### Goodfellows Facing Biggest Job Ever

Plymouth's hardy band of Goodfellows, foreseeing a bigger task this Christmas than ever before, will be on the sidewalks and streets of the city this Saturday with hopes that shoppers will open their hearts more than ever before too.

Last year the Goodfellows made the Christmas of 43 families brighter through boxes of toys, food and clothing. They expect the number of cases to be higher this year.

The Goodfellows will have 5,000 copies of their Goodfellow Edition to sell. They will be at the gates of the Burroughs Corp. Friday and then will be stationed throughout the city Saturday to sell the remaining copies.

There is no price on the newspapers. Buyers can contribute whatever they wish. The Goodfellows will refuse

no contribution, no matter how large or how small. The families aided by the Goodfellows are all within the community. A committee first makes investigations of the homes to determine if a family is deserving of aid. They also find out what the particular needs are of each family. Boxes are filled to meet these orders.

Complete Christmas dinners, toys for the children, clothing for the family and even fuel for the furnace are given where needed.

Lester Coats is president of the Goodfellows this year. Other officers are: first vice-president, Clarence Holman; second vice-president, Charles Huebler; secretary, Jack Thorpe; assistant secretary, Abe Koorman; treasurer, Harold Stevens; assistant treasurer, James Thompson. This is the 21st year for the Plymouth Goodfellows.

### Theft Leads Police to Stolen Safe

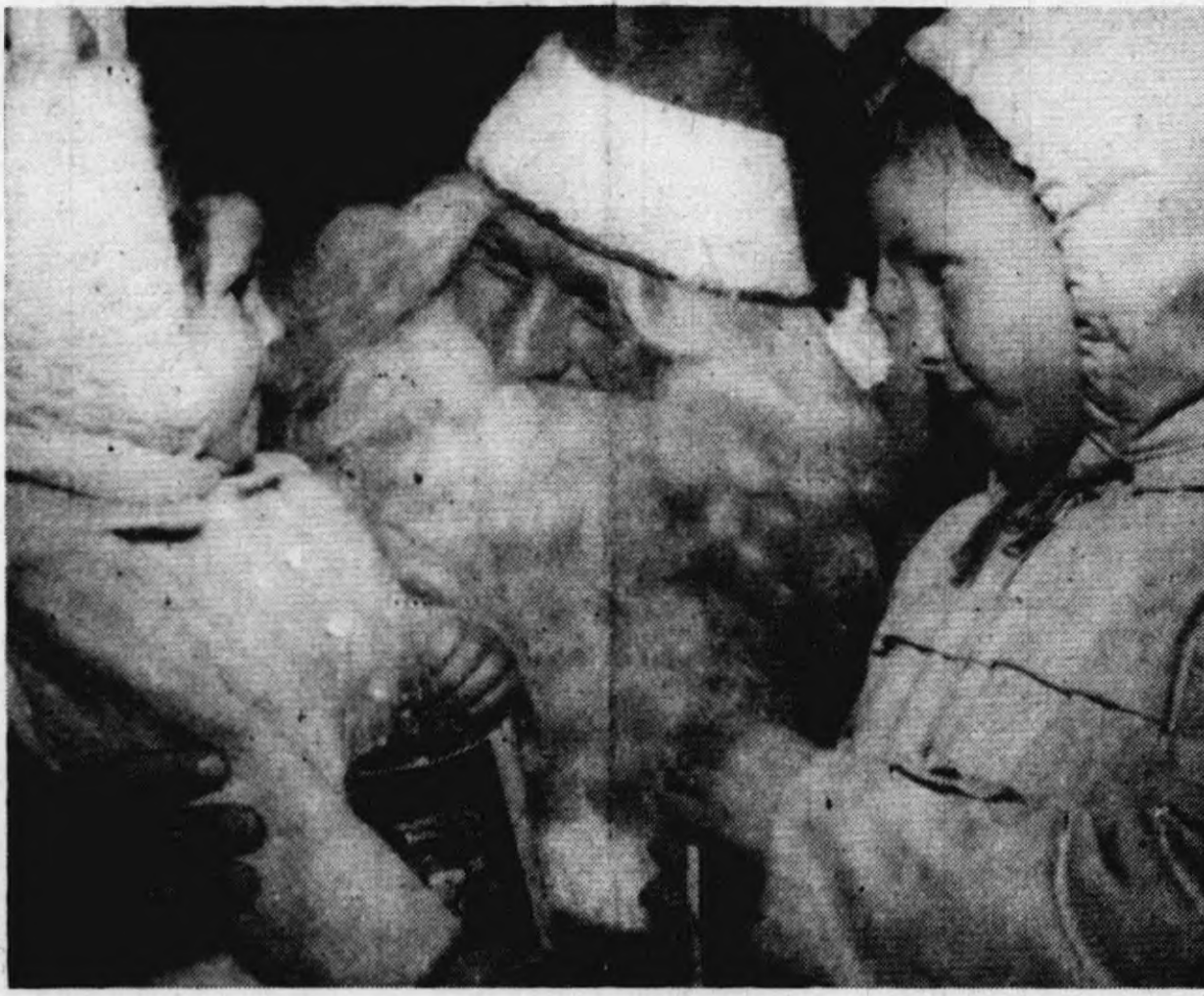
Thanks to another thief, Detroit police have found the safe that was stolen last month from a Plymouth drug store that had contained both cash and narcotics.

### Record Donation Ends Fund Drive

With a check for \$4,653.16 from the Burroughs Corp. and its employees, the Plymouth Community Fund bounced over the goal this week and kept the 15 year record of always meeting the quota.

The Community Fund total this week stood at \$34,410.16. This year's goal was \$34,097.

In a brief ceremony, the Burroughs check was turned over to Community Fund President John Pint by Burroughs community relations director, Hugh Griffin.

The huge check in dimensions was also the largest in cash ever received by the Community Fund.

Of the \$4,653.16 from Burroughs, \$2,453.16 was from employees and \$2,200 was from the corporation.

Plymouth's Community Fund opened its campaign

late in September and it has been struggling to meet the goal ever since.

The goal will mean that all of the agencies participating in the Fund will receive the amounts for which they asked.

This year's campaign goal was the largest ever set, although it was only \$560 higher than last year.

### Crash Victims Better; School Resumes Classes

Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic school, closed last week because of the death of its principal and injury of two teachers, re-opened again Thursday after replacements were found.

The three-day holiday was called because substitute teachers were not available immediately. The school has eight teaching positions.

The Mother Superior, Mary Victorine, was killed in the accident in which she and another nun and a lay teacher were involved. The lay teacher, Mrs. Joseph Near, was driving the car and was very critically injured.

Also hurt was Sister Madeline Marie. The driver of the other car, Edward Tanner of Redford Township, was also killed.

Mrs. Near and Sister Marie are still confined to St. Carmel Hospital. Mrs. Near,

wife of Plymouth's city clerk, is reported recovering.

She suffered a fractured arm, jaw, ribs, two fractured kneecaps and internal injuries that included a collapsed lung. One of the fractured kneecaps was not discovered until this past Sunday.

Sister Marie received a concussion and other head bruises.

When word got around that the parochial school would be closed because of the shortage of teachers, there were many former teachers who volunteered their services.

Two lay teachers were selected and a teaching nun from the St. Joseph Motherhouse in Nazareth, Mich. arrived to fill the other vacancy.

Sister Annice, eighth grade teacher who had been Sister Victorine's assistant, is temporary principal of the school. The head-on collision occurred Dec. 5 at Inkster Rd. near Schoolcraft in Livonia.

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### Detroit Industry Buys 12 Acres of City Land

Construction of a 40,000 square foot plant that would employ at least 200 is expected to start next spring following approval of the sale of land last Monday night by the City Commission.

Authorization to sell 12 acres of city-owned land to the Wheel Trueing Tool Co. of Detroit was approved by the City Commission Monday. The deeds were transferred Tuesday.

The 12 acres is located along the south side of Plymouth Rd., opposite the Burroughs Corp. plant property.

Wheel Trueing's president, Harold E. Robison, said yesterday that his firm would break ground some-

time in March or April. The building should be ready for occupancy by July 1961.

He added that 200 people will be employed here and that "it might be more."

Wheel Trueing is now located in Detroit. It has three manufacturing locations there and one storage building. They expect to incorporate all of these facilities under one roof in Plymouth.

"We feel that Plymouth is a very fine community and a good neighbor," Robison declared yesterday in speaking about the proposed move here.

The building will have between 40,000 to 50,000 square feet and will cost upwards of a half million dollars.

Wheel Trueing's land has been zoned for "light manufacturing." The firm fabricates and sells diamond tipped drilling and dressing tools and similar products.

The city of Plymouth bought a Wheel Trueing product itself earlier this year. It is a machine that drills holes into concrete and requires a diamond-tipped drill.

Bids for the industrial acreage owned by the city were opened by the city last June. Wheel Trueing bid \$41,125 for the 12 acres (about \$3,500 an acre).

The City Commission earlier this year annexed 90 acres of city-owned park, cemetery and vacant property from Plymouth Township. This was done by resolution.

Thirty-eight acres of the vacant property along Plymouth Rd. will be sold for industrial development. The move was made to increase Plymouth's tax base.

A new sewer and water line will be laid to the Plymouth Rd. site that will serve both Wheel Trueing and Burroughs. Two weeks ago Burroughs renewed its contracts with the city for water and sewer services.

### Yule Mailing To Hit New Peak Here

This year's volume of mail still surpasses the record-breaking volume of 1958, Postmaster George Timpona declared this week.

An increase of 10 to 15 percent is anticipated over last year, the postmaster estimated. This is higher than the nationwide trend. Postal authorities in Washington estimate the current Christmas mail will be highest on record for both greeting cards and parcels. These conclusions are based on samplings of postal receipts made in several major cities which show anticipated increases of two to five percent over last year.

The Post Office Department again plans to deliver all Christmas mail prior to Christmas day as it has for the past several seasons. Postmaster Timpona noted, in urging local mailers to cooperate with Post Office Department by mailing Christmas cards and packages early and often.

Longer hours at the Post Office mailing window are still in effect. It is open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Mondays through Fridays and this Saturday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The window will also be open this Sunday from noon until 4 p.m.

### School Board Report

### Church Use of Schools Studied

A long-standing policy of the Plymouth Community School District Board of Education forbidding the use of school facilities for religious or religious-connected bodies may be eased shortly if Monday night's conversation by board members is any indication.

Their new look at the policy was brought about by a request from the pastor of a mission that is being organized in Plymouth and wants to temporarily use a school for Sunday services.

Rev. Norman Brauer, who is starting a mission for the Missouri Synod, Lutheran Church, made the request before board members. He expects to have a church built on a site on Ann Arbor Rd. near Haggerty within two to three years and asked use of the auditorium and several rooms of Allen Elementary School on Haggerty. The church, he said, would pay any charges involved.

The board just last January reaffirmed its policy concerning school facilities by church groups. This reaffirmation was made following a request for bus service for parochial school children.

Board Trustee Peter Zylstra started off the lengthy discussion by making a motion to approve the request. This was seconded by Treasurer Charles Zoet.

Most other board members argued that before a hasty decision, there should be a complete study of readjusting the policy and just what limitations should be. Some school districts, for instance, limit use of schools just to new congregations awaiting construction of their church. This would be for a stipulated time.

Secretary Harold Fischer noted that the board is being

### School Custodians Form Union Local

Have or have not the custodians of the Plymouth Community School District been unionized?

This was the question the board of education officially wants to find out.

But the board of education said they would rather hear it from representatives of the custodians before any meetings took place.

The conversation during the next 25 minutes revolved around how the union can prove that the custodians are organized.

Robert Ross, business manager of the new Local 522 said that the union has all 31 of the male custodians signed up and their money paid.

This, he said, is proof enough. Board member Peter Zylstra argued that a secret election conducted by the State Labor Mediation Board would be a logical way to prove it.

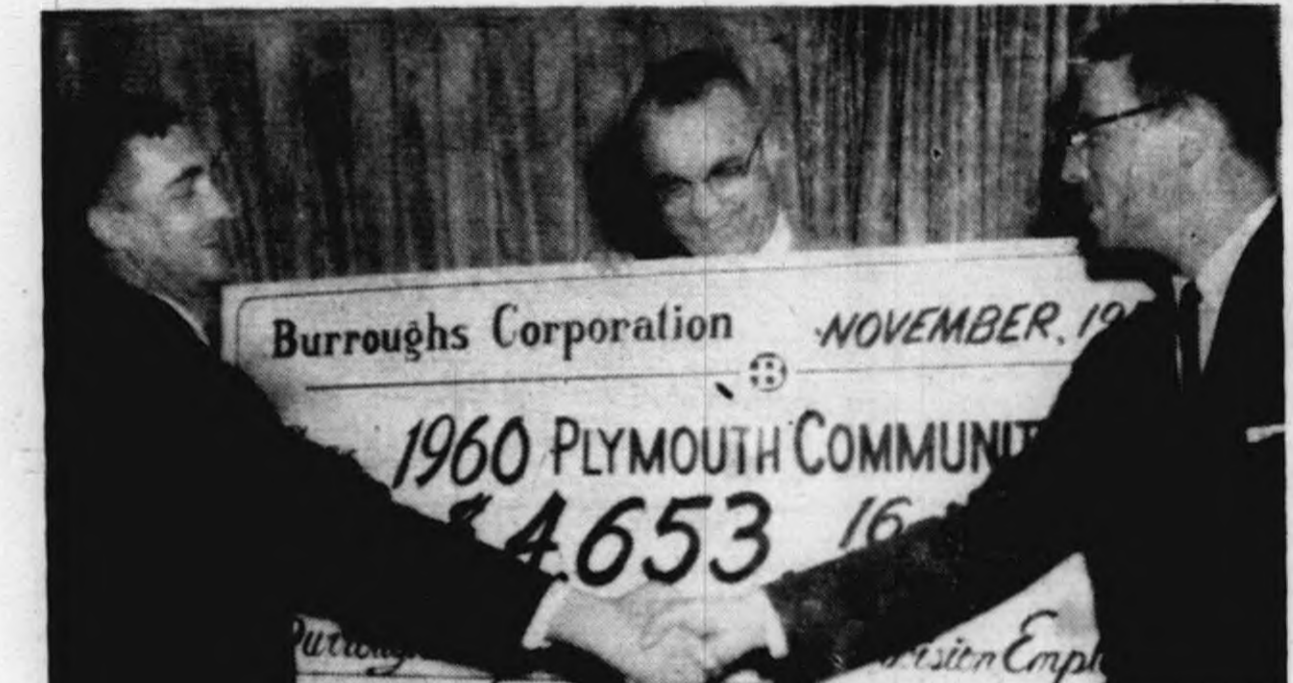
A committee of the board has always met with three representatives of the custodians to discuss problems in the past. The chairman of this committee, Wesley Kaiser, said that he had no indication from the representatives that they were joining a union.

It was decided that the two groups should meet once more so that the representatives can declare if they are or are not any longer the official representatives of the custodians.

Ross said that the 30 members were signed up after two meetings. There were four or six women at the meetings, he said, but they decided not to join.

This is the first experience that a Plymouth board of education has had with any employees being unionized. An attorney specializing in labor affairs has been consulted by the board to determine what the board's responsibilities are in dealing with a union.

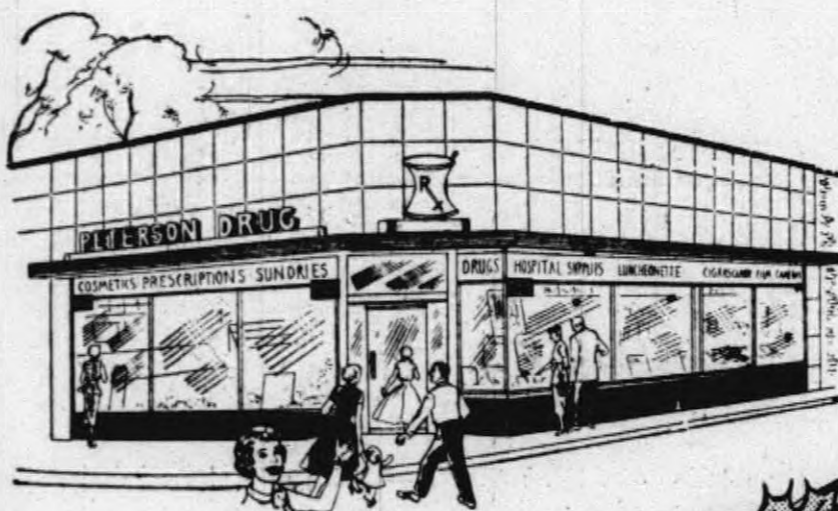

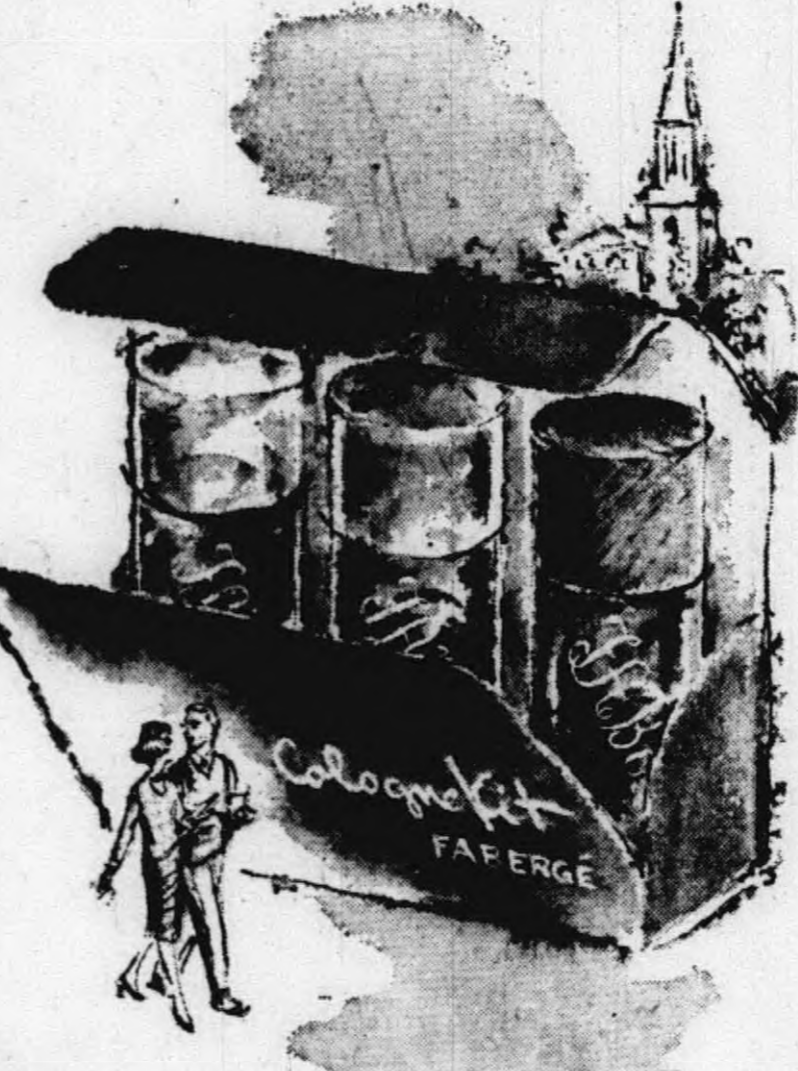

When you think of the num-

ber of people from many communities that give many hours of devoted talent for the Plymouth Symphony and the long list of yearly supporters, you realize the continuing importance and vitality of the Symphony Society itself.

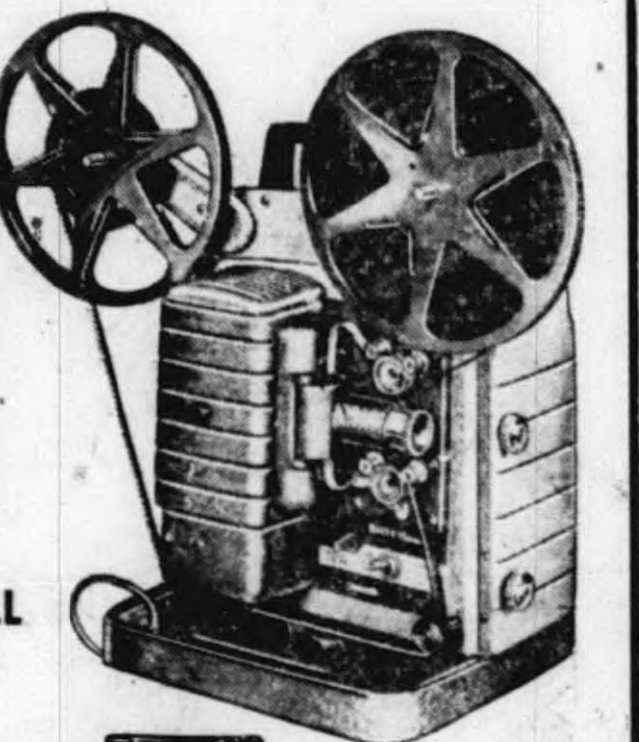

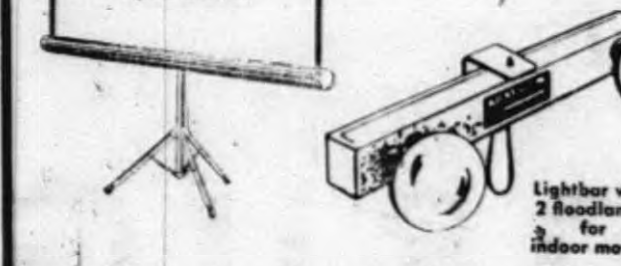

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# The Mail Attitude

Right after the recent school bond proposals were beaten here in Plymouth, The Mail Attitude fouled an effort to analyze the "upset."

We suggested the whole thing was hooked to the financial distress in Lansing, the inevitable of new state taxes, and to the public's tax shyness because of the strike effects.

It seemed to make sense, as an immediate reaction at the time.

We since have decided that we were just plain thoroughly wrong in our analysis. At least five other school proposals have been on the ballot in other communities during the past three weeks, and every single one has been approved by the voters.

On the identical day that Plymouth's was losing, a similar brace of requests passed in close-by Farmington.

So, something unique is wrong in Plymouth. Our best idea now is that there were too many things tied up in one package.

If the Board were to come back again, with some particular part of the previous package, and to explain it in a crystal-clear way, uncomplicated by other measures for the time being, well... maybe that would make a difference.

As was revealed on our Page One last week, the Township of Plymouth now is seeking to tap into city of Detroit water at the Livonia city limits at Eckles and Plymouth Road during the next year. The Township hopes to get 500 gallons per minute of Detroit water.

To do this, the Township must secure the permission of Livonia's city council. (The move has the blessing of the City of Detroit water department, which furnishes water to Livonia and has just arranged to increase the supply going there in 1960.) Supervisor Roy Lindsay has told the Livonia council, "Our existing wells are adequate for normal use, but we must have an auxiliary service in the interest of our industrial needs."

Anyway, your editor's reaction to the request first was registered in The Livonian, a sister paper. We now quote, for your interest, from a column published there last week:

Some of the most crucial decisions in local government are made on matters which have the most innocent outward appearance.

We state the foregoing with practical humility. In our years reporting the Livonia scene, it took much time and grief before we really became aware that you couldn't always tell the contents of the bottle by the label.

Nor, in some cases, do the people making the decision know what kind of reaction they may be starting. Sometimes the bottle is full of bees and mosquitos, and there isn't the slightest hint until the cork is released.

A current case in point involves a request from Plymouth Township, Livonia's adjacent neighbor to the west, for permission to draw 500 gallons of water per minute from Livonia lines at Eckles and Plymouth Rd., starting next year.

The Council tabled this on a technical point of law Monday night. We don't know how it ultimately will be voted, but suspect it'll be approved... and that might be the correct decision. Listen, and judge for yourself.

At this moment, however, there are facts which the Councilmen, who determine the fate, don't even suspect.

First, Plymouth Township, as a matter of simple necessity, could get along on its present basis (without growth) if it never draws a drop of water from Livonia's lines.

Plymouth Township has operated on wells every moment thus far in its history. Its entire water system today consists of 3.5 miles of line, two small wells, and a storage tank at Lakepointe Village. This system was installed by a sub-divider and deeded back to Plymouth Township.

All other homes in the Township have their own well supply. It never has been otherwise.

More than that, to the immediate west of Plymouth Township is located the City of Plymouth. The latter has enough extra water to supply the existing residences and industry of the Township of Plymouth for the next five years.

Then, by 1965, a main water line from Detroit will have dropped southward into the Plymouth area and there will be unlimited Detroit water for both City and Township to abandon well water supply.

We said we were talking as a matter of absolute NECESSITY in saying the Township could survive without Livonia water at this time.

Contrasted to the "necessity" of the matter, however, there is the preference of Plymouth Township to hook up to the City of Detroit system rather than buy from the City of Plymouth.

Plymouth and Plymouth Township are an old, established community. Historically they are one, the central city surrounded by lightly-populated land. The outside has remained to this day under Township government; the interior is an incorporated Charter City. Each has about 7,500 population.

About 10 years ago, growth signs appeared. Big factories moved into the area, out in the Township, where land was open and cheap.

The central city at this point began efforts to annex or combine with the Township, so as to put the big new industrial tax base under the whole community package.

Rival political personalities appeared, and great bitterness grew. Old Township natives, enjoying their low taxes and new industry (and cheap land that someday might be subdivided into a fortune) resisted the rude efforts by the City to "grab."

This gulf spread and spread... until last spring an election was held and, by a narrow margin, voters in the Township elected to incorporate into a "new City of Plymouth Heights."

This can't become official until another charter election is held, but the "new city" is a fearful and real thing in many Plymouth minds.

If it should come to pass, the old city, with its underground facilities, its paving, its police and fire facilities, its schools, and what all, will be sealed off, while a new unit (with most of the heavy tax base) will start on its own to duplicate everything and build a new political empire.

The original City will, in effect, become a hole in a geographical doughnut. The present Township wraps, crescent-shaped, around the City of Plymouth.

A genuine "community" (from a historical, sociological sense) will be divided into two alien parts. And then, out in the open areas of the Township, the swift suburban growth will be triggered. All this, if water arrives in big quantities.

Perhaps now you see why the Township of Plymouth wants water from Livonia, when all it presently needs is at hand, right in its own backyard.

Perhaps you can see why it is willing to invest taxpayers' money for pumps, storage, lines, and who knows what else—to set up a separate system over a 15 mile line—when Detroit water will be right next door if it just waits five more years. And City of Plymouth water is available right now, a few yards across the border.

If you realize what the adding of sewer and water mean in dollars to a holder of raw land, then doubtless you realize what kind of stakes are involved when fresh water arrives in a Township for the very first time.

And, if you've hung on until now, you realize that the decision Livonia's Council makes on this one, innocent-sounding "tap-in" request, is something that will send heavy shock waves out in many directions, in places and in ways of which the Councilmen have never dreamed.

And all of what we've said today is above and beyond the "normal" decision the Council would make—does Livonia have any water to spare, in the first place?

## Buy Toys to Fit Child, Not Yourself, Dr. Molner Advises

Now that the biggest "toy time" is here, if you intend to give toys, know what the child can use before you buy them, Dr. Joseph G. Molner, City-County Health Commissioner, advises. Adults must watch that they do not buy gifts to please themselves rather than to give pleasure to the child.

Make sure one of your first considerations is the child's happiness, but remember that safety and suitability for age are important if they are to bring this happiness. Wise selection of toys as gifts by aunts and other relatives will help give the child's parents an enjoyable Christmas in addition to delighting the child. Select toys that are durable and simple to give to young children. They should be easily cleaned and not have removable parts small enough to be swallowed. Each toy should stimulate its owner to some activity, either mental or physical. Some of the longtime favorites which meet this requirement include dolls, wagons which have pull strings or round handles and blocks with rounded corners.



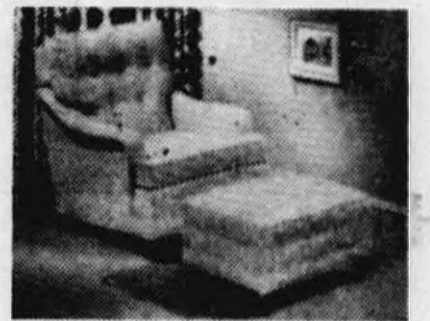

would be no change in the rate and potability of the water, according to Stewart.

Each of the five dispensing units would cost about \$600 and the annual cost for Calgon (Sodium Hexametaphosphate) would be \$1,460 a year.

The committee decided that after each rusty water complaint, an investigation should be made as to the trouble and a form filed out as to location of the home, piping, softness, water heaters, rust occurrence, etc. Trouble spots would be indicated on a map to determine if this were an overall or isolated case.

From observations so far, most complaints are localized.

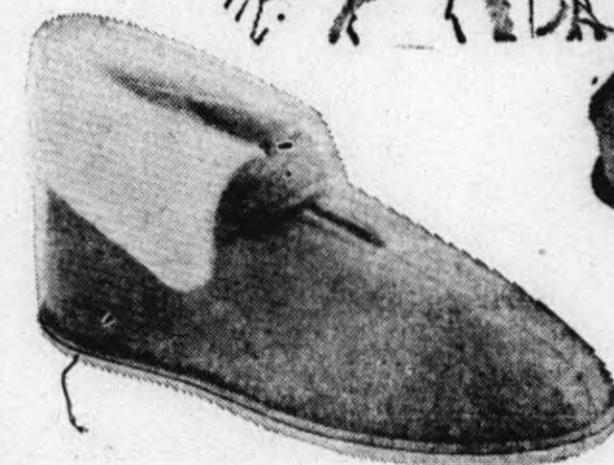

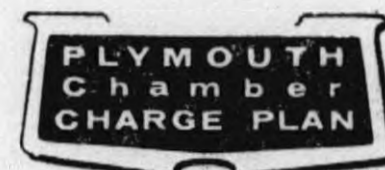

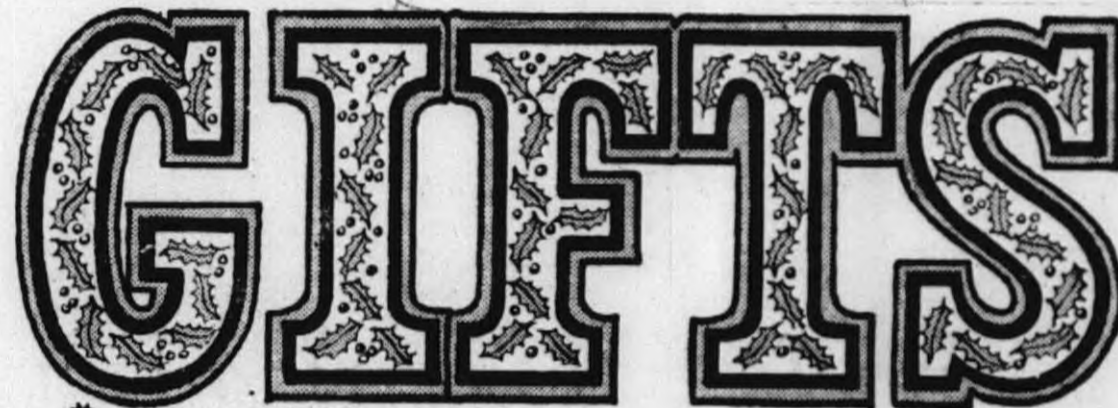

The good Bishop was granted permission by Pope Junius I to appoint a group of theologians to determine as accurately as possible, the exact date of Christ's nativity.

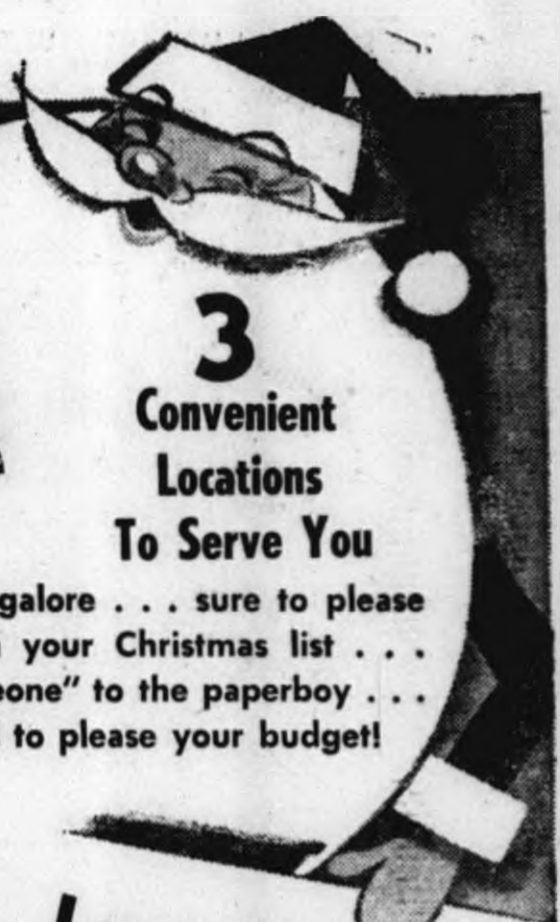

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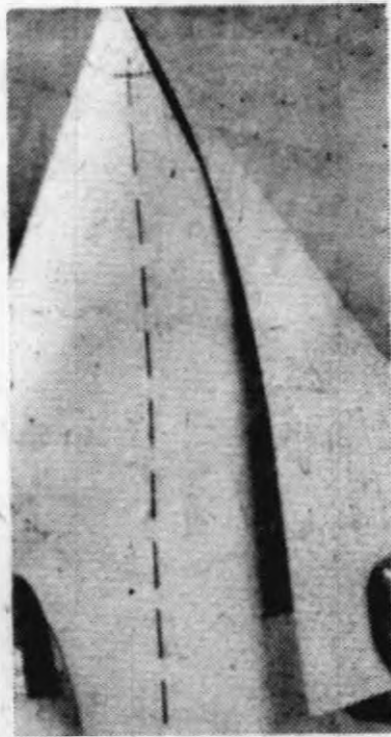
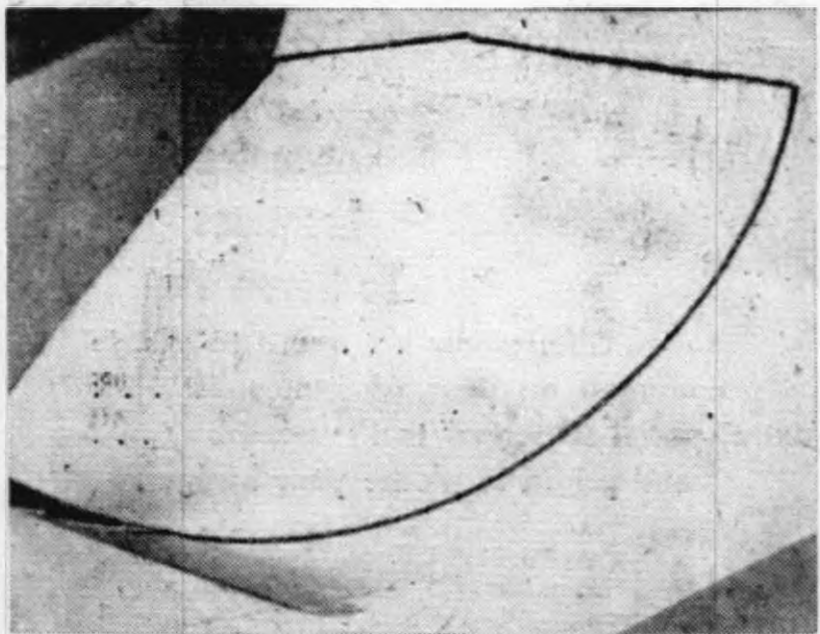

**A.** Wrap strip of black paper around can; pull firmly and glue. The can forms the base. Using pink construction paper, draw large outline as pictured for Santa's head. Straight sides measure 8 1/2 inches; the diameter is 15 1/4 inches; and the radius is 8 1/2 inches. Draw smaller outline on red construction paper for Santa's hat. The straight sides measure 4 3/4 inches; the diameter is 8 1/2 inches; and the radius is 4 3/4 inches. Cut out both outlines.

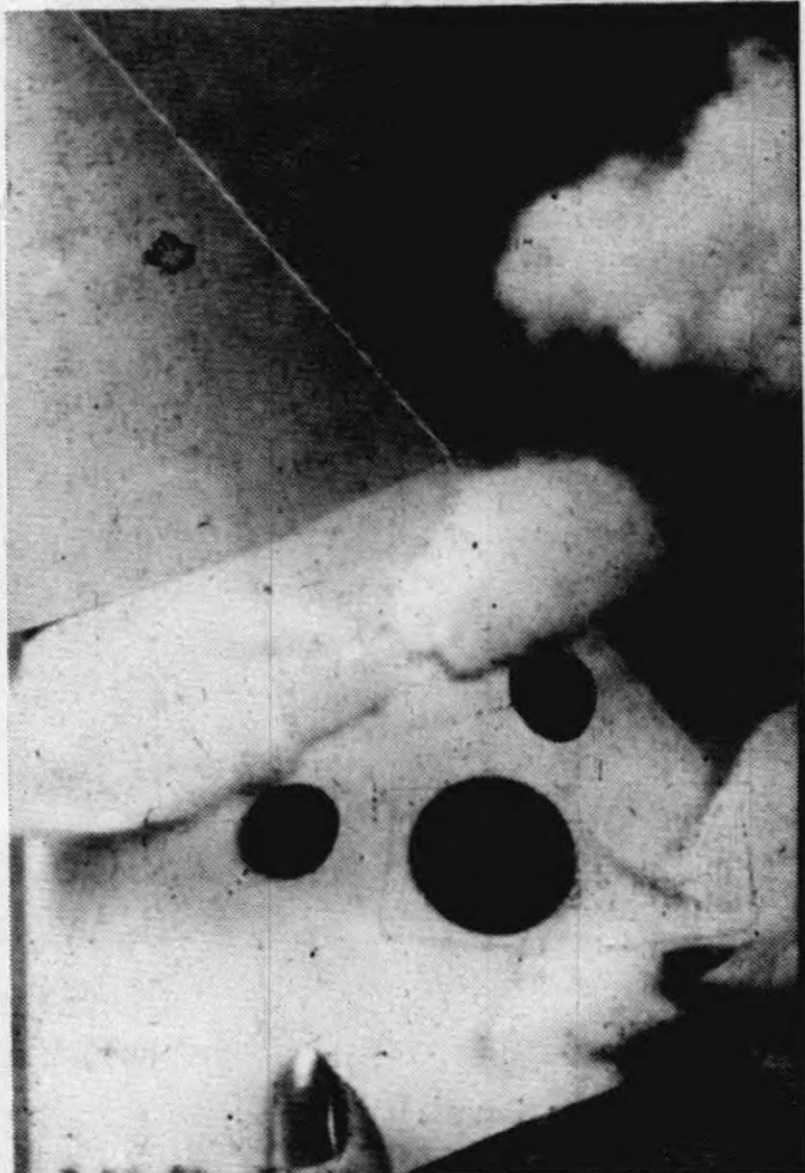
**B.** Form each outline into a cone and glue securely. Dotted line shown above indicates slight overlap where glue is applied. Cut a tiny circle out of the top of each cone to prevent wrinkling; glue red cone over pink cone.

## Decorative Ideas About Grapefruit

NEW YORK (UPI)—Looking for an unusual centerpiece for your Christmas dinner table? Make grapefruit turkeys.

Cut four rows of deep slits in grapefruit peel, covering a third of the fruit. For tail feathers, insert thick green leaves such as rhododendron with the tips cut straight across. Place the smallest leaves in front. Make deep slits on the sides of the fruit and insert a leaf (do not trim tip) in each side for wings.

Use a shelled almond for the head, held in place by a pin. Cut a waddle from pimento. Make breast feathers by cutting scallops in the peel below the waddle, using an apple corer with rounded side down.



**C.** With pencil, lightly outline shape of area for beard; glue on cotton for beard and eyebrows. Glue flat candy wafer in place for nose. Split a licorice drop crosswise and glue in place for eyes. Add a fluff of cotton for tassel on hat.

Cold brisk air perfumed with the odor of pine, the sound of bells above the roar of traffic on busy streets, smuggled packages, and family secrets remind us that it's time once again to think of Christmas.

Half the fun of the season fills the weeks before when everybody's busily preparing for the big day. Gather your family around and let them all share in dressing up your home for Christmas. Include the children, too, for little tots usually have more imagination than adults if provided with the materials they like to work with.

A good idea for a family project is a gay holiday cookie canister. It's decorative as well as useful, easy enough for youngsters to assemble, and inexpensive, too. Starting point is a three-pound shortening can; Santa's hat, face, and beard are made with art paper, cotton, candy, and glue.

Ways to use the cookie jar are limited only by your imagination and ingenuity. Place it on a breakfast bar or window in the kitchen, on a table or buffet in the living room. Circled by a wreath of pine at the base, it becomes an attractive centerpiece. When filled with homemade cookies, it makes a thoughtful remembrance for the children's teacher or a friend or neighbor down the

block. It costs practically nothing so it can be discarded after the holidays, if you wish.

Materials which you'll need to make the cookie jar are:  
1 three-pound shortening can with lid  
1 sheet of pink construction paper 10 x 17 inches  
1 sheet of red construction paper 8 1/2 x 10 inches  
1 strip of black construction paper 17 1/2 x 5 1/2 inches  
1 small bolt of cotton  
Flat candy wafers and black licorice drops  
1 small tube of glue

To assemble the cookie canister, follow the step-by-step directions below in the photographs.

### ALMOND WAFERS

1/2 cup Pream  
1 cup shortening  
1/4 cup water  
2 cups sifted flour  
Combine all ingredients and blend thoroughly. Chill at least one hour. Roll about 1/4-inch thick. Cut into rounds with 1 1/2-inch cookie cutter or glass. Coat rounds on both sides with sugar by placing on waxed paper that has been sprinkled heavily with sugar.

Place on ungreased baking sheet; prick in about four places with fork. Bake at 375 degrees F. until slightly puffy but not brown. When cool, make sandwiches with filling below. Makes 5 dozen 1 1/2-inch sandwich cookies.

### ALMOND FILLING

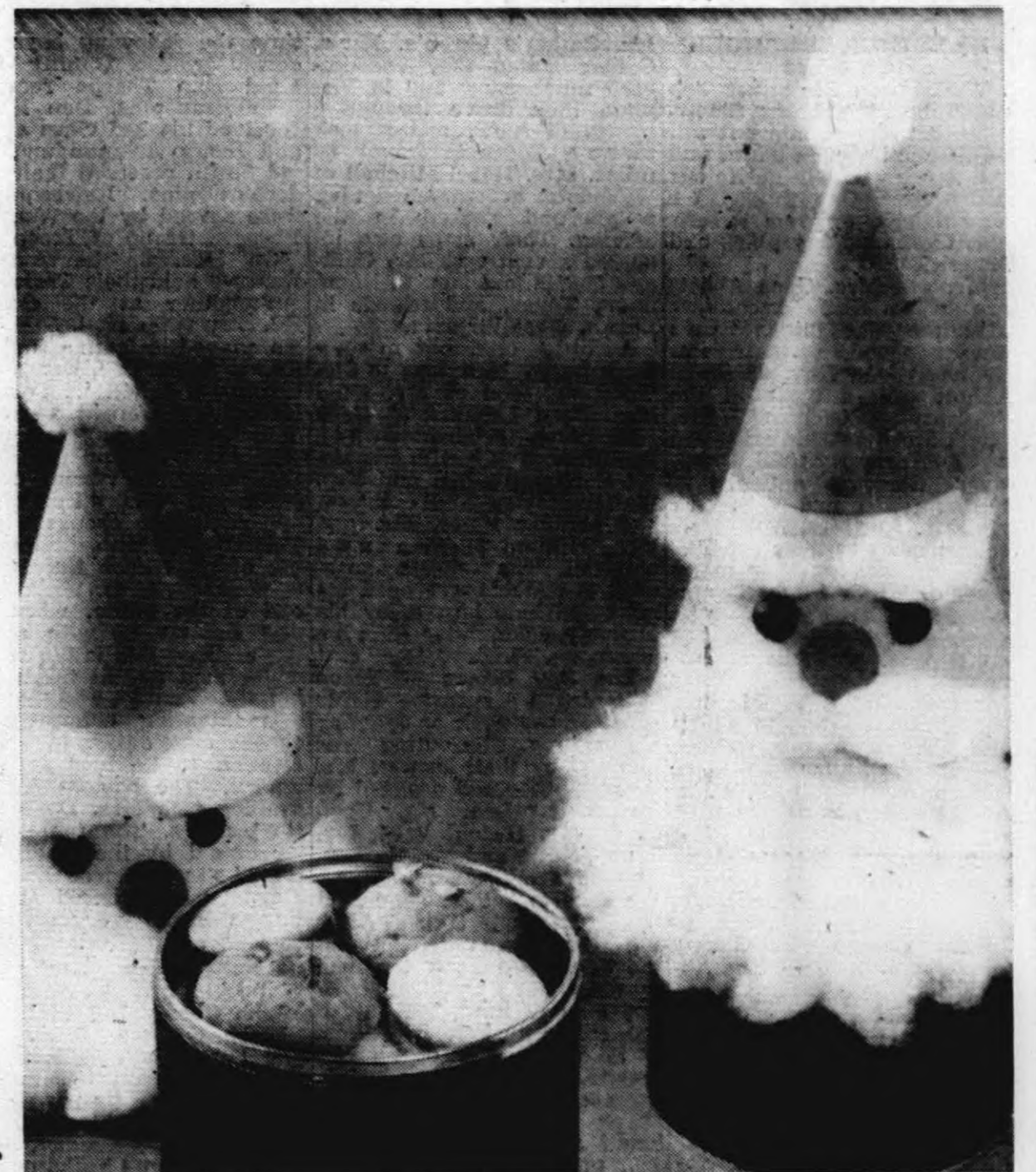
Combine 2 tablespoons Pream, 2 tablespoons shortening, 1 1/2 cups confectioners' sugar, 2 to 3 teaspoons hot water, and 1/4 teaspoon almond flavoring; blend until smooth.

For Chocolate Filling, omit almond flavoring; add 1 square unsweetened chocolate, melted. (If necessary for spreading consistency, add additional water, 1/2 teaspoon at a time).

### BUTTERSOTCH NUT DROPS

1/2 cup shortening  
1 1/2 cups brown sugar, packed  
2 eggs  
3 cups sifted flour  
1/2 cup Pream  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon soda  
1/2 cup water  
2 tablespoons vinegar  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
3/4 cup chopped nuts  
Cream together shortening, sugar, and eggs. Beat until light and fluffy. Sift together flour, Pream, salt, baking powder, and soda. Combine vinegar and water. Add dry ingredients and water mixture alternately to creamed mixture. Mix thoroughly. Stir in vanilla and nuts.

Chill dough; drop from teaspoon, 2 inches apart, on lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake at 400 degrees F. 10 to 12 minutes. Cool. Makes about 4 dozen.

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## Holiday Topping For Gingerbread

**Christmas Seal Buyers Help With \$7,200 DeHoCo Gift**

A \$7,200 Christmas Seal gift officially was handed to the commission of the Detroit House of Correction last week by the Tuberculosis and Health Society of Wayne County.

It was no surprise and no Christmas gift "exchange" will be necessary. The Society donated the Christmas Seal chest X-ray equipment which, for the last 11 months, the House of Correction has been trying on for size. It's a perfect fit.

The equipment first was installed last January 5, for a trial period. Its aim: To protect prison staff members and inmates from infectious TB.

Prisoners are routinely X-rayed when they are admitted. Doctors at nearby William Maybury Sanatorium have read the 6,448 X-ray pictures taken since last January and have found 84 active cases of TB. That is 12 times the rate of tuberculosis found in the general population. Employees also are given periodic examinations. Prisoners found with TB are immediately treated at Maybury or at the prison hospital in Jackson.

Besides tuberculosis, 539 prisoners were found to have chest abnormalities, heart conditions or lung tumors, during the trial period.

William E. Shane, co-chairman of the 1959 Christmas Seal Sale and vice-president of the Michigan Bell Telephone Co., made the presentation along with Richard L. Lea of Plymouth, executive director of the TB and Health Society.

"I can't think of a better way to protect the public against spread of this disease," said Shane, "and at

the same time help these people overcome their health problems. It's just one example of the work Christmas Seal dollars do all year long."

Christmas Seal contributions provide the sole support for the programs of the TB and Health Society and the Detroit Tuberculosis Sanatorium. The funds are used for

medical research; for teaching both children and adults to protect themselves from TB and other diseases by living a healthy life; for medical social service to patients and their families; and for a summer camp for 500 children from TB families.

The Christmas Seal Campaign continues to the end of the year.

**The CITY MANAGER'S CORNER**

Guarding your civil rights and accounting for your tax money requires many detailed and involved legislative and administrative procedures. In our previous column we looked into the special assessment procedure from the time the Annual Budget is being prepared, when it was only an idea to undertake some public improvement, up through the moment the assessment roll is confirmed and the treasurer is directed to collect the amounts which have been assessed. Now, we will complete our discussion of the procedure by showing how the rolls are handled once they have been created.

After a public hearing has been held on an assessment roll, it is confirmed by the City Commission. The date of confirmation is written on the roll and from that date, the roll is final and conclusive

for the purpose of the improvement to which it applies. It is, however, subject to an adjustment to conform to the actual cost of the project. Because the roll is final, there can be no change from the original plans and specifications for the project as adopted by the Commission unless express authority for a change, a copy of the resolution permitting it must be attached to the original plans and specifications, which have been filed in the clerk's office.

Within 60 days after the completion of the public improvement, the manager is required to compile a report of the actual cost of the project. This report is certified to the Treasurer who then adjusts the roll to correspond to the actual cost of the project. If the assessment roll does not provide enough money to meet the actual costs of the improvement, the Commission may make an additional assessment, but the total amount assessed cannot exceed the costs of the project.

On the other hand, if the original assessment provided money 5 percent or less in excess of the actual cost of the project, the commission may place that excess in the city treasury. However, if the excess on the roll is more than 5 percent of the total costs of the project, the excess is refunded on a pro-rata basis. In either case, whether the excess is more or less than 5 percent of the total cost, the Commission may, by resolution, provide that the excess be allowed as a credit on the last installments, if those installments are still unpaid, or a refund made to those who had paid their assessments in full.

The money that is raised by special assessment to defray the cost of any local improvement must, according to our charter, be held in a special fund to pay the cost of the project, or repay any money borrowed or advanced for the project. Each such account must be used only for the improvement project for which the assessment was levied. At the present time, the city is maintaining about 65 active special assessment accounts. The other accounts have been paid in full and have been retired. The rolls are kept in the city vaults as evidence that the various assessments have been paid.

The record is necessary, not only for active rolls, but the retired rolls as well, because an unpaid special assessment is a lien upon property. If the assessment is not paid for a period of three years, a tax sale will be held according to the regulations for any other tax delinquency. To prevent such an occurrence, the accounting department keeps accurate and up-to-date records of each assessment roll.

Whenever an installment comes due, the interest is computed and bills are sent to the owners of record. When the bills are paid, a receipt is delivered to the accounting department so the assessment rolls may once again be brought up to date.

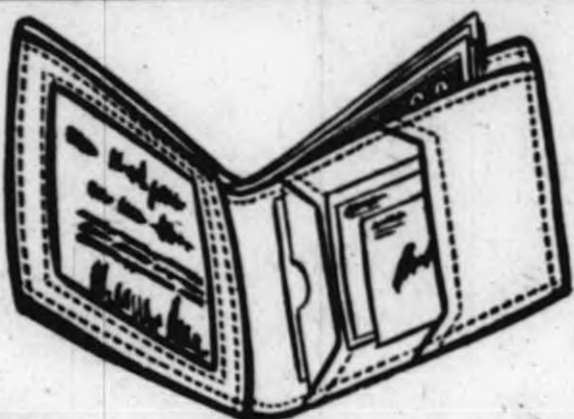

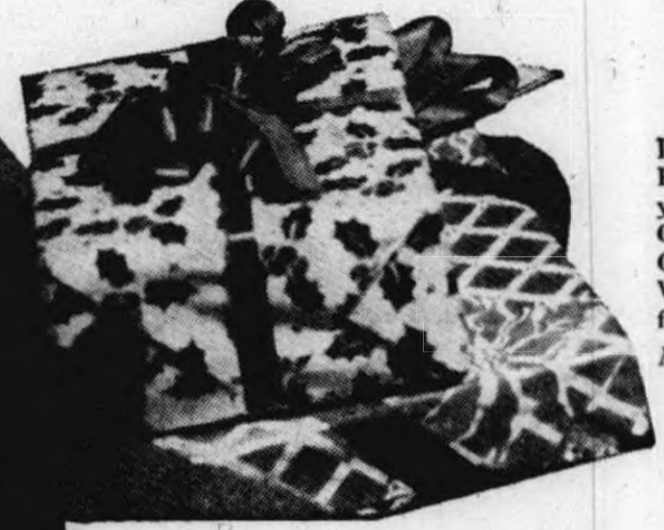

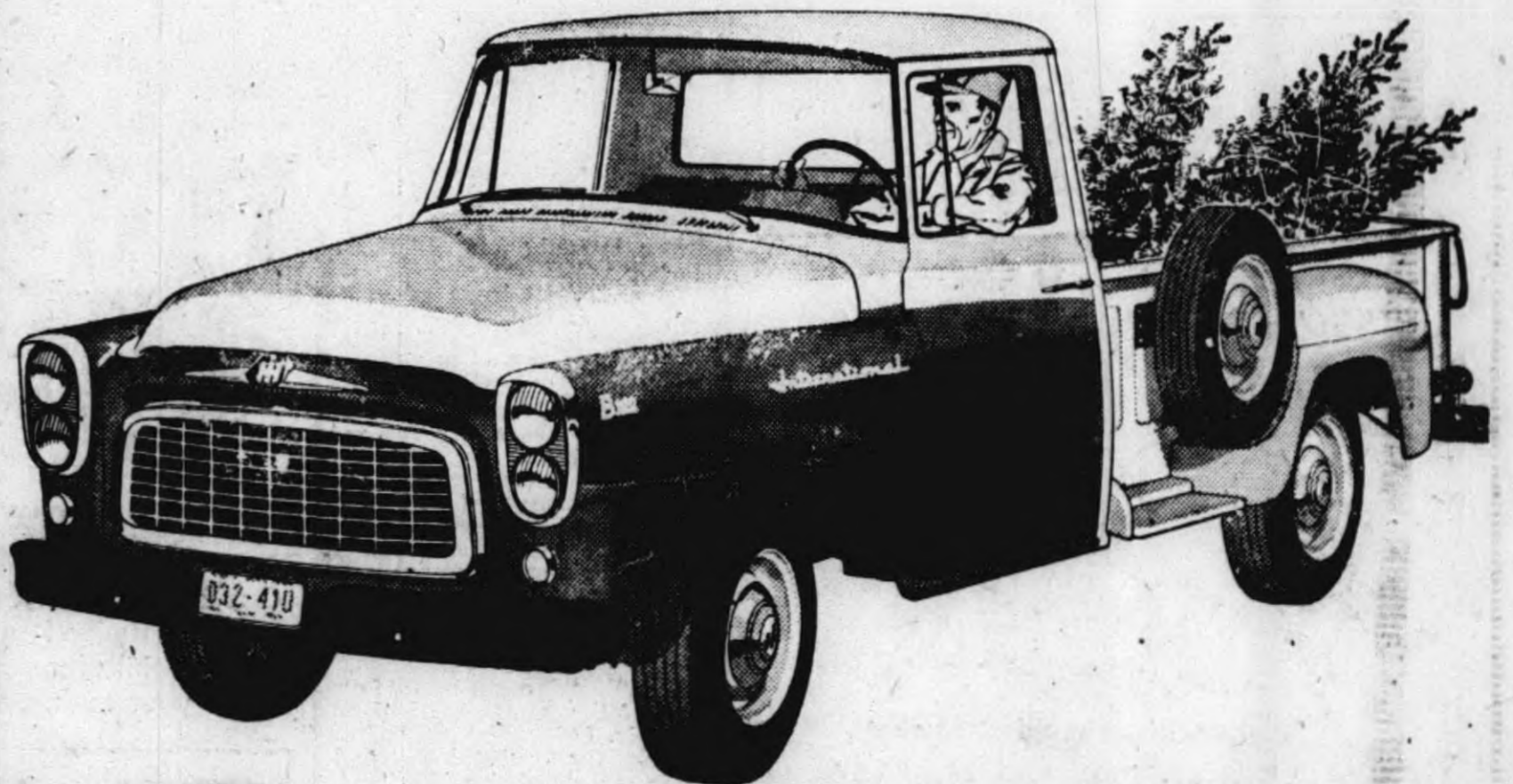

**Hotels Face Sharp Challenge From Plush Downtown Motels**

CHICAGO (UPI)—In nearly every major American city, motels are moving downtown to challenge the established hotels.  
These new metropolitan motels, however, are a far cry from the small tourist courts that can be found on the outskirts of cities everywhere.

These are lavish, multi-million-dollar edifices which look suspiciously like hotels. But they still stress the same convenience and informality which have made their country cousins so popular with motorists.  
In Chicago, the classified telephone directory now lists 25 motels within the city limits — all of them built since 1953.

One of the plushiest is the 12-story Lake Tower Motel, just north of the Loop on Lake Shore Drive. It contains 150 units, cost \$3,500,000 to build and claims the distinction of being the world's tallest motel.  
The Lake Tower's manager, Robert A. Jenkins, managed hotels for 26 years. But he says he saw "the handwriting on the wall," and went into the motel business.

"Hotel occupancy rates dropped from 93 per cent in 1946 to 70 per cent in 1957," he said. "Most of that business went to motels."  
Jenkins believes the city motel is the answer to congestion, lack of parking space, high parking rates and bothersome tipping. It is also cheaper than a comparable hotel, he declared.

A single room at the Lake Tower starts at \$12. The rate includes free parking in a three-story garage, free bus service downtown and a swimming pool.  
About 20 major cities now have motels in or close to their downtown areas, he said.  
The largest is the huge 370-room Marriott Motor Hotel in Washington, D. C. near the Pentagon. It cost \$5,000,000, is sound-proofed and air conditioned and boasts two swimming pools.

An even larger building, the 415-room Motel City, is now going up on Ninth Avenue in New York City. This \$4,000,000 motel will include gardens, cocktail lounges, a restaurant and many other features of a fancy resort.  
An \$8,000,000 motel, the Jack Tar, is planned for downtown San Francisco. It will have 400 rooms.  
New Orleans has a 265-room motel being constructed near the city's civic center. Houston, Tex., has two in the heart of town. And a 350-room unit is being built in Philadelphia.

The hotel men have apparently reconciled themselves to the fact that city motels are here to stay. The Greater Chicago Hotel Association has admitted 11 motels to its membership.

British Style Lunches  
LONDON (UPI) — "Chic" luncheons, British style, are due to appear on New York restaurant menus next year according to the London Daily Mirror.  
Its food writer, without naming them, said two New York restaurateurs had been in London studying inexpensive menu items, with a view to making British tourists feel at home when eating out in New York. Dishes that reportedly made their list: sage and mash; shepherd's pie, and chips and dumplings.

**Big Joe Is Santa The Year-Around**

NEW YORK (UPI) — A woman with a baby girl in her arms and a little boy tagging along behind came up to the desk of Joe Rosenfield Jr.  
"Big Joe" wrote her a check for \$83.90. "Now go home and pay that rent," he told her sternly. She made her exit muttering thank-yous.  
Rosenfield had just dispensed some more happiness at his office above the movie houses and pinball parlors of West 42nd Street. "Her husband's been out of work and they were going to be evicted," he explained.  
In a reception room, 20 men and women with troubles written on their faces were waiting to see Big Joe. Some of them would go on his radio show to tell their stories. Listeners would be invited to send in a few dollars to help them out.  
The "Happiness Exchange," as Rosenfield calls his non-profit foundation, recently hit the jackpot. A listener left Big Joe \$1,000,000 in her will.  
Mrs. Dewitt Page of Bristol, Conn., widow of a vice president of General Motors, bequeathed the Happiness Exchange 22,000 shares of GM stock currently listed at over \$5 a share. At the recent dividend rate of \$2 a share, the foundation can expect an income of \$44,000 a year from the stock.  
Big Joe was going through a foot-high stack of mail on his desk. A check fluttered out of almost every envelope.  
"We first heard from Mrs. Page about three years ago," he said. "She sent \$10 for one of the people we had on the air. Later, she sent other checks for \$10; and \$25, and then one came for \$500."  
Rosenfield called Mrs. Page to thank her, and on her next birthday he sent her a card. Her next check was for \$40,000, which the Happiness Exchange invested in AT&T stock that is earning \$2,800 a year.  
"I never met her, except by phone. She was blind and she didn't know how she looked, so she avoided people and spent most of her time alone," Rosenfield said.  
Mrs. Page died Oct. 10 at the age of 88, income from her bequest will go into the charity program that gives medicine, hearing aids, eye-

Glasses, wheelchairs and cash to as many as 200 persons a day. Rosenfield said.  
"Most of our cases are people who are behind in their rent, or having their gas and lights turned off. We also run an employment service for people over 40, and we've paid the train fare for 500 drug addicts to get to the Federal hospital at Lexington, Ky.," he said.  
Rosenfield, 59, is a former newspaperman who ran a similar "happiness" radio show in New Orleans before moving 10 years ago to New York, where it is broadcast over station WABC. The show is broadcast seven nights a week from midnight to 4 a.m., and 22 different advertisers use it for commercials.

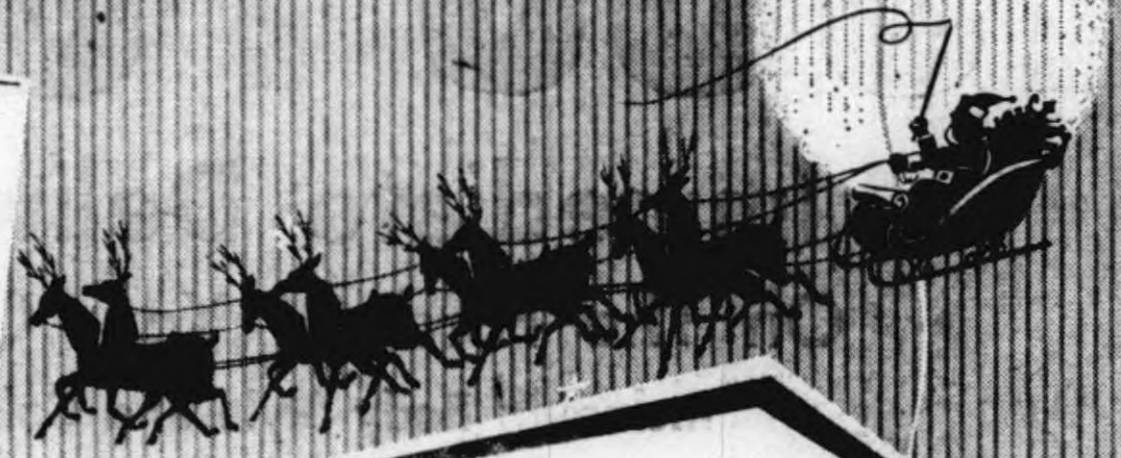

Deer Harvest Good but Pheasant Harvest Falls Below Million

Hunters killed approximately 108,000 deer in Michigan during the November 15-30 regular and special firearm seasons to record their best harvest since 1952, a pre-season report of the Conservation Department indicates.

Although the Department's pre-season kill estimate of 113,000 was not reached, this marks the sixth straight season that deer take has increased. A record 15,828 deer were brought south across the State's reports from the Mackinac Bridge reveal. This figure is almost 2,500 above the previous high set in 1958. From all reports, buck kill dropped about 7,500 to 9,500 below the 1958 total of 72,880. Department game officials predicted this in view of starvation losses last winter. Under this year's liberalized special seasons, antlerless take approached the 46-

000 quota set by the Department to ward off heavy deer losses this winter. Special permit hunters took 26,000 antlerless deer last year.

Pheasant hunters this fall failed to harvest 1,000,000 birds for the first time since 1952, according to a Conservation Department estimate. The estimate, based upon field reports, indicates the ringneck kill approached 950,000. Slightly more than 1,180,000 pheasants were bagged during the 1958 season. Several factors clouded over-all hunting success. A marked drop in breeding numbers made a 27 percent dent below last year in the state's pheasant population. The forecast of fewer birds, coupled with rainy weather during the season, the opening day, apparently lessened hunting pressure estimated at roughly 20 per cent below the 1958 level.

# Many Drivers Will Die During Holiday Season

WILL YOU SUFFER the loss of a loved one before the end of the holiday season? An extra effort to see that you don't is underway by the Michigan Highway Safety Commission and news media of the state.

Accidents and highway deaths increased during December. Few people like to discuss it, but a little thought right now might save your life, or your involvement in an accident costing someone's life.

"Drinking drivers or pedestrians account for 42 percent of the accidents," says Joseph A. Childs, commissioner of state police. "And this percentage is higher in December."

Childs is not talking about drunks so much as the great number of moderate drinkers who are not considered drunk at all. Regardless of a person's capacity and attitudes about drinking, the hard fact is that people who have been drinking are involved in disproportionately high percent of accidents.

The moral is clear: If you drink, do not drive!

Extra driving care is required because of frosty windshields or icy roads. Carelessness is a vicious thing which is a danger to all drivers.

Childs pointed out that the "good" driver is commonly involved in serious accidents. "It's not fair to blame our whole problem on teenagers and drinking," he stated. "While these groups merit special consideration, it is important to realize that many names which appear on accident records are listed there for the first time. They have a long record of good driving — or maybe good luck — and in a moment of carelessness they become involved."

How do you keep the public concerned? That's the main problem faced by safety experts. Listed below are some topics they consider important:

There are 50,000 "accident prone" drivers on the roads today — 20,000 more than last year.

There is a great increase in the number of drivers without licenses. These include drivers whose licenses have expired, those who never received a license, and most importantly, drivers who have been ruled off the road. (Try an experiment. Right now, check the expiration date on your license. Then ask 10 of your friends to do the same. Chances are you would find someone whose license is expired.)

Tougher enforcement by local officials is required. Safety officials will ask police officers to check licenses more carefully and urge judges to be more severe with drivers whose licenses have been revoked.

An effort to make it "vulgar" rather than "wicked" to violate traffic regulations will be undertaken. A great part of the problem is considered to be the public's attitude about driving. The new concept, if it can be created, would help.

The push for a Christmas safety campaign is only part of the story. Those who work in this field know the problem requires constant and long term attention. Since many interested parties, including a Michigan Press Association Traffic Safety Committee, began work six years ago, a number of recommendations of traffic experts were put into effect. As the state's record improved substantially it seems the importance of these has slipped from public attention.

Exactly 50 people died in traffic accidents last year in the 78 hour period at Christmas. If the record is to be better this year, it will take the cooperation of all drivers.

If the number of people who are maimed or killed on streets and highway is to be reduced to the minimum over the next 12 months, it will take the attention and the effort of everyone.

Every individual in the state has something to say about the answer.

# Textbooks Luring Stocks

Most businessmen and investors are well aware of the economic impact of the long "baby boom" of the past two decades. The obvious needs of growing families — for food, clothing, and shelter — have been reflected in the sustained high rates of retail sales and residential building.

The important task of educating these children has also been in the public eye, but chiefly because of the soaring tax rates in response to the constant rise in public spending for schools.

While population trends have directed investor favor toward companies in the food, clothing, building and recreation fields, the rise in school enrollments is destined to benefit still another industry in the next few years. This is the small, but rapidly growing, textbook publishing business.

In the past fifteen years, textbook sales have risen more than fourfold; this uptrend should continue.

The crop of "war babies," representing the initial phase of the baby boom, are now firmly entrenched in high school. Hence, sales of elementary and high school textbooks have enjoyed a substantial growth of de-

mand since World War II. And sales of college textbooks have by no means lagged.

Government educational grants to ex-service men created a sharp bulge in postwar college enrollments. Hence, colleges have not had to await the natural sequence of population growth to reap the bene-

fits of increased enrollment.

Moreover, the upgrading of family incomes and the rapid expansion of the middle-income class have enabled and encouraged a larger percentage of high school graduates to seek college education.

Aside from population trends, the shortage of teachers and the need for

improved material presentation afford challenging opportunities for textbook publishers. Rapid changes in the fields of science are inflicting a high rate of obsolescence upon standard textbooks, creating additional business.

The outlook, therefore, is bright for the textbook publishing field.

## If Your Name Is 'Priscilla'

"Priscilla" is a name that makes us think about the early settlers, and evokes the notion of virtues ascribed to the Puritans. For instance, a sort of white ruffled curtain with the crisp clean starched look we believe to have been the pride of a Puritan housewife, goes by the name of priscilla.

Although a favorite with the early settlers, the name Priscilla had been around much earlier. It is a name from the Bible, revived from the Reformation. In the Acts of the Apostles, in the New Testament, a woman called Priscilla is mentioned. Historians of the early Church commemorated her and her husband, Aquila.

Priscilla, or Prisca, and Aquila, were pupils of St. Paul, and Aquila was a tent-maker by trade, as was the apostle. Prisca and Aquila owned their home, and it became a gathering place for early Christians, first at Ephesus, and later at Rome. On the Aventine Hill, in Rome, is a church named St. Prisca, and this was erected on the site of a more ancient one, a so-called Title Church, that is, one of the churches that were private homes to which a member of the community held title. Priscilla and her husband owned one of the two oldest houses serving as churches. — There was another Priscilla, later on; she was an

early Christian martyr who suffered beheading.

Literally "Priscilla" means "little old woman"; the name is derived from the Latin word "prisca" which means "ancient."

There is a famous Priscilla in our literature, Priscilla Mullins in H. W. Longfellow's "Courtship of Miles Standish." She is the girl John Alden wooed for his friend, Miles Standish, and won for himself; an inevitable outcome, because winning a girl's love is a thing "if you would have it well done... you must do it yourself." This, according to the words Longfellow put in John Alden's mouth. Priscilla and John Alden were ancestors of Longfellow, and so their story had a special significance for him.

Priscilla and John crossed on the "Mayflower," and John Alden, a young cooper from Southampton, England, is said to have been the first to step ashore. Priscilla, by her last name Mullins, was of French Huguenot ancestry.

Although today the name "Priscilla" is by no means among the most popular ones, there still are more than 20,000 Priscillas in these U.S.

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### Phone Cable Work Begins in Joy-Main Area of Plymouth

Work is underway on a \$21,433 project to provide additional telephone facilities for subscribers in S. Main and Joy Road area and faster service between Plymouth and Wayne, Ypsilanti, and Belleville.

William Dunn, Plymouth area manager for Michigan Bell Telephone Company, said the expenditure is part of the \$302,000 the company is spending in Plymouth this year to improve and expand service.

The project calls for 2,700 feet of underground conduit and cable along Elmhurst from Ann Arbor Road to Joy Road.

"The added facilities will enable the company to fill new orders for service and orders for better grades of service," Dunn said, "as well as provide faster service between Plymouth and Wayne, Ypsilanti, and Belleville."

Scheduled for completion the latter part of December, the project will use a cable containing 455 pairs of telephone wires.

A new oil refinery near Adelaide, South Australia, will have docks capable of accommodating 80,000 ton tankers.

Old George has a confession relative to a strange idiosyncrasy that has plagued him now for many years. No, it's not tied directly to the theatrical field strangely enough. Maraschino cherries are the dastardly culprit! For years I deplored the stinky soda jerks as they put one and only one maraschino cherry on the top of a sundae. Last week gathering up courage, old George kicked over the traces and bought a large jar of cherries. It was my pleasure this week to festoon two scoops of ice cream with eight—yes, count 'em—eight maraschino cherries. It's wonderful to spurge and live life to the hilt.

Life is far from a fancy bowl of maraschino cherries as pictured in the current play at the Shubert Theater, the Pulitzer Prize winner "J.B." "J.B." is a dramatic retelling of the Biblical Book of Job. Once a decade a production with the stature and maturity of "J.B." comes to town. I urge all of you to sidetrack some of that Christmas money for a ticket to this highly competent production at the Shubert. It will be in Detroit through Sunday, Dec. 13.

Basil Rathbone and Michael Higgins perform their roles in masterful fashion. To act in a verse play and make the lines come naturally and with the proper force takes years of dramatic experience. The cast at the Shubert has that experience. Director Elia Kazan can properly take a few bows for his efforts in keeping Archibald MacLeish's writing alive and moving during the evening. His direction helps the audience grasp the true significance of the memorable second act.

Late in the second act, the three comforters come on to offer sardonic solace to the long-suffering J.B. or Job. To me this was the high point of the play. Bert Conway as Bildad put zest and vigor into his speeches so that their meaning cut deeper than a razor swunge in a wild rage. Listen to J.B.'s speech at this point in the play:

**J.B.:**  
The hand of God has touched me. Look at me!  
Every hope I ever had,  
Every work I've ever done,  
Every work I've ever done,  
Annulled as though I had not done it.  
My trace extinguished in the land;  
My children dead, my father's name  
Obliterated in the sunlight everywhere...  
Love has left me.

**BILDAD:**  
Love! (a great guffaw) What's love to Him? One man's misery!

**J.B.:**  
(hardly daring) If I am innocent...?

The scene continues with each comforter heaping more verbal woes upon poor Job until you wonder how any human being could take so much physical and mental punishment. As I said earlier, this play has a powerful message: Man must have faith, trust in a higher order, and love his fellow-man. "J.B." provides the right entertainment "change of climate." Here is an evening in the theater that makes you think about your philosophy of life in a most exciting manner.

# Survey Shows A Common Glass Is A Health Hazard

There's one health hazard in every home that is neglected by most housewives. It's used as a receptacle for false teeth; a handy holder for tooth brushes and paste; a mixing bowl for mouth and eye washes; an aid to pill-taking; a dipper for use in rinsing the hair, or a bath toy for baby.

Most of all, it's used for just plain drinks of water. It's the common bathroom drinking glass that sits above the wash-basin just to the side of the medicine cabinet.

All members of the family frequently use it and, sometimes, even visitors. A rinse, many housewives seem to believe, makes it as sanitary as when it was new. It hardly ever gets thoroughly washed. The trouble is that it's overlooked. And who wants to run upstairs, or down the hall, to fetch it when the dishes are being done?

The neglect of the bathroom glass was disclosed in a home survey. Most housewives admitted the glass is generally forgotten—sometimes overlooked for months

and washed less frequently than the kitchen floor. Tests of neglected glasses show that they are receptacles for many different bacteria, including air-borne types, which can cause sore throats, colds and other nose and throat ailments. The glass also serves as an unsuspected carrier of germs from one member of the family to another.

The U. S. Health Service pointed out that the common drinking glass is a major offender in spreading ailments through the family. This was one of the points it made last year when the Asian flu epidemic was threatening.

The solution to family health protection on the bathroom glass front is simple. First, housewives must remember the glass. Then they have to wash it regularly, just as they do other glasses and dishes. Every member of the family should have his own, too. And the glasses should not be used as holders for anything.

If this seems like a lot of trouble, paper cups may be used. Sanitary cup dispensers are available for mount-

ing on the walls of kitchen or bathroom. After use, of course, the cups are discarded.

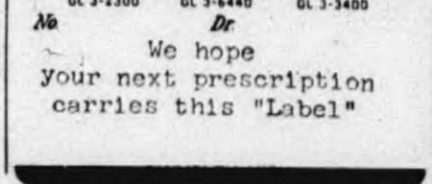
So—if you're determined to ward off colds this winter, remember that bathroom glass. Doing that may save you misery and perhaps some money, too, because the annual U. S. bill for colds is \$35 to \$40 per family.

### YUGO-POLAND TRADE PACT

WARSAW (UPI)—A 66-million-dollar trade agreement has been signed by Poland and Yugoslavia for 1960 under which Poland will export industrial equipment, coal, coke, rolled products, chemicals, drugs, synthetic rubber, textiles, sugar and household articles.

In return, Yugoslavia will deliver concentrated zinc ore and pyrites, colored metals and products made of them, rolled synthetics, cellulose, leather, synthetic fiber and food products.

"We shifted around a little later in the game and were able to equalize the height advantage," Doyle added. He pointed out that Bentley's six foot five Ron Bogoyevac (who got only six points, but many rebounds) was fouled out early in the fourth quarter.

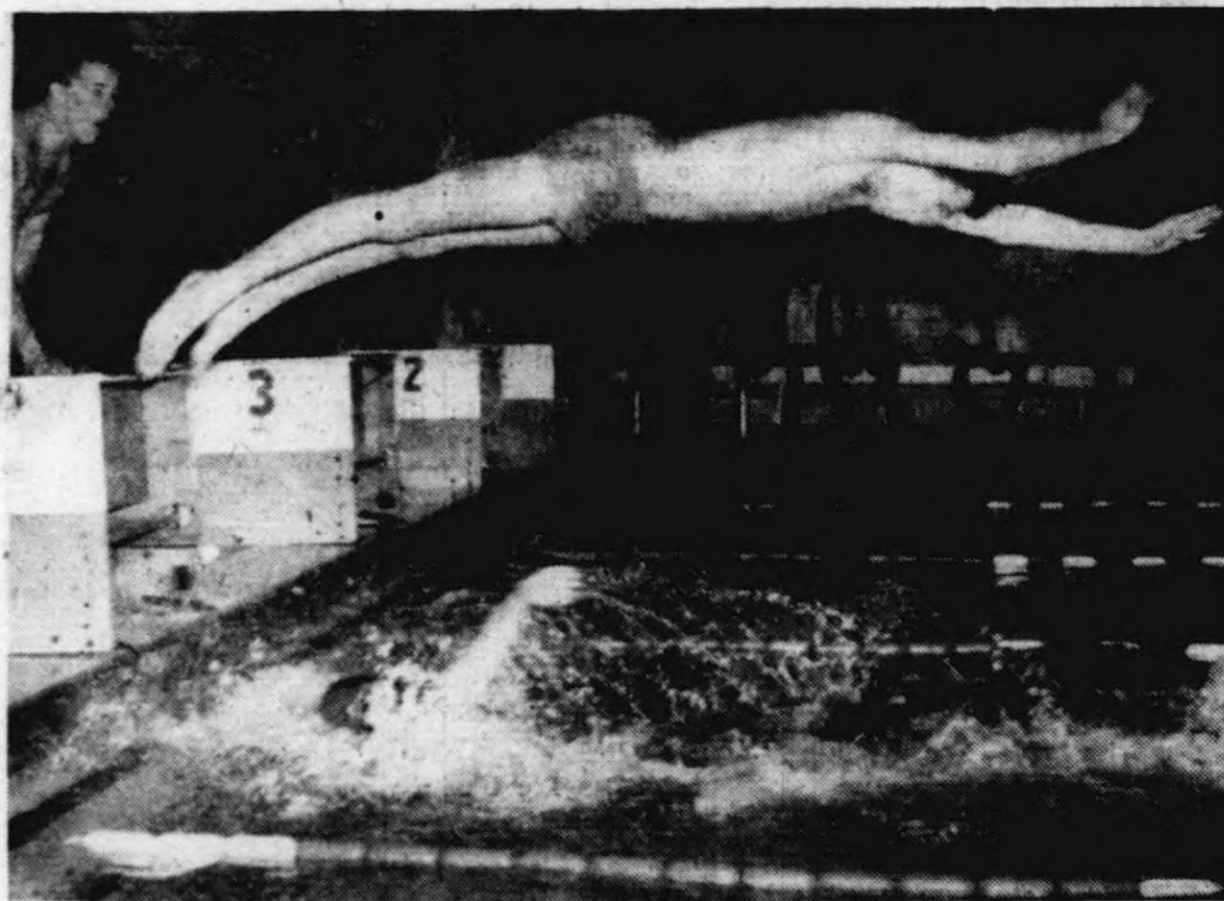

The Detroit Red Cross blood program, accustomed to meeting emergencies, was able to assist St. Mary hospital when it was asked to provide 10 pints of blood for patients scheduled for surgery on the hospital's opening day.

Mr. Mowry Arnold, 963 Roosevelt, Plymouth, president of the St. Mary Guild, long time Red Cross volunteer and member of the Detroit Red Cross chapter board, says: "I was just leaving my home to help with the bloodmobile at Ford Motor Company when the hospital called to ask if I would go to the Red Cross and pick up the blood. Sister Mary Modesta, chief medical technologist, and Mr. Lew Terrison, administrator of the Red Cross blood program, agreed blood would be advanced from Red Cross supplies. I called the hospital Guild member, Mrs. Albert G. Kaline, 22375 Haggerly Road, Northville, and she said she would make the trip to the blood center in downtown Detroit.

"Last year 73 pints of blood were credited to the Plymouth Community account, including those transferred from the Daisy Manufacturing Company employees account when the company moved its operations, and 21 to the Livonia Community account, either at bloodmobile units or the blood center.

"It costs the Detroit Red Cross \$5.44 to collect, process, and deliver each pint to the hospital for an eligible patient. This is a community service we all provide for ourselves and each other. If it were not for the large number of volunteers involved in the blood program, the cost would be much higher," Mrs. Arnold said.

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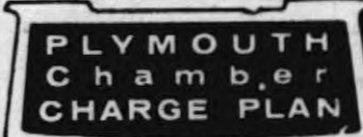

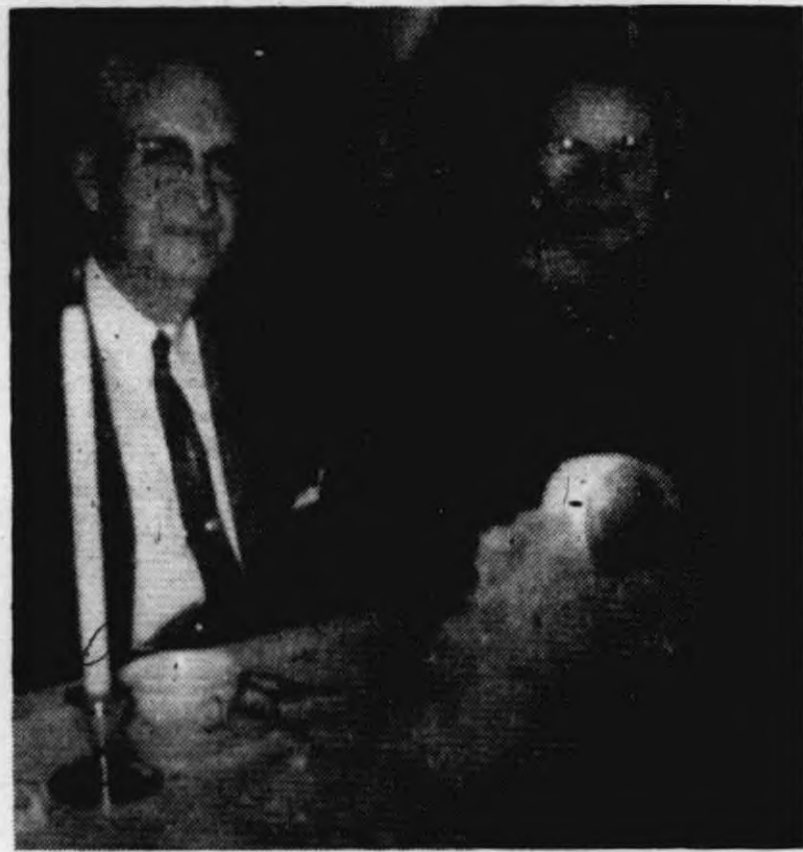

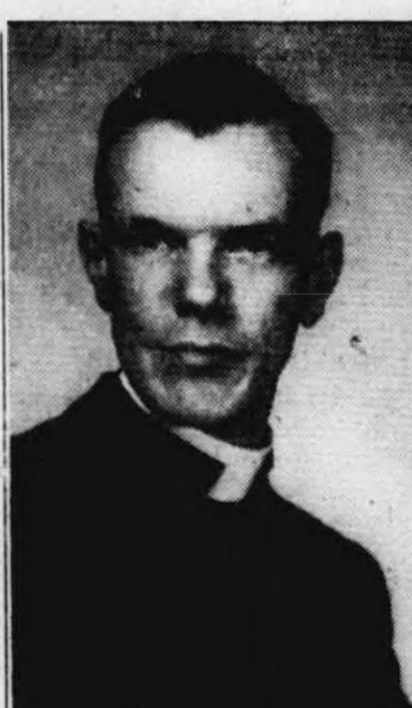

Here is also another brief rundown on the latest in books on the Civil War as the 100th anniversary of the war approaches (1960). Stonewall Jackson, by Lenoir Chambers (Morrow): A biography that probably will stand for a long time as definitive. These two thick volumes cover practically all that is known of the many-sided Jackson. His two years of fighting with the Confederates established his reputation as a general and Chambers makes much of his military ability. But the work covers particularly the early life of Jackson, the youth who was never really young, although he was only 39 when he was killed at Chancellorsville.

Confederate Indians, by Frank Cunningham (Naylor, San Antonio, Tex.): A lively and often partisan account of the almost forgotten part the Cherokee Indians played in the Civil War of the West under the leadership of Gen. Stand Watie, a three-quarter Cherokee who has been called the "foremost soldier ever produced by the North American Indians."

Generals in Gray, by Ezra J. Warner (Louisiana State University): Biographies of all 425 Confederate generals from brigadier to full general with photographs of all except one. Likely to become a standard reference book for Civil War buffs and writers.

Mr. Lincoln's General. An illustrated autobiography of U.S. Grant, edited and arranged by Roy Meredith (Dutton): Selected passages from Grant's memoirs with illustrations that make it an impressive book. It should go far to dispel the myth of Grant as a drunkard, bungler and butcher and set him in true perspective as a great soldier.

**"Weltfuechtlingsjahr" As Seen by Ursula Kell**  
(The Refugee Year)

Editor's Note: The division of East and West Germany after World War II is pointed out by Plymouth's German Exchange Student, not as words in a newspaper, but as it affected her life and the daily activities of family and friends.

**INDIVISIBLE GERMANY?**  
This year is the "Weltfuechtlingsjahr," the World Refugee Year. All over the world there are millions of people who had to leave their countries, because of force of fear. In Europe, Germany has been the country where we had to face this problem for 15 years.

Since 1945, two and a half million people have left this so-called Ddr, East Germany. About 500 people escaped to West Germany every day. Since 1946 every sixth person in the Ddr has left his home.

But how is it that we have this unnatural and sad situation in Germany today? What are the consequences of this in the daily life of Germany?

It started right after the war, when Stalin, Truman and Atee met in Potsdam in 1945 to decide about the German fate. They divided Germany into four zones. The Russians got the part from the Eastern border of the Federal Republic to the Oder River.

Berlin was divided, too, into four zones. Nobody knew

exactly what should happen after that, and there was a statement that said it should remain like this until a peace conference in the future.

But this peace conference never came. After the dividing of Germany the aim of the Russian government was to make their zone a communist state. The alliance says work together to make their zones good for democracy. The three separated zones of the Western powers became one the Federal Republic of Germany. It was created in 1949 by the adoption of a provisional constitution known as the basic law.

The zones occupied by the Russians got their own government. They created a state, known as the Ddr, Deutsche Demokratische Republik (German Democratic Republic). By this word you can see that we have the same words in East and West Germany, but their meaning is entirely different. West Germany wants reunification and East Germany wants reunification. What, for heaven's sake, is in the way? The answer is reunification under what aspect?

More than thousands of kilometers of the border has barbed wire. Right after the border is a 10 meter control strip, we call it the "strip of death," because it is partly mined, then the 500 meter protect strip. Only "authentic" people are allowed to live there. The next part is the five kilometer "Sperr-

zone." This strip of land is very carefully watched by watching towers, guards, etc. The barbed wire which has become thicker and thicker during the years is supposed to make it impossible for Germans to see other Germans. The watching towers are often at the most beautiful places in Germany and have become a sad attraction to many tourists.

Here are some examples that happen every day in Germany: The 100 geese of a farmer, who lived in EAST Germany, escaped through the border and came on West Germany's territory, where they lived for some days, until one day the farmer from East Germany appeared to get his geese back. He could not come the nearest way, that is just to go over the border, but he had to take a train for a long distance of 100 kilometers, get his geese and then traveled back 100 kilometers to the next gate, where he was allowed to pass the border. He could have done all this in 10 minutes, but because of the law of a higher authority, he had to waste money and time.

But there are more serious examples. A woman, living in East Germany talked about 10 minutes over the border to her relative living in West Germany. A Communist policeman came and walked her off. Some working women in East Germany answered the greeting of a West German policeman. An East German Communist policeman saw

this, told them it was not allowed to talk to people from West Germany and wanted their identification. When the women refused to do this, he just said, "Okay, we shall see us in a higher place."

A doctor from East Germany, who visited West Germany for three months, was thrown into jail because he had visited places which he did not tell the authorities of the Ddr.

There are some pleasant cases to tell, but they don't happen too often. The citizens of two villages, one in East Germany and one in West Germany, wanted to have a talk with each other. A hundred people talked over the border of East and West Germany without any interference of the East German police.

They surrendered too, before an old woman, who went over to see her son in West Germany. When the police got her she said, "I am too old to make a round-about way. I did only the most reasonable thing," which was to run to her son two kilometers instead of taking a train 160 kilometers.

But there was once a young girl, who could not speak and hear. She wanted to see her parents in East Germany whom she had not seen since 11 years. She was told that only urgent cases are allowed to come to East Germany, and her case was considered not urgent.

These are things that happen every day. Children are not allowed to come to their parents, neighbors cannot speak to each other, families

### Packaged Education Program Used in Teaching CAP Students

This is a significant mission, particularly in light of the fast-developing technology which has ushered in — brief history — the jet age, the atomic age and the space age.

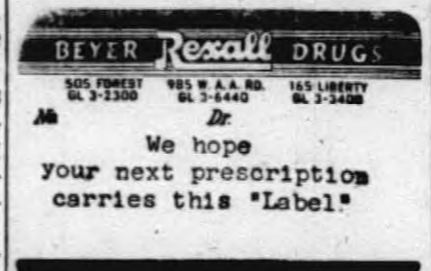

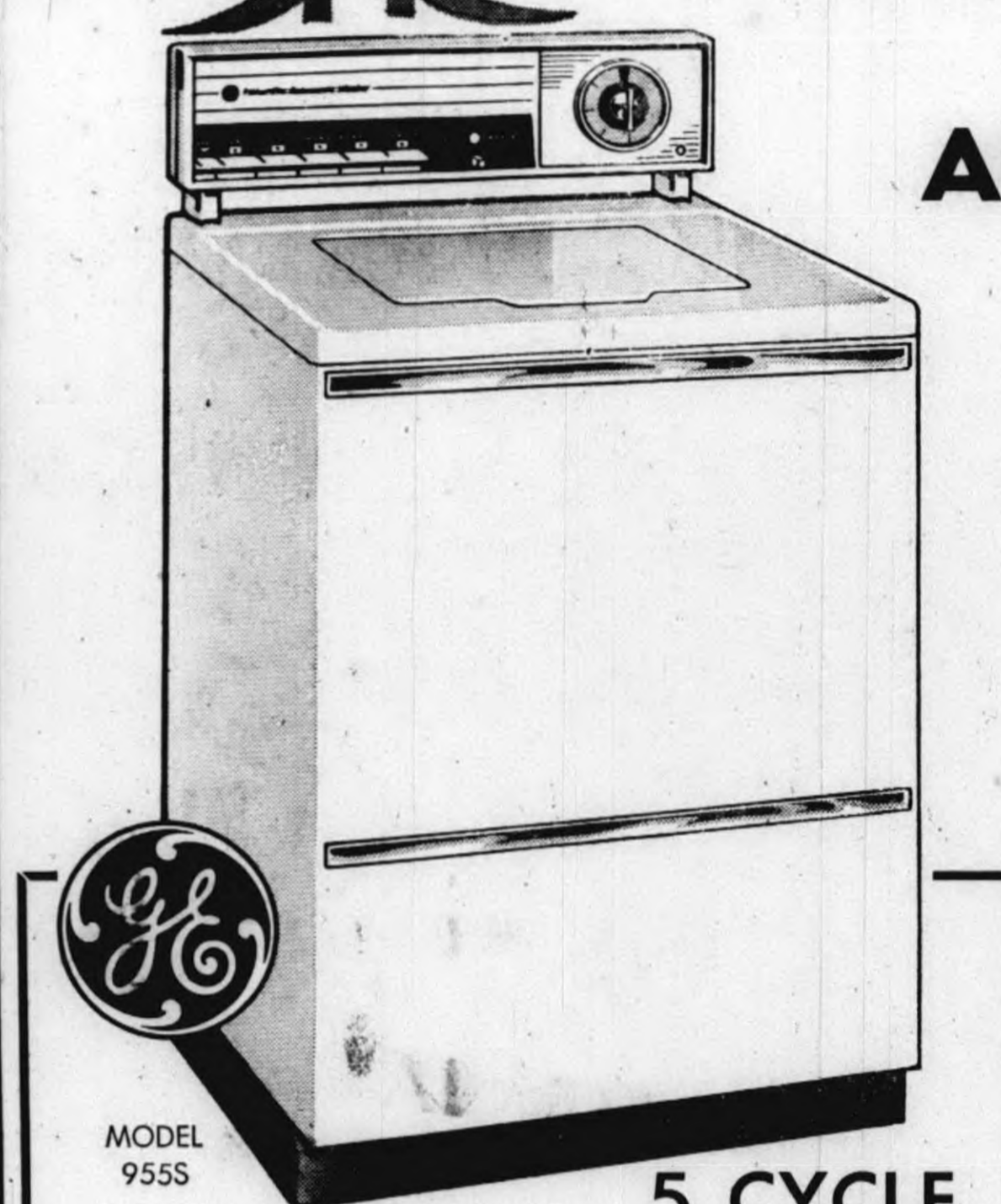

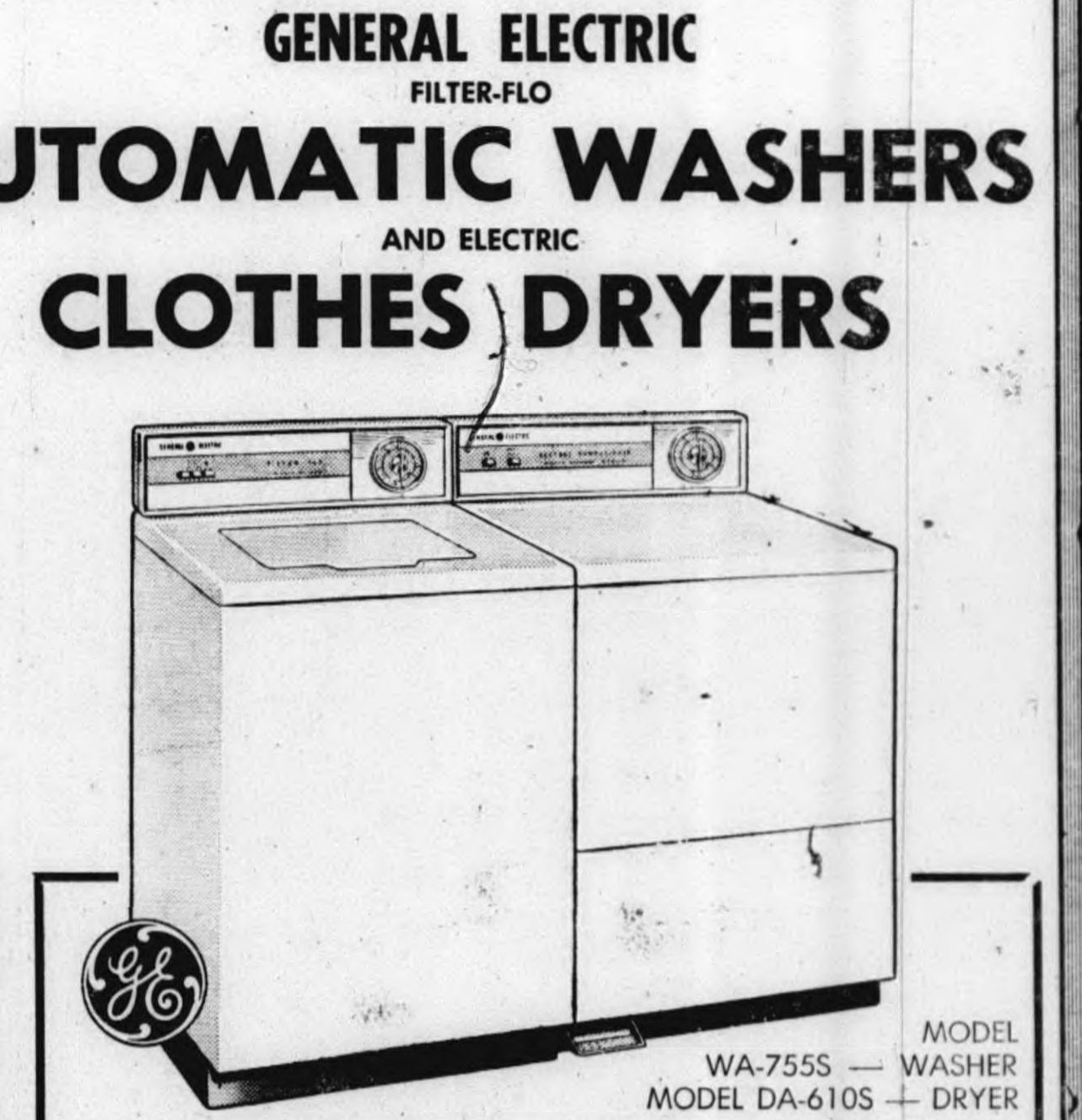
