sun came up Sunday morning. Later investigation showed that the only damage was to telephone and electric wiring.

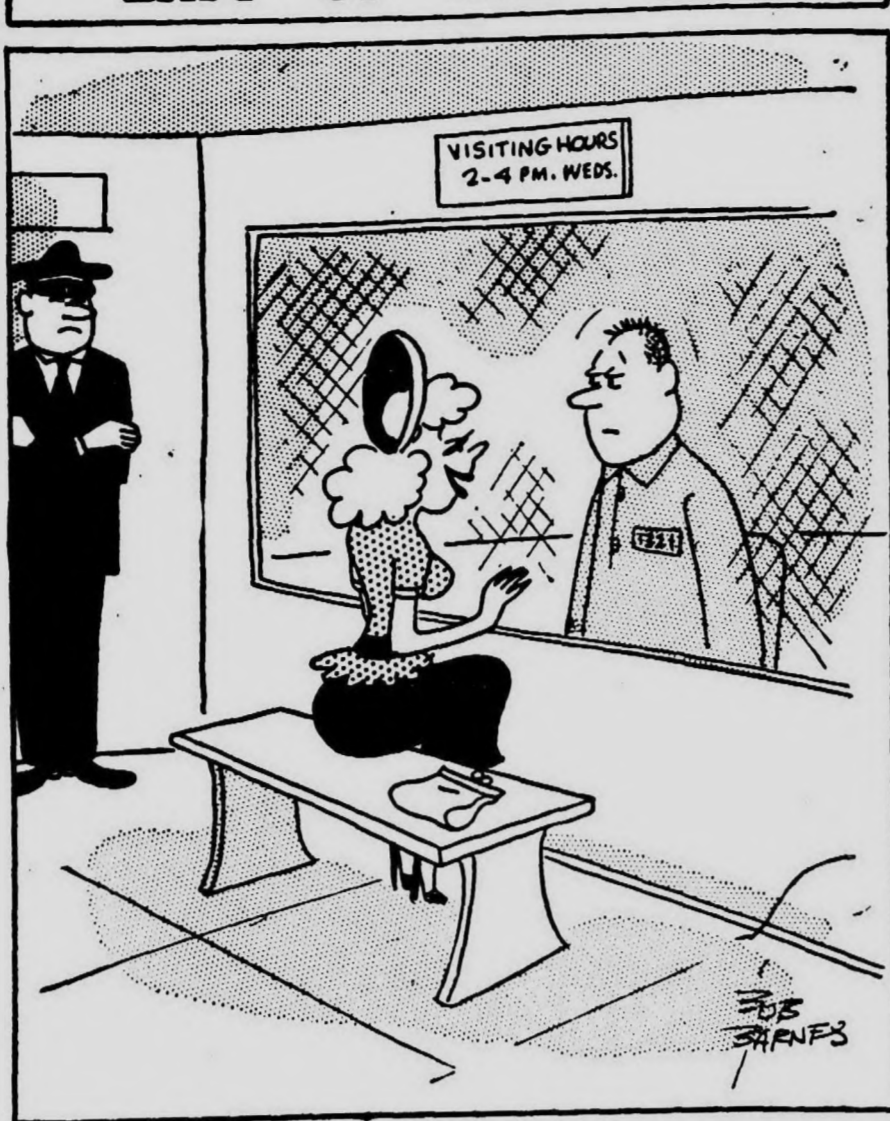

Airman second class Harold A. Secord recently received the air medal for "extraordinary achievement as radar operator while participating in aerial flight in the Korean conflict from August 29, 1951 to April 24, 1952."

Airman second class Secord flew air rescue missions consisting of behind the line pilot pick-up orbits, and search missions in an unarmed SA-16 type aircraft. "These flights were exceptionally hazardous because of long distances over water and the number of hours spent over enemy territory during which time enemy contact was probable and expected" the citation reads.

The citation concludes "By his courage, fortitude, and his desire to aid the United Nations cause to the best of his ability, Airman second class Secord brought great credit upon himself and the United States Air Force."

**"Dollar-A-Mile"  
Yardstick Used  
on 2 Speeders**

Municipal Court Judge N. Perlongo has set up a "yardstick" by which to penalize speeding motorists.

She paid a \$35 fine after being named as a Main street speeder—driving at speeds up to 60 miles an hour.

**10 Years Ago**

In one of the greatest drives this nation has ever made to help raise funds to carry on the war, every business man in Plymouth has become a member of "The Commandos of Main street" and from July 1 until the end of the war, they are pledged to give to the government their fullest cooperation in the sale of war bonds and stamps.

The divisional office of the Salvation Army in Detroit this week announced the transfer of Adjutant Elizabeth Lemorie and Envoy Lovila Bonser of the Plymouth corps to Cheboygan. Adjutant Lemorie and her assistant will conduct farewell services Sunday, with morning service at 1 o'clock and evening meeting at 8 o'clock.

The government's drive to collect reclaimable scrap rubber through local salvage committees and gasoline station dealers has

been extended to July 10 by Presidential proclamation. Plymouth's collection of scrap rubber netted 15 tons during the first week of the campaign, according to reports from local gas stations, but only five tons during the past week. The Cub Scouts of Plymouth, in a house-to-house canvass of the community, collected a half ton of discarded rubber articles.

Tuesday the Wayne county board of supervisors voted down a resolution to endorse the proposed, so-called Home Rule amendment; the vote was 106 against the resolution to 15 for it. The motion which was introduced by Thomas Leadbetter, city clerk of Detroit, asked the supervisors to endorse, not the general principle of Home Rule for counties, but the specific amendment written by the Detroit Citizens' committee that was organized last January.

a total of \$80,000 and 16 new homes under construction, but this year's record for June is considered average in view of the many government restrictions limiting new building.

Bond Issue for Main Street Improvement Called Solution

Main street, with its cobblestone-like bricks, jolting depressions, and tar-filled cracks will not be paved or widened this year, say some city officials.

Four city commissioners made this statement, declaring that "no specific action" has been taken by the city commission to finish the Main street improvement program completed last year between Mill street and Stark-weather avenue.

One of the stumbling blocks to completion of the project is seen as one of "insufficient funds."

Available money for street improvement has been earmarked for projects already underway, Commissioner Floyd Tibbitts explains, pointing to the Harvey street black-top paving program and curb and gutter installations being made this summer.

A bond issue covering the cost of the Main street program is one suggestion discussed by Commissioner Tibbitts, who states that he made such a recommendation to other City Commissioners. "It is an issue that should be placed on the ballot and voted on by the people," he declares.

Two other commissioners emphatically agreed that Main street should be widened and resurfaced.

Commissioner Henry Fisher made this known when he said, "it (Main street) should be paved and widened—the sooner, the better."

He disagreed with some officials as to the means of paying for this project that may cost upwards to \$150,000.

"Widening of the main thoroughfare," he asserts, "should be assessed against owners whose property abuts Main street."

The cost of resurfacing the street and putting up new curbs and gutters should be borne by the City, he maintains, stating that the street foundation and curbing has already been paid once by owners whose property is adjacent to Main street.

Commissioner Ernest Henry looked on the Main street improvement program as part of the

Here is one local car owner who brought her fire right to the fire department to be put out.

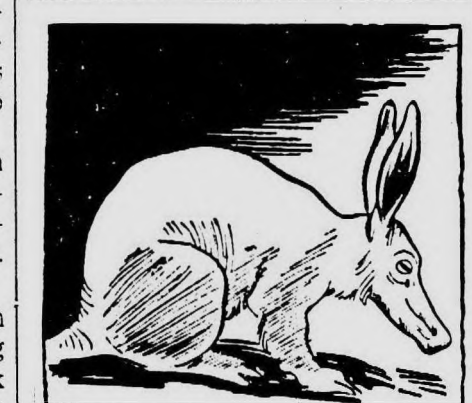
Firefighters report that an unidentified woman motorist whipped up to the front steps of the fire department last week with an upholstery fire burning up the front seat of her 1952 model car.
