

## Wayne County 4-H Fair Opens Next Tuesday

Three thousand 4-H boys and girls, including many from the Plymouth area, will exhibit their livestock and handwork at the 11th Annual Wayne County 4-H Fair which opens next Tuesday.

The fairgrounds is located on Quirk Road, just off the Expressway, north of Belleville. Young people will exhibit their year's activities and will be competing for ribbons, premiums and championship trophies in 24 different divisions.

Saturday, August 17 has been designated as "Plymouth Day" at the fair. Plymouth residents are being urged by the Chamber of Commerce to attend the day's events. The fair will last through Sunday, August 18.

Livestock exhibits will include over 125 head of 4-H pleasure horses, 50 head of cattle, and 15-20 pens of sheep, hogs, rabbits and poultry. Other exhibits include everything from foods to handicrafts.

The 4-H Fair is a non-profit organization operated by interested people anxious to provide 4-Hers with outstanding fair facilities. All officials are volunteers, says Fred Korte of Canton township, fair president.

In addition to the 4-H exhibits, there will be displays of farm and garden machinery and home appliances. Other exhibits include an Air Force display, 4-H information movies and a talking tractor from the Ford Motor Co.

High points of the week's program are community parades and queen contests, high school marching bands, Rickey the Clown, John F. Ivory's Roman Riders, moonlight square dancing, the Detroit Mounted Police Force, plowing contest, archery contest, tractor handling and others.

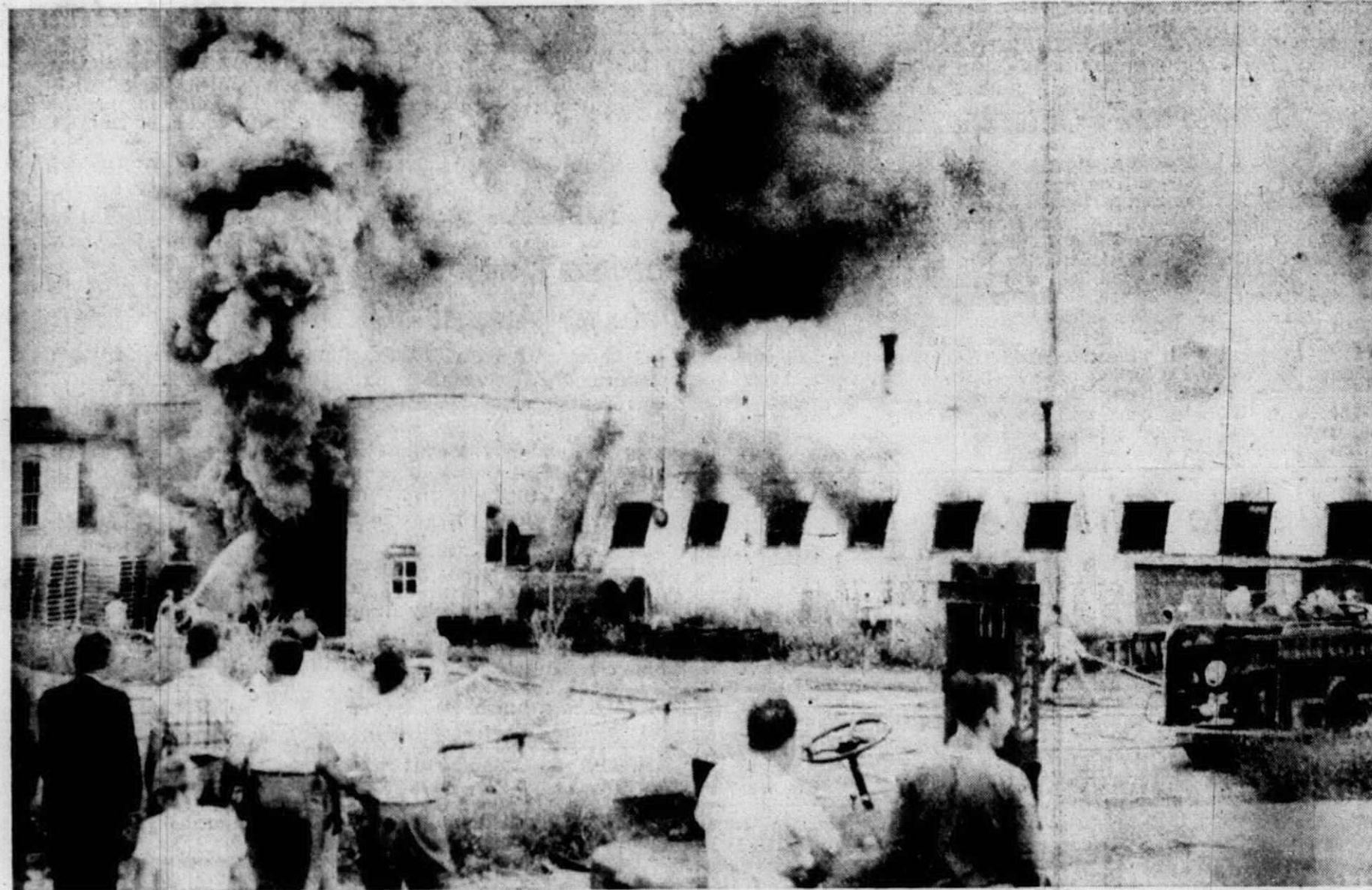

## Local Firemen Help Fight Northville Blaze

With columns of smoke visible all the way to Plymouth, one of Northville's largest industries, the Powdered Metal Parts Division of the Allied Products Corp., was destroyed by fire Tuesday afternoon.

The Plymouth city fire department sent a pumper and six men to the blaze. There were also two local policemen on the scene. The remainder of the fire department crew stood by here until the truck returned at 4 p.m.

Damage caused by the uncontrolled fire is estimated at a million dollars. The plant is located at 456 Cady, just off Plymouth street in Northville. Around 65 people are employed in the plant, making it one of Northville's biggest single employers next to the Ford plant.

Contrary to reports that 100 employees fled from the burning plant, there were actually only three people in the building when the blaze started during lunch hour. A switchboard operator called the fire department. It is believed that if workers had been on the job, the fire may have been extinguished.

A large quonset section at the rear of the building was first destroyed. The fire then moved swiftly into a concrete block section and finally into the offices.

Some records were saved but most equipment and thousands of dollars in personal belongings were destroyed.

There were several explosions, including four furnaces valued at \$100,000 each. Transformers outside the building also began shorting out, causing explosive sounds which sent firemen under cover.

There has been no cause of the fire established. Neither is it determined if the plant will be reconstructed. It is a subsidiary of the Allied Products Corp., 12667 Burt road.

Besides Plymouth's department, the Novi department assisted Northville's 15-man volunteer squad.

Gears and pressed bearings were manufactured in the plant.

### West Brothers Appointed Dealer For New Edsel

An agreement to sell and service the new Edsel medium price car line, to be introduced early in September, has been signed by Wilbert West of Plymouth, it was announced this week by Harley F. Riley, Detroit district sales manager of the Edsel Division of Ford Motor Co.

West Brothers Edsel, Inc., will be the name of the firm which in past years has been West Brothers Nash. Their showroom is at 534 Forest. Wilbert West is president of the corporation, A.R. West is vice-president and Earl C. West is secretary.

They have been in the automobile business for the past 20 years in Plymouth, operating both the Nash and an International Harvester dealership. They will continue to handle the International Harvester line. The building has a showroom containing 1,750 square feet and a service area comprising 3,250 square feet.

Wilbert West will act as both general manager and sales manager of the new Edsel dealership, and T. C. White will be service manager.

Ford Motor has invested \$250,000 to produce the new car. The four series—Ranger, Pacer, Corsair and Citation—will be marketed initially by an organization of some 1,200 to 1,500 dealers. Eventually, there will be between 2,500 and 3,000 dealers.

Included in the 18 models are two convertibles, one Pacer series and the other in the Citation, plus a full line of two and four-door sedans and hardtops and a line of five station wagons.

### 1,068 Dwellings Built in Township City Since 1950

The city and township of Plymouth have together added 1,068 dwelling units since 1950, according to a report released yesterday by the Metropolitan Area Regional Planning Commission.

Plymouth township has shown a gain of 48.6 per cent in dwelling units since 1950, the report said, while the city of Plymouth has gained 26.7 per cent.

The report shows that in 1950 there were 1,090 occupied dwelling units in the township. Now there are 1,620, or an increase of 530.

The city had 2,012 units in 1950 and now has 2,550, or a gain of 538. The combined increase of the city and township is 1,068.

Wayne Out-County continues to lead Detroit in the per cent of increase, although Detroit gained the most numerically. Garden City, adding 6,171 units, showed the most growth with an increase of 264 per cent. Redford township grew 218 per cent, Allen Park 197 per cent, Livonia, 171 per cent.

Canton township's dwelling units increased from 1,051 in 1950 to 1,400 (45 per cent); Northville township, from 586 to 830 (41.6 per cent); Northville city, 895 to 1,000 (11.7 per cent); Salem township, 431 to 590 (36 per cent); Superior township, 1,995 to 1,650 a decrease of 345 units or -17.3 per cent.

Attorney Cutler said that the subdividers did not wish to enter the controversy, so have moved back their subdivision an average of six feet to accommodate either line. The legal description of their property, however, is figured from the county's line, not the city's.

Three Northville youths are in University hospital in Ann Arbor today after the car in which they were driving hit a tree on Northville road at 7:58 Monday night.

The driver, Bruce Rose, 21, 199 Meadowbrook and passenger Glen Howarth, 42675 Seven Mile road, are in serious condition. Rose has a fractured collarbone and head injuries. Howarth sustained a head injury.

The second passenger, Richard Alkire, 19790 Fry road is in good condition with a fractured right knee.

Rose's 1951 Studebaker was going South on Northville road at what the Wayne County Sheriff's office termed a "high rate of speed," when it struck a tree on the opposite side of the road in front of the 18405 address.

Commissioner Carl Shear and other commissioners asserted several times during the discussion that there was absolutely nothing the city could do to change the line—that since it is a county road, the county will establish its center line where it wants to. If the road is widened to encroach upon property of the homeowners, commissioners noted, property owners could resort to legal action.

A motion was finally made and approved to have the subdivision approved pending final approval of the county.

## Last of Watchmen Soon to Go

The 7:25 was a little late the other night. It didn't particularly matter though. Erwin (Cappy) Wright, 75, of 28433 Joy Road, is one of the last in a vanishing breed of railroad watchmen and is used to irregular train schedules.

After all, he's been watching them come and go from his chair in front of the shanty at the crossing on Starkweather Avenue for seven years.

"Freights have a hard time keeping on schedule," he said. "You never know when they're going to be loaded and ready to pull out of the yard. But passenger trains keep to a pretty tight time-table. I can set my watch by most of them."

After seven years Cappy is looking forward to the time when there will be automatic gates. This fall to guard the crossing. "When those gates come I'll finally retire," he said happily.

But Cappy thinks the people will have to get accustomed to automatic gates. "For one thing those barricades will come down while the train is still 1,200 feet away. That's going to hold traffic up more. I always used my own judgment and waited until the train is closer than that," he said.

Cappy has the 4 p.m. to midnight shift at the crossing. Elsa Baker, 797 Holbrook, has the 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. vigil while Adams Bush, 774 Starkweather, holds down the watch from midnight to 8 a.m.

During clear summer weather the watchmen can sit in front of their shanty watching for approaching danger. Winter days and nights finds them inside in front of a roaring fire.

According to Cappy things don't get boring during his eight hour tenure. "There's always something to see if you keep your eyes open," he said.

The watchman's job isn't lonely. There's always a lot of friends

## Plymouth's New \$19,700 Fire Engine Passes All Tests with Ease

Plymouth's new fire engine arrived in town last week and passed its tests with ease.

Taken to Wilcox Lake last Thursday afternoon, the new American-LaFrance pumper hit a peak of 1,136 gallons per minute although it is rated at 1,000 gallons per minute.

For three hours the motor ran furiously—an hour at 1,050 gallons a minute, an hour at 760 gallons and another hour at 520 gallons. Three hoses were connected to the deluge gun which was tied to the ground and the water was sprayed in an arc for 75 yards across the water.

The water came from an intake hose laid into the lake.

The new truck is almost identical to one purchased two years ago. Fire Chief Robert McAllister said that there are some minor differences and volunteers will start training on the new truck immediately. City hall will be the main base for the new pumper.

It will be another week or two before the new pumper is actually put into operation. It arrived in Detroit by freight from Elmira, N. Y. where it was built from the ground up. An engineer from the Company put it through its tests here.

City taxpayers are taking special interest in the engine because they received a larger yearly tax bill last month due to a special bond issue to finance the truck. A one mill, one

year, issue was approved April 1 and the mill was added to the July tax bill.

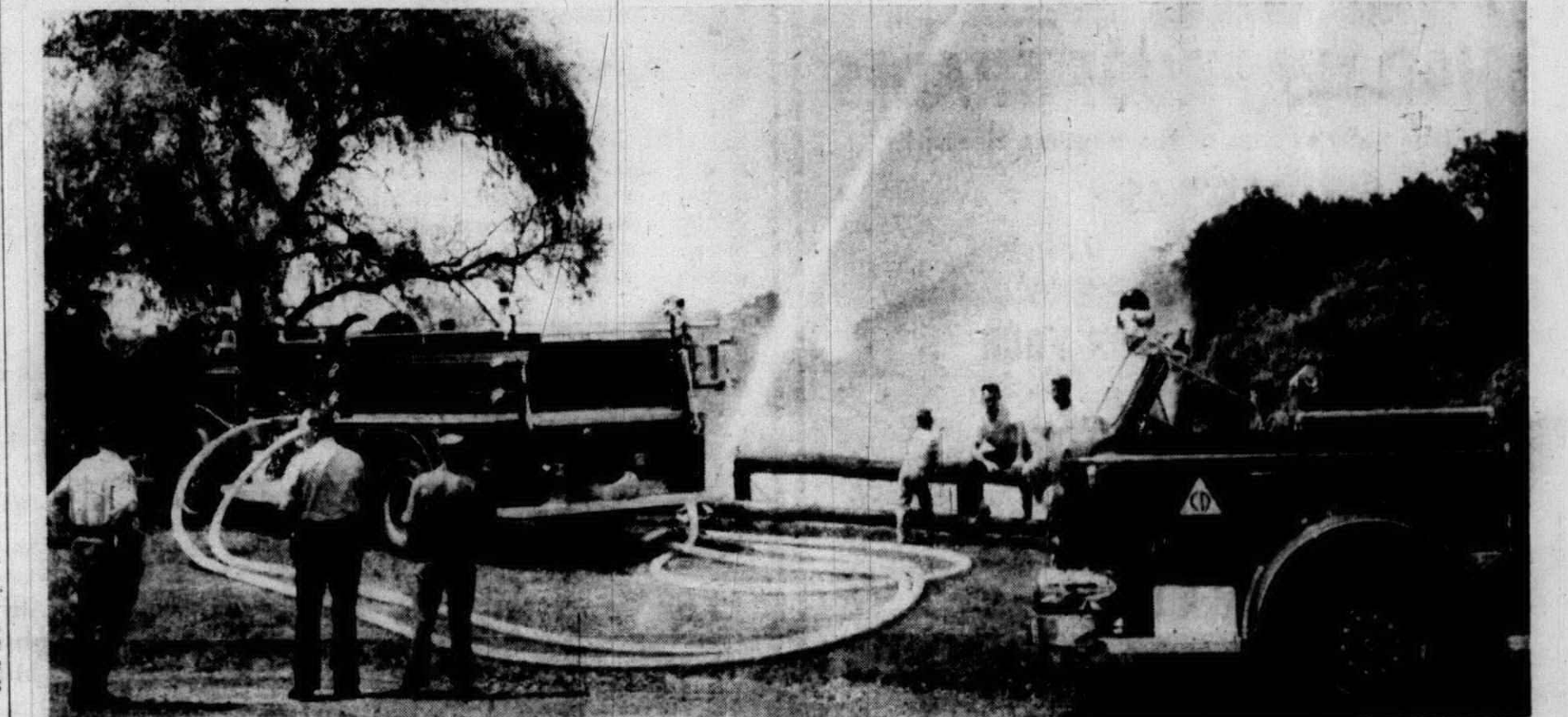
What was the bill for the

truck? City accountant Joseph Near says that the purchase totals \$19,700.

When the new truck is placed

into service, a 1946 Dodge truck loaned by the state will be returned and a 32-year-old American LaFrance will be sold. A bid

of \$250 for the old truck was turned down by the commission last month because they believe it is worth more.

Typographical errors never really amuse those of us in this business, but there was one in the paper last week which has been called to our attention. It requested a woman "to care for a tedious child." Should have been "teen age" child. It's an accepted truth, of course, that the way to induce rain is to have your car washed. John Jamieson, Jr. of Plymouth Gardens, 15405 Lakeside, has stronger feelings than most of us on the subject.



Soon after he had his sparkling red-and-white hardtop washed and parked in the driveway, the quick storm came up here last Saturday afternoon. It rained and the wind blew—not so hard everywhere, but hard enough in Plymouth Gardens to crunch over two trees.

That Red Wing trade is the biggest give-away in hockey since 1946.

The following has appeared in many places and many ways before, but it's always brought me a chuckle, and one of our reporters took the pains to suggest that we print it again to keep our statistical readers in a properly humble spirit.

It is called "Working Too Hard?"

"There aren't as many people actually working as you may have thought. At least not according to a survey included in the Iowa State Daily.

"The population of the country is 160 million, but there are 62 million over 60 years of age, leaving 98 million to do the work. People under 21 total 54 million which leave 44 million to do the work.

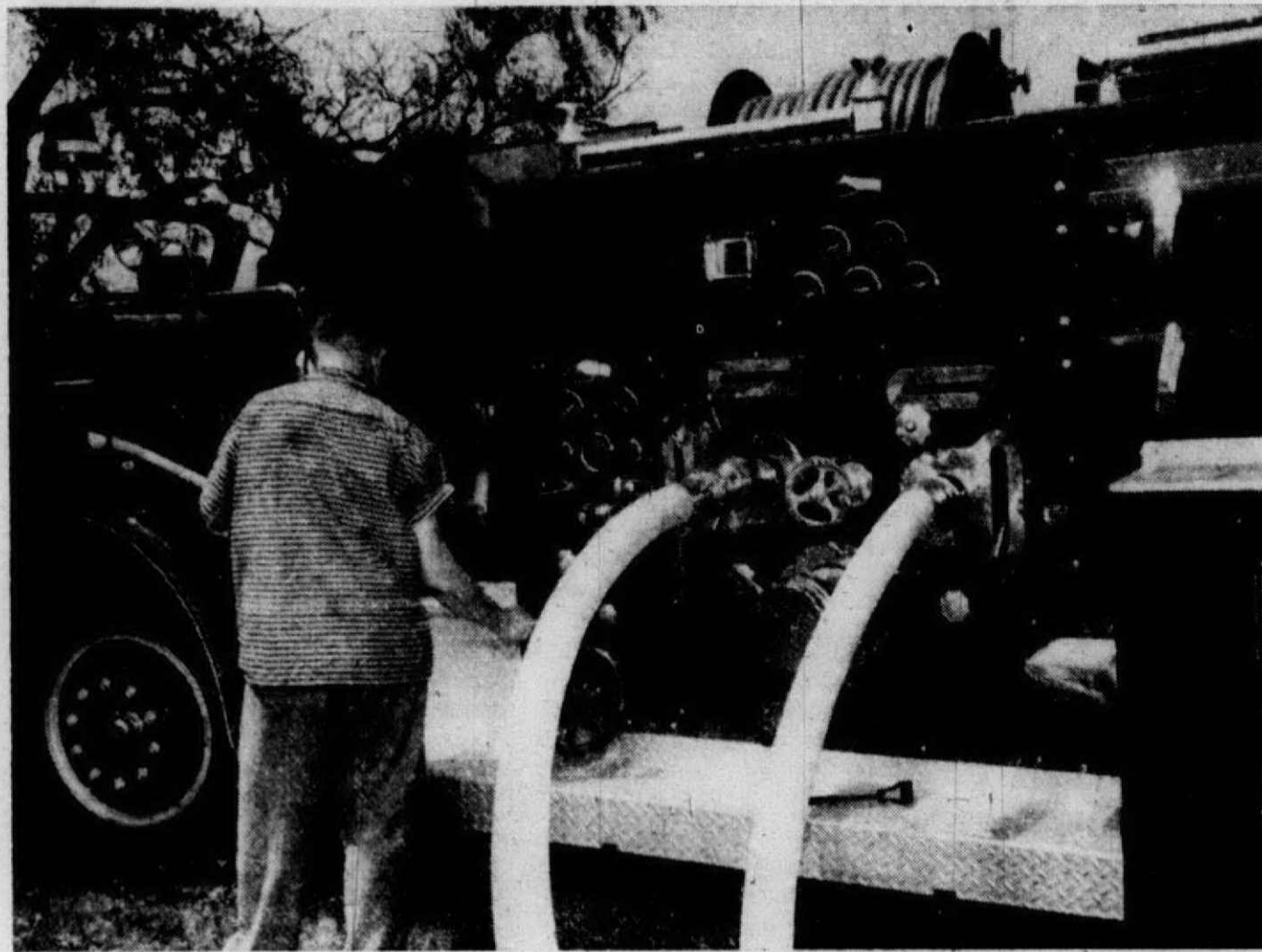
A new cemetery ordinance was recently passed with approval of the cemetery board which sets terms for trustees. Trustees previously serviced until they resigned.

## Plymouth's Business

This week will see the final Plymouth Colony Concert of the season, an endeavor that has certainly added much to the luster of Plymouth's cultural accomplishments. If ever a project offered reason for supporting your local merchant it was this series of concerts. From its very inception, the business men of Plymouth gave their solid support both financially and morally. The Plymouth Colony Concert is not an isolated case. Virtually every civic project has its beginning with a request for support from the local merchants and to our knowledge, any project with merit has yet to have been turned down. Why buy in Plymouth? We think the answer is obvious.

A man whose fortune was founded on nickles and dimes, Sebastian S. Kresge, celebrated his 90th birthday last week. The modern Kresge store in Plymouth with its self-service is a far cry from the store which S. S. Kresge opened on Woodward avenue in Detroit in 1897. At that time the Kresge & Wilson store actually sold nothing for more than a dime. Today, very few items could be purchased at that price, but the "five and dime" name is still in use. There are 603 Kresge stores in the U. S. and 83 in Canada.

The Kroger Company has no such plans as this for Plymouth, but at the Northwood Shopping Center in Royal Oak they are trying out the first multiple produce ever established in the area. Six large vending machines each vend up to 12 items each. They include bread, milk, eggs, hot dogs, soft drinks, coffee, party supplies, cold meats, canned fruit, vegetables, butter and over 50 other items most often in demand on the spur of the moment by customers.

The machines are housed under a lighted canopy and floodlighted on a 24 hour basis, seven days a week. Kroger officials point out that the machines may provide one answer to the current controversy regarding "Sunday openings" which has plagued the grocery industry with consumer demand for service on Sundays.

# 44 New Teachers Join School System

All teachers for the 1957-58 school year have been hired with 44 new instructors joining the staff, Superintendent Russell Isbister said this week.

About half of the 44 will fill teaching jobs vacated last spring while the other half will be new positions created by the addition of more classrooms. There will be 185 professional teachers and administrators in the system as school opens September 3. The first day of classes will be Thursday, September 5.

The superintendent said that there was no trouble finding new teachers this year. He said that Plymouth's salary schedule compares favorably with others in this vicinity, making the local jobs more attractive. Detroit has been having a difficult time filling its vacancies.

A new addition to the staff this year is a full-time psychologist. He is Eugene D. Alexander, a graduate of the University of Connecticut and formerly psychologist with the Wayne County Board of Education. Alexander will work in the Plymouth schools three days a week and in Northville schools the remaining two days, with costs shared proportionately.

Plymouth High School will also get a new basketball coach to replace Charles Ketterer who is transferring to the junior high. The new coach is James Doy, former coach at Grosse Ile High School.

Four of the new teachers have taught in the local school system on previous occasions.

of the city engineer. The subdivision will be required to set up an escrow controlled account for \$127,000 as a bond to assure the city that payment will be made for improvements in the subdivision.

A letter was read from Frank B. Swapka of the Garling Construction Company asking what the results were from the water study made by an Ann Arbor engineering firm. The builder wants water for a proposed subdivision that will be located in both the city and township near Park Drive.

City Manager Albert Glassford said that the study results should be ready within a week or two. Commissioners asked for the study in connection with forming their policy of extending water service into the township.

Acceptance of a bid for a heating unit, a request for refunding a zoning application deposit and presentation of "graduation" certificates to two city officials, were among the shorter items on Monday night's city commission agenda.

Als Heating, with a bid of \$590, was awarded the contract to furnish heating to a new room on city hall. The heating unit will be for a police room that is being placed in the former garage.

James Latture appeared before the commission to ask that a \$25 deposit be refunded to Dr. Edward Reuter who operated a chiropractic office on Church street for several months. Dr. Reuter had deposited the money when asking that his property be re-zoned for professional use.

The zoning commission, Latture said, decided to re-zone other property in the area too. The proposal was rejected when other property owners protested. Dr. Reuter was then told that his use of the property was illegal. He then decided to move away. Latture was told by City Manager Albert Glassford that the \$25 will be refunded.

Certificates were presented to the city manager and to S. L. Besse, city engineer, for completing a Local Planning Administration Course with the International City Managers Association. The course is one of several completed by the two men.

On the afternoon program host Warren Huff will tell about how he manages his 1,000 head a year beef feeding operation and farmers will have a chance to see many interesting features of the farm.

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
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## THE RIDER

You are a calm, cool and collected individual with decision. You have a direct, logical approach to life.

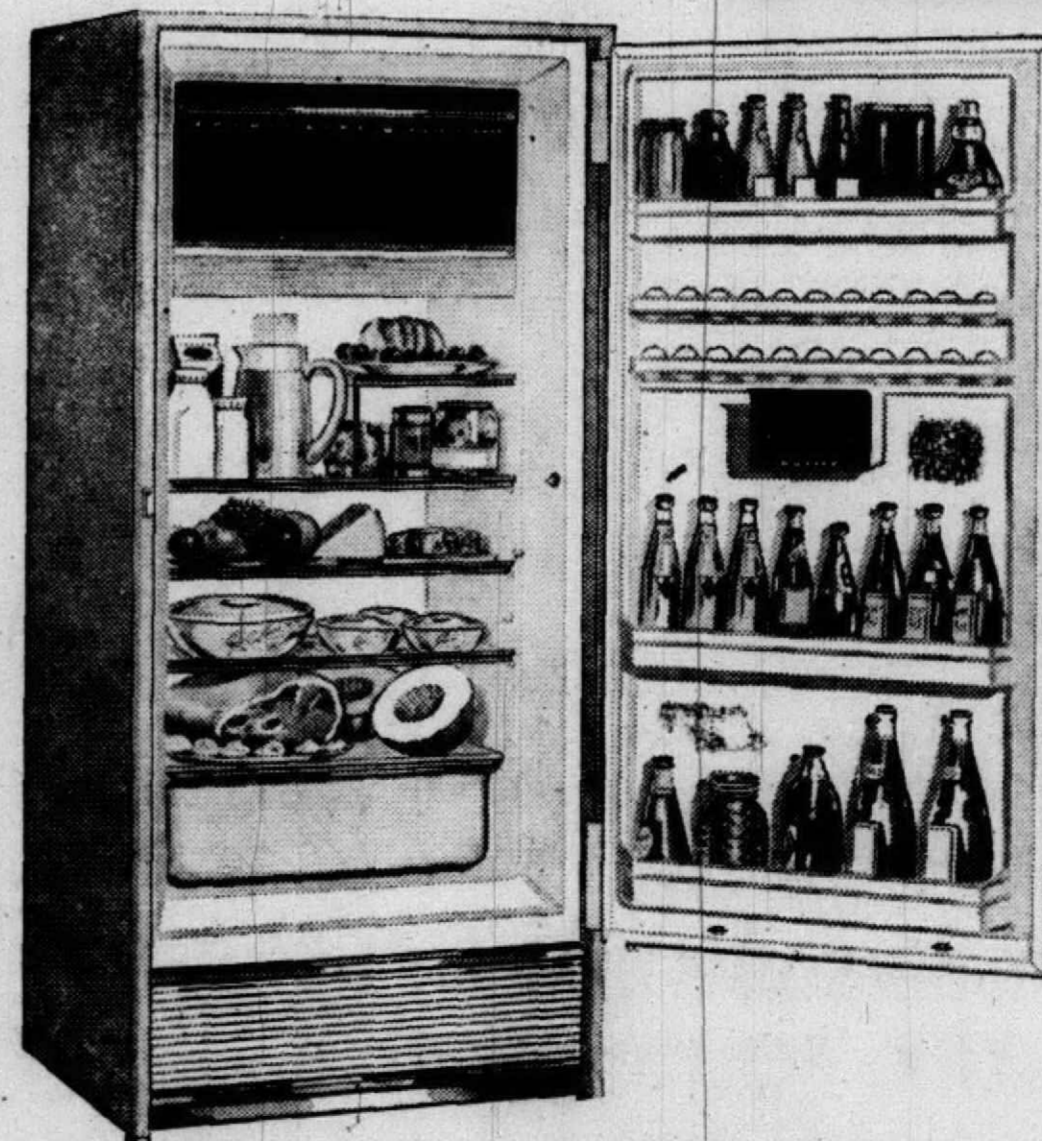

**Demos Have the Tiller**

Democrats are now embarked on their first complete operation of state government for the first time in two generations. Gov. Williams voiced a warning:

"We are on the spot to produce. We wel, come that."

To the top six administrative offices won in 1956, the Democrats added the department of public instruction and the state highway department last spring.

The party celebrated by staging the first spring inauguration ceremonies in Michigan history.

Taking office were Dr. Lynn M. Bartlett, new superintendent of public instruction, Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie, and Chris Magnusson, new member of the state board of education.

Williams spoke of a "mandate of the people," and said the victories at the polls meant that the public wanted Democrats to build their highways and administer the education of their children. It was made plain that major policies and decisions would be made in a position not too far away from the office Democrats have held for almost nine years — that of Williams.

The Democratic take-over in Michigan was a step-by-step progress.

Williams shocked Republicans in 1948 when he handily defeated former Gov. Kim Sigler, bringing in with him his own lieutenant governor John Connolly and Atty. Gen. Steven J. Roth.

Roth and Connolly fell by the wayside two years later, but Williams remained — alone but in a commanding position as chief executive.

Come 1954 and Williams won again with his full fall slate, leaving only the department of public instruction and the highway department still in the hands of Republicans. Last spring, the full sweep was completed.

"Now we've got no one to fight with, except the legislature (still Republican controlled)," said one Democratic chiefstain.

Ladies now can be appointed as officers in the Michigan National Guard. Major Gen. George C. Moran, the state's adjutant-general, asked Atty. Gen. Thomas M. Kavanagh for the legal ruling which resulted in the decision.

Kavanagh went back into the law books and discovered that only "able bodied males" were considered officer materials in the National Guard.

This, he ruled, did not take into account the need for nurses. So, he informed Moran he was perfectly proper in appointing women as officers, so long as they were designated as nurses.

**ARMY WORMS INVADED** central Michigan this year in the worst assault on crops in the past 10 years.

Strangely, they are not under a state control program, though thousands of dollars have been spent to eliminate the gypsy moth, and other insects that threaten to denude farms of crops and foliage.

The experts said the army worms invade in cycles, every three to five years, starting in July, multiplying by millions and attacking grain fields until early in August.

The 1957 invasion was on a line between Muskegon and Bay City, affecting large segments of the Saginaw Valley.

The worst concentration was in the Mt. Pleasant area where communities were asked to get together to finance an aerial spray program proven effective in other parts of the country.

One state official said the invasions normally follow mild winters after which the foliage and the stemmed crops—wheat, oats and barley—develop and mature early.

**Big Month for Shooting Stars**

**ANN ARBOR** — The outstanding "heavenly" display during August will be the annual Perseid meteor shower, reports a University of Michigan astronomer.

Hazel M. Losh, U-M associate professor of astronomy, says the Perseids, popularly referred to as "shooting stars," will be visible for two or three weeks but will reach their peak around the nights of Aug. 10 and 11.

"Meteors may be seen darting across the night skies of August at a higher rate than at any other time of year," Professor Losh points out. "Often from fifty to seventy per hour may be observed."

The astronomer notes one drawback of this year's display: "Unfortunately, there will be a full moon on Aug. 10, which will materially reduce the number of 'shooting stars' visible, especially the fainter ones. In spite of this, however, one should expect to see many of these streaks of light flitting here and there."

"Although the meteors may be seen in any direction," she says, "their paths, when traced back, seem to intersect in the northeast where the constellation Perseus will be rising around 10 p.m. This accounts for the name given to this annual shower."

The determining of the date of this display is the time of year that the Earth, in its orbit around the Sun, encounters this swarm. The professor explains that these pieces of iron and stone become visible only when they enter the Earth's atmosphere. "Coming in at very high speeds, they are checked, and the resulting friction sets them burning, with most of them being consumed in their plunge," she comments.

Professor Losh suggests that the best time to look for the "shooting stars" is just after midnight.

Other astronomical highlights for August include numerous observable planets. Locating the four visible planets during the month, Miss Losh says: "Saturn will continue a conspicuous object

in the southwestern sky during the evening hours; Jupiter may be seen above the west point of the horizon, setting from one to two hours after the Sun; Venus, much brighter than Jupiter, will also shine in the western twilight; and during the week of August 13, Mercury should be observable, for on that date this cunning and elusive planet will reach its greatest angular distance from the Sun, and should be detected above the west point of the horizon, about four degrees to the right of Venus."

**Here's Way State Got It's Nickname**

Ever wonder how Michigan got nicknamed the Wolverine State? Says Professor William H. Burt, curator of mammals at The University of Michigan, "The fur trade was big business in the early days of Michigan. Detroit became a center from which not only Michigan furs but also those from adjoining areas to the west and north were shipped east."

"Michigan probably became known as the Wolverine state because of the great number of wolverine skins in these shipments. Most of the wolverines probably came from the northern Great Lakes area but they were assembled in Detroit, and the men who received them in the East had no way of knowing where the animals were caught," says Professor Burt.

The University professor describes the wolverine as having massive and powerful limbs and feet. The general color, he says, is dark brown, paler on the cheeks and head, and two broad yellowish stripes extend from the shoulder region back along the sides and meet above the base of the bushy tail. The weight of females is about 22 pounds; that of males, about 30.

Did the wolverine ever live in Michigan? According to Professor Burt, "The animal was probably formerly present in most of the state, but is now extinct. There is no Michigan-born specimen in any museum."

Professor Burt points out that there is some written evidence indicating that the animal once lived in Michigan. "In the margin of a map of the state of Michigan, published by Ensign, Bridgman, and Fanning in New York, and entered according to Act of Congress in the year 1855, is a list of animals occurring in the state, which includes the wolverine."

"I don't know who prepared the statement," he says, "but the other animals mentioned, 23 in all, are either here at the present time, or were authentically recorded previously. Supplemented by trappers' reports, this suffices to put the wolverine in the early fauna of Michigan."

"But the only hope of establishing an actual record for the state is to find a wolverine skull," says the wildlife expert. "Here's a tip on how to identify it. Says Burt, 'In an unbroken skull the lower jaw is

so firmly hinged to the cranium that it can not be removed."

**New Expressway Portion Opened Near Ann Arbor**

Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie announced today the State Highway Department next Tuesday will open to traffic 7.2 miles of new expressway on US-23 from the Huron river bridge at Ann Arbor's north end to within about one-half mile of the village of Whitmore Lake.

Some 3½ miles of additional new roadways remain under construction from that point around the west side of the village and northerly to a junction with present US-23 near the Grand Trunk railroad tracks north of the Washtenaw - Livingston county line.

Cost of the new bridge over the Huron river and nearby railroad tracks and its approaches, removal of the old US-23 bridge nearby, also the 5.3 miles of new divided roadways, plus structures at the US-12 relocation near Ann Arbor and at Territorial road, amounted to \$3,174,168.26.

The 4.5 mile contract for new dual roadways north of Territorial road, and 0.9 of a mile of single roadway to form half of a divided section of roadway directly north of new dual roadways, plus grade separations at the Ann Arbor railroad in Whitmore Lake and at Barker road west of the village, will total \$2,084,401.74.

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**Wall Provision in Building Code Used By City Has Been Modernized**

The nationally-recognized building code on which Plymouth models its building regulations has been modernized to permit the use of non-combustible curtain wall construction, a key advance in building technology. The Building Officials Conference of America (B.O.C.A.) recently amended its Basic Building Code to permit the use of non-combustible curtain wall panels when the wall is 30 feet or more from a common property line or adjacent structure. The code had allowed most lightweight panel construction, but required a minimum three-quarter hour fire-resistive rating. The B.O.C.A. voting membership includes municipal officials

who administer or formulate laws governing the construction of buildings. The new amendment has been forwarded to the 258 municipalities that subscribe to the code or have modeled their building regulations on it. Each city now must consider adoption of the amended regulation, according to Paul E. Baseler, B.O.C.A. executive secretary. The three other national building code bodies have a non-combustible wall construction provision that is similar to the B.O.C.A.'s.

The curtain wall is so-called because it literally hangs from, or is supported by, the structure of the building. With the strength, durability, and ease of fabrication of today's structural framework, which carries the entire weight of the building and its contents, bulky masonry walls no longer are required to shoulder the load. Lightweight panels perform the true function of exterior walls—to keep out the weather and prevent the spread of fire. At the same time they provide new materials with which the architect can design buildings that are both beautiful and functional.

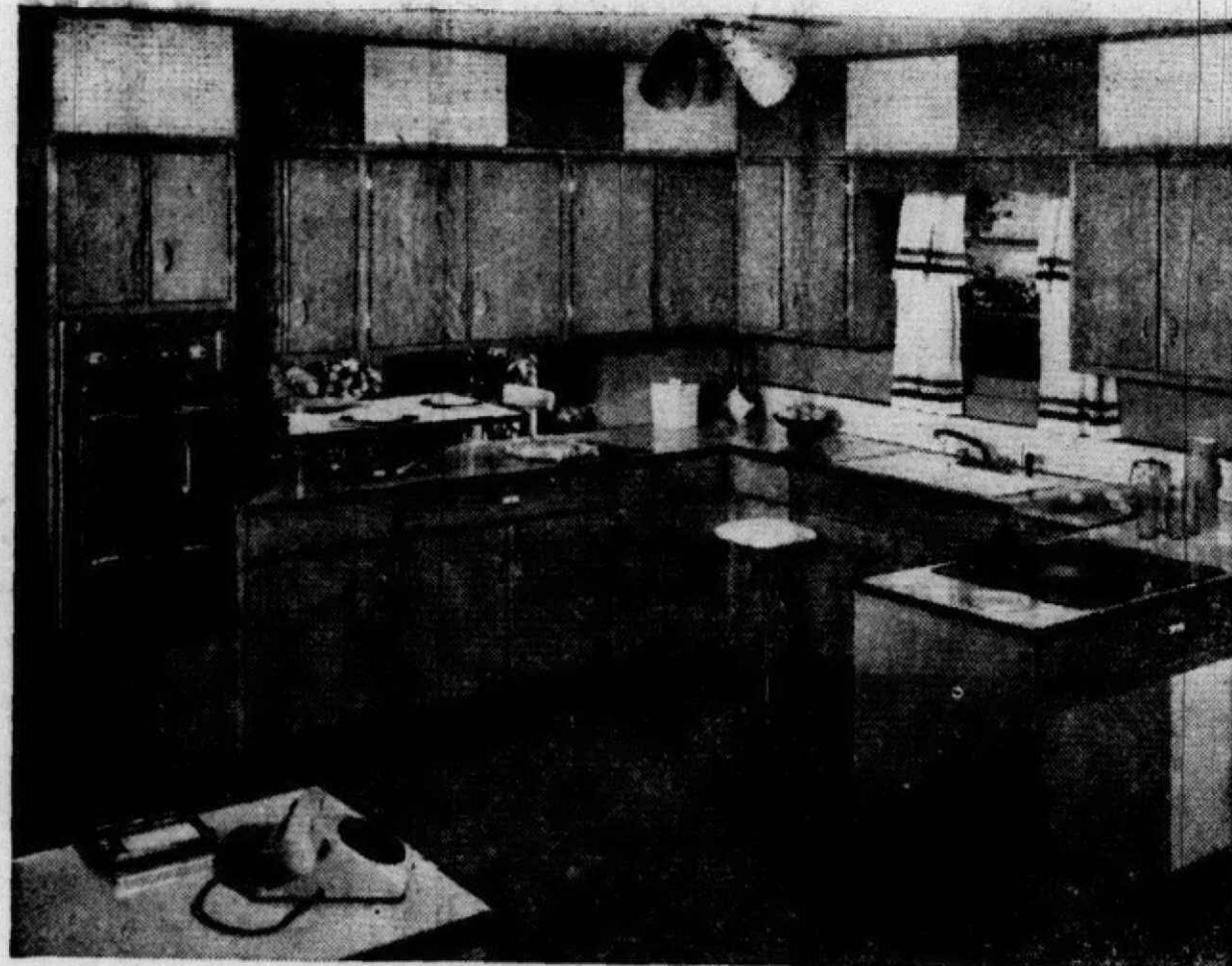
The curtain wall technique was developed in Chicago in the 1880's, but only recently has it been widely adopted as an effective synthesis of aesthetics and technology. Steel curtain wall panels, for example, combine strength with beauty, lightness with durability, and low upkeep with high construction speed. The trend today is to curtain walls in the construction of office and apartment buildings, and schools, hotels, churches and auditoriums, and for the future probably nearly all other types of buildings.

Some of the advantages of panel construction have been offset by building regulations requiring more fire resistance than is necessary for safety to life and property. The B.O.C.A. Code now permits its non-combustible wall panels when the wall's proximity to the adjacent structure is 30 feet or more.

Non-combustible curtain wall construction provides structure savings through reduction of load, permits earlier occupancy, reduces maintenance costs, and provides more square feet of usable floor space. A reduction of six inches in the thickness of the wall in a 100-foot by 200-foot building 20 stories high, renting at \$8 per foot per year, creates an increase in rentable floor space representing an additional income of \$36,000 per year. Rapid enclosure of the building with thin, lightweight panels permits most of the interior work by other trades to be carried out more speedily, with full protection from the weather.

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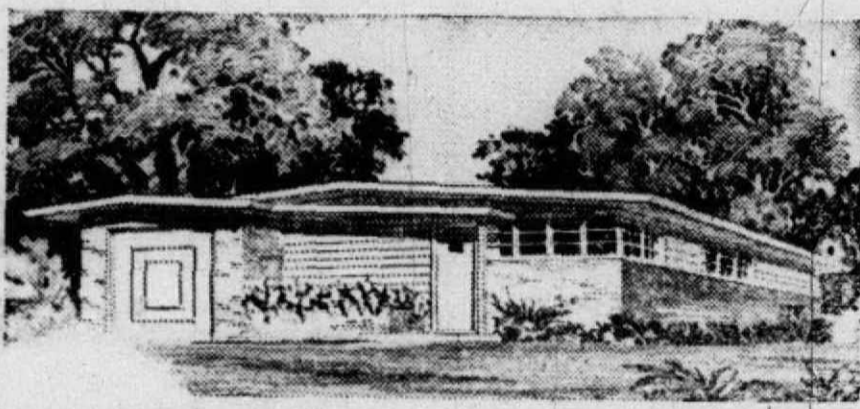
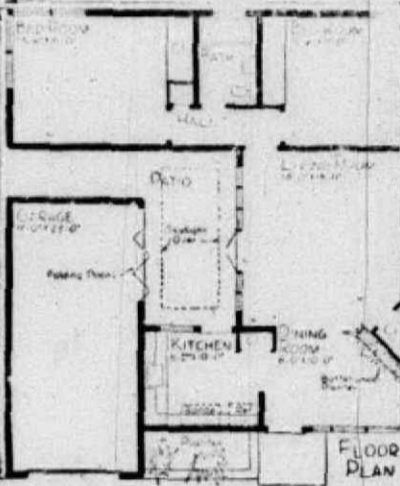
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**Handy Jim's FIXIN-UP TIPS For Farm and Home**

**Lawn Seed Time Good in August**

If you are planning to seed a lawn, August is the time to do it according to C. M. Harrison of the farm crops department of Michigan State University. The usual dry weather of August helps in weed control and makes the soil easier to prepare. The grade should be sloped away from the house and the top soil should be spread and disked in during the first two weeks of August.

A high nitrogen fertilizer such as 12-6-6, 10-6-4 or 10-10-10 should be applied at 15-25 lbs. per 1,000 sq. ft. and then the seed bed should be finished out smooth. One to two pounds of seed will cover 1,000 sq. ft. Aug. 15 to Sept. 1 is the best time, just before the fall rains. Harrison says bluegrass is well adapted for the open sunny areas on fertile loams and clays. On the shady areas or sandy low fertility soils, red fescue is the better grass. Combinations of the two on a 50-50 basis is effective on mixed soils or areas with spots of shade. Harrison suggests the seed be allowed to germinate and start growing before water is applied but after it is started the seedlings should not be allowed to wilt.

Later seeding does not allow enough growth and winter killing will result. The good grasses take more time to establish but a little patience will produce the finer lawn. Put a little luminous paint around the keyhole and the electric light switches to save fumbling in the dark.

Any kind of tree may be hit, but the tallest are the most vulnerable. Frequent victims are tulip, oak, elm and maple trees. Isolated trees on high ground, trees with deep roots in moist soil and trees with thick, soggy bark are especially susceptible to lightning strikes. None is immune.

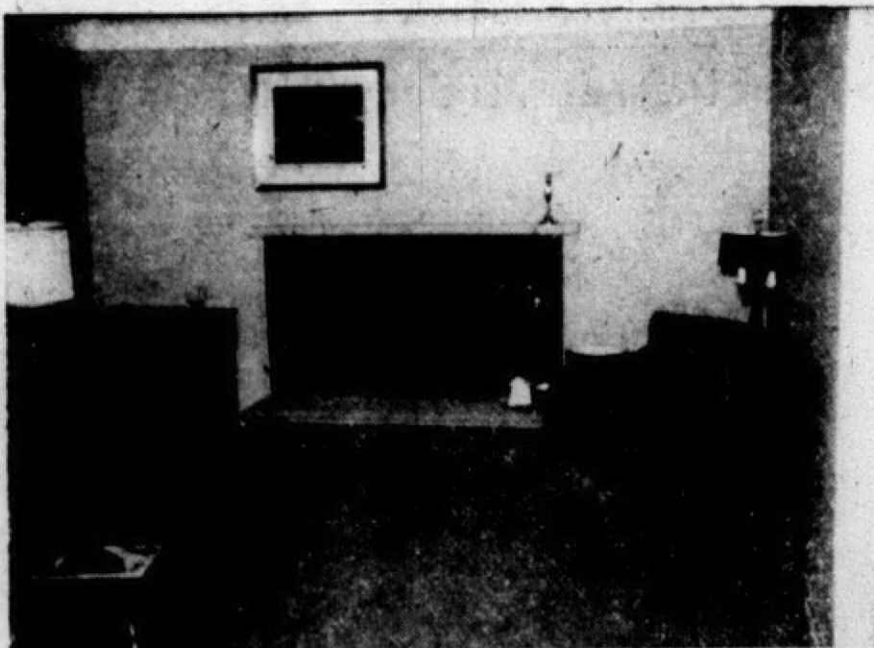
The new Arbor Village development which is holding its grand opening this week is one that will add much to the appearance of Plymouth and Plymouth Township.

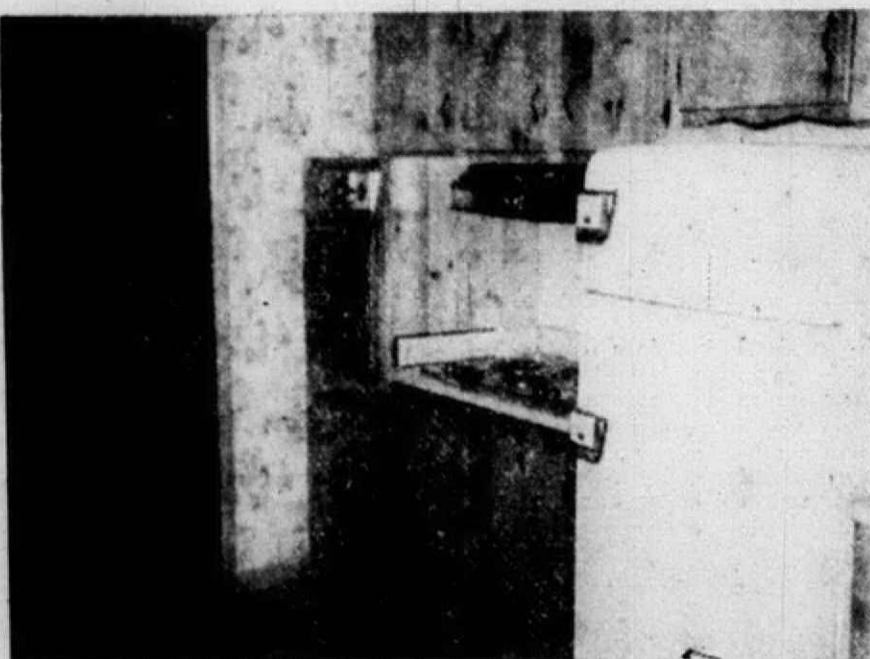

Arbor Village is located on Ann Arbor Road just West of Haggerty and the model is open for inspection daily.



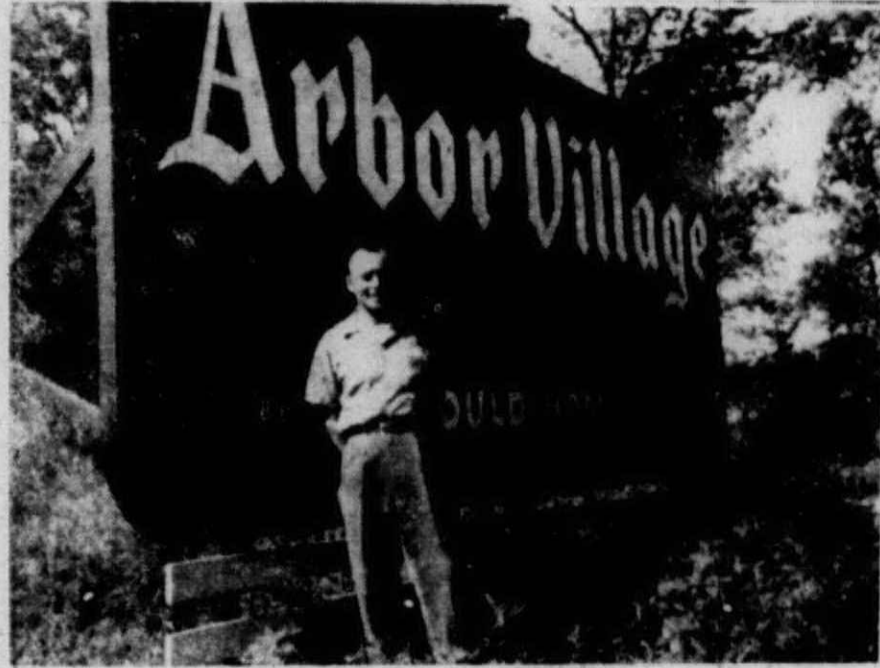
The spacious living room features a brick fireplace with ledge. Furnishings are by King Furniture.



The kitchen is equipped with built-in range and oven, fluorescent fixture, hood and vent fan above the range.

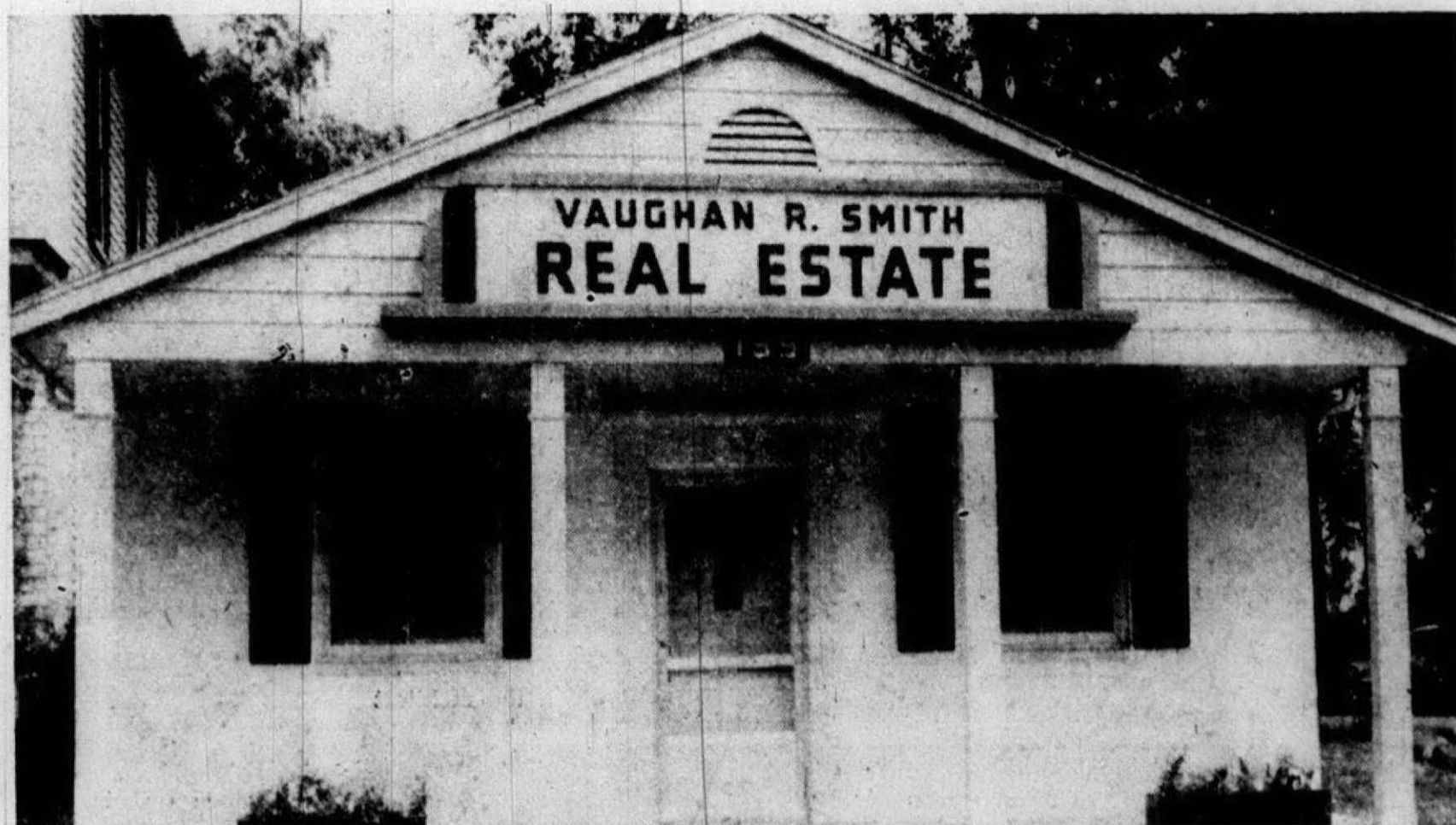


The panelled den of mahogany is an attractive feature of the Arbor Village model.

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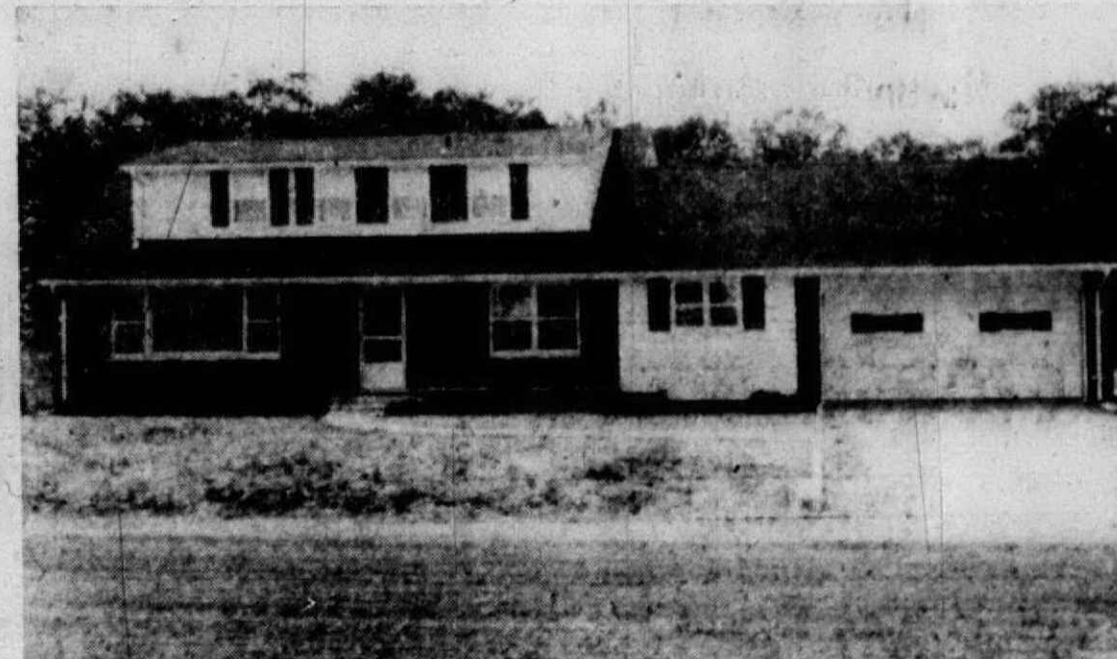
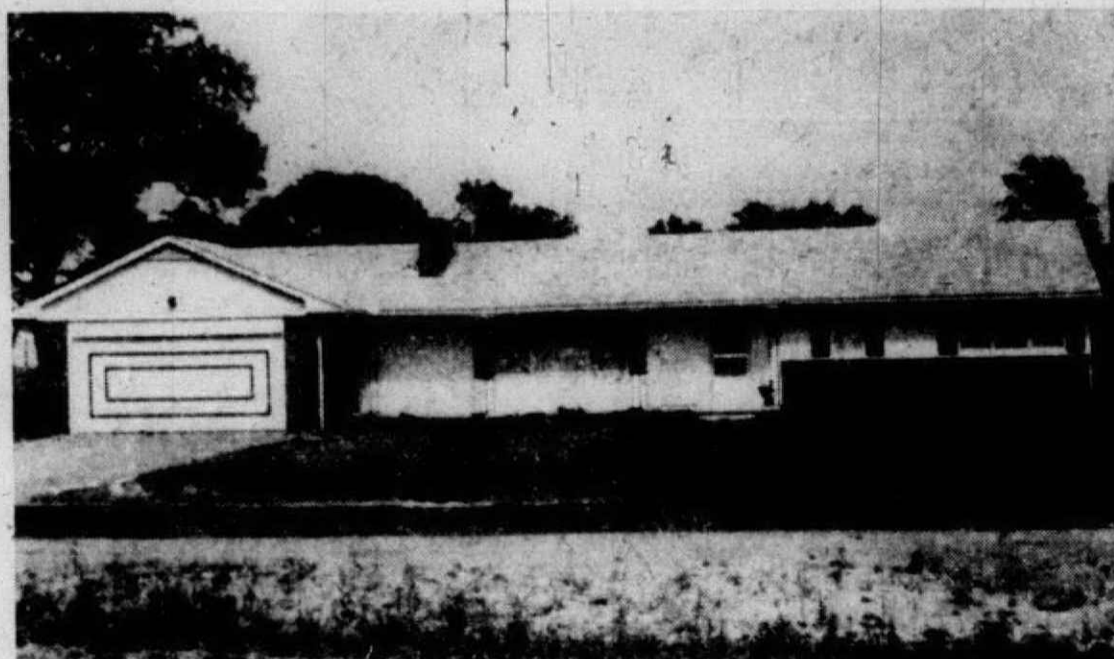
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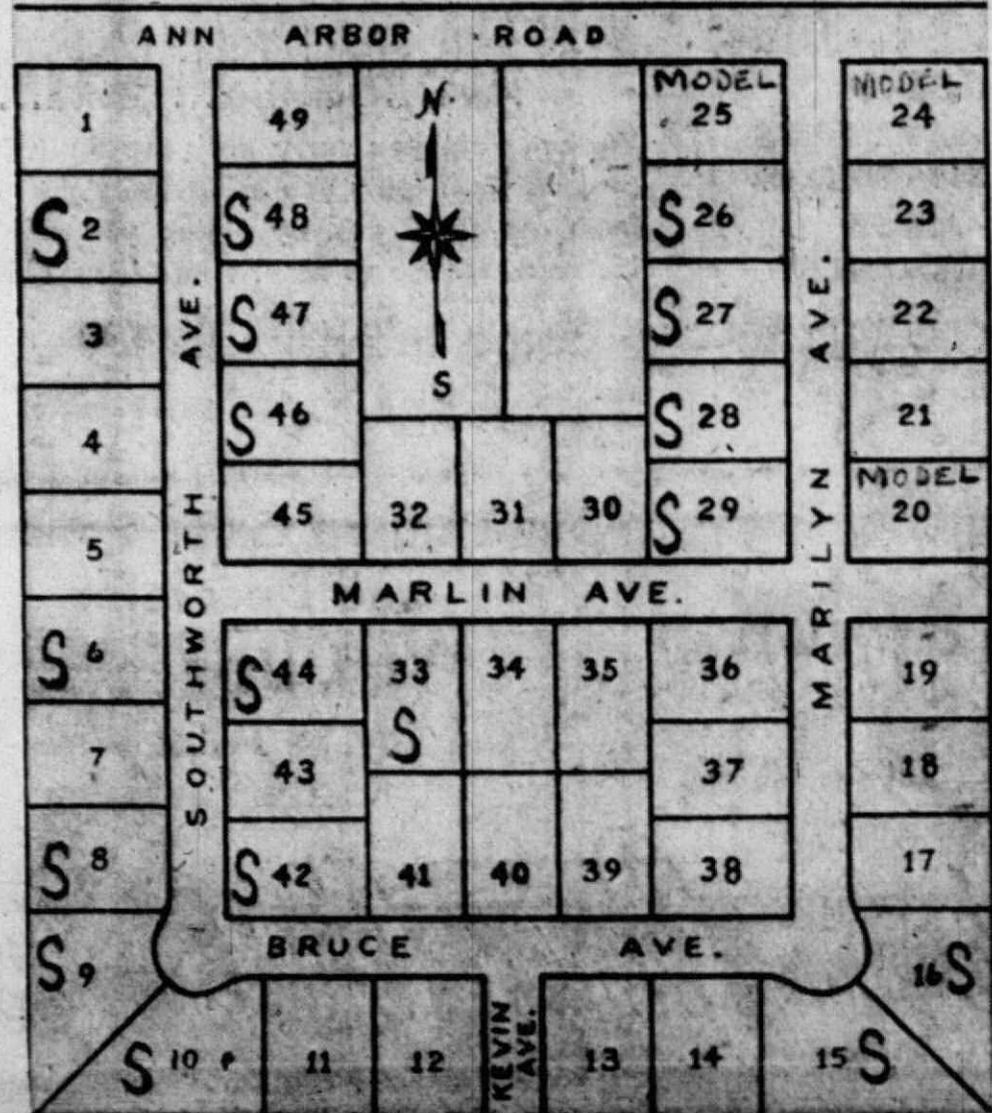
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1 package blackberry-flavored gelatin  
1 cup hot or boiling water  
1 cup cold water  
1/2 cup heavy cream whipped  
Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Stir in cold water. Measure 1 cup of the gelatin and set aside in a separate bowl. Chill both portions of gelatin until thick but not set. Set one of the bowls in a bowl of ice and beat the gelatin until it is light and foamy. Pile the whipped gelatin and the thickened gelatin into parfait glasses in alternate layers, ending with the thickened mixture. Chill until firm, about 1 hour. Just before serving, top each glass with a spoonful of whipped cream. Makes 5 servings.

A cool dessert served in a tall, sparkling glass and topped with a drift of whipped cream spells a parfait to most of us. "Parfait" literally means perfect, and a better adjective has yet to be found to describe this sophisticated confection.

A brand new ingredient in parfaits this season is blackberry-flavored gelatin. The flavor is temptingly tart and fresh, lending itself perfectly to your luncheon and dinner menus as well as to the occasion of an afternoon or late evening refreshment. Here's the simple recipe for you to try when you introduce blackberry gelatin parfaits to your family.

## Tailored or Dressy - - Adapt Fabric to Pattern

Anyone who has been in a fabric store recently knows the endless variety of fabrics being displayed. You can select sheer patterned chiffon, brocade, lace, embroidered organdies, colorful cotton prints, satins and gingham - just to mention a few. Pattern books and catalogues show an equally wide variety of designs which can be combined with these fabrics.

In order to use both the dress pattern and the fabric to the best advantage, it is important to know how they influence each other. The finished effect of the garment depends on several things: the shape of the pattern pieces, the grainline placement, and the fabric used to support the lines and shapes of the pattern. Your selection determines whether the garment will hang in straight lines, flare away from the body or whether it appears crisp, soft or bulky. You may

prefer to select the pattern first and coordinate the fabric with it. Other times you may do the reverse. As you select a pattern, you will note two basic groups or types: the tailored and the dressy.

Tailored garments mean those with details that can be sharply pressed. For example, a design with patch or set-in pockets, slim or pleated skirt, crisp collar or cuffs, tabs, flaps and top stitching. This excludes designs with drapery, gathers, ruffles or other soft details. You will find many patterns for coats, suits, sportswear and children's clothes in this group, as well as one and two piece dresses. The most suitable fabrics for this group are hard finish worsteds, rayon and wool suiting, cotton tweed and other firm cottons and almost all linens. Pleats, bound buttonholes, and similar finishes are especially effective when these fabrics are used.

The dressy type garment has softer details which are not pressed sharply. Some examples are designs with drapery gathering, fullness such as shirring and unpressed pleats, tucks, cowl necklines and bias folds. Softer fabric which falls into folds when draped over your arm should be used. Especially suitable are silks, soft wools such as flannel, crepes, wool jersey, chiffon, georgette, voile and velvet or satin.

### Apricot Towers

1/2 tablespoon gelatin  
1 tablespoon cold water  
1 cup apricot pulp  
1/4 teaspoon almond extract  
1 cup cream, whipped  
Vanilla wafers.

Sprinkle gelatin on cold water and dissolve over boiling water. Add to the apricot pulp. Chill. Fold in the whipped cream and almond extract. Put a spoonful of the apricot mixture on each wafer and spread evenly. Stack 3 or 4 wafers one on top of the other for each serving. Chill several hours. Serve with whipped cream.

### "Fruit Drink Hints"

In making large quantities of fruit drink, it is always better to prepare a syrup. Just dissolve sugar in heated water or fruit juice to cover. Cool before adding to the mixture. Use your imagination as a guide in blending fruit juices because the combinations of fruit juices are almost unlimited. But, when you do combine two or more juices, it is best to have one predominating flavor. All ingredients should be well blended. A little salt improves the flavor. A final suggestion for zesty, refreshing fruit drinks is to serve all fruit drinks thoroughly chilled.

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## Well Chosen Carpet Reflects Character and Needs of a Room

A rug or carpet on the floors of your home make it attractive, cozy and livable. But your floor covering will only do its job if it is chosen correctly. The activities to take place in the room and the persons using it are as important as choosing a carpet that will blend with the color scheme and furniture styling in the room.

A rug or carpet on the floors of your home make it attractive, cozy and livable. But, your floor covering will only do its job if it is chosen to meet the needs of the room it is in.

This takes wise planning and buying, tells Jessie Marion, home furnishing specialist at Michigan State University. Consider these points in making your floor covering plan: the size of the room, traffic, style of furniture, lighting, color and pattern balance.

In a small room, wall-to-wall carpet in a solid color and simple design or texture, gives a feeling of spaciousness. Patterned, tone-on-tone or carved effects on carpet look best in a big room. If you use a rug, the edges should be not more than eight inches from the wall in a small room and twelve inches in a large room.

### Immediate Ironing For Rayons, Acetates

"Iron rayons and acetates immediately after washing, if possible," advises Lola Belle Green, extension specialist in clothing at Michigan State University.

Laws requiring that the label must state whether the fabric is rayon, acetate or a blend of these, have made it much easier to know how to care for these garments.

The two are washed similarly. Both should be washed before they get too dirty; the colored garments should be separate from the white ones (in both washing and drying); they should not be allowed to soak because rayon fibers weaken when wet; and they should be rinsed in water which is the same temperature as the wash water.

Bleaching is not necessary; rayon is a naturally white fiber. To dry, roll the garment in a turkish towel and knead out the moisture. However, do not leave the garment in the towel because colored, especially printed, fabrics tend to streak.

If the fabric is all acetate, only a warm iron is needed; a high temperature will melt and fuse the material. The garment should be evenly damp and ironed on the wrong side with very little pressure. Iron the material smooth, but don't try to dry it. After ironing, hang on a hanger in an open space; the steam left in the fabric will smooth out the wrinkles as it dries.

All rayon materials can be treated the same way except that the temperature of the iron should be somewhat higher than that used on acetate.

If the material is a blend of the two, follow the ironing directions for acetate, Miss Green advises.

Where there is a great deal of traffic, such as in living rooms, stairways and rooms used as passageways, choose good quality carpet that wears well, is crush-resistant and resists soil.

Choose the carpet that expresses the character of your furniture, whether it be traditional, modern or casual. Your carpet can coordinate all furnishings and reflect the personality of the room.

Lighting comes into the picture when you plan your floor covering. Miss Marion says a sunny room calls for cool color in carpets such as gray or green. For a north exposure or a dark room, you might select gold or rose.

Your carpet may well be the dominant color in your room since the floor is the largest usable area and the background for all furnishings. Then wall, draperies and upholstery may be of harmonizing or contrasting colors.

Miss Marion suggests that if you choose a definite pattern in your carpet, draperies and wall-paper should be in solid colors or a simple design. A bright carpet is mated with soft colors, while a neutral rug looks attractive with gay draperies.

In case you're wondering just what kind of material your carpet should be made of to do the right job for your needs, Miss Marion lists some of the qualities of the rug fabrics now on the market. Wool is very durable, springy, crush resistant, warm and colorfast.

Cotton gives a serviceable, colorful washable rug at moderate prices. The pile crushes, but can be raised by using a vacuum cleaner or carpet sweeper.

Carpet rayon has brought glamorous color and luxurious softness to rugs in the medium price range. Their compact construction gives good service, tells Miss Marion.

Nylon makes beautiful, long-wearing carpets and rugs that resist crushing. It is spot resistant and easily cleaned.

Saran is very resilient and crush-resistant. It resists spotting and can be cleaned with soap and water. Many spots can just be wiped from a Saran carpet.

4 eggs

Heat milk in double boiler. Add salt and corn meal. Stir constantly and cook 10 to 15 minutes, or until thickened. Cool slightly. Beat eggs and add to mixture. Pour mixture into a well-greased 2-quart baking dish, and place sausage links on top. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 40 to 45 minutes. Yield: 4 servings.

## Chicken, Vegetable Salad

2 tablespoons gelatin  
1/4 cup cold water  
2 cups hot chicken soup  
2 hard boiled eggs, sliced  
1/4 cup stuffed olives, sliced  
1/4 cup sliced chicken  
1/2 cup cooked peas  
1/2 cup cooked diced carrots  
1/2 cup cooked string beans  
1 cup mayonnaise

Soak gelatin in the cold water and dissolve in the hot soup. Cool. Place the sliced eggs and olives in the bottom of a mold and cover with a thin layer of the gelatin mixture. Chill. When firm arrange a layer of the chicken and cover with more of the gelatin mixture. Chill. When firm arrange a layer of the vegetables and cover with the remaining gelatin. Chill until firm. Unmold, slice and serve on crisp lettuce with mayonnaise.

Fred DeLano, general manager of the Detroit Pistons professional basketball team, was in town last Friday to speak to the Rotary Club and appeared quite optimistic about the welcome that Detroiters will give the new sport.

After watching the pro game of the week on television throughout the past four winters, there will probably be many Plymouthmouthites who will attend some of the 28 home games at Olympia this season.

As sports fans recall, the Pistons' franchise was moved from Ft. Wayne to Detroit about four weeks ago. Detroit will be in the Western Division of the National Basketball Association with St. Louis, Cincinnati (formerly Rochester) and Minneapolis. 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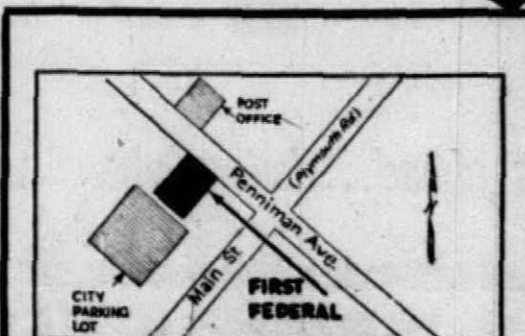

Q.—"Dear Elinor: I have had a crush on a boy for three years, but I can't seem to get him to like me. I am 14 and puzzled because I can't seem to get him or forget him. What should I do?"

Ans.—Change your attitude! It's natural to want to date the boy you admire, but you'll be more likely to rate a date with him if you put that boy-catching gleam out of your eye and think of getting better acquainted with him as a person and as a friend . . . instead of how to "get" him as a date.

A boy can sense these things sometimes (just as you can) and can tell when a girl "wants a date" and might get the idea that you're chasing him. But if you can get to know him and talk to him enough to let him know that you like and admire him as a person . . . then he'll probably want to date you.

If you know him well enough, have you tried inviting him to a party or a dance? Have you invited him to your home with another couple he knows for a TV evening, games or cards, record-playing or dancing and a snack? Or a picnic or a swimming party? (Most boys like "outdoor" dates and it's easy to get acquainted while you're swimming or toasting marshmallows at an open fire.

Perhaps you can find out what his tastes are—dancing, swimming, bridge, etc.—and invite him to do it with you in a group. Better still, get a friend to include him in a party, group or double-date. Afterward, it's up to him to do the date-making.

Girls aren't the only ones who are shy during dates. Here's a boy who has the same problem.

Ans.—Take it easy! Just keep on dating her and having fun without worrying about shyness, and some Saturday night you'll pop the "going steady" question before you realize it or have time to be bashful. Meanwhile you know that she likes you and she knows that you like her . . . or you wouldn't have been trying to get "for a long time." Probably you two are actually "going steady" without ever mentioning it.

It's easier for some shy people to talk on the telephone. If you can't do it any other way, perhaps you can ask her while you're talking with her on the telephone . . . It's not the most romantic way, but she'd rather you would do it by telephone than not at all!

Don't worry and don't try to rush, and you'll be able to ask her when the right moment comes. It's better to be a little slow about it than to start "going steady" too soon and worry about how you can get out of a date-deal you no longer want.

perhaps one more year of high school and if your parents and grandparents consent, you could consider staying and finishing school with your class and continue dating this girl—that is, if you two believe it's the "real thing" and you plan to be married eventually.

But if you're in the early or mid-teens, your first consideration is for your parents.

They have invested 14, 15 or 16 years in you and it would probably hurt them deeply if you made a big fuss about leaving them for the sake of a girl who might change her mind about you at any moment. She might decide to date somebody else and you might too, although you don't think so now. Then you'd be sorry that you left your parents and a normal family life, rearranging your entire life for the sake of this girl.

The things you're thinking of giving up—parents, family home, etc.—are the permanent elements of your life. If you're under 18, it's too early to be sure that your feeling for this girl—or hers for you—is lasting.

So go with your parents, have a normal family life, finish your education—and get a part-time job, if necessary, so you can earn money to visit your grandparents often and see the girl. Keep in touch with her in this way, and if it's love, it'll last.

Columbus figured he could sail around the world and reach the Indies. The only thing that kept him from it was that nobody had dug the Panama Canal yet.

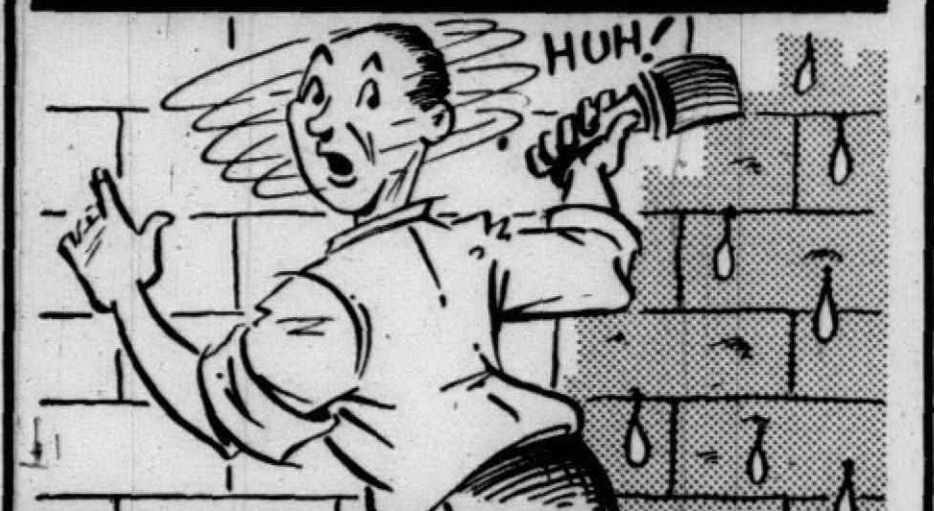

**YOUNG PEOPLE URGED TO "STAY IN SCHOOL"**

"Take the long view and stay in school!" This is the advice being given by the Education and Scholarships Committee of the American Legion Auxiliary to boys and girls of Plymouth who might be considering dropping out of school before completing high school or going to work instead of to college. The Auxiliary is co-operating in a national "Stay in school" campaign being sponsored by the United States Department of Labor; Health, Education and Welfare; and Defense.

Others appointed by Robert Miller, president of the Airlines Terminal Corporation, are: Judge Hicks Griffiths, Detroit, retired jurist and flying enthusiast; H. J. McLaurin, Detroit, private plane owner and insurance executive; William P. Joy, member, Detroit Aviation Commission, former member, State Aeronautics Commission; Donald S. Military and civil movements bring the total to 560 a day. Twelve airline carriers use the facilities. The yearly payroll for Detroit-Willow Run's 2,500 employees is more than \$10,000,000.

**The CITY**

**MANAGER'S CORNER**

BY AL GLASSFORD

Our police department is quite cramped for space. The chief's office serves as a conference room, assembly room for officers, hallway and ventilation passage for the rear portion of the building. The City Commission allocated \$2,000 in the new budget to revamp the garage section attached to the city hall into an office for the chief, together with dark room and storage room. Work is progressing.

The opening of the old garage doors has been closed in and a new door and windows installed. We have taken bids for running heat into the area. Probably all the money that will remain of the \$2,000 is enough to install a plywood floor for this year and some lighting fixtures. The plastering and floor tile may have to wait. This will be a big improvement, however, in order to give the chief a private office for his conferences and confidential records.

Our new fire engine arrived in Detroit on July 29th via boxcar and was delivered August 1. Chief McAllister came back from his vacation to help unload the vehicle. American-LaFrance Corporation sent an engineer to unload the engine and put it into service. The new engine will be stationed at the City Hall.

The testing of a new fire engine, before acceptance by the city, requires about three hours. During this time, a great deal of ceremony takes place. Fire chiefs from nearby communities arrive to congratulate the city and the fire chief upon the fine new arrival. Acquaintances are renewed, and chit chat about fire departments ensues. Gallons of coffee and lemonade are prepared by the firemen for their "guests". The salesman is busy demonstrating the features of the machine, while the service engineer charts the various tests required by the Michigan Inspection Bureau.

Upon conclusion of the testing, the chief announces, "She's all ours." The Manager replies, "Yes, we've got the bill."

In the D.P.W., Joe Bida has evolved a new system for painting the lines for the cross walks and curbs. Instead of using the machine to travel along the pavement, he finds it is very much easier to keep the painting machine on the pickup truck and to use the air brush attachment. Then using templates to make the markings, a much neater job is done.

We also are trying out 2 kinds of paint, one from a local paint store, the other through the Municipal Purchasing Service operated by the Michigan Municipal League. We will keep record of the costs and keep track of the wearing time to determine which, in the long run, is the cheaper to use.

The D.P.W. is also busily engaged in removing dead, dangerous trees and in trimming some of the branches obviously needing care. While Charles Thompson was on vacation, Cameron Lodge, Sr. substituted for him in making electrical and building inspections. This was a reciprocal arrangement with Novi Township, when Mr. Lodge was on vacation. By such cooperation, both communities had continuous inspection service.
