

# Township Asks Detroit Water Tap

Livonia councilmen to allow Plymouth to hook up its water system to a Detroit water source was postponed Monday night as councilmen turned to their attorney to come up with an opinion on whether the supply could be turned off during emergencies.

Plymouth Township Supervisor Roy Lindsay made the request two months ago. If the water is granted, he declared, it will be an auxiliary supply to the present township system.

The request asks for tapping into the Livonia water system on Schoolcraft at Eckles Rd. The flow would be 500 gallons a minute, only during off-peak periods.

Livonia has no water source of its own, but instead buys its water from the Detroit Water Department.

According to Supervisor Lindsay, the Detroit Water Department officials are in favor of extending the water to Plymouth Township and it appears that so are most Livonia councilmen and their water consulting engineers.

But councilmen decided to table further action Monday night while their legal department came up with an answer to one question.

One of the terms of the resolution states that the Livonia Water Department will have full control of the shut-off valve on the main going into the township, with the right to close the valve during peak demand periods on the Livonia system.

The question was raised if it is legally possible to shut off water when the lives, health and safety of people depending upon the water are at stake.

Supervisor Lindsay said yesterday that despite the legal snag, he is optimistic

Santa's trip here has again been arranged by the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce. Plymouth officially opened its Christmas season last Thursday night with the turning on of the lights in Kellogg Park. It was also the first of the night-opening hours for stores.

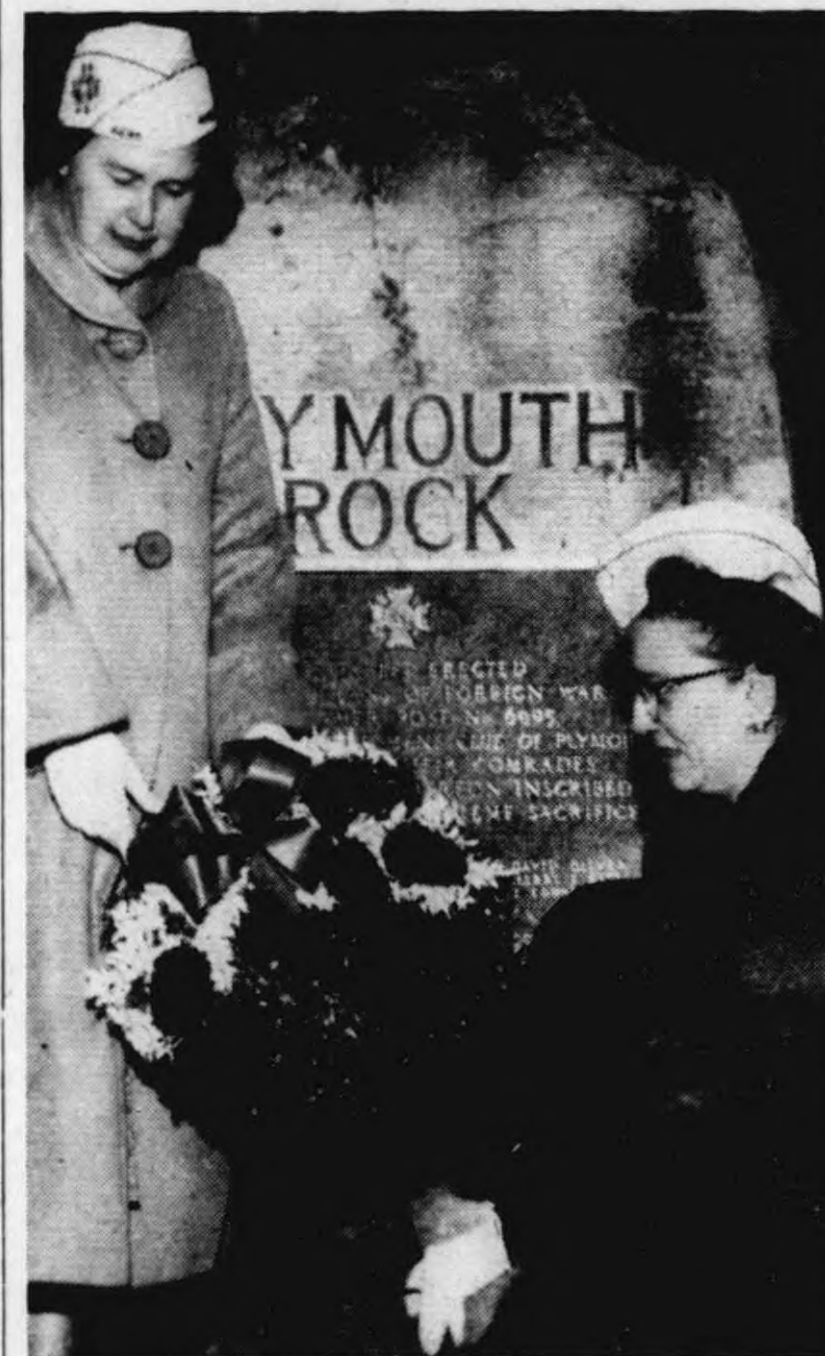

## Airman Dies on Road

Military funeral services will take place Thursday morning at Rock Island (Ill.) National Cemetery for Jeffrey A. Yeoman, 20-year-old Plymouth serviceman who was struck and killed by a car as he hitchhiked on the Indiana toll road Sunday.

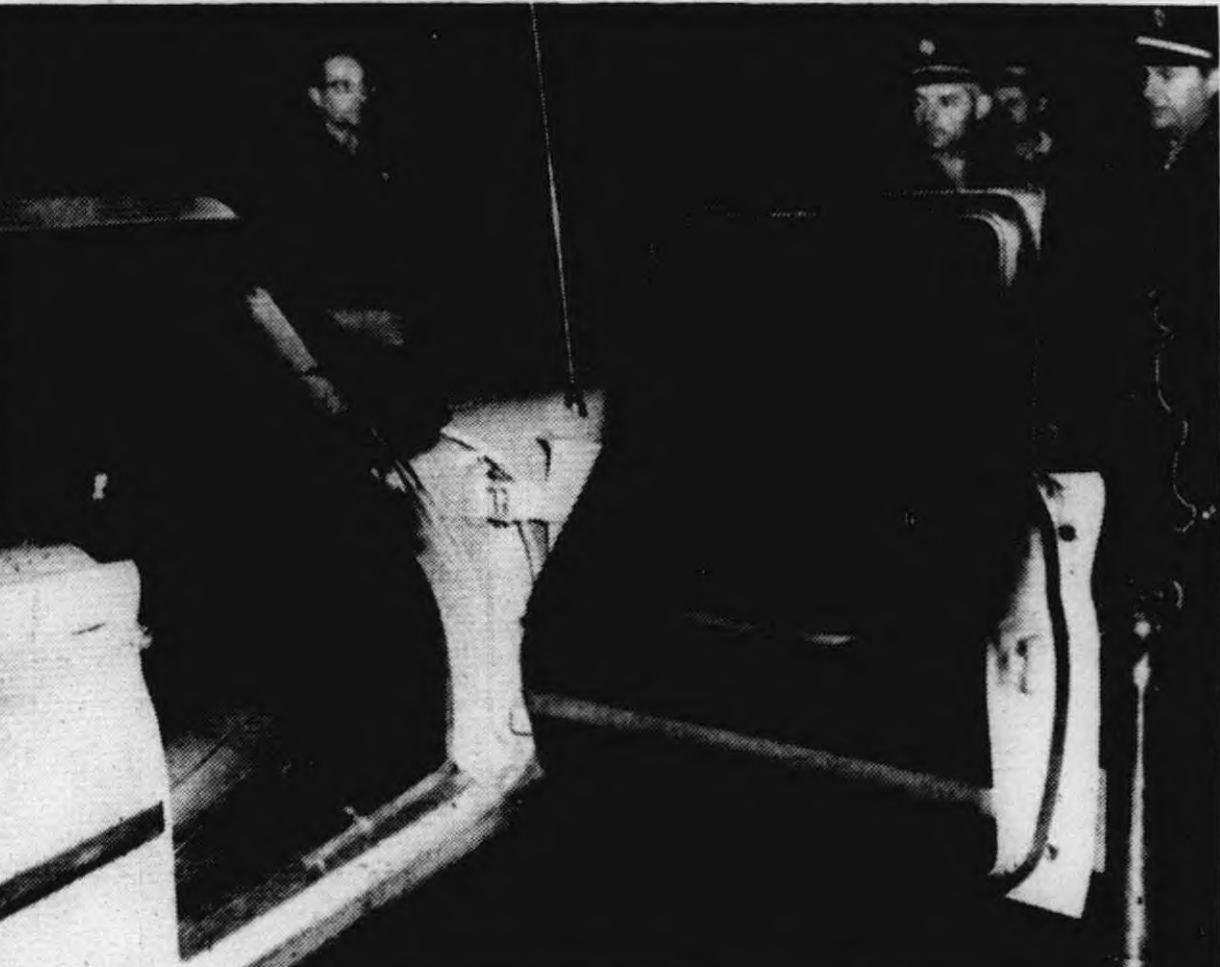
Jeffrey, who was an airman second class and stationed at Chanute Air Force Base in Illinois, was hitchhiking back to the base after a weekend at home. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Alex J. Yeoman, 14269 Minehart Dr., Plymouth Township.

According to reports from Indiana, Jeffrey was hitchhiking on the turnpike when he was struck by a car driven by Joseph Schlomer, 19, of Flint. Schlomer stopped his car and crossed the road to aid the Plymouth youth.

Another car swerved to avoid the scene of the accident, but was hit from the rear by a semi-trailer truck driven by George Baker of Janesville, Wis. The truck continued down the road and ran over both Yeoman and Schlomer, killing them.

Mr. and Mrs. Yeoman left Tuesday morning for Illinois to attend services. Jeffrey was born in Detroit Nov. 13, 1939. Surviving with his parents is one sister, Mrs. Janice Salow, Stockbridge, Mich.

The youth was a graduate from Plymouth High School in 1958 and enlisted in the Air Force.

## Phones Firemen Himself

A 16-year-old Plymouth boy who has admitted setting four cars on fire last week by throwing lighter fluid on the seats, has been temporarily released to his parents pending the outcome of psychiatric tests.

He was picked up at his home last Saturday night shortly after phoning firemen that another fire had been set.

The youth, whose name was not released because he was a juvenile, set two of the fires in cars parked in the East Central Parking Lot, another on Union St. and the other on Church St. near Adams.

The first fire was set in a 1957 Rambler last Tuesday night. The youth put the fire out himself and burned his hands slightly in the process. He entered the Plymouth Mail shop and inquired if the owner was working there. Employees checked the car and didn't recognize it. They advised the boy to report the fire at city hall and he did. The car belonged to Harvey Griffen, 38270 W. Warren Rd.

It was the next night when Assistant Police Chief Loren Johnson, while patrolling the East Central lot, noticed another car on fire. This one was a 1960 Chrysler owned by Roman Micalace, 2540 Hathaway, Livonia. Firemen extinguished this blaze. The interior was heavily damaged by fire and smoke and the windshield cracked from the heat.

Police and firemen noticed the youth who reported the first fire was also on the scene Wednesday night.

Police kept a close watch on the parking lot the rest of the week.

At 9:45 p.m. Saturday, Fireman Donald Moore received a call at the station saying that another fire had been set, but the caller would not say where. Moore tried to keep the caller on the phone while the call was traced. Both he and a patrolman listening believed it to be the voice of the boy who was suspected.

As police drove to the youth's home, a call came into the fire department reporting the front seat of a car was burning on Church St. This one belonged to (Continued on Page 8)

# Fatal Crash Closes Parochial School

With a tragic two-car collision in Livonia claiming the life of its principal and critically injuring two teachers, Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic school in Plymouth was forced to close its doors this week until replacements are found.

The principal of the parochial school, Mother Superior Mary Victorine, S.S.J., was killed in the head-on collision last Saturday afternoon on Inkster Rd. near Schoolcraft.

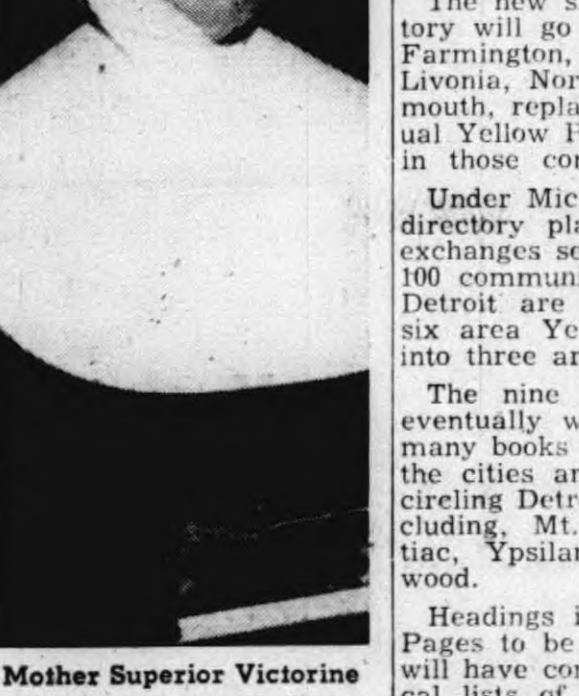
Recovering from their multiple injuries are Sister Madeline Marie, S.S.J., the fifth grade teacher; and Mrs. Joseph Near, the seventh grade teacher. Sister Victorine taught the fourth grade.

Mrs. Near, wife of Plymouth's city clerk, was driving back 46 feet by the impact. Sister Victorine, who struck the windshield, was dead upon arrival at the hospital. A priest from a nearby parish was on the scene and administered last rites of the church before ambulances arrived.

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## Township Re-zoning Request Interests City Neighbors

A large crowd is anticipated next Wednesday night when the Plymouth Township Planning Commission holds a public hearing on re-zoning a corner at Sheldon and N. Territorial Rd. to accommodate a service station.

Three of the intersection's corners are within the city and are all zoned for one-family residential. The southwest corner is in Plymouth Township and has been zoned agricultural.

The Ohio Oil Co. intends to purchase the property for a service station. To do this requires a zoning change to C-2 commercial district.

A petition bearing 80 names opposing the change has been filed at the township hall. Most of the signers and those who will appear at the hearing are city residents. There are only a few township homes in the vicinity. There are 1.07 acres involved.

# How Menotti Hit Upon Idea of 'Amahl'

Editor's Note: Tickets are now on sale for the "Amahl and the Night Visitors," the Christmas opera that will be here Sunday, Dec. 20 with the original television cast. Held in the High School gymnasium starting at 4 p.m., the opera will be accompanied by the Plymouth Symphony.

The popular opera was written in 1951 for NBC by Gian-Carlo Menotti, who here writes he decided upon the opera's theme.

"The Genesis of 'Amahl'"  
By Gian-Carlo Menotti  
This is an opera for children because it tries to recapture my own childhood. You see, when I was a child I lived in Italy, and in Italy we have no Santa Claus. I suppose that Santa Claus is much too busy with American children to be able to handle Italian children as well. Our gifts were brought to us by the Three Kings, instead.

I actually never met the Three Kings — it didn't matter how hard my little brother and I tried to keep awake at night to catch a glimpse of the Three Royal Visitors, we would always fall asleep just before they arrived. But I do remember hearing them. I remember the weird cadence of their song in the dark distance; I remember the brittle sound of the camels' hooves crushing the frozen snow; and I remember the mysterious tinkling of their silver bridles.

My favorite king was King Melchior, because he was the oldest and had a long white beard. My brother's favorite was King Kaspar. He insisted that this king was a little crazy and quite deaf. I don't know why he was so positive about his being deaf. I suspect it was because dear King Kaspar never brought him all the gifts he requested. He was also puzzled by the fact that King Kaspar carried the myrrh, which appeared to him as a rather eccentric gift, for he never quite understood what the word meant.

To these Three Kings I mainly owe the happy Christmas seasons of my childhood and I should have remained very grateful to them. Instead, I came to America and soon forgot all about them, for here at Christmas time one sees so many Santa Clauses scattered all over town. Then there is the big Christmas tree in Rockefeller Plaza, the elaborate toy windows on Fifth Avenue, the one-hundred-voice choir in Grand Central Station, the innumerable Christmas carols on radio and television — and all these things made me forget the three dear old kings of my own childhood.

But in 1951 I found myself in serious difficulty. I had been commissioned by the National Broadcasting Company to write an opera for television, with Christmas as a deadline, and I simply didn't have one idea in my head.

One November afternoon as I was walking rather gloomily through the rooms of the Metropolitan Museum, I chanced to stop in front of the Adoration of the Kings by Hieronymus Bosch, and as I was looking at it, suddenly I heard again, coming from the distant blue hills, the weird song of the Three Kings. I then realized they had come back to me and had brought me a gift.

A colorful procession, complete with a festive tray decorated with a boar's head, will include gaily costumed heralds, chefs and trumpet fanfare.

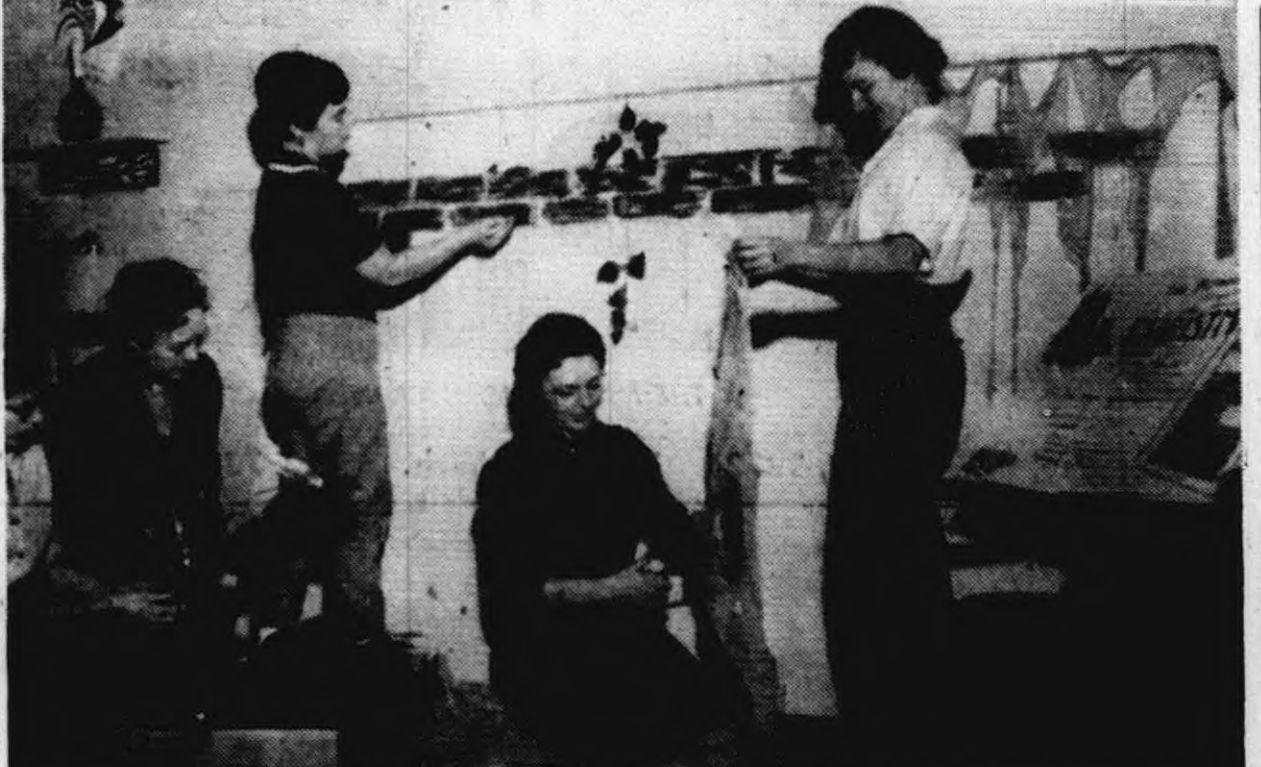
Dr. Henry Walch will be the toastmaster of a program which will include special Christmas music and will feature Rev. Matt Theiss as the principal speaker.

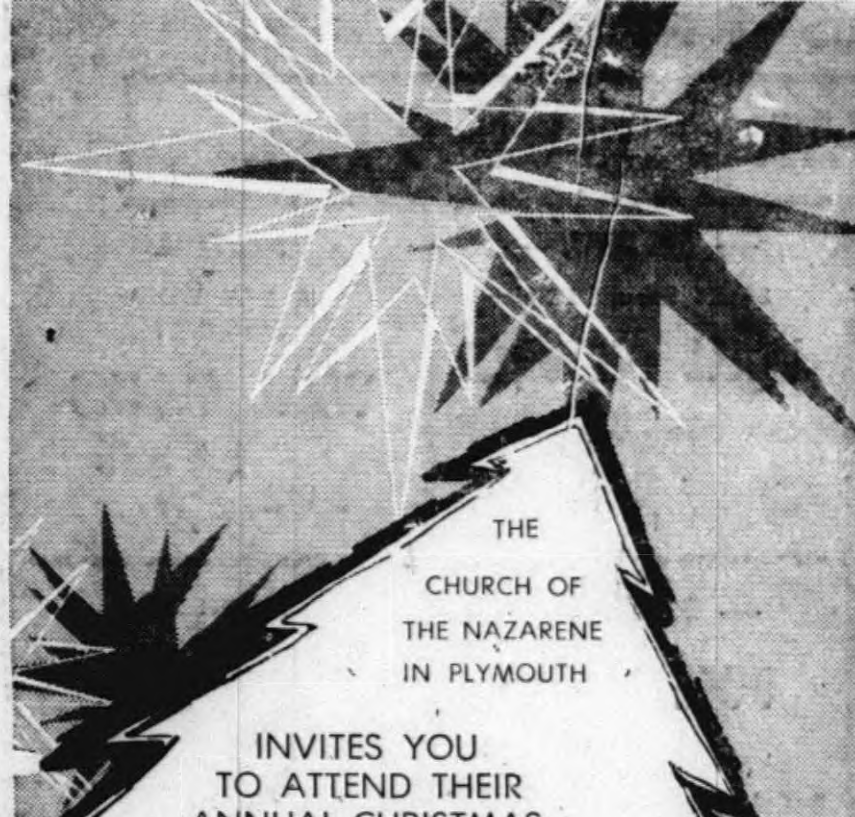

# The Mail Attitude

Unless community action comes quickly, a fierce battle over the question of Sunday store openings is going to be swirling around our ears almost at once.

This newspaper recommends immediate emergency action on the matter by all governing bodies in our area.

Sunday openings, of course, represent an old, tough bone for government. Even the biggest stores have remained opened on the seventh day from time to time.

This, in turn, starts the chain reaction where the competition feels compelled to remain open, too, to "protect itself."

A brand new such "war" has developed among the giant grocery supermarkets during the past few days. Two chains now have stores open on Sunday. A third chain threatens to follow in another two weeks, if the first two persist in Sunday selling. A fourth chain has announced its intention to stay open until midnight Saturday, while still "observing the Sabbath" on Sunday.

And the grocery battle is only the beginning. The department stores, hardware stores, and many others are involved.

There long have been cries from church groups and merchants for regulatory legislation. "We don't like this," insist the retailers, "but we're forced into it to protect ourselves."

The usual objection to "Sunday closing laws" is religious, a matter of principle. Sunday is not observed as the Sabbath by substantial numbers of American citizens. To insist by law that they go along with the majority is to deprive them of fundamental, clearly-stated Constitutional rights.

And, even above that, there is the question whether religion can be made "compulsory" upon anyone who chooses Sunday as a day when he would like to use his property to make a living.

Both ideological points should be honored and defended.

Nonetheless, the brewing storm could become utterly destructive of decent retailing in our area; could result in employes laboring six and seven

days a week without any rest; where everyone involved will become an ultimate loser, including the communities which will appear to respect no Sabbath.

There are pathways around the religious problem.

One which makes a great deal of sense is for local governing units to require all licensed retailers to close their doors "one day each week."

This wouldn't restrict it to Sunday. For those of non-Sunday faiths, the day of closing could be Saturday, or any other day—it would be optional.

Most stores would close on Sunday, which is the objective.

The problem, as we said, is rushing swift upon us.

Fast legislation by our Commissions, Councils and Boards, right now in the midst of pre-Yuletide, would be a decent, lasting Christmas present for the community, would put a brake on cut-throat retail competition, and show that we as people value something else in daily life beyond "making a buck."

It will be recalled that a small majority of voters in Plymouth Township last Spring approved a proposal to incorporate a portion of the Township into the "City of Plymouth Heights."

It also will be recalled that the Yes vote was "sold" by its campaigners mostly on the basis that "the move isn't seriously intended. It's just a device to keep the City from grabbing our land, and to preserve the Township way of life."

It will come as news then, to many of those who voted "yes", that the word throughout the Township now is that the top officials are treating the incorporation matter "seriously," and "intend to go ahead," despite the assurances made at election time.

In this case, to "go ahead" would mean approving a city charter at a future election. A charter was written by a Commission and submitted some time ago to the Governor for approval. When the latter says "OK," it is returned and the charter election then may be held anytime until the Spring of 1961, the deadline being two years after the original incorporation voting.

Only if the charter fails to carry at that next election, does the incorporation project die.

The first news on the charter in many weeks came from Lansing just yesterday.

"Plymouth Heights" charter is being returned to the local Commission for re-writing in several places. It was reviewed by Attorney General Paul Adams and found to have flaws.

One had to do with the powers, duties, disposal of fines and nature of the office of the "justice of the peace" or the "municipal court."

The attorney general also believes the powers granted for regulating gas stations goes beyond the limits of state law. And the official "tax day" should be Dec. 31 instead of Jan. 1.

And a couple of other small matters. None are difficult and can easily be re-phrased.

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### Plymouth Township Proceedings

TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH BOARD PROCEEDINGS OF REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING Held at Township Hall, December 2, 1959

Board members present: Lindsay, Holmes, Miller, Norman and Sparks.

There being a quorum present, the meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Chairman Lindsay.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read by the Clerk and adopted on a motion by Mr. Norman, supported by Mr. Miller.

Mr. Lindsay read a list of bills amounting to \$11,715.91. On a motion by Mr. Sparks, supported by Mr. Norman, a resolution as adopted designating the National Bank of Detroit as the depository for all 1959 tax collections.

A petition by residents of Wilcox and Schoolcraft Roads for water service was discussed and tentatively approved on a motion by Mr. Norman, supported by Mr. Miller.

On a motion by Mr. Norman, a resolution was adopted designating the present water system and the determination by Engineer Hamill of the cost.

On a motion by Mr. Norman, supported by Mr. Sparks, action was deferred on the request by Mr. Lindsay that the Township furnish portable flasher signals for the school crossing at Schoolcraft Road and Huntington Drive, pending arrangements for proper custodianship for this equipment.

On a motion by Mr. Sparks, supported by Mr. Norman, the following conditions clarifying workmanship under Article 1, General Regulations, Section 5 of the State Plumbing Code were adopted:

All sewers installed for NEW BUILDINGS WITH BASEMENTS, shall terminate at least three feet (3') outside the footing line, and shall be properly capped and covered before starting basement excavation.

Traps delivered to these jobs shall have A.L.L. hub openings closed with blind plugs installed with oakum and lead. After the trap has been installed with proper crock to iron connection, the plug in crock hub may be removed, subject to the following conditions:

Install sub-soil drains in basement and connect to trap, or install at least five feet (5') of perforated crock or drain tile encased in pea gravel with end plugged.

Failure to comply with the above conditions will result in an IMMEDIATE stop order.

On a motion by Mr. Sparks, supported by Mr. Norman, it was agreed to support the Wayne County Road Commission on its proposal to require of builders, a bond and permit, prior to the issuance of a building permit, to insure against the cost of repairing damage to pavement, sewers and ditches by the builder and related services during the period of construction.

Mr. Sparks supported a motion by Mr. Norman that the service of Municipal and Contractors Service Co. be accepted to clean 2418 feet of sewer between manholes

2-6 and 7-17 in Lake Pointe Sub-division No. 1 and 2 at a cost of \$480.00.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 9:02 p.m. on a motion by Mr. Miller, supported by Mr. Sparks.

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**Gretzinger Sets Two Records, Swimmers Dunk Lincoln Park**

John McFall's 1959 Plymouth swimming team splashed Lincoln Park last Thursday 73-23, gaining revenge for one of the three losses inflicted in last season's 13-meet schedule.

The Rocks piled up nine first places out of a possible ten and grabbed seven of eight second places.

Saturday they journeyed to Royal Oak Kimball High School for the 17-school Kimball Invitational Relays. They tied for third with 49 points against some of the best schools in the state.

The Rocks will stage their home opener in Plymouth High School at 7 p.m. tomorrow against Bentley in the Suburban Six league opener. Last year Plymouth was unbeaten in 10 league meets.

In the Lincoln Park meet, pool and team records were set by Dick Gretzinger in the 100 yard butterfly and 200 events. Gretzinger churned the 100 yards in 1:00.5 and the 200 in 2:26.3.

Other Rocks who placed first in their events were: Art Helm, 50-yard freestyle in 26.2; Ron Daley, 200 yard freestyle in 29.8; Al Davies 100 yard backstroke in 1:05.2; Don Williams, 100 yard breaststroke in 1:14.1 and Art Helm, 100 yard freestyle in 56.1.

Williams, Soth, Toll and Carney hustled the 200 yard medley in 1:57 to win that relay and Izett, Rossou, Gould and Smith gained victory in the 200 yard freestyle relay by breaking the wire in 1:52.4.

Nick Herrick placed second for Plymouth in Diving, posting a 54.3. Other seconds were scored by: Doug Bal-four, 50 yard freestyle; Beau Toll, 100 yard butterfly; Robert Daley, 200 yard freestyle; Dick Michaels, 100 yard backstroke; Art Carney, 100 yard freestyle and Robert Daley in the 200 yard individual medley.

In the Invitational at Royal Oak, Grosse Pointe was first with 75 points, Birmingham second with 72 and Plymouth and Royal Oak Kimball tied for third with 49 points each. Plymouth scored three seconds (400 yard medley relay, 200 backstroke, 200 butterfly relay), two-thirds (400 freestyle relay and 200 medley relay) and one-fifth (200 yard freestyle relay).

Other schools in the invitational that Plymouth will face later in the year included Dearborn, Dearborn Fordson and Redford Union. Dearborn Fordson scored 19 points, Dearborn got 18 and Redford Union only six.

Plymouth set a record in the 400 yard medley relay preliminaries at the meet in 4:12.1, chopping the old record of 4:22.5 by over 10 seconds.

In the finals Plymouth repeated its record, but Birmingham, which had turned in a 4:14.3 in the preliminaries powered home in 4:11.8 to set still another record.

Swimming this event for Plymouth were Allan Davies, Don Williams, Dick Gretzinger and Jim Carney.

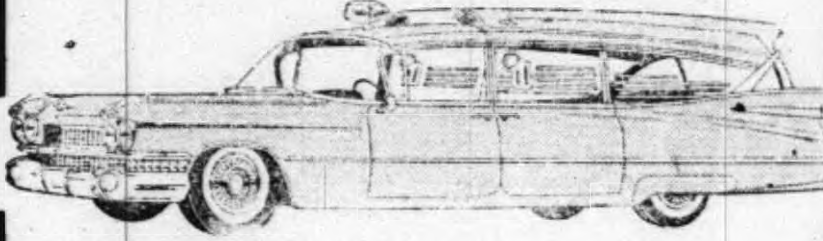

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## Wild Northville Win Added to Ypsi Victory

Plymouth High School's 1959 basketball team moves into the Bentley High School Gym Friday evening with two victories bulging proudly under its belt. One was a smooth opening performance against Ypsilanti 45-35 and the other a wild, ragged melee in the home opener against Northville, 44-41, which was decided in the final 47 seconds.

Rock Guard Dave Mynatt fired a field goal with 47 seconds left to give Plymouth a 42-40 lead. Northville Captain Wade Deal closed the margin by sinking one of two foul shots with only 30 seconds left to make it 42-41. But with 16 seconds left Plymouth's Don Argo added two foul shots to make it 44-41.

Captain Randy Egloff led the Rock scoring with 22 points on eight field goals and six free throws. The burly Rock star kept Plymouth in the game during the first half by scoring 15 of Plymouth's 20 points. Northville led at halftime 23-20.

At the beginning of the fourth quarter the three point Northville lead was still intact 30-27, but rarely has a period anywhere started as ominously as the fourth quarter for Northville.

Northville forward Gary Morgan grabbed the tip-off and raced unopposed to sink a basket—at the Plymouth end of the court. A wild discussion ensued with Northville Coach Dutch Vaningen objecting to the basket being allowed to Plymouth, because the teams had lined up wrong.

The basket was allowed, however, for Plymouth and the Rocks later pushed ahead with four minutes left on two baskets by Egloff.

Coach Jim Doyle contrasted the performance against Northville with the previous night's effort against Ypsilanti. "We played twice as well against Ypsi," Doyle said, but added, "They kept their heads against Northville and that made the difference."

Plymouth also had to come from behind at Ypsilanti. The Rocks trailed 17-12 at the first quarter and 21-20 at the half.

They pushed in 14 points in the third period to Ypsi's seven to go into the final period with a six point 34-28 lead. They increased that margin to 10 points by the end of the game.

Egloff led the scoring at Ypsi with six field goals and two free throws for 14 points. Close behind were Jim Thompson and Don Argo. Argo connected on six field goals for 12 points, while Thompson contributed four goals and two free throws for 10 points.

The essential purpose of the game of basketball is to put an inflated sphere through a raised hoop at one end of the court which is normally defended by an opposing team.

Doubtless Northville player Gary Morgan understands that concept a little better today. When Gary dribbled full speed toward the wrong basket with the fourth quarter tip-off hardly anyone was aware of what was happening.

The players had lined up wrong with the score 30-27 in favor of Northville. The ball was still spinning through the net when Plymouth Coach Jim Doyle was on his feet, making sure that officials noted that the ball had gone through the goal Plymouth was trying to shoot at.

A whistle stopped the action and the officials allowed the goal. The reaction on the Northville bench was not the kind of restraint conducive to peace. Coach Dutch Vaningen led a shouting session that served to define the issue, but was not persuasive.

In conversation after the game officials looked for a rule to cover the situation. About the closest thing applicable, one official mumbled, was a statement that after the ball is airborne from the officials hand, it is too late to call any foul for activity taking place before said moment. In other words too late to change the line-up.

The officials pointed out that at the start of the game and the half they had explained to each team which goal it was to aim at. After that, they felt, the players were on their own.

One observer felt, however, that it may have been the officials' responsibility to see that the teams were lined up facing the proper goal. There was nothing on point in the rules, although scorers were able to find a rule that when such a basket is scored (it more frequently happens when a rebounder tips it in the wrong basket), the goal is credited to the team. It used to be the team's captain who got credit for the score.

If it's undeterminable who tipped the ball in (as sometimes happens in a scramble under the basket) the closest player may be given credit.

In short there is nothing that says a player may not shoot at any basket for which he has a whim. However, that thought doesn't solve the controversy about the responsibility of lining players up properly.

Coach Mike Hoben, now directing the JV basketball team, wound up his 1959 football chores last week by a speaking performance at the Plymouth Team Banquet which was every bit as good as his coaching job the past season.

He had something different to say about each of his letterwinners.

Wayne Sparkman (honorable mention All-State) by his teammates and tackle Ralph Spigarelli elected next year's captain.

Michigan's baseball coach, Don Lund was the featured speaker. There was a rumor prevalent Banquet night that Egloff may end up at Michigan.

You could feel the pride in the banquet atmosphere created by the parents of the boys. The banquet was held largely through the efforts of Dr. John Salan and the Men's Club, who are fathers of the boys on the team.

The man then went to the front door of the station and smashed out the window with a flashlight. Mrs. Edmund hurried to the front door, opened it, and turned her boxer dog loose on the man.

The dog knocked the prowler to the ground and held him there until Mr. Edmund arrived. He had been on duty

during the earlier part of the night. Washtenaw County deputies arrived and arrested the prowler who was identified as Edward T. Greendle, 27, a Garden City insurance agent.

Greendle delivers a Detroit newspaper to Salem early in the morning and was on his route when caught. He said that he was merely trying to get some anti-freeze for his car.

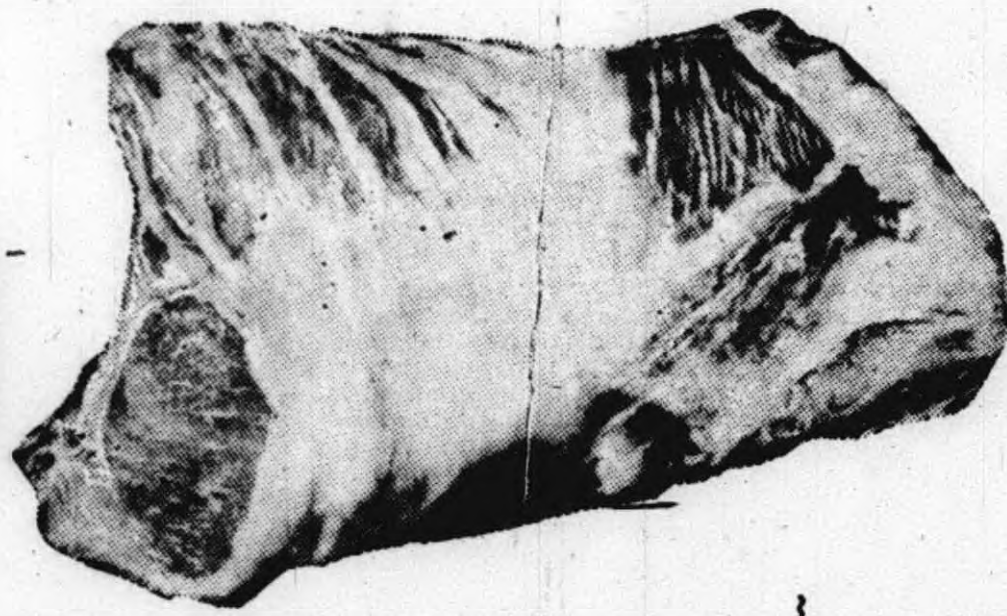
Other choirs, and the dates on which they will appear at the Rotunda, are:

During the Fantasy, Rotunda visiting hours are from 8:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily. The show will end at 3 p.m. December 24.

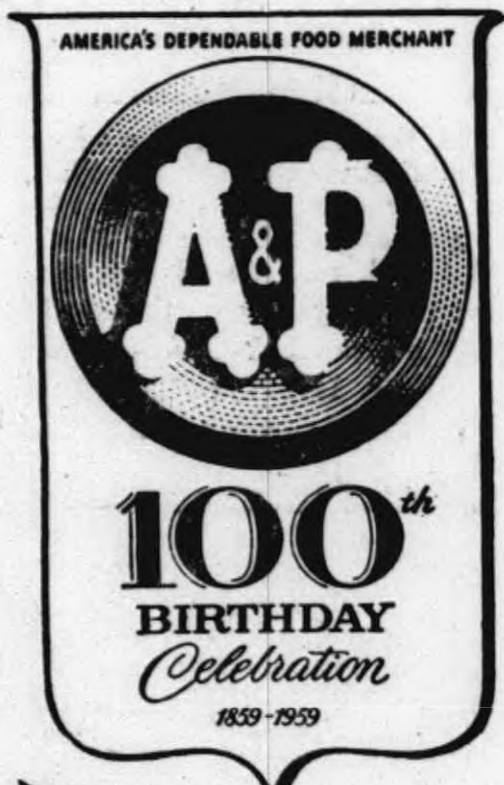

 Christmas. You would be astonished about the little difference you would find, but only at the first glance. You would see the same Santa Claus in the shop windows, you would see the Christmas tree in the middle of the town, and all the other decorations that make you feel like Christmas.

The stores seem just so crowded as here. These things outside seem to be really much alike, but if you would live only one Sunday in this time before Christmas in a German family, you would get quite a different impression.

This Advent time is the most wonderful part of Christmas in the German family. Since the family customs on how to celebrate these four Sundays before Christmas differ a little bit, I will tell you how our own family did it. (Most of the people do it like this.)

The symbol of this time is the Advent wreath. Usually the family makes it by themselves the Saturday before the first Advent. This day is the introduction for the Christmastime. The children gather around the mother, who usually makes the wreath and listen to the Christmas stories she tells them. Grandmother makes the first Christmas cookies and everybody is looking forward to Sunday.

The League is a Salvation Army women's group and derives some of its revenue from the donations that shoppers drop into the familiar sidewalk Salvation Army kettles.

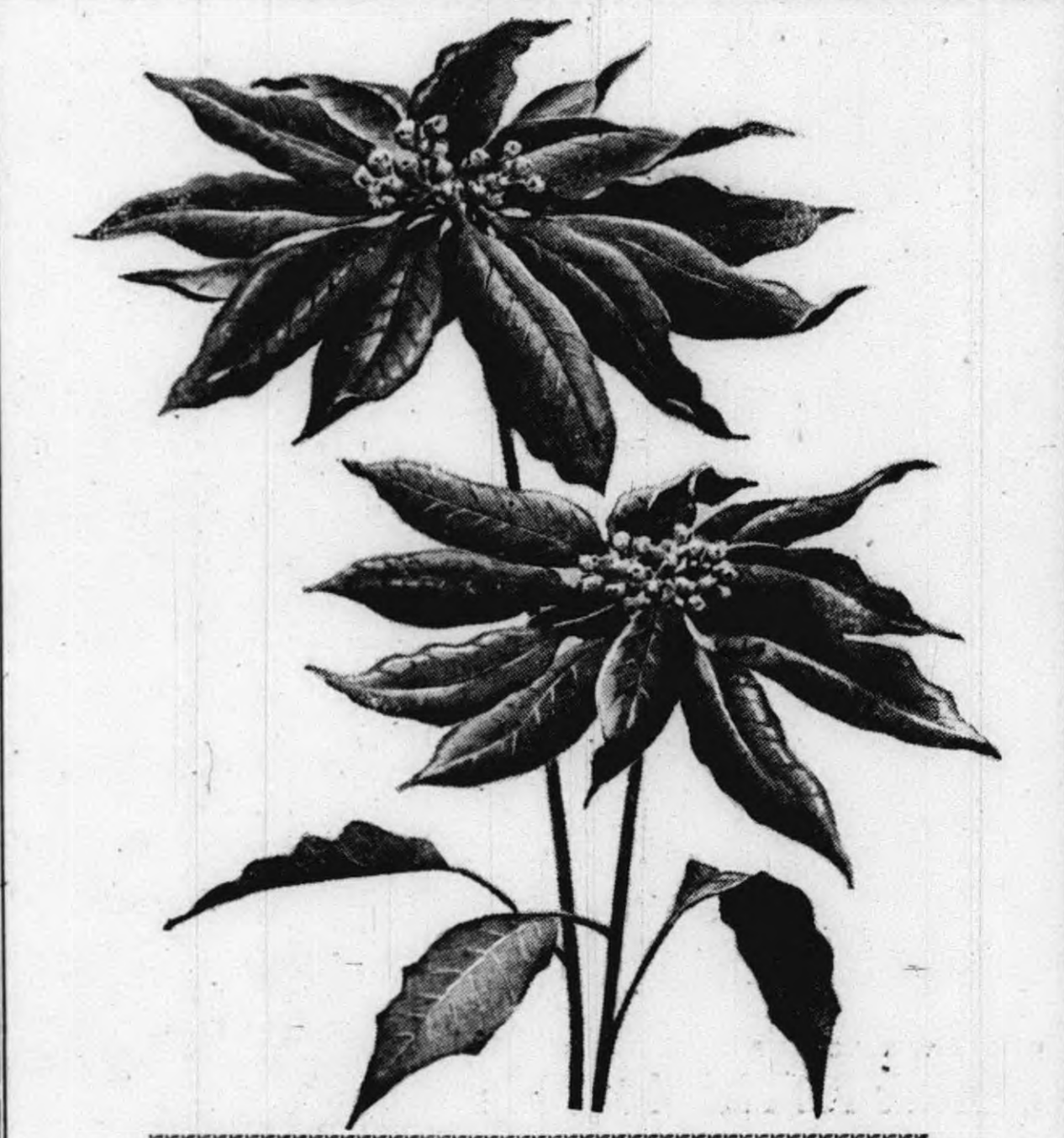
The kettle made its appearance this week in downtown Plymouth. This money helps pay for the big project of providing a happy Christmas to many area families.

The Salvation Army used the kettle to collect for needy on the San Francisco waterfront in 1894. The empty soup kettle and the smiling bell ringer and the sign urging those passing to "keep the pot boiling" have now become a familiar sight around the world.

**CITY MANAGER'S CORNER**

Many years ago, Plymouth was a community with dirt streets and wooden sidewalks. Horses, carriages and wagons struggled through the mud, and nearly every house had a scraper for cleaning boots before one could enter the building. About ten years ago, the City Commission used the by-word, "Let's get Plymouth out of the mud." The improvements over the years were made possible through numerous paving projects, sewer systems were installed and miles of sidewalks were laid. These improvements in turn were made possible by special assessments, which were used to pay for most of the projects. Several weeks ago, the city adopted its 237th annual assessment roll, which is being used to pay for part of the cost of the bituminous recapping of Blunk Street. Roll No. 236 was set up at the same time to help pay for similar work on Harvey Street. Anyone who has driven on either street has noted with satisfaction the improvement resulting from this work.

A special assessment roll has its beginning when the desirability for an improvement is decided on by the City Commission. This usually is during the time the municipal budget is being prepared. At that time, some public funds are reserved for use for public improvements, after discussing a tentative program and its estimated cost.

Nevertheless, the entire program is still in the planning stage. Later on during the year, the Commission decides which projects will be handled at that time and which will be postponed until some later date. When this decision is made, the Commission authorizes the Manager to make a study of the proposed work and requests a detailed report on the estimated cost of the project, specifications and plans, the expected life of the improvement, what portion of the total cost the city can afford to pay, how an assessment for the remainder of the cost should be spread, and his recommendations. The Commission may ask for any other information it feels is necessary for making a well informed decision on the necessity, cost and extent of the project.

After receiving this detailed information, the Commission schedules a public hearing on the proposed project, at which time interested persons may attend the Commission meeting and express themselves concerning the proposed project.

Based upon the information received from the Manager and the opinions of the persons appearing at the public hearing, the Commission decides whether the proposed project is necessary and desirable at that time.

Assuming that the Commission decides the city should enter into the work, it passes a resolution declaring the necessity of the project and authorizes the Assessor to prepare an assessment roll. At this time, the Commission is committed to the project.

When the assessment roll is completed, it is presented for study. The Commission accepts the roll by resolution and sets a public hearing on the assessment roll. At this public hearing, persons whose names appear on the roll may express their opinions about the way the assessment has been spread.

If, after the public hearing, the Commission is satisfied with the roll, or has made whatever changes it feels are fair and equitable, the assessment roll is confirmed. When this is done, the Treasurer is directed to collect the various sums appearing on the roll.

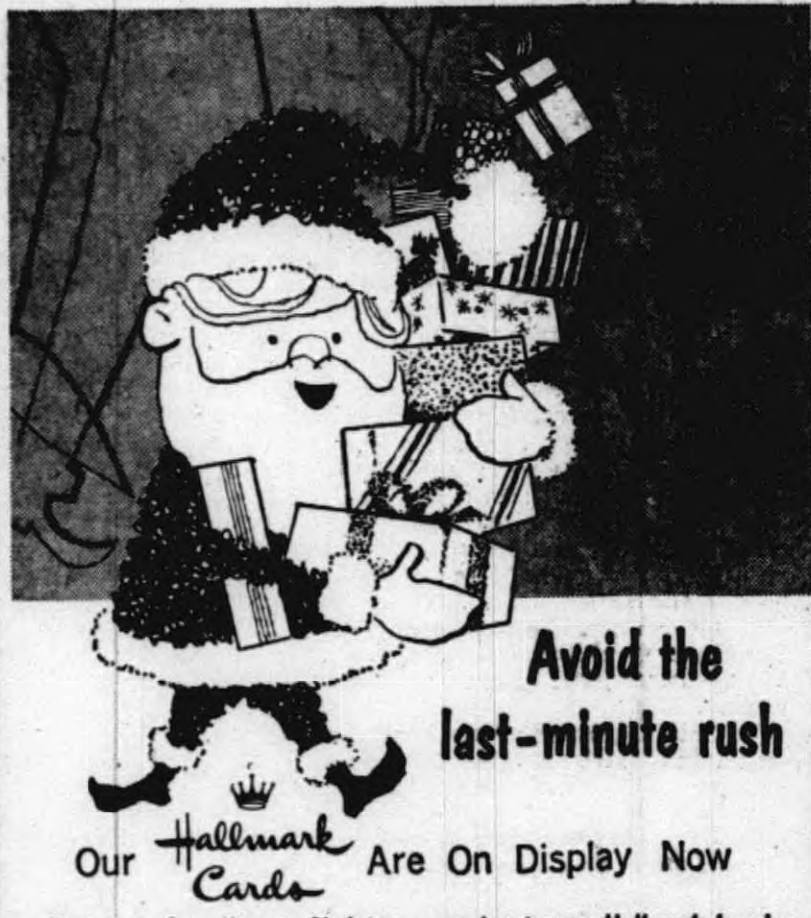

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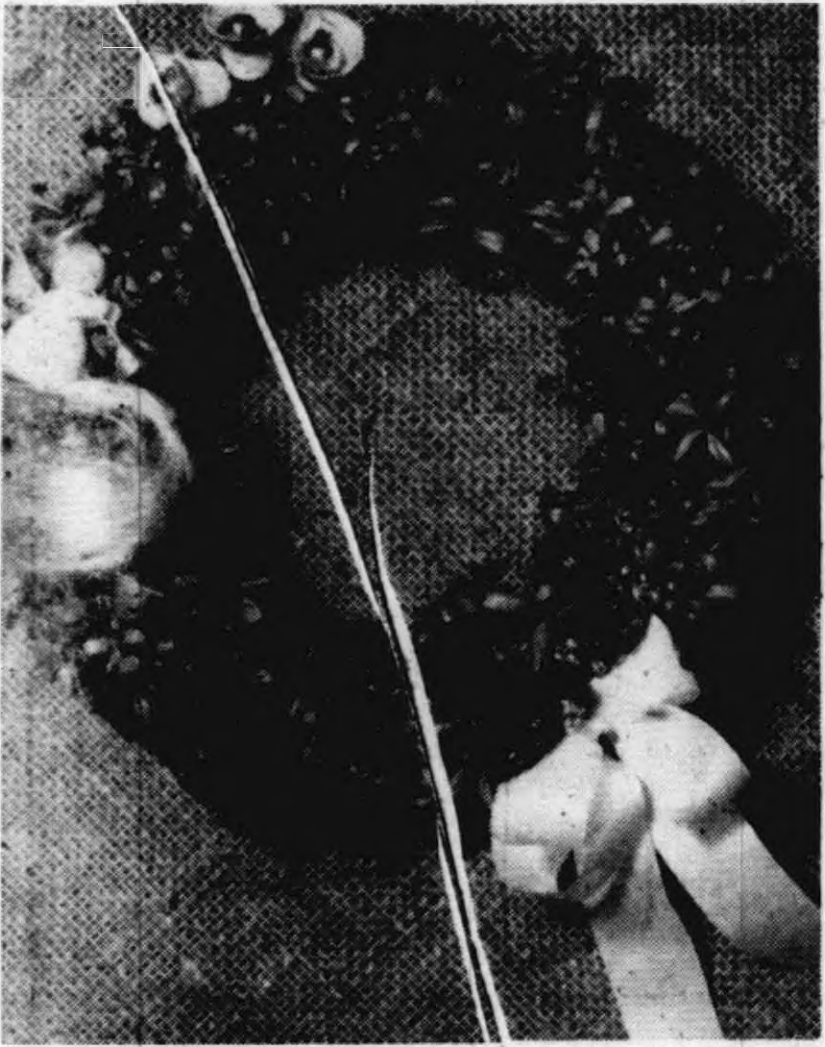
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# Hand-Made Christmas Wreaths Go All Over House

## Greens, Shiny Foil, Ingenuity, Are Part Of This Fascinating Pre-Christmas Pursuit

Big, fat wreaths of real holly with red berries as red as the bow of ribbon spell Christmas for many people even though they're almost impossible to find nowadays. Just because garlands, swags, sprays and the like have been seen so much in recent years, wreaths could give a house a fresh holiday look.

Use wreaths all through the house, indoors and outdoors. Big wreaths and little wreaths to fit different places where they can reflect the spirit of Christmas. Choose your own theme and purchase plain green wreaths to be decorated as a family project.

The circle of boxwood clippings (see photo) only 8 inches in diameter was decorated to hang over a child's crib

or some place in a youngster's room. The tiny bells with gold clappers actually ring. The angel carries a gold colored trumpet and wisps of 'angel hair' curl over the green boxwood.

The same basic decoration could be carried out on larger wreaths — one to hang over the mantelpiece, another for the front door, still another smaller one as the centerpiece on the dining table. On these larger wreaths a larger angel carrying a larger trumpet, larger white bells and big gold balls would be in better scale. If ribbon is used on the large wreaths for the door and mantelpiece, make it wide white ribbon and omit the angel hair.

Your family might decide this is the year when they want to say "Merry Christmas" with candy canes. This

would mean long canes for large wreaths, shorter ones for small wreaths. Tie them in place with bright red bows and add clusters of red Christmas tree balls in a size that won't be dwarfed by the size of the candy cane.

Bells, cones in natural color or silvered or gilded, birds and bees or artificial flowers contributed by the distaff side of the household to represent the flowering on the first Christmas Eve are other themes or decorating the wreaths for your home this year.

Decorating the wreaths won't take long if the trimmings and the equipment to fasten them in place have been collected and the whole family sits down one evening to get the wreaths ready for hanging. In addition to wreaths, equipment should

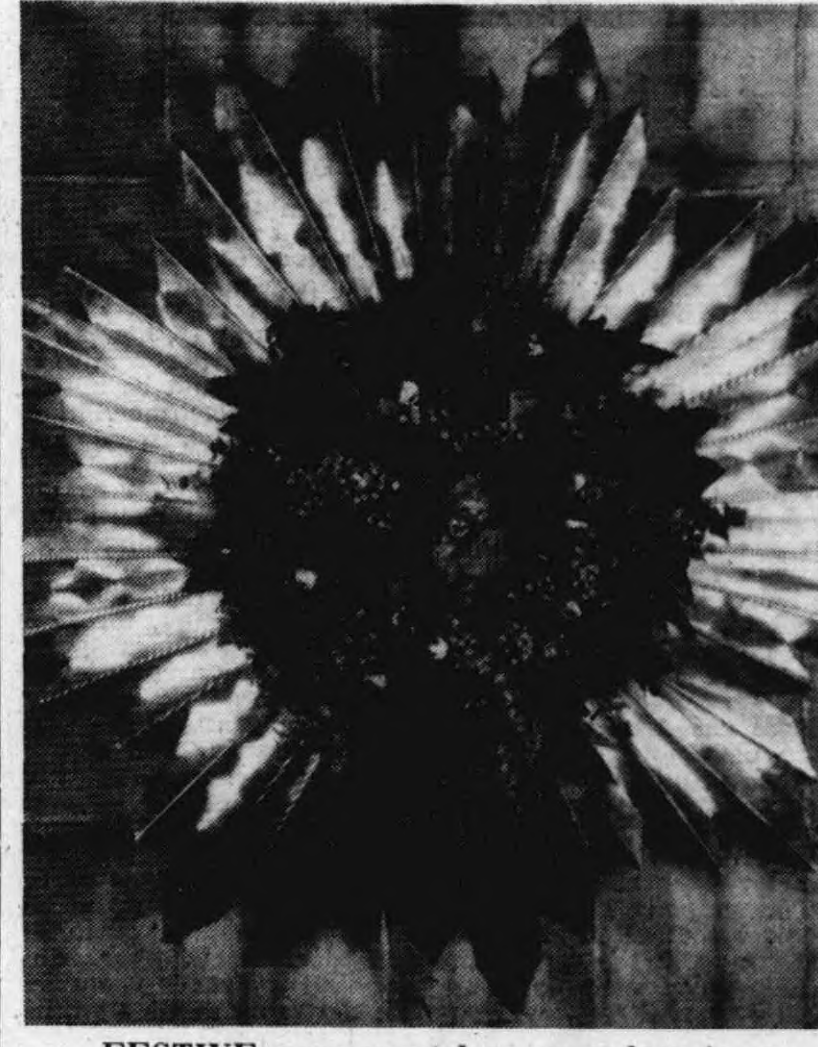
consist of a spool of fine wire, boxes of sturdy round toothpicks, pruning shears, cutting shears, pliers and perhaps a stapler.

Short lengths of wire can be slipped under the base of a cone and then used to wire it to a toothpick so that it can be thrust into the wreath wherever it is desired. A longer piece of wire will hold Christmas tree balls in a cluster. They in turn can be wired to a toothpick and placed on the wreath. Wire holds ribbon in place as a bow and fastens it to a wreath too.

Wreaths that are hung outdoors can be made of any kind of evergreen. Indoors, spruce and hemlock are unobjectionable. Even the most satisfactory because needles fall too quickly. Decorations on an outdoor wreath should

ribbon bow. Show or rain will cause color to chip from Christmas tree balls.

One place in the house might have a star surmounting all the wreaths. If there's a hall into which the wreath-trimmed front door opens, that's one good place; the mantelpiece in the living room which has a wreath in every window is another location. The star probably will have to be tailor-made. It might be greens stapled to a piece of hardware cloth cut out star shaped. Or a silver or gilt sunburst might have its center filled with sprigs of evergreens adorned with rosy pepper berries and twigs of eucalyptus in the Southwest, holly berries and Spanish moss in the Southeast, or winterberry and bayberry elsewhere.

## Some Tips on Gentle Arts of Being Hostess

"What a wonderful party!" Do your guests say that the next day? If you use a little foresight, they'll say it — and mean it. Planning and attitude are the keynotes to becoming the charming hostess you've always known you are.

Most people think a party begins when the guests arrive. This isn't true. It actually begins when you first invite them. Make your invitation list with a view to how well the personalities mesh. People won't enjoy themselves unless they're able to elicit some form of response and recognition. They have to blend and feel they're essential to the balance of the party.

When they first arrive, be happy to see them. A warm smile at the door will make them glad to be present. Introduce them to everyone and guide them into conversation with other guests. See to it personally that quiet, shy Freddie gets a chance to talk to that pretty girl in the corner he's been admiring but doesn't have the courage to approach.

If cliques form — and they will if you leave your guests alone — certain members of the party will be neglected. It's your job to keep people mingling. A hint to a member of one group that there's someone in another group he or she would like to meet often solves the problem. If the hint doesn't work, subtly drag them together.

Food and drink, primary

elements of any gathering, require planning, too. Serve foods that are interesting, gay, exotic if you wish, but avoid the eccentric. Make sure there's a generous supply. Heaping bowls and well-stacked platters make a wonderful impression. You can always shove the leftovers into the refrigerator for tomorrow's lunch.

You owe it to your guests to be thoughtful and discreet about liquor and its use. You don't want everyone inebriated after one drink. Tall highball glasses and a good addition of mixer subtly slow up the process. If you're worried about not having enough ice, before the party put two pitchers of water in the refrigerator. When the trays are empty, fill them with this chilled water. It'll freeze faster.

Club soda is becoming more and more popular at parties because of its neutralizing effect on the stomach and the liquor. The next morning isn't nearly as painful. The better club sodas contain natural salts that soften the impact and point up the flavor, like salt on a steak.

For your cocktail minded guests, put your glasses in the refrigerator an hour before the party. The frosted effect is impressive — another little thing your guests will remember.

## New Flavor Combination With Sweet Potatoes



Sweet potatoes go with holiday menus like turkey and cranberries. There is something highly attractive about a serving of this vitamin-rich food that adds colors and flavor to any special meal.

Ideas for variation in the preparation of sweet potatoes are welcomed by most homemakers. Here is one new idea which varies ingredients as well as method of preparation. Mix and blend the ingredients in this recipe early in the day when you are not hard pressed for time. Place sweet potato mixture in a buttered baking dish that also can be used for serving. Wrap the dish snugly in saran film and refrigerate until time to put the dish in the oven. The plastic film will keep the food moist and good until time to heat for serving. This is a time and worry saving way of adding a variation to the meal. The flavor and color of this sweet potato dish will be enjoyed by all at mealtime.

### California Sweet Potatoes

- 2 cans sweet potatoes No. 2 1/2
- 4 tablespoons butter
- Milk if needed
- 1 cup chopped walnuts
- 1 cup finely chopped dates

Mash and whip the sweet potatoes using some of the liquid. Add milk if still too dry. Blend in butter and season with salt. Add chopped walnuts and dates. Spread in a buttered casserole. Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees F. about 30 minutes or until lightly browned and heated through. Serve with baked ham. Makes 6-8 servings. Prepare this recipe in advance, wrap in saran and refrigerate until time to put in the oven.

### Suggested Christmas Gifts For Car Owners, Young or Old

It's easy to find suitable Christmas gifts for car owners. On any list, the men regardless of age will be especially pleased with useful accessories as a change from the inevitable shirts, socks and ties.

For the young man who has just bought, or is thinking of buying, his first car, a set of tools won't be covered in his budget. And if he has his own tools, he won't be inclined to "borrow" Dad's. These tools should be good, sturdy and well made to last a lifetime. Besides the basic screw driver, hammer and pliers that come in every car, Junior will appreciate a set of socket wrenches in different sizes, an assortment of screw drivers (including a Phillips), perhaps a spark plug wrench.

These tools are not expensive in comparison to some

other accessories that young car owners covet. Chrome-plated wheel covers, for instance, will cost about \$30 for a set of four in the deluxe model. These wheel covers are the envy of the neighborhood teenagers and are so highly prized that they are often stolen. For this reason, manufacturers now have put out special wheel-cover locks. A side view mirror is another useful gift that is not standard equipment on cars. These mirrors are easily installed by anyone who has a drill to make a hole in the metal of the side window frame or door.

License plate frames of chrome give the car a neat appearance and will keep the license plates looking like new. This makes an inexpensive gift (\$1.95 to \$2.95).

Two battery booster cables would come in handy on a cold morning when the car's old battery fails to turn over the engine. Connecting the old battery to a good one by means of the booster cables supplies enough juice to get the car started.

One of the newer accessories this year — and a fine gift — is calling a Flashing Powerlite. It is larger than a flashlight and more like a lantern and runs on batteries. It has a side spotlight that is ideal for changing tires and a red flashing top to warn other motorists away.

The lady of the house might like new seat covers, preferably gay ones. Even car floor mats can be purchased in colors to match the upholstery. Magnetic plastic trays that attach to the dashboard are useful to hold change for tolls, a map, sun glasses or other small items.

Membership in one of the Automobile Clubs is one of the best Christmas gifts of all, especially for the older members of a family. Junior doesn't mind changing his own flat tire on the road, but his parents would appreciate this service as well as many others made available to them by a club-affiliated garage.

New Christmas tree lights so decorative they can serve as ornaments. The bulbs are designed with a swirling pattern in five color combination — red on white, green on white, red on yellow, orange on white, and blue on white. They fit any string of lights or ready-made Christmas decorations equipped for the multiple-burning, seven-watt tree bulb with candelabra base. (Decro-Lite, Westinghouse.)

Round steak makes a fine pot roast when company's coming. Seasonings may be only salt and pepper. Or you may add one or two other things such as sliced onions, minced garlic, whole bay leaf, sliced carrots, celery leaves, or some spices and herbs. Braising liquid may be just water. Flavor change comes when you use bouillon, consomme, tomato juice or canned tomatoes, pineapple juice, or even apple cider.

**The 'Drinkard' Is  
New Unwanted Driver**

Every 24 hours 33 Americans die on the highway as a result of drinking and driving.

Every 30 hours in Michigan, one dies and 15 are injured in accidents involving a driver who had been drinking.

These are the known statistics on drinking drivers. They are considered to be the minimum indications of the problem posed by drinking and driving.

That is why the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police in their "Unwanted Driver" program are calling attention to the problem of drunk drivers.

Police Chief Kenneth Fisher of Plymouth pointed out that the problem with the Drinkard is one of degree.

"We are not so concerned about the pie-eyed, saturated drunk as with the 'drinking driver' who has only had a few shots, a few bottles of beer. Reliable studies indicate that in at least 50 per cent of fatal traffic accidents, one or more drivers had been drinking."

"The so-called drunks are fairly easy to spot," the chief pointed out. "It is the social drinker, the man or woman who has had only a few drinks and doesn't think it has had much affect, that is the real problem."

"Such a driver doesn't know that alcohol in any quantity begins to affect judgment, attitude, perception and reaction in traffic manipulative skill seems unimpaired."

That's why traffic safety authorities have named the drinking driver as the greatest menace on the highway.

A recent study at Northwestern university found the drinking driver is involved in serious accidents at four times the ratio of non-drinking drivers.

Spot studies in Michigan, conducted by the secretary of state's office also indicate drinking drivers in half or more of the fatal traffic accidents.

Since the drinkard, unlike the drunk driver, cannot easily be detected before he gets himself or others into trouble, the problem is to convince the person who drinks at all, to refrain from driving.

The police are not attempting to revive prohibition in their program. They just want the social drinker to realize that when he drinks he shouldn't drive, for safety's sake.

# Canton Goodfellows at Work

Hope we were missed last week, but due to the lack of news a column was impossible, but we do have some now, so here goes.

Last Saturday, no doubt, you were greeted by one of the township's Goodfellows and although we had hoped to give a little background of this group of fine men, we thought perhaps you who bought one of their papers would like to know how your contribution will be used. In the early fall of 1949, Robert Waldecker attended a meeting of the Plymouth Goodfellows. Mr. Ernie Rossow and Jim Henry of the Plymouth Association helped to set up the new group. Other assistance and materials were given by the Plymouth Goodfellows. The constitution and by-laws of the Canton group are patterned after those of the Plymouth unit. The Charter members of this new organization included Ralph Wise, George Simmons, Walter Theissen, William Johnson, Earl Buchner, A. W. Schrader, Jr., Sanford Silcock, Russell Travis, Matt Everett, E. J. Richards, Russell Magraw, Robert Waldecker, Dean McClue, Perry Hix, Leslie Freedle, A. W. Schrader, Sr., George Alimpich, M. A. Y. Housman, George Simmons, Harvey Vetal, William J. Squires, Gordon Vetal and Stanley West. These members elected as their officers for the initial year: President, George Alimpich, Vice President, Russell Magraw, Secretary, Leslie Freedle, Treasurer, Russell Travis. Many of the names appearing on the Charter are still very active in the group.

Today the Goodfellows of Canton have between 35 and 40 members and the officers are president, Earl Neiman, vice-president, Edward Hauk, treasurer, Robert Waldecker, secretary, Harold Longley (who at present is ill and Mr. Ralph Burch is taking over for him).

You may be wondering why the write-up now after the paper sale. Well, many of you who were not home found a paper in your door which the Goodfellows hope you will enjoy and although they do not expect a contribution when they leave the paper, I understand contributions are not only needed but welcome throughout the year. No contribution is too big or small and any of the officers will accept your gift or it may be left at the Township Hall. 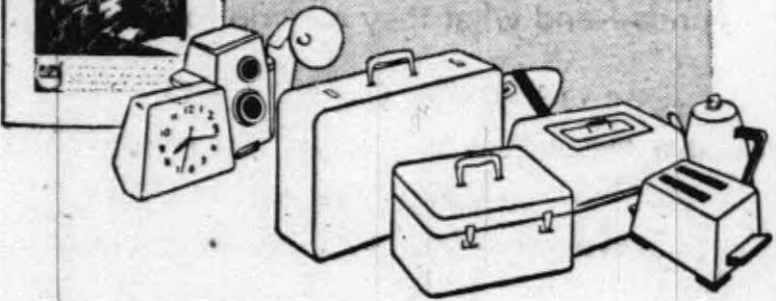

# Editorial Romney Sounds Right

What can be done to prevent deadlocks such as the steel strike has become?

The spectacle of a cabinet member "eating his hat" because so many are idle as a consequence is not a happy one and the operation of mills by injunction is only a temporary measure.

In accepting a Franklin Institute award in Philadelphia a few days ago, George Romney, president of American Motors, made some suggestions worthy of consideration. Already on record against excessive concentration of power either in industry or labor, he proposed:

1. The combining of national unions for the establishment of common bargaining demands or use of economic power should be prohibited. The same prohibition should apply to national employer organizations.
2. Unions representing more than about 10,000 employees of a single employer should be prohibited from combining to establish collective bargaining demands against more than one enterprise. Unions should be free to combine in bargaining with employers having less than about 10,000 employees, but only within prescribed geographical limits. The same limita-

tions should apply to employers.

3. In our basic industries, affiliated unions of a national union representing employees of a single large company, regardless of size, should be permitted to combine in collective bargaining. The law should not prohibit union cooperation aside from the above limitations.

"Excessive power of industry," said Romney, "required reforms that reduced that power and opened the door to greater power for unions. Our laws became two-faced, banning monopoly power in the market place, but inducing it in collective bargaining. The steel strike is a forceful illustration of the result. The powerful unions banded together. The steel industry massed itself... Must we wait for a whole series of national emergencies such as the steel strike to throttle us before acting — isn't it far wiser to tackle the causes of the national steel emergency before others arise?"

Romney was right about many Americans preferring less cumbersome automobiles. He also may be right in suggesting that a less cumbersome and less gigantic system of collective bargaining be instituted for industries like steel. Perhaps Congress can consider the idea.

# If Your Name Is 'Polly'

Would you guess that "Polly" derives from the name "Mary"? It does seem strange. Here is the explanation. From "Mary" several petnames were made up. Molly, Moll, Mally and Molly among them. Then, from Molly a scolded rhyming nickname was formed, "Polly". Such rhyming nicknames were often made; there is, for instance "Peg" from which we obtained "Peggy", made up from "Margaret".

This in turn evolved from Margaret. It is as far removed from its parent name as Polly is from Mary. "Mary" developed from the ancient Hebrew name "Miriam"; books and books full of explanations have been written about this name's meaning. According to the prevalent scholarly view it signifies "rebellion".

"Polly" is no recent development. One famous Polly in fiction is the heroine of John Gay's "The Beggar's Opera", written in 1727. Gay chose the ill-famed Newgate Prison of London (torn down in 1903) as the setting of his play, and the main characters are thieves and beggars. He felt it either would be a great

success or a dismal failure. It proved an immense success. In his own time it made John Gay's name a household word. When the English actress Lavinia Fenton, the first "Polly", sang "For on the rope that hangs my dear, Depends poor Polly's life" she brought down the house. Encouraged by his success John Gay wrote a sequel to "The Beggar's Opera", entitled "Polly", but the English Government felt that some of its members were made fun of in it, and suppressed it.

"The Beggar's Opera" proved to be one of the last stage successes. A modern ingenious adaptation of it, words by Bertolt Brecht, music by Kurt Weill, has been acclaimed on several continents.

"Pollyanna" is a name made up by joining "Polly" with "Anna"; it is the invention of Eleanor Hodgman Porter. Incidentally, "Anna" is a Hebrew name, originally "Channah" and means "grace." Miss Porter's girl heroine Pollyanna is a character filled with an overwhelming, unquenchable gladness for everything that happens to her, and eagerly

seeks out the good in seemingly unhappy experiences also.

Her cheerfulness brings joy to all who get to know her. Soon a new Pollyanna, in Walt Disney's version, will be seen on the screen; way back, Mary Pickford portrayed the always happy little girl whose name became a synonym for one who disregards down-to-earth reality, and is being carried away by an often unfounded optimism. ## How's Business?

# November Trade Was Dull

By ROGER W. BABSON

Saddled with strikes in the metals producing industries, especially in the early days of the month, business failed to show any noticeable improvement in November. The Babson Composite Business Curve remained at the level set in October—23 percent above the "normal" point of growth for the economy. In the past five months, however, this barometer has de-

clined over 5 percent from its midyear high of 130.

Resumption of activity by the major steel producers, under the Taft-Hartley injunction, bolstered the nation's economy during the second half of the month. Steel production rebounded with greater than expected vigor. By the end of November, output of steel had soared to a rate close to 90 percent of the industry's theoretical productive capacity. Accom-

panying gains also occurred in mining and freight transportation; and personal income showed a welcome increase.

The hiatus in the steel strike, unfortunately, did not immediately remedy the woes of steel consuming industries. Raw material shortages forced further output cuts in the automotive, consumer appliance, and farm equipment industries.

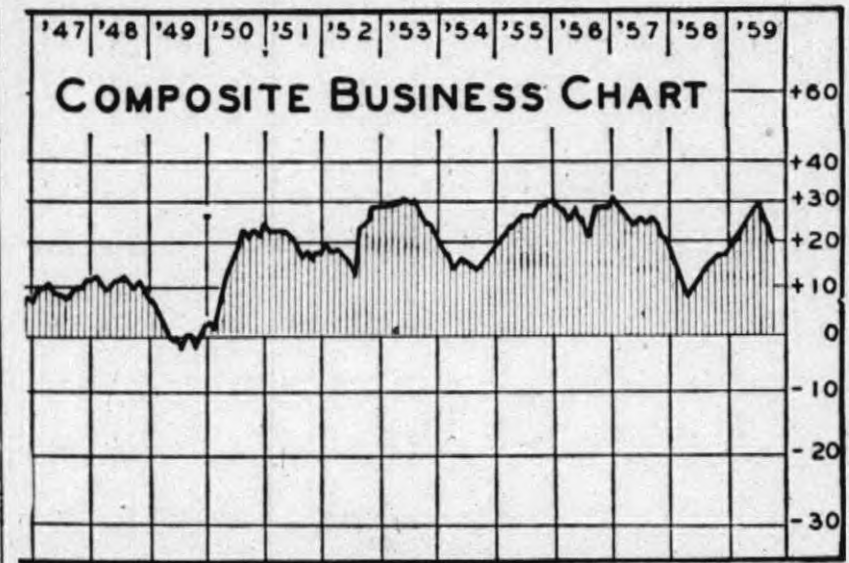
Heavy construction also declined, due to inadequate supplies of structural steel. With auto and appliance dealers unable to get their fall complement of 1960 models, retail sales did not benefit

fully from consumer buying enthusiasm.

Since striking steel workers were not listed among the unemployed, their back-to-work movement did little to alleviate jobless conditions.

Although secondary effects of the steel labor tie-up may be felt for several weeks, the nation's economy can look forward to an upswing in business. Inventory replenishment programs should add further impetus to the rise in activity.

Nondurable goods, machinery, and electronics products, whose operations held up remarkably well during the strike period, will in all likelihood, sustain their high levels of production. Unless the steel and railroad labor problems are settled, however, another crisis this winter could threaten the business upturn.

# Some Familiar Legends About Santa Claus

Just how old is Santa Claus? Why does he enter by chimney? Where does he come from? Why does he drive a sleigh?

Even the best reference sources do not quite agree about the ancestry of the jolly, big-hearted fellow we know.

But, after all, is it so important whether the name Santa Claus has its origin in the Dutch "Sinterklaas," or in the German "Christkindl" or "Kris Kringle"?

It is generally agreed that the idea for our modern day Santa Claus began with a young boy called Nicholas over 1600 years ago.

During his early years, growing up in the Asia Minor portion of present-day Turkey, he was generous and pious. These qualities grew within him until as a man he became the bishop of Myra.

His most famous deed of generosity was directed toward three beautiful daughters of a poor nobleman. He wanted dowries for his children so they could be married.

So, Nicholas on three different nights tossed bags of gold through a window of their home, and each daughter could be married and well cared for.

Down through the centuries the story of Saint Nicholas was carried to other countries and when unexpected gifts appeared they were attributed to him.

Dutch children still wait for Saint Nicholas, or "Sinterklaas" as they call him. He is pictured as a kindly, white-bearded bishop who rides a white horse over the rooftops when he lowers his gifts down the chimney.

It is to this "Sinterklaas," brought over by the early Dutch settlers, that we give thanks for Santa's custom and method of giving, for the full white beard, riding over rooftops and, partially, for his name.

Santa Claus had many other forerunners, some who still bring gifts in his place to children in other lands.

Another "ancestor" of Santa came from Germany. "Christkindl," sometimes called "Kris Kringle," is a little messenger of the Christ child. This same angel also was the gift-giver to the Swiss children. There the angel arrived in a sleigh drawn by six reindeer. The elves, Santa's fine helpers, are "imported" from Norway.

Dr. Clement Clark Moore, a seminary professor, wrote "A Visit From St. Nicholas" ("The Night Before Christmas") for his children. He vividly described Santa Claus, bringing together all the many legends he knew.

In 1863, cartoonist Thomas Nast was commissioned to illustrate Moore's poem. Santa Claus, much as we see him today pictured everywhere at Christmas, emerged from Nast's drawing board 96 years ago in New York City.

Since then, this red and white garbed fellow known as Santa Claus — with the big heart, the jolly face and abundant good-will is here to stay and is now quite, quite real for every child!
