

Mental Health Agency Advocates Northville Children's Hospital to State Legislators

Northville may get a children's hospital. Defending his position for a curative center for mentally ill children, he said that children who became mental cases, if not properly treated, are potential patients for the mental hospitals or prison inmates. He argued for an institution exclusively for children suffering from mental illnesses.

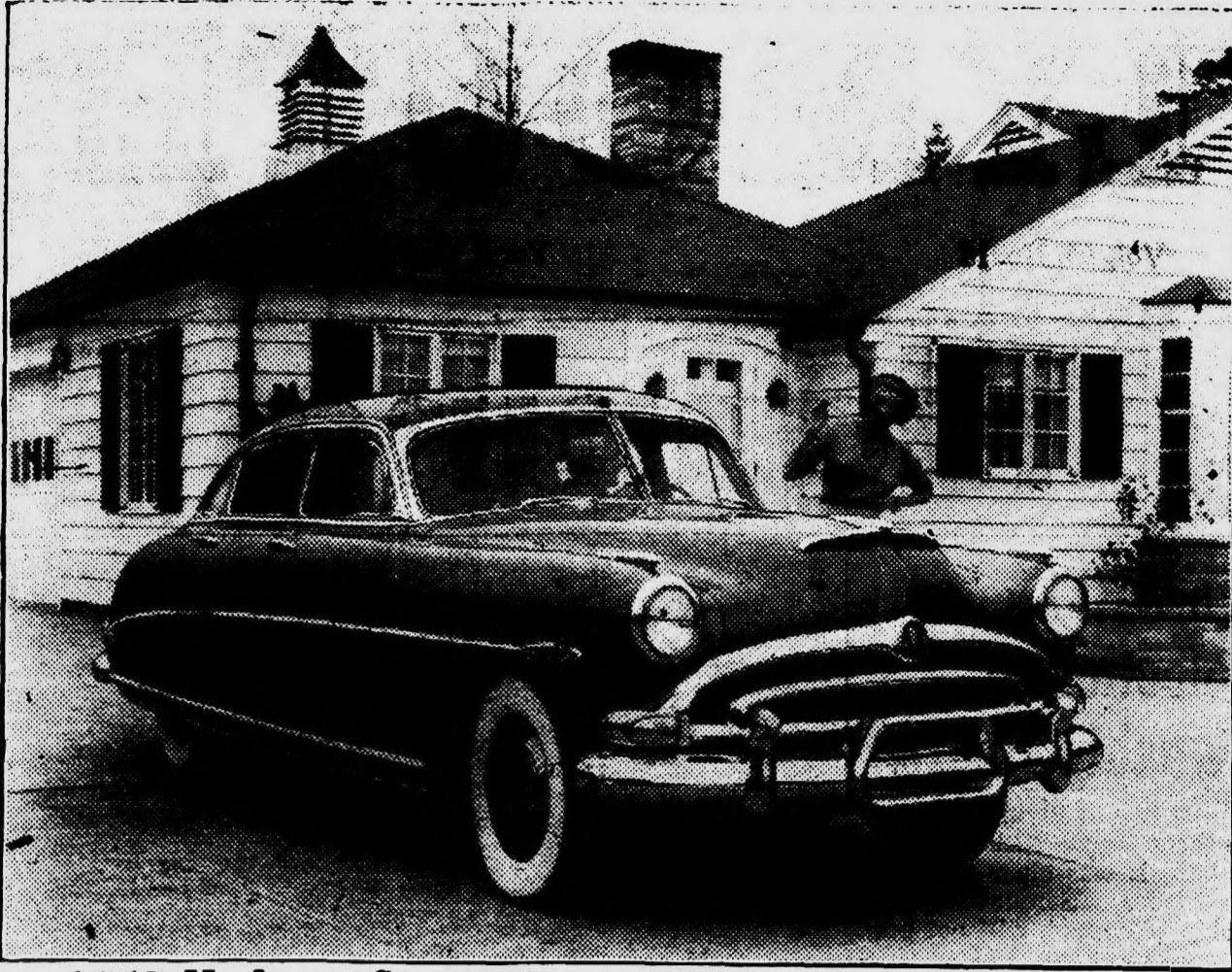
Dr. August turned hands down on a training and research center for mentally ill youths, such as now being operated by the University of Michigan medical school, where treatment is played down on favor of research projects.

"We just can't get along with a 15-bed unit at Ann Arbor," Dr. August said, pointing out that he was not belittling any children's program in the field of polio or palsy.

Supporting Dr. August was Charles F. Wagg, director of the Mental Health Commission.

The children's hospital, when the money was made available in 1951, would have cost \$1,500,000. That cost has now risen to \$1,980,000, and does not include utilities and other services which will be provided by the Northville State hospital.

Hopeful that contracts for the 88-bed institution can be awarded by July, 1953, is the Hospital Commission, who revealed to state legislators at this same time that there are some 25 mental hospital construction projects under way throughout the state. About \$7,000,000 of authorized construction is on the drawing boards for which bids have not been taken.



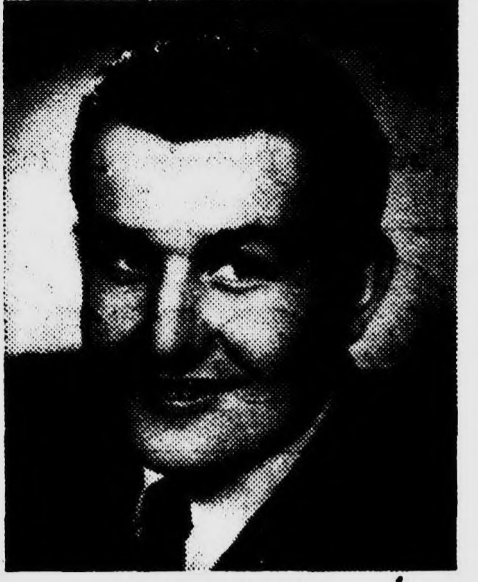

Handel Gains Immortal Fame For "The Messiah" Composed in 25 Days

Among music critics, George Frederick Handel's "The Messiah" has become a legendary Christmas oratorio, a spiritual salute telling of the birth of Christ, sung and orchestrated in 35 acts and recitatives.

Musically, The Messiah was Handel's greatest composition, creating for him an immortal fame that serves as a spiritual guidepost to millions of people during the festive Christmas holidays.

Handel was born in Halle, Germany, in 1685. It was in 1741 he wrote his "great masterpiece," The Messiah, born and completely in just 25 days.

History tells that Handel did not leave his house, "his whole mind in a trance," "filled with the white heat of inspiration," during the entire time required to compose the oratorio.

His servant reputedly tells of finding the composer "with tears streaming down his face" just as he completed Part II of The Messiah—the "Hallelujah Chorus," exclaiming "I did think I did see all heaven before me, and the great God himself."

The Messiah was first performed at a concert in Dublin, Ireland, in 1742. Handel himself conducted the orchestra. The London premiere of The Messiah took place a year later—in March, 1743—and it was on this occasion that the tradition connected with the Hallelujah Chorus arose.

When the singers burst into this chorus, the King (George II) was so moved that he spontaneously stood up in his box, the audience followed suit, and all remained standing until the chorus ended. The custom has persisted down to this day wherever The

Messiah is played. Handel was 68 when he died—called by music historians "one of the greatest composers who ever lived."

Besides the fame that came to him for his composing ability, Handel amassed a "considerable fortune." From 1726 he was a naturalized British subject. Though he became almost totally blind, he continued active until 10 days prior to his death in 1753.

December Stars Moon to Brighten Christmas Scene

The heavens' glittering array of December stars will be spotlighted this month by the Christmas Eve appearance of the Northern Cross high in the western sky.

Another shining Christmas constellation will be the Giant Hunter, which, according to Hazel M. Losh, University of Michigan associate professor of astronomy, is hard to excel in splendor and beauty.

Close on the heels of Orion, the Hunter, is his dog Canis Major, considered from earliest times one of the dogs he took with him when hunting. She points out that on maps the dog is generally pictured as standing on his hind feet watching or springing after the hare, found cowering under Orion's feet.

Two of the sky's brightest planets also will shine during the Christmas season. Venus will be seen in the southwest after sunset and will grow steadily brighter throughout the month. It is a common belief, the astronomist states, that Venus was the original Christmas star. Jupiter will also be seen high in the sky every night.

December will also have a double share of moonlight. In addition to the December 1 full moon, there will be another around midnight, December 30. The interval between full moons is 29½ days so it is easily possible to have two like phases in the same calendar month.

According to Professor Losh, winter will have its official beginning at 4:44 p.m. December 21 when the sun enters its winter solstice. This is the day on which it will reach the most southerly point in its apparent yearly journey around the earth, and its shortest daily path across the sky.

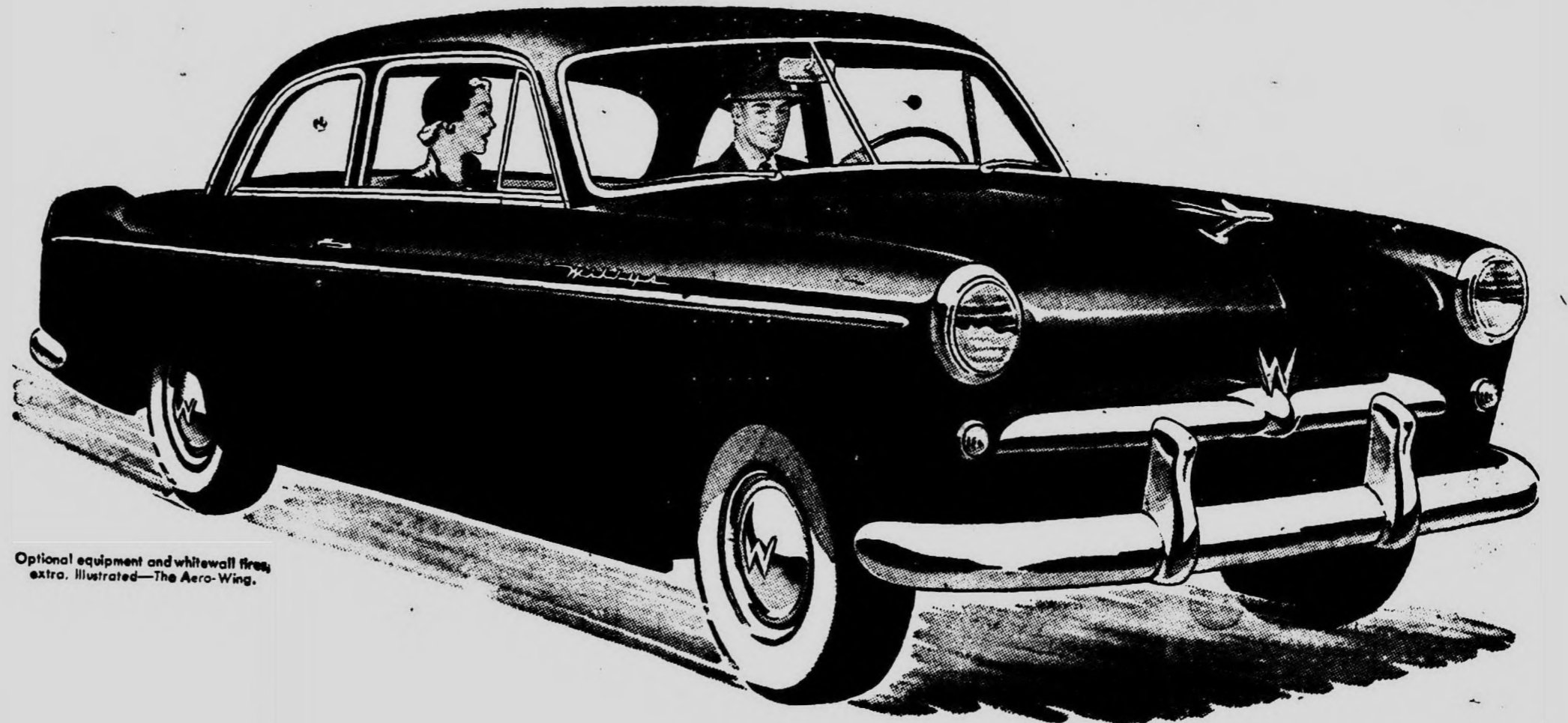

"During the past five years nearly 82,000 December traffic accidents have occurred in Michigan. They resulted in 752 deaths and 18,973 injuries.

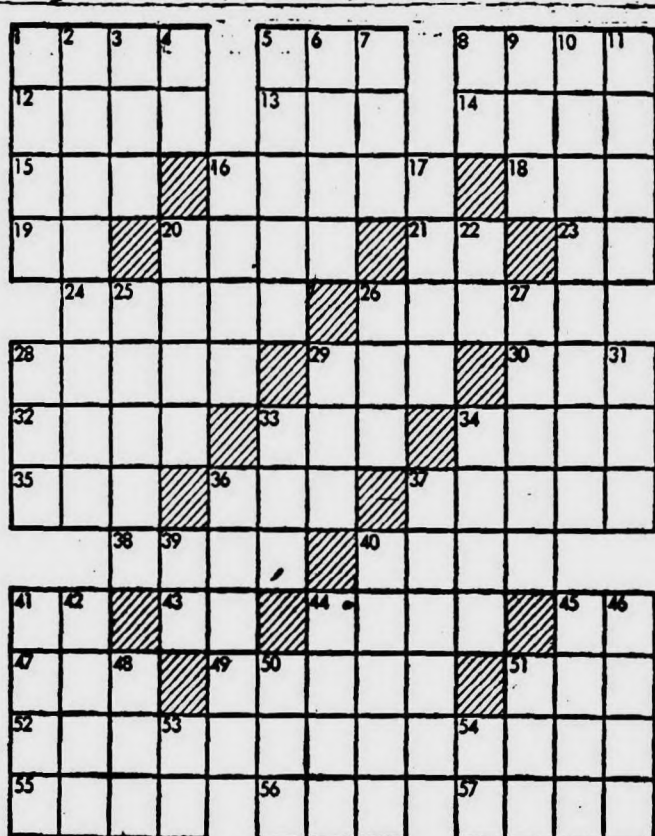
