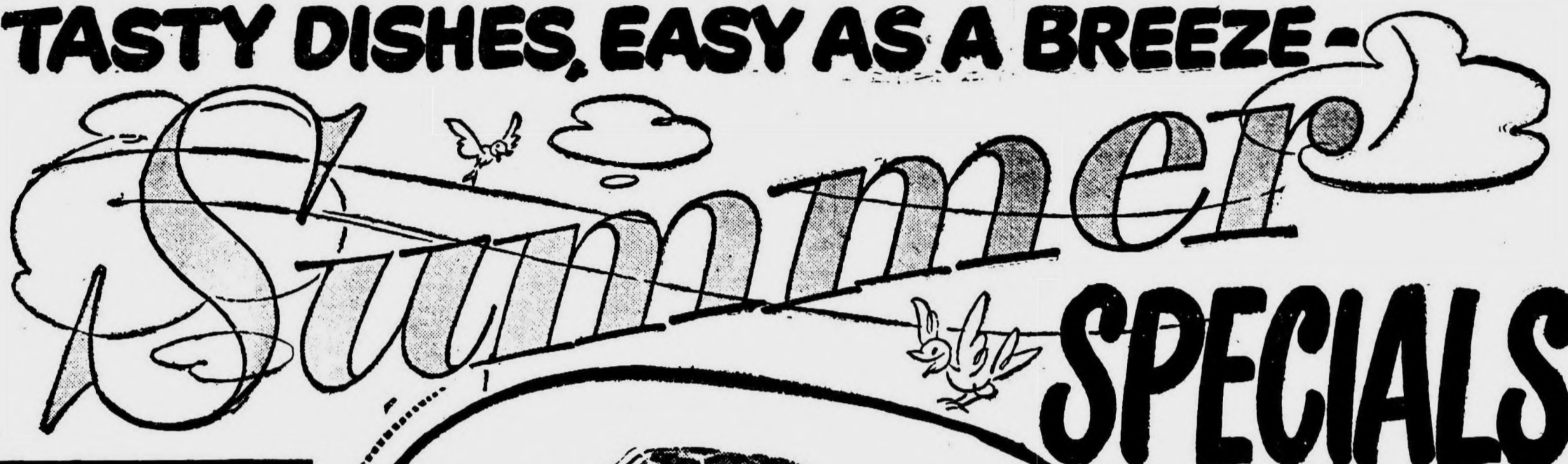

Check Reveals Machinery Value

Overhead costs of owning a lot of high-priced farm machinery can eat up the profits of a harvest season.

On the other hand, failure to plant or harvest a crop at the right time because of a lack of the right machinery can greatly reduce the cash farm income. That makes ownership of farm machinery largely a problem of individual management—there needs to be some balance between expenditures for machinery and cash income.

There are several factors to take into consideration in deciding how much machinery to buy. They are volume of business, labor available, availability of custom equipment, physical handicaps and pride in ownership.

Volume of business and pride in ownership often go together. Purchase of a new three-plow tractor or may be necessary to increase the tillable acres on the farm, even though the purchase might not be justified from the standpoint of present income.

Costs per hour for using farm equipment decreases as the number of hours of use increase. Farm tractors should be used in the neighborhood of 500 hours per year to reduce the hourly overhead cost to an economic level. Other farm equipment should be used in the neighborhood of 100 hours per year.

Here's a handy rule of thumb to figure cost of owning machinery. In terms of dollars a new machine will cost the owner approximately 15 per cent of the purchase price each year for 10 years running. For example, a \$1,000 machine would cost the owner about \$150 a year to own.

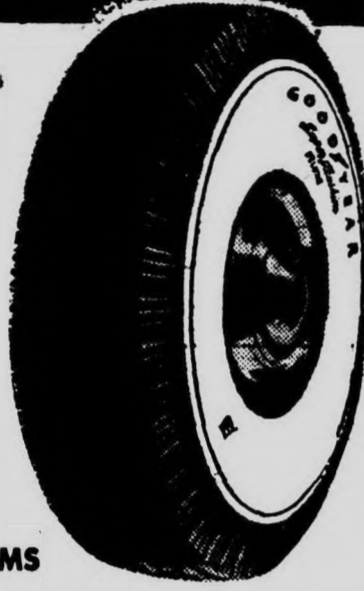

Feeder Batters Egg Quality
POULTRY raisers may avoid thin-shelled eggs, even in winter, by making always available to their flocks high-grade oyster shell with a calcium carbonate content of approximately 95 per cent. Presence of vitamin D in the ration determines the extent to which a bird can make use of the calcium carbonate in manufacturing egg shell.

Inclusion of a vitamin D concentrate therefore helps improve egg shell texture when flocks are confined to laying houses.

An efficient device for keeping the flock supplied with the shell-making ingredient is a grit and oyster shell feeder, such as illustrated here. Its design is sound from the functional viewpoint, and it can be built in a few hours.

Three short boards, 1 by 6 inches, provide the framing for the feeder. The top, back and front are panels of Masonite 1/2-inch tempered Presdwood. The feeder contains two compartments and is designed for attaching to the wall of the laying house. This is an economical device for keeping the necessary grit and source of lime always before the layers.

Decision Delayed on Sign Permit

Held over until the July 21 meeting of the City Commission was discussion of erection of a sign by the Socony Vacuum Oil company station, corner Amelia and Main streets.

The sign would be at ground level and would project onto city property for 18 inches. This extension would not intrude upon the right of way of persons walking down either Main or Amelia streets.

It does, however, violate a city policy which prohibits such signs. The sign is to be installed to replace a sign which was removed following the recent sign survey.

An overhead sign, commissioners said, of this type, is not practicable because of the number of trees in the area.

Final decision was postponed until they had a chance to survey different types of signs. This came after a move to permit a nine foot square sign extending not more than 18 inches onto city property was defeated.

When Charles H. Thorne recently returned from an eastern trip that included a visit to Plymouth, Mass., he brought with him a copy of the Old Colonial Memorial, the excellent weekly newspaper that has served the citizens of the eastern, historic city for nearly a century and a half. The publication claims to be "New England's Greatest Weekly Newspaper."

It is an excellent publication, not publishing quite as big a newspaper as The Plymouth Mail.

While Plymouth Mail readers get a larger and as good a newspaper as is the Old Colony Memorial, they also get it for considerably less than half the subscription rates of the Plymouth, Mass., newspaper.

Its subscription rate by the year is \$5.00. The rate of The Plymouth Mail for local circulation is only \$2.00 per year. The Plymouth, Mass., paper charges \$2.50 for a six month subscription.

Like The Plymouth Mail, it also uses many local pictures. While The Plymouth Mail has never boasted much about it, this was the first weekly newspaper in Michigan to inaugurate a timely local picture service that has so pleased the readers of this publication. A recent check of Michigan papers showed that there are several weekly papers now that use timely pictures to a considerable extent.

In Oneonta, Alabama, the Blount County grand jury held its half-yearly meeting, made only one recommendation: that a better place be provided for the grand jury to meet. In Norwich, England, a jury retired to consider its verdict, filed back into the courtroom 40 minutes later and asked for tea.

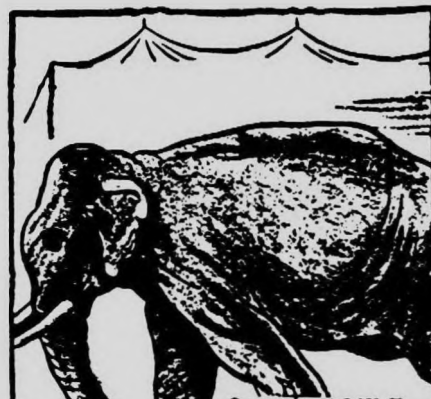

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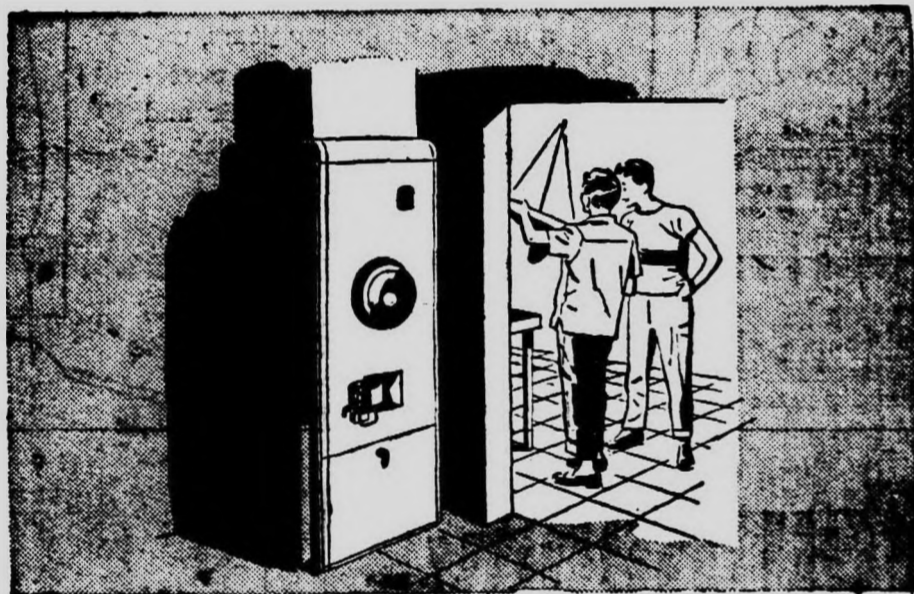
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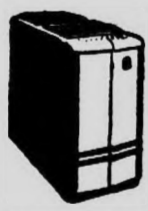

supervision for children and to release women workers for war production.

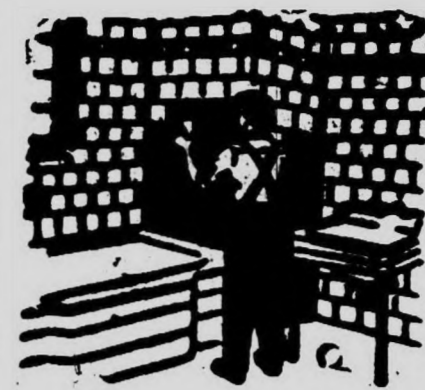

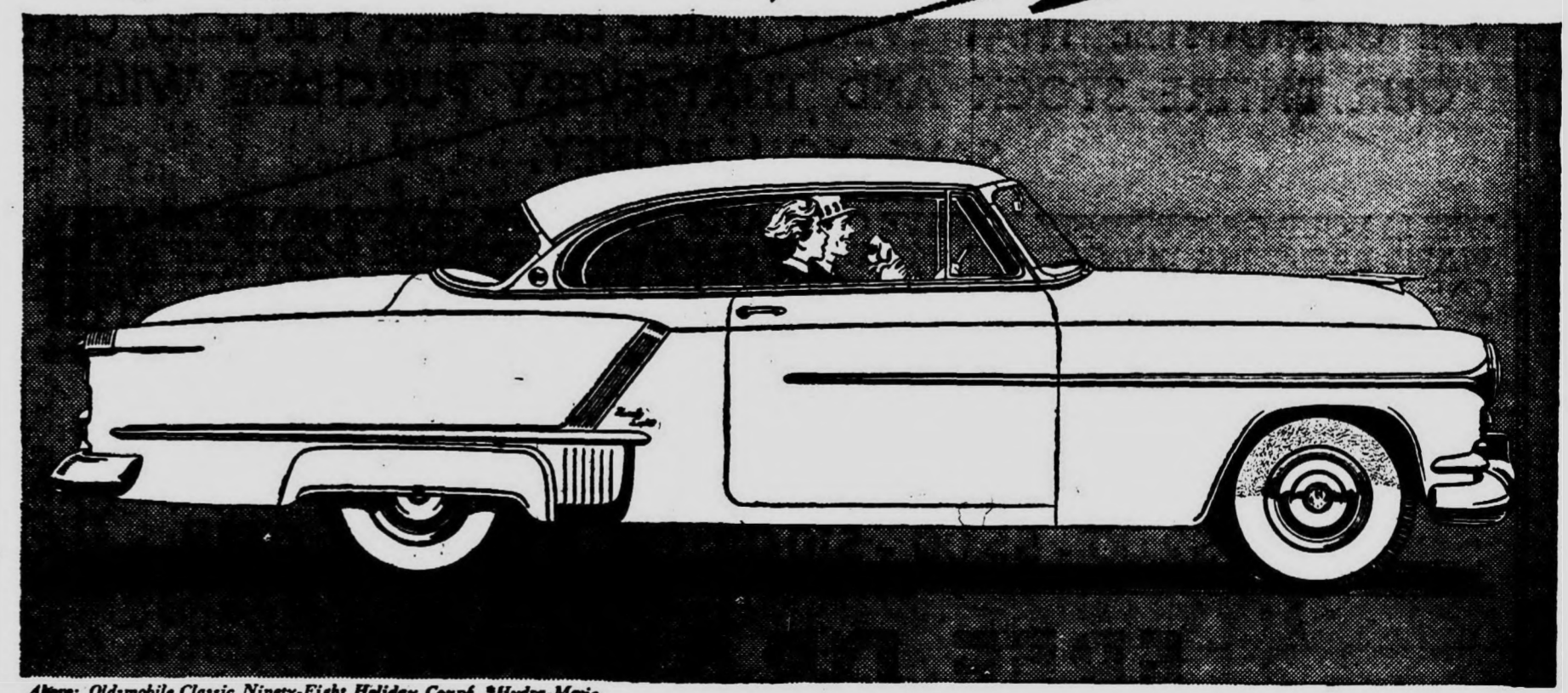

I started with five employees and now have over 170 on the job. Our record has been good. And furthermore, all we have said and done is recorded in public libraries.

collateral. Today, with prices actually higher, these Money Rates are slightly above 2 per cent.

Statistics on Failures, which were one of the best barometers of impending changes, are another illustration. In 1928 failures were 24,000, with liabilities of \$500 million. Yet, today, with nearly twice the volume of business, failures are running at the annual rate of 8,000, with liabilities of \$300 million. This, of course, is due to the fact that the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, the Federal Mortgage Banks and the various other Government aids make it unnecessary for a concern to fail. Therefore, statistics on failures are now of little use when making forecasts.

Managed Currency Is Pleasant But Dangerous
 The fact is that today there are no economic ceilings and no floors. Three-quarters of the subjects upon which we used to depend in making forecasts are now of little account. Of course, Washington cannot continue indefinitely the present practice of extending unlimited aid to all groups. The Law of Action and Reaction is fundamental, like the Law of Gravity, and must sooner or later result in an economic crash. On the other hand, the Government can postpone such a readjustment for some years more by printing more money or more bonds. Furthermore, it will be a great temptation for any Administration to do this—Republican or Democratic.

This next economic smash will probably be brought about by an ultimate showdown between Congress and the labor leaders. If each side should refuse to "give in", with a large number of industries being struck at the same time, we could have a real depression. Almost within sight of my office one of the largest bus systems in the world has been shut down for 120 days, inconveniencing hundreds of thousands of people and costing the employees and the company a million dollars a week. What would happen if a dozen of the country's largest transportation systems should so strike at the same time? The steel strike, which has thrown 650,000 steel workers out of employment, has affected so many other businesses that the whole U. S. production of all goods has fallen 10 per cent during the past few weeks. What if the employees of our ten largest industries, doing 70 per cent of

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How Can We Forecast?
 By a study of new subjects, such as dividends and wages received, selling and advertising expenditures, and various confidence indices it is possible to make accurate forecasts for perhaps four to six months. When, however, "experts" attempt to tell you what the business, employment or stock market conditions will be for more than a year ahead, this is nonsense. No facts now exist to give proper basis for any such long-term forecasts. Some will say, "It is in the hands of the gods". I even deny this and say, "It is in the hands of Congress." If Congress should get fed up with labor leaders and demand a showdown, and the labor leaders should refuse to be reasonable, a depression could come next year. The probabilities, however, are that Congress will allow matters to drift for some years. But the longer the cancer runs its course before a surgical operation, the more dangerous the operation will be when it finally takes place.
