Tours To Mark Open House at PHS, Monday

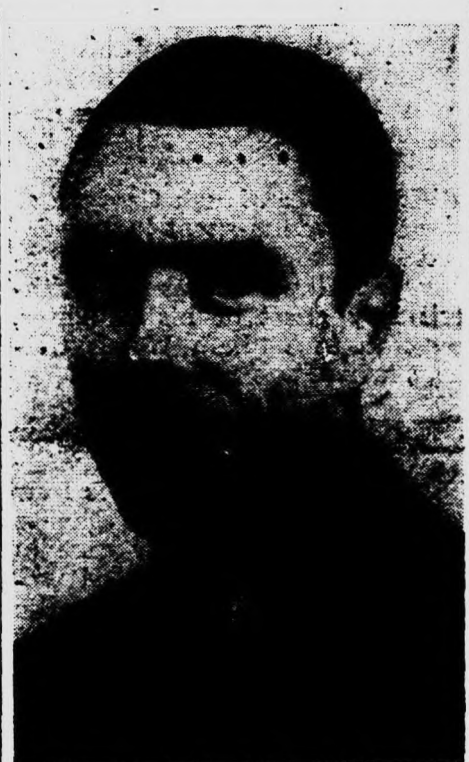

Plagued by lagging interest and lack of funds the six-man Christmas Lighting Committee voted unanimously to return some \$1,600 in checks to merchant and business contributors starting sometime next week. Liquor Question Loses by 1795 No to 966 Yes

Voters here turned out 3,656 strong Tuesday tipping over the Republican hat and pouring forth a deluge of votes that gave President-Elect Dwight D. Eisenhower a three to one majority over his Democratic opponent.

Voting in line with the rest of the nation, it was the same story in Plymouth and Canton townships, also turning out in record numbers at the polls.

Of special significance is the total number of 1,904 women here who deluged the city's polls in numbers exceeding their men-folk by 152. Completed tallies show 1,752 men taking the election-day trek.

Plymouth and the two townships also stayed in line with out-state areas, giving over a two to one Republican majority in the gubernatorial and other state races.

Senator Blair Moody pulled in a poor second with 1,035 tallies scored against three-term Congressman Potter's 2,516.

Clarence J. Reid, Republican, cornered 2,485 of the city's vote

Physical education and the cost of fielding a football player at the University of Michigan were discussed by Howard Leibe, associate professor of physical education, at the regular meeting of the Plymouth Kiwanis club Tuesday evening.

"The uniforms for each college player today cost approximately \$160," said Leibe as he displayed each piece of equipment. "Football is definitely big business and, according to Michigan Athletic Director Crisler, the only sport that pays its own way."

Giving a brief background on the history of football, Leibe remarked that Michigan played its first game in 1873. It was in this year, he said, that the then president of Cornell University, a man named White, refused to allow his school to participate in a game with Michigan. White made this famous statement: "I refuse to allow 30 boys to travel 300 miles to agitate a bag of wind."

Commissioners Seek to Head Off Injunction by Relocating City Jail

Bowing to the demands of the State Inspector of Jails, the City Commission Monday heard proposals for relocating the city's condemned lockup.

Following discussion, Commissioners tabled the relocating proposal for further study.

The city's poorly ventilated basement "dungeon" has been the subject of severe criticism by the State Department of Correction, who periodically for the last four years, has condemned it because of its basement location. Just a month ago W. H. Nestle, State Department of Corrections inspector, warned that if the city failed to "better jail conditions" here that a court injunction might be sought to close it.

Nestle pointed out that to avoid negligence charges if a prisoner is injured or killed while detained in the jail, the city should locate the lockup on the same floor as the police department.

Earlier he called the jail's location a fire hazard. City Manager Albert F. Glassford detailed one "better solution" (Continued on page 5)

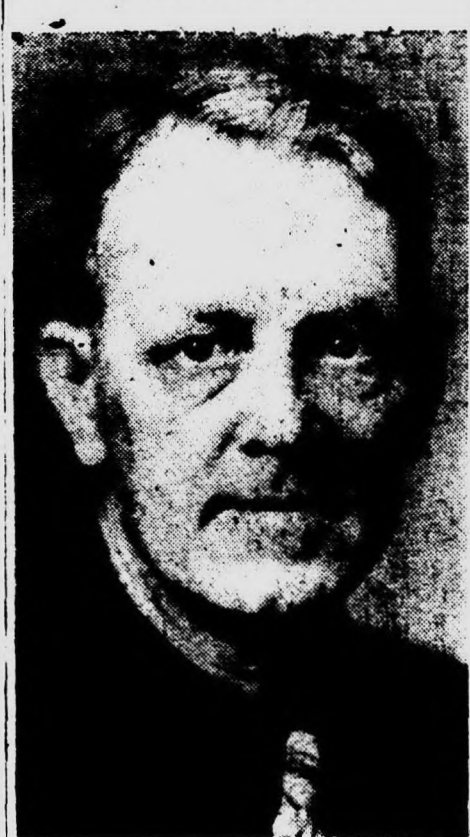

Former City Assessor Dies



Arnold B. Thompson A former city assessor died at Sessions hospital in Northville last Thursday. He was Arnold B. Thompson of 324 North Harvey street, for many years an active member of local military organizations.

A full-dress military burial was held for the deceased man last Saturday with the Reverend Carroll Ware officiating at the burial rites.

Detroit born, Mr. Thompson lived in Plymouth for 27 years prior to his death. He was a city assessor here from 1938 to 1947. For 17 years preceding that time he was employed as commissary manager at the Detroit House of Correction.

Mr. Thompson claimed membership in the American Legion, Myron Beale Post No. 32, Plymouth Ex-Servicemen's Club, Canteen Club, Masonic Order and Goodfellows Organization.

He was known as the originator of the World War II Canteen Club and past commander of the Ex-Servicemen's club.

Military funeral services were held from the Schrader Funeral Home.

In addition to his veteran affiliations, Mr. Thompson was also deputy city clerk here, police officer, a member of the Wayne County Board of Supervisors and secretary of the Plymouth Defense Council from 1941 to 1942.

He is survived by his wife, Ruth, a son, Jean O., living in Lansing, and a sister, Mrs. Grace Wigent of Detroit.

Presidential Vote Here 272 Short of Total Cast

Of the 3,656 votes cast here, 272 voters failed to vote for a presidential candidate with another 103 failing to cast a ballot for gubernatorial candidates.

It is speculated that non-familiarity with the city's voting machines caused some voter consternation in how to operate them.

The 103 persons who abstained from voting for governor are assumed persons who crossed party lines either accidentally or deliberately failing to cast their gubernatorial ballot.

In general, voting records indicate that most voters here cast a straight ballot. There was little variation in the number of total votes credited between different candidates.

The city's liquor-by-the-glass proposal saw a total vote cast of 2,761, nearly 900 ballots fewer than were cast city-wide. This was also true of State proposals that fell nearly 1,000 short of the total votes cast.

Liquor-by-Glass Proposal Takes Second Drubbing

Plymouth's liquor-by-the-glass resolution took a sound drubbing at the polls Tuesday with voters defeating the proposal by 1,795 to 966.

A controversial issue since 733 petitioners placed the measure on the ballot, this was the second time it went down in defeat. In 1940 balloters dealt the hard-liquor measure a resounding defeat by 879 to 280 yeas.

Before the measure can again be placed on the ballot a four-year period of time must have elapsed.

"I have met other crises in a similar way and thanks to God my most fervent prayers have been answered every time."

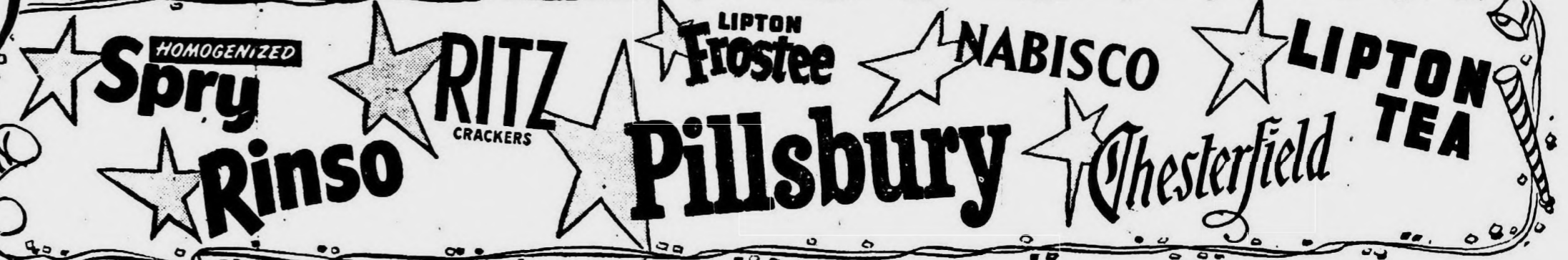

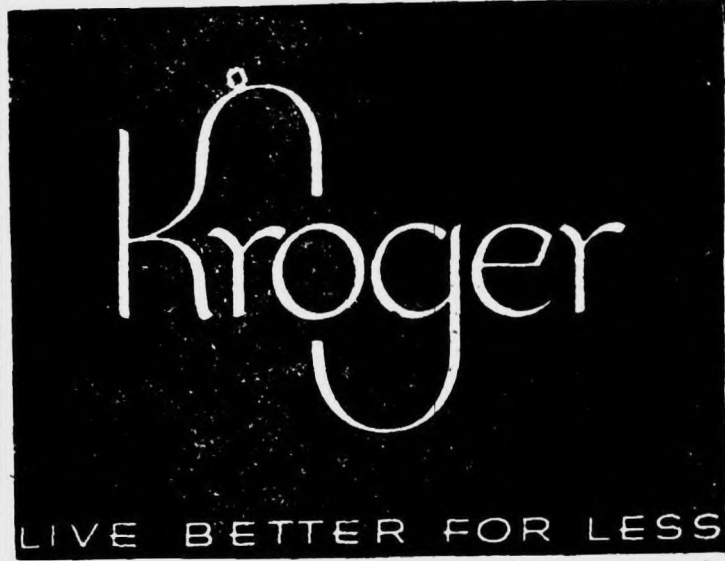

HOW TO STORE POTATOES FOR WINTER: Keep in dark, moderately cool place, where it is moist but not wet, well ventilated but not drafty. Although potatoes keep longer and sprout less if kept at 40 to 45 degrees F.; they have a better cooking quality when stored at 50 to 60 degrees F. If kept too cold, they will be undesirably sweet and dark colored when cooked. This can be partly overcome by exposing to ordinary room temp. for about 10 days before using. A dark storage place is important as potatoes may turn "green" if exposed to light, losing both flavor and food value. Make sure air can get under and around potatoes. A crate, bag, basket, or ventilated bin is suitable. Do not set directly on a concrete floor, but place on boards or straw.

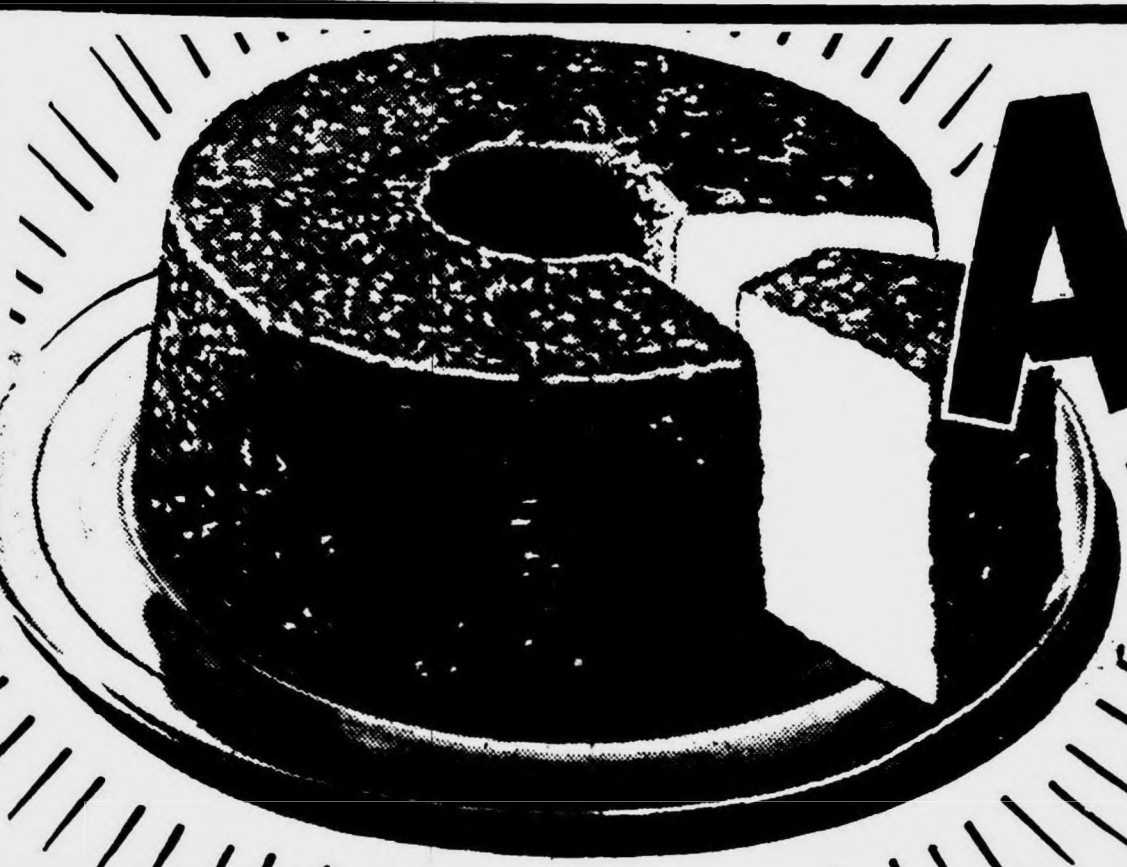

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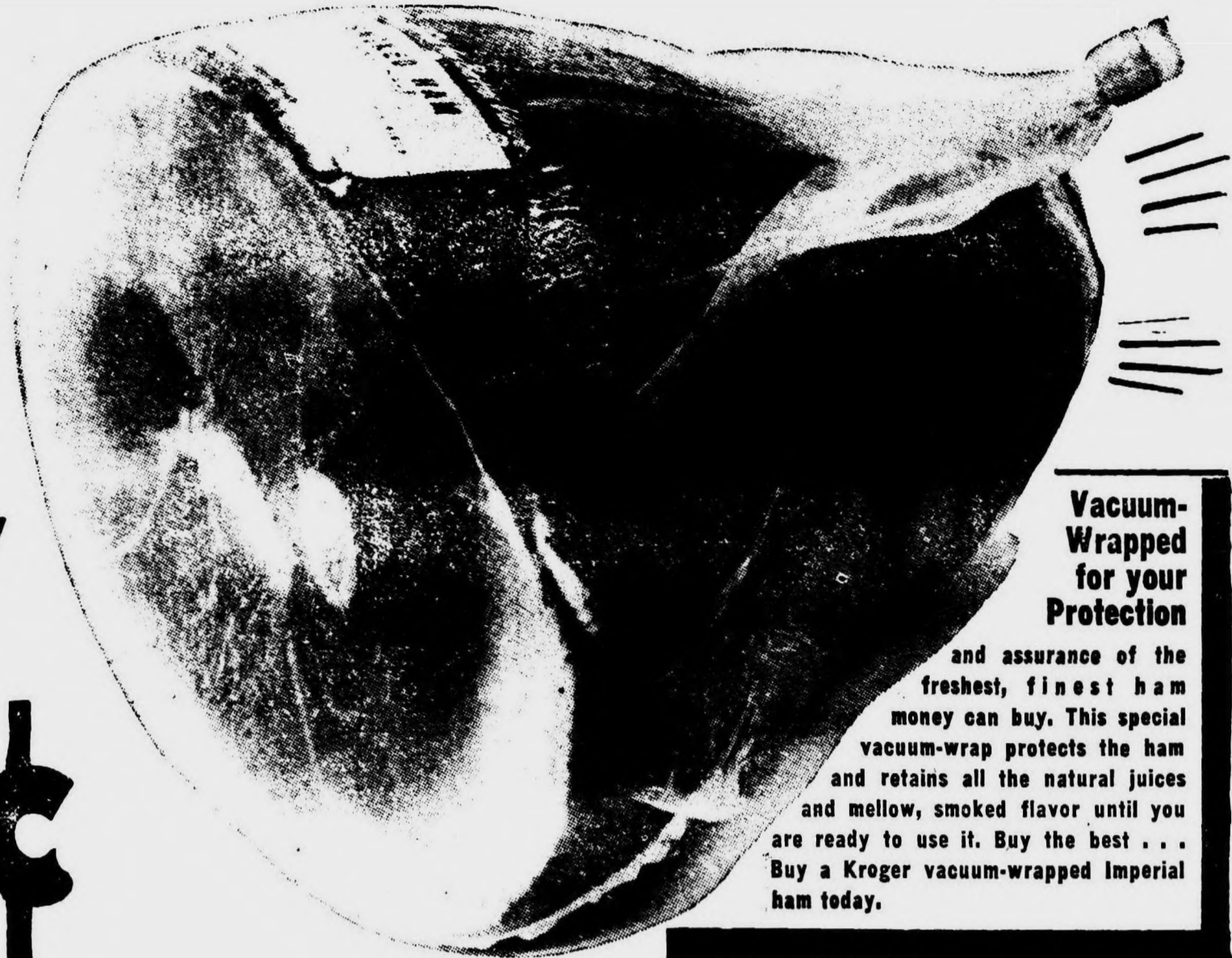

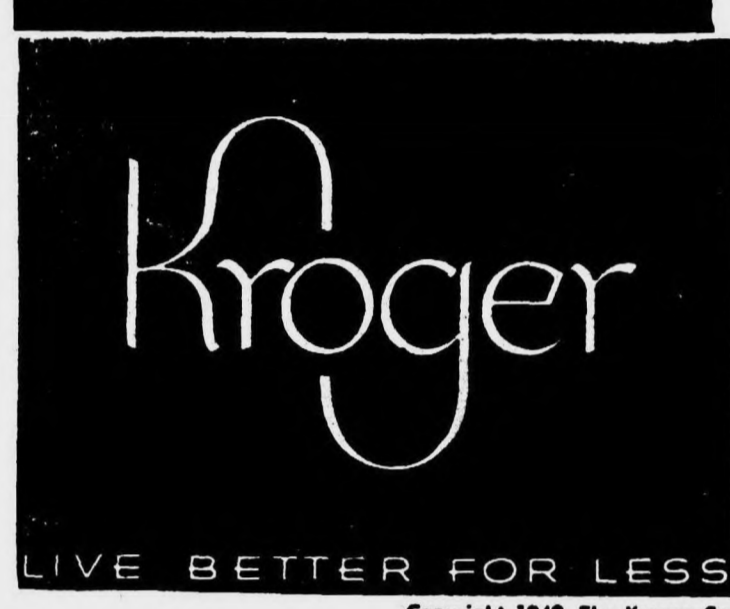

Four Million Families Own Home Freezers

Freezing foods is a quick, convenient and easy way of preserving foods. Four million families in the U.S. now own home freezers.

There is not any dollar-and-cents advantage in lower food costs for the family that has a freezer and has to buy their food supply. There is some advantage in making possible wider selections of foods and in the time spent in shopping for food and preparing meals. For families who raise their food supply there may be a food cost advantage, but the ease and convenience will be most important.

In buying a home freezer patronize a reliable dealer. Do not buy a unit unless you can arrange for adequate servicing. Be certain the freezer has enough insulation and does not vary over five degrees in any part of the cabinet. The freezer should have an accurate thermometer. An alarm device is helpful in indicating when current is off.

Place the freezer where it will have adequate floor support and where it will have air circulation around the refrigeration unit. Be sure the unit will go through the necessary doors before purchasing.

There are ways of paring down food costs by the use of a freezer. Purchase big institutional packages rather than the small retail packages. Buy frozen foods from a dealer in large enough quantity to obtain a discount from the regular retail price. Buy fresh fruits and vegetables in season, when the price is lowest, and package them at home. Better yet—raise the food to go into the freezer. In any case, use the freezer to capacity. The greater the turnover of food in a freezer the less is the cost per pound for freezing and keeping the food frozen.

All fruits and vegetables which are usually canned, meats, poultry, fish and eggs freeze satisfactorily. Exceptions are tomatoes and pears. Some prepared and precooked food can also be frozen. Freeze only the best—firm, well-ripened fruits and fresh, tender vegetables. Meats must be high in quality and handled properly from the time of slaughtering to the time of freezing.

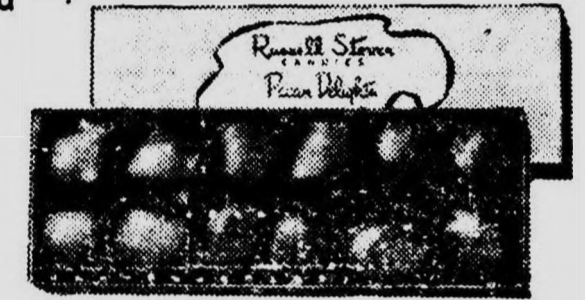

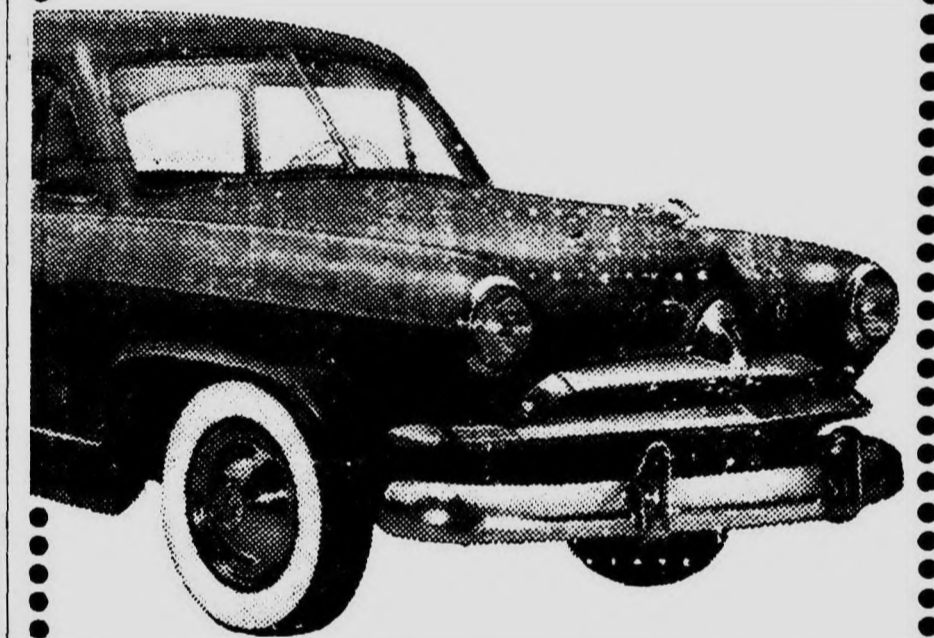

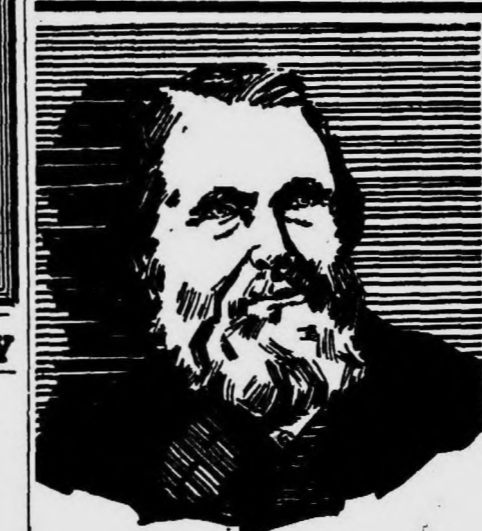
**Mary Lou Hartwick Elected Choir President**

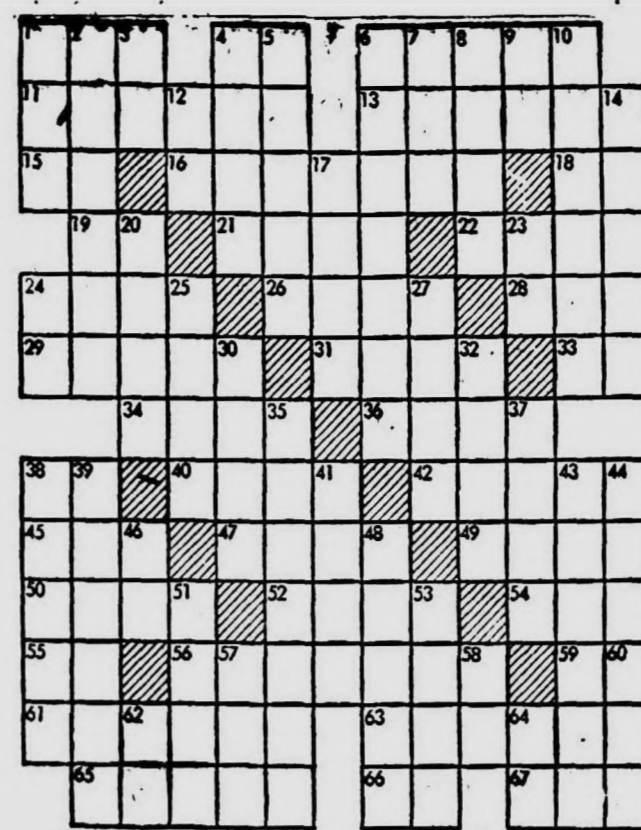
