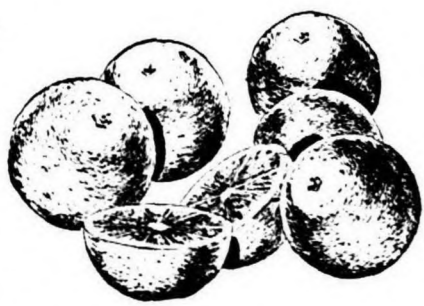

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second in a series on how to prepare and care for your lawn. The articles were written by Harlow O. Whittemore, professor of landscape architecture, University of Michigan.)

Is heavy clay posing a lawn-making problem for you?

Clay soil is not infertile, but it is so stiff that it slows down root penetration and cracks and dries out badly in dry weather.

To break up clay, about two or three times as much sand as clay is needed. If the lawn is to be of blue grass, the clay can be broken up with sifted coal ashes. However, other grasses do not like the lime in that mixture. Most grasses will prefer slightly acid or neutral soils.

Best results are obtained in Michigan by bringing in black swamp muck, which is the decomposed or carbonized surface of peat bogs. This carbonized muck has a remarkable effect upon clay.

When the clay is dry and broken into a powder, lay about two inches of black muck over it and harrow to a depth of four inches

into the clay. The muck will expand the clay to make about seven inches of top soil. This mixture, if coupled with a reasonable amount of chemical fertilizer, will assure an unusually fine velvety lawn. It may not be necessary to lay a one-inch loamy seed bed, but it is usually advisable to do so.

Warning: Never use black swamp muck as a seed bed on top soil by itself, because it will dry up and blow into the house.

In all lawns under preparation, rake out and throw away all chunks of clay and other debris before the seed bed is laid.

Best chemical fertilizer to use is probably 10-6-4, or ten parts nitrate, six parts phosphate and four parts potash. Quantity to be used varies in accordance with the richness of the soil. One to two pounds of chemical fertilizer for every 100 square feet should be enough for a start.

From Mrs. Bertha Williams, Ft. Recovery, Ohio: I remember going to the woodland with my brothers to get spicewood. It was a great breakfast treat for us youngsters to have a cup of hot spicewood tea made with maple syrup. I remember the hollowed out wooden troughs and the wooden spiles that were used in tapping the maple trees.

Fire Chief Urges Residents To Get Burning Permit

Plymouth township residents have been warned recently by Fire Chief Clayton Koch that state law requires a burning permit to burn off empty lots, fields or brush.

These permits can be acquired at the local township fire department, he said. He stated that fire runs are seldom necessary on fires where permits have been issued, thus pointing out the fact that people who obtain permits also take the necessary precautions to keep their fires within their intended bounds. If everyone gets permits as required by law, Koch said, few grass fire runs will have to be made. The equipment would be left available for more serious building fires, he added.

For "domestic" fires such as cooking fires and leaf and debris burning in close proximity to the home, permits are not required, Koch said.

Those burning without a permit are subject to prosecution and a fine which can be quite heavy, he warned.

Church Group Sponsors Dessert

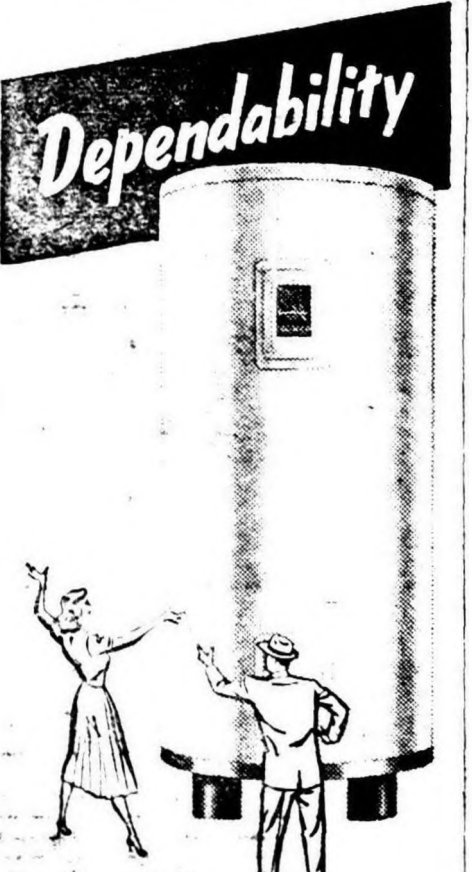

Local Concern Specializes In Aerial Maps

The Clark Aerial Survey corporation of Plymouth came into the news recently when they donated the negative for the 16-foot high photograph of Detroit's skyline to the Detroit city hall. The completed photograph is now on display there.

The local company, situated on North Territorial road, was started about three years ago with Frank Lodge as president and Mrs. Wayne Clark as vice-president and secretary.

Far from merely taking aerial photographs, the corporation specializes in aerial survey maps. These are constructed through many steps with the photographs taken by Lodge himself. He uses a Fairchild Mapping-type camera in his Howard single-engine plane. For the mapping shots, Lodge said, an overcast day is desirable since shadows are not apparent.

After the negatives are developed and printed, Lodge and Donald Kane, his engineer, check and lay up the contact prints. Great care must be taken to get the same scale and tilt in the prints on laying out the map. Engineering and field work with surveying equipment are necessary to get the maps exactly to scale and completely accurate. The emphasis is on precision, he said.

Before laying up the map which is like a mosaic each separate photograph is feathered and sanded to make it lie perfectly flat and even. The many separate pieces are glued down to form the complete map.

It takes the company about three months to lay out a map of an area like the Ford River Rouge plant, on which they are now working. There is no accurate control map of the Rouge

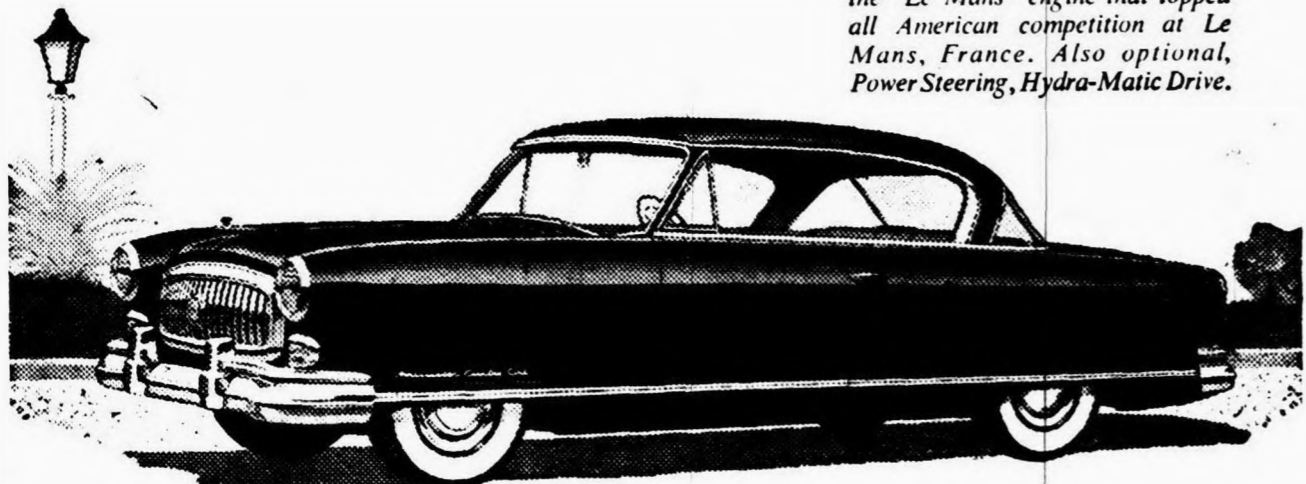
plant, Lodge said, so they have been commissioned to lay one out. The cost of this operation is dependent on the scale and the number of square miles covered.

The Ford map is made with a scale of 200 feet to the inch. When it is completed it will be re-photographed in sections with scales of 50 feet to the inch. With maps such as these exact locations of buildings, distances between them, roads and river can be seen.

Most of the mapping contracts handled by the company are from utility and power companies, Lodge said. More come in from highway commissions and individual plants, like the present Ford map.

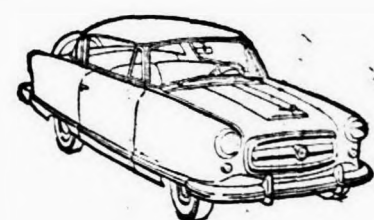
These maps are also used to construct road maps by taking tracings from the aerial maps. This has been done by the Detroit Edison company in many instances, Lodge said.

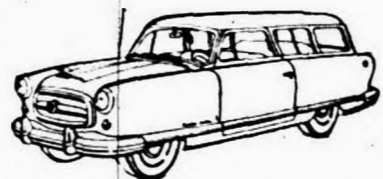

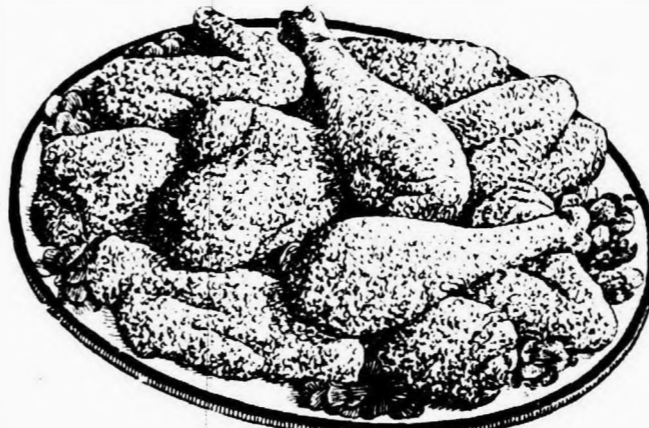
