Any elector in the Plymouth Community School District who feels he is not sufficiently informed about the Proposed Northwest Wayne County Community College to vote on the proposal June 12 is urged to attend the Town Hall meeting this Thursday (June 1) at the Junior High School.

Town Hall meeting as "the place to go" for those who have not yet received any information concerning the proposed college. The Plymouth Community Town Hall meeting will start at 8 p.m. Dr. Eric Bradner, coordinator of the program, will explain the college's objectives and needs. Also speaking will be Harold Fischer, Plymouth's candidate for the college's Board of Trustees.

The 13 candidates-at-large for trustee have also been invited. These include Mrs. Jane Moehle of Plymouth; Fred H. Morris of Garden City; Helen Hunter and Isabel Billings of Redford; Harold Weber, Edward Tell, South Redford; James O'Neil, Charles Kirkpatrick, Rosina Raymond, Donald Getts, William Horie, Norman St. Aubin and Alan Walt, Livonia.

Each of the six participating school districts — Plymouth, Livonia, Redford Union, South Redford, Clarenceville and Garden City — will elect one trustee from their district and will join in electing three trustees-at-large. Moderator for the program will be J. A. Graves, who is chairman of the Education and Action Committee of the Proposed Northwest Community College.

## Leaguers Parade Saturday

Little League baseball gets its second season underway in Plymouth this Saturday with a parade through the downtown that will end at the new diamonds on Plymouth Rd.

Twelve teams composed of 180 boys have been formed this year. The American and National Leagues both have six teams. There were four last year. And instead of two diamonds as they had last season, the new location on Plymouth Rd. will offer three diamonds.

Little League players are being asked to form the parade at the Hamilton St. playground at 10:30 a.m. At 11:15, the parade, led by the Junior High Band, will move down Wing St. to Main and on Main to Dodge St., near City Hall.

The boys will gather in the East Central Parking Lot behind the Dunning-Hough Library, where they will be transported to the new diamonds.

The diamonds are located on City-owned property just east of Hillside Inn. The band will continue marching to the diamonds where there will be an "opening day" ceremony with Carl Cederberg, WJBK-TV newscaster, as master of ceremonies.

Opening the season will be three games among the National League teams on the three diamonds, followed by games among American League teams.

Last year the teams played on a field located behind the Senior High, between Amelia and Farmer Streets. This season's field offers sufficient space to add another diamond. New dug-outs have been set in and backstops erected.

Starting this Saturday, the Little League Auxiliary will open a candy sale in behalf of the Little League. The sale will continue for two weeks.

## Services Here For Union Chief Bert Brennan

Funeral services were held this afternoon (Wednesday, May 31) in Plymouth for Owen "Bert" Brennan, vice-president of International Brotherhood of Teamsters Union, who died Sunday of cancer in Grace Hospital, Detroit. He had been a resident of Plymouth for 10 years.

Teamster President James Hoffa and other union chiefs were in Plymouth today for the funeral held at 2 p.m. from the Schrader Funeral Home. The Rev. Henry J. Walsh, D.D., pastor of First United Presbyterian Church, officiated. Interment was in Oakwood Cemetery, Saline.

Mr. Brennan had lived on Wilcox Rd. for a decade prior to moving two years ago to Hickory Farms, 10383 Austin Rd., Manchester. He had been ailing for the past two and a half months.

Surviving are his wife, Alice (Johnson) Brennan; two sons, Raymond and Lawrence Brennan, both of Plymouth; one daughter, Mrs. Thomas Neese of Chicago; and six grandchildren.

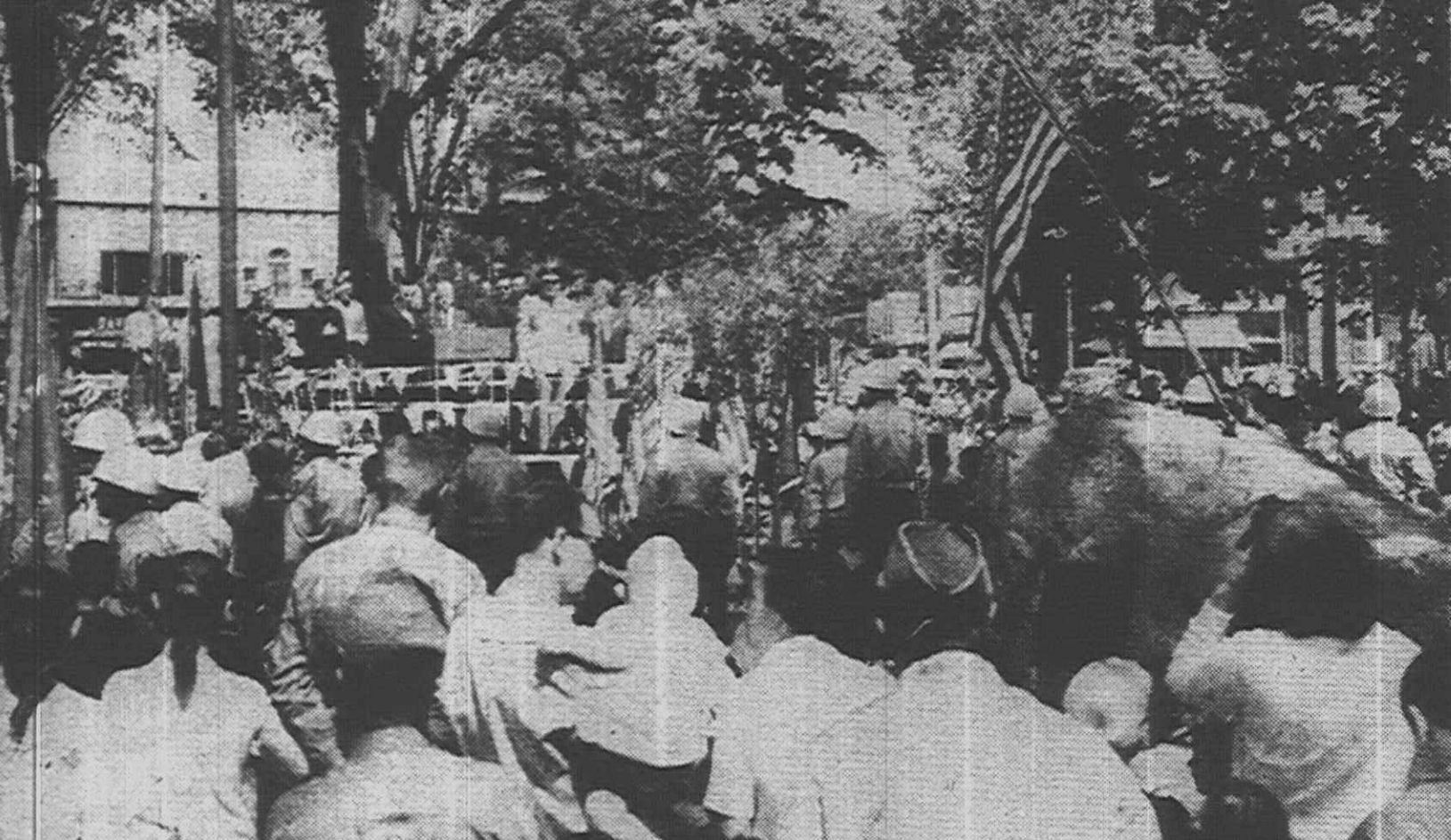

Pollard warned, and then he concluded by asking, "Do you care enough to sacrifice even a little in order to preserve in peace what our country fought to hold onto in battle?"

When students are kept from entering college, we are all interested. We want to know why.

## Senior Citizen Needs Probed

City Sampling 100 Families

A survey to determine the future housing needs of the elderly is being taken in the City of Plymouth by 25 volunteers starting this Saturday.

Using personnel from nine local churches, the High School sociology class and the University of Michigan Gerontology Department, the survey will be made on a random sampling basis.

Twenty random blocks in the city were surveyed Sunday by the sociology class and they found 100 families with ages of 62 or over. Interviewing these 100 further, the City hopes to determine what housing needs will be in future years.

One plan has already been advanced to build senior citizen apartments on City-owned land along Tonquish Creek, west of Harvey St. (between Penniman and Ann Arbor Trail).

City Manager Albert Glassford said that a public housing program for the elderly may also come about as a result of the survey.

The survey is also intended to provide civic organizations interested in developing new opportunities for the aging with information for planning programs and services designed to meet the needs of older people.

Nine churches have been asked to supply three volunteers each to interview the senior citizens. The churches are First Baptist, St. Peter's Lutheran, First Methodist, St. John's Episcopal, Our Lady of Good Counsel, St. John's Episcopal, Salvation Army Calvary Baptist and Allen Heights.

The volunteer interviewers will start their job this Saturday. Each interview is expected to take an hour. The

survey answers will be kept in confidence and the interviewees need not give their names.

Questions cover such areas as physical condition, education, occupation, retirement plans, leisure activity, present living quarters, financial security and religious activity.

Coordinating the survey is Carl Glassford, son of the city manager, who is working here in cooperation with the U of M Gerontology Department. The U of M will analyze the findings and make recommendations.

This Saturday at 9:30 a.m., the interviewers will meet at the City Hall for their instructions. The job is expected to take a week.

reading improvement, arithmetic, typing, instrumental or vocal music, business machines, business law, English, Latin, algebra, plane geometry, American history, U.S. government, sociology and special education.

These courses are available for those from the first grade up. Further information can be secured by phoning GL 3-3100, Extension 1.

All except swimming are also available to those living outside of the Plymouth School District.

**Classroom TV Makes Bow**

Use of television that is beamed in from an airplane 150 miles from here may not be too far away for pupils in the Plymouth Community School District.

The airborne lessons have already begun for hundreds of students in the Detroit area and right now the Plymouth system has the project under study. The new junior high school going up on Sheldon Rd. and Ann Arbor Trail will have a conduit system ready to handle a classroom TV system.

It was only two weeks ago, on May 15, that the first scheduled airborne lessons were sent out. They come from a converted DC6 which hovers monotonously in a 20-mile diameter over the little town of Montpelier, Ind.

From an altitude of 23,000 feet, the 24-foot-long antenna extending downward from the nose of the plane beams out two different lessons simultaneously each morning, four days a week.

This adventurous \$7 million experiment is financed by grants from the Ford Foundation and private industry. In the short time that the programs have been on the air (tests have been sent out since January) dozens of schools have been installing the systems.

Picking up the programs from this distance on UHF channels 72 and 76 is not a simple matter. And helping many of Michigan's schools in solving this problem is a Plymouth firm, Clover Communications, 173 W. Liberty, operated by Bill Schwartz and George Reily.

Seeing the potential growth of educational TV, Schwartz went into training at Purdue University, home of the project known as the Midwest Program on Airborne Television Instruction (MPATI).

Clover Communications installed two of the three Michigan test schools, John Dewey Elementary School in Oak Park and Sycamore School in Holt, near Lansing. The other test school is in Kalamazoo.

Since then, Clover has installed systems in 26 Detroit schools and working 10 more at all hours in other schools throughout the state. The Detroit area, however, seems to be more aggressive, according to James Davis, sales manager of the organization.

Last Thursday I traveled with Davis to the Dewey School to take a look at the test program. According to

Principal Robert E. Bailey "it will be a big help to education, but it will never replace the classroom teacher."

In the fourth grade classroom of Mrs. Tillie Sturman, we watched a science program. The picture was as clear as one received from any Detroit station, except of a wavy line pattern. This will be eliminated, experts say, because power is now only being utilized at 60 per cent of its potential level.

"Good morning, children, this is the Science Corner," the young teacher on the 23-inch TV screen said. "Today

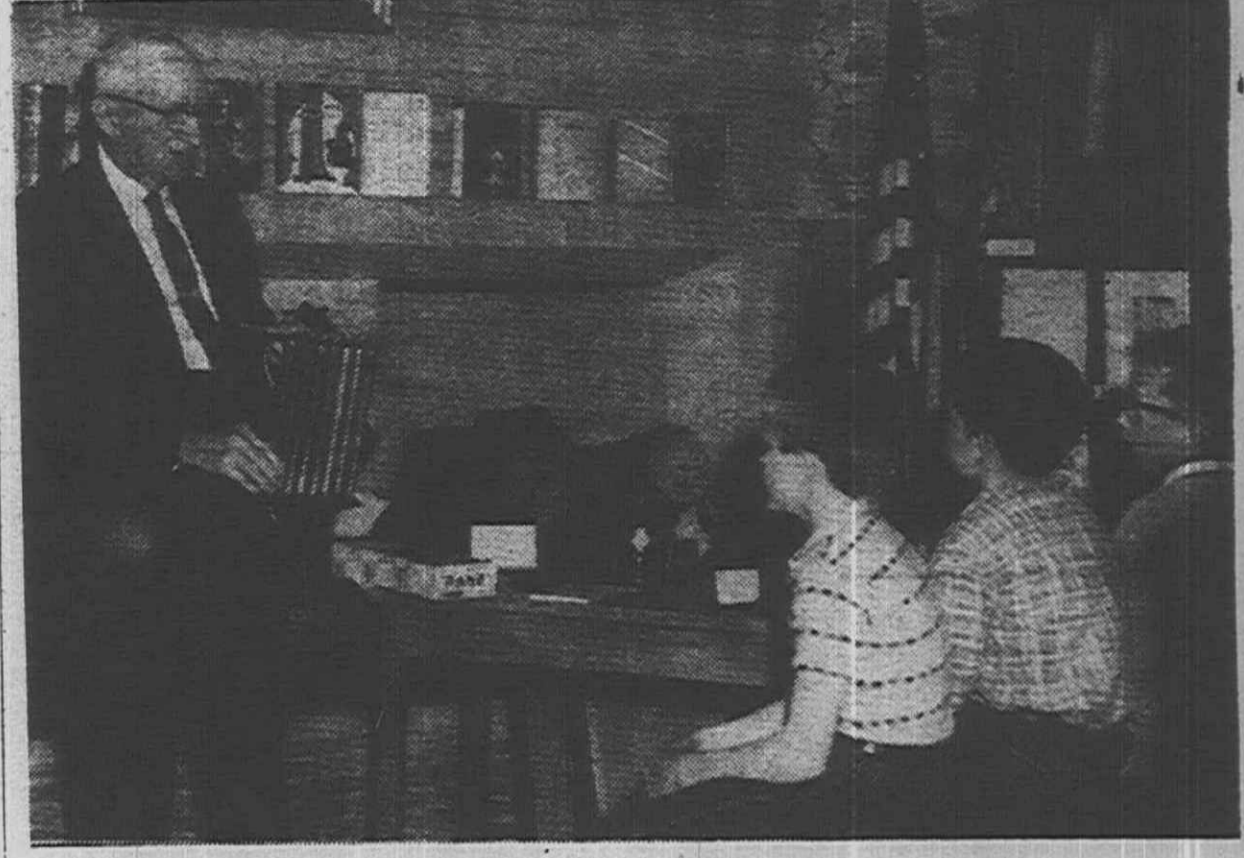

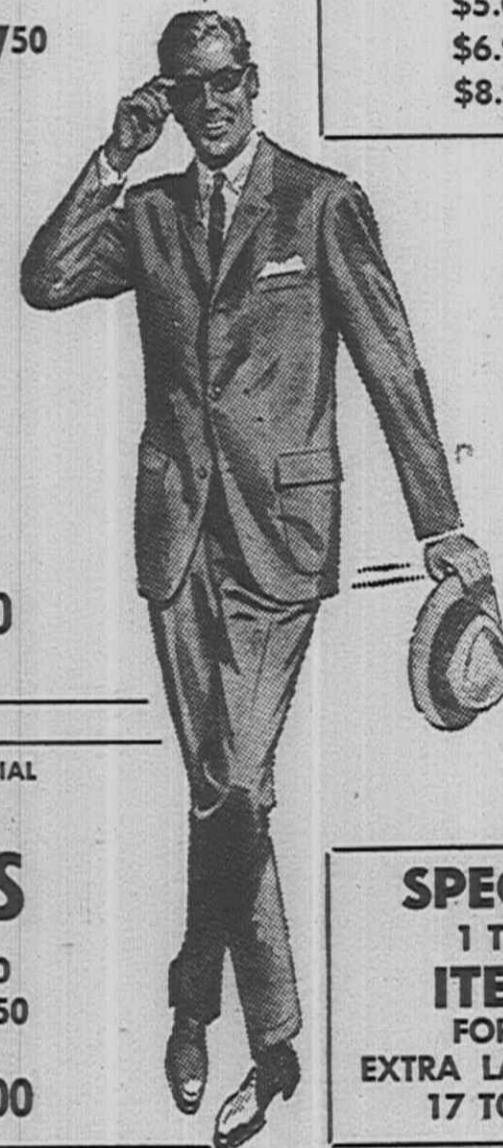

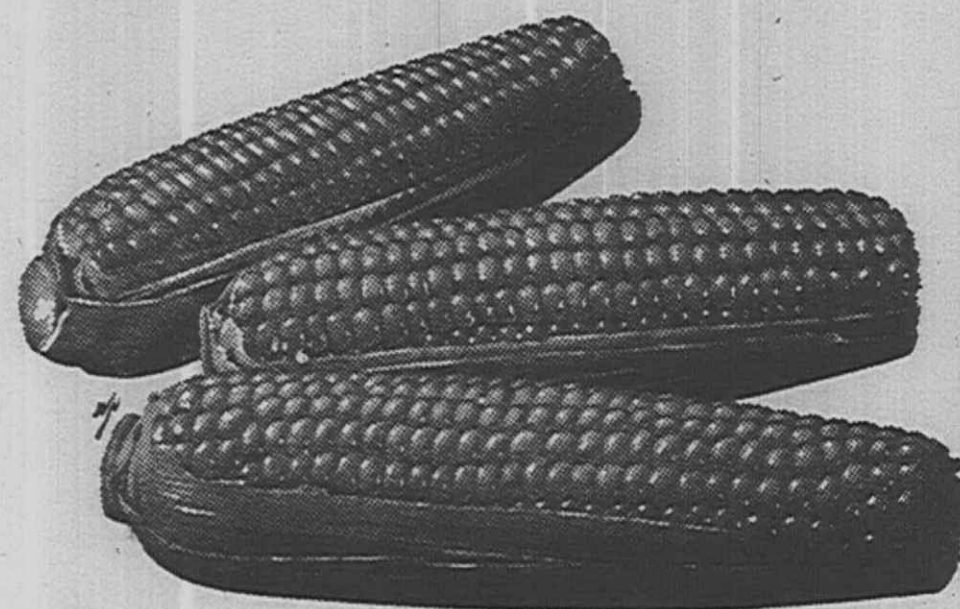

## Our Guy in the Sky

# Golf Game Lousy? Why Not Try Flying?

**(EDITOR'S NOTE: Is learning to fly easy? Or hard? Will our managing editor, Jim Sponseller, ever get off the ground by himself? And if he does, will he ever get down? This is the first in a series of articles about learning to fly an airplane.)**

Seated behind a bewildering array of dials, buttons

and other mechanisms, our plane rolled along the taxi strip toward the end of Mettetal Airport's main runway. This was my very first flying lesson and without even getting off the ground, I was already wondering if it was a great mistake.

My instructor, Al Finney, had spent 20 minutes telling me what the dials were for and how to start the engine. Looking under the cowling at the engine, it was unbelievable that such a little motor was going to get us up in the air!

I can't really say why I wanted to learn how to fly in the first place. Maybe it was watching Spaceman Shepard on TV being hurled into space. Or maybe it was just groping for a new hobby. My golf game hasn't improved in six seasons and my lack of bridge know-how would fill volumes.

Without even moving a foot down the runway I've already learned that learning to fly takes a tremendous amount of courage. No, not climbing in and depending upon a little engine to get you upstairs. I mean coming home and breaking the news to your wife that you're going to fly. Every pilot, I've been told, agrees that this can be the most precarious part of the process.

A recent newspaper Sunday supplement told how easy and safe it is to fly your own light plane. Just about anyone can do it nowadays, the article declared.

I was out to prove how right—or wrong—that statement was. Before I had any time to change my mind, Al had opened the throttle and our Piper Colt shot forward down the runway. Within a few seconds the plane was in the air as it

cleared Joy Rd. by a hundred feet or so, I figured it was a little late to step out. We headed northwest. West of Northville, we had reached our training grounds. The instruction began.

In front of both of us (planes have dual controls), was sort of an oval-shaped steering wheel. Pulling the wheel out makes the plane climb; pushing it in makes it go downward. Turning it right and left makes the plane turn right and left. This has to be helped, however, with pushing the left or right rudder pedal with your feet.

Al made a few turns and let go of the wheel as the plane banked—a trick that would be sure-fire death in a car. But before I could grab the wheel, Al explained that the plane will fly itself quite nicely if the air is calm enough.

Within a few minutes he turned the plane over to me and we started making turns, following the straight parallel roads below. I was amazed at how little the wheel had to be turned in order to bank. "Nothing to it, is there?" Al declared.

I had to admit that this was easier than I had expected, but I added, "I suspect that we're doing the easiest part of this job."

"Well, you're one-fourth done. All you have to learn now is how to take off, land and glide," Al assured me with a grin.

After 45 minutes we headed back to Mettetal and Al took over for the landing. That's a nice, wide runway looked like a pencil mark from where we sat. We came in closer over the farms and as we approached the runway I gripped my seat tightly.

"We'll never make the runway," I said to myself as the plane nosed down toward the newly-plowed field at the south end.

Suddenly the ship leveled off and with a little bump we sat down. We taxied back to the parking area and I climbed out—still in one big nervous 190-pound piece.

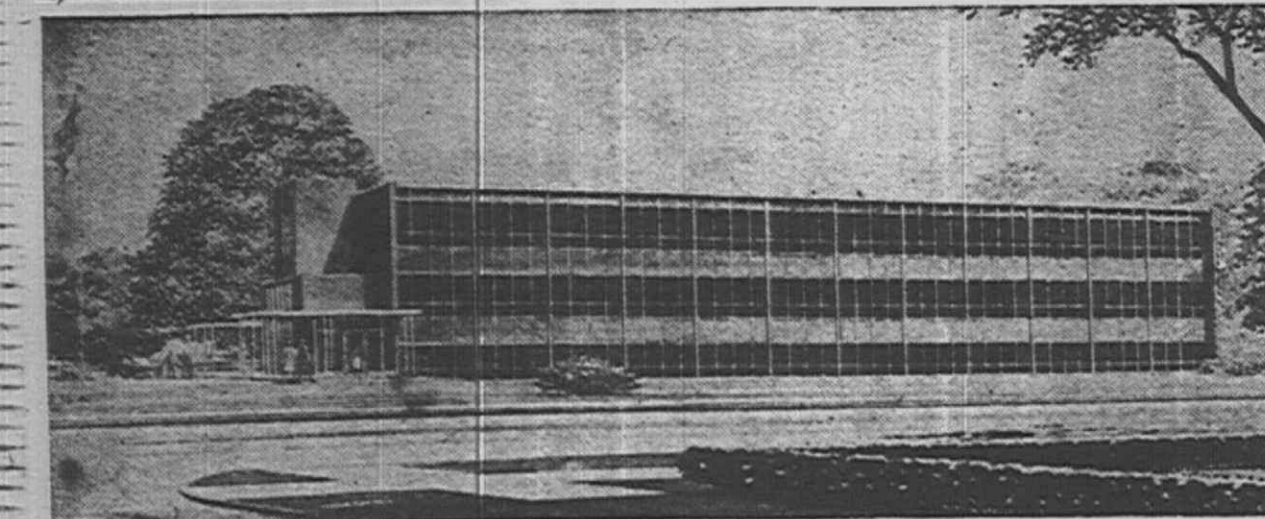

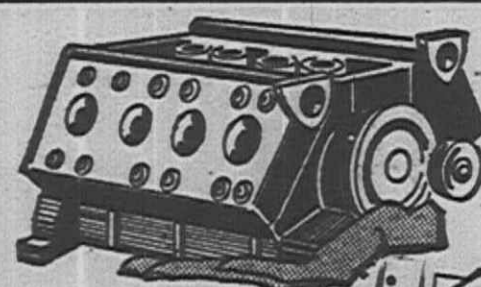

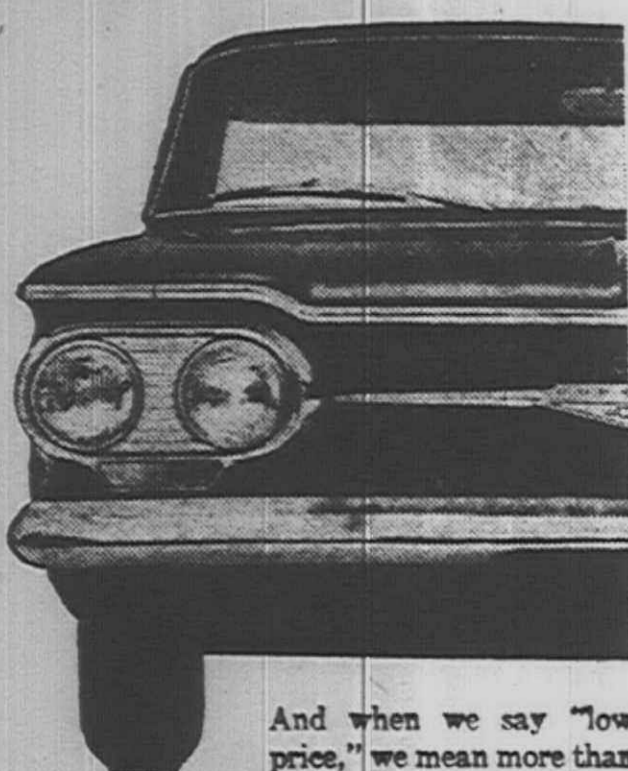
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## Front Row Center

Sailing smoothly down a local thoroughfare on a bicycle belonging to my oldest daughter, my nostrils encountered a delicate, heady fragrance—the potent, jasmine scent of lilacs. I sniffed more than my share of such sweet air. In fact, passersby on the sidewalk might have thought my deep inhalations came from a sudden asthmatic attack. No, it was merely a profound, poetical regard for those olfactory harbingers of spring—the lilac bushes that abound in such thankful profusion in our perfumed Plymouth.

Wish I could have had a smidgeon of that heavenly scent the other evening while viewing Miss Nancy Kelly in "The Bad Seed." I'm afraid I had my dark-colored glasses on. "The Bad Seed" as a play left a bit to be desired. Miss Kelly's performance was outstanding. Many times during the evening you felt the electric shock of empathy hitting subtly in your brain box area. When your spine tingles or the heart palpitates, a bit, you know you're in the presence of a great actress. Miss Kelly does all of that to you. Too bad the Maxwell Anderson play couldn't have said a bit more. At times the play seemed as loosely constructed as an amateurish first attempt.

Nevertheless, the Drama Season in Ann Arbor proved that a capable actress with the able assistance of six other professionals can do wonders for a weak play. Community players considering this play for their local audiences must see "The Bad Seed" done under these "best of circumstances" and should not be misled that they can do as adequate a job. Too often a "difficult play" represents a rather large pitfall for amateur groups to stumble into. They never realize what has really happened to them. Hometown theatrical groups lose more faithful members in this manner than any other that I know. So—script committees wherever you may be, unite and listen with open ears to such advice. Watch out for the play that is basically weak, but survives on the big time. Broadway-level of professional acting.

With O'Neill's "Touch of the Poet" filling the Lydia Mendelssohn stage in Ann Arbor this week there should be little worry script-wise. "Touch of the Poet" done earlier this year at the U. of D., easily qualifies as one of Eugene O'Neill's finest. It's an intriguing study of life in America circa 1800. Albert Dekker plays the featured role of Con Melody, the blustery Irishman lately come to America. Take time out to see this production. You'll see the rare combination of a great play and some excellent acting.

The Vanguard players continue to amaze old George with their versatility. Their current production, Gorki's "The Lower Depths," demands concentrated characterization. Each of the Vanguard veterans handles his role with the skill of a perfectionist. Not once during the evening does the show "drag." You are pushed along by the violent action on the stage. Something happens all the time. And the philosophy does not stop the action. Dr. Gregory, the managing director of Vanguard, has staged this play with the care and patience of Mr. Tyrone Guthrie. For old George to put anyone in Guthrie's gunboats (believe me his size 14 shoes are most difficult to fill in my book) is a real concession. But Dr. Gregory has accomplished once again another directorial triumph.

Latest news from the Vanguard: next attraction a delightful musical comedy, "Leave It To Jane." "Leave It To Jane" has plenty of comedy, fine tunes, and zany actions for the perfect summer attraction. As with last summer's "Boy Friend" production... "Leave It To Jane" will run all summer at the Vanguard. Here's your chance to see the Vanguard players performing at their best. June 7 is the opening date.

Broadway is preparing for the annual summer doldrums. Box offices report slumps in ticket sales. "Advise and Consent" has closed. Other shows contemplate shuttering for the summer. A few brave shows ("Mary, Mary"; "Do-Re-Mi"; "The Sound of Music"; and "All The Way Home") will weather the traditional end-of-the-season financial blues. "My Fair Lady" passes all existing records for theatrical longevity on June 10. "Oklahoma!" record run of over five years will be relegated to the wastebasket and the new champ, "My Fair Lady," will take over the No. 1 position. And the amazing situation is that the show continues to do \$50-\$60,000 worth of business every week. Oh, to just write that one big hit.

Lately the game of basketball has been a haven for the strictly vertical type individual. If you're not seven feet tall and equipped with built-in tentacles for hands, you're chance to score a few baskets is slim. Flubber changed all of that by turning a group of shorties

into bouncing maniacs. It was a glorious satire on the game of idiot ball. For once the apologetic referee with his screeching whistle made sense as he tried to keep the players on the ground. If you missed "The Absent-Minded Professor," catch it at a local drive-in.

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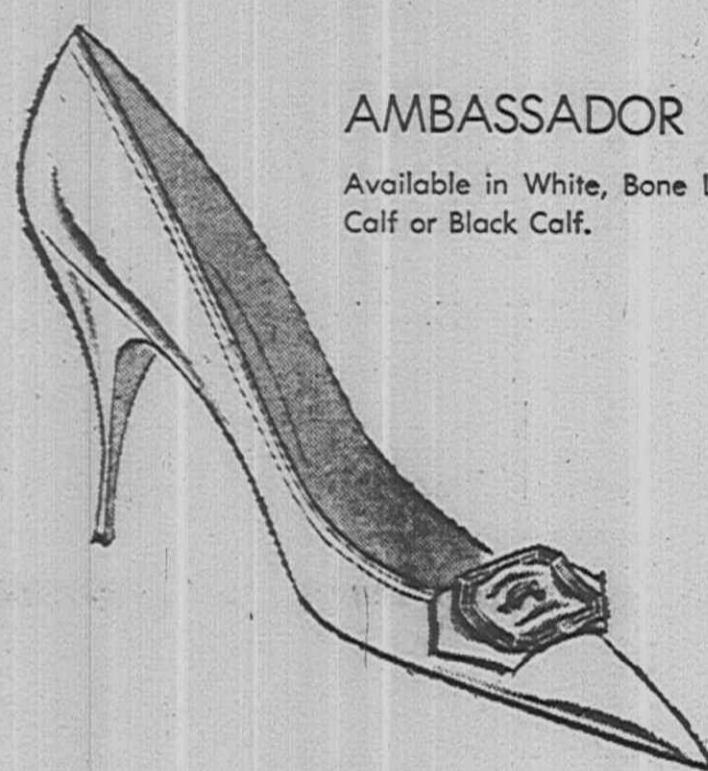
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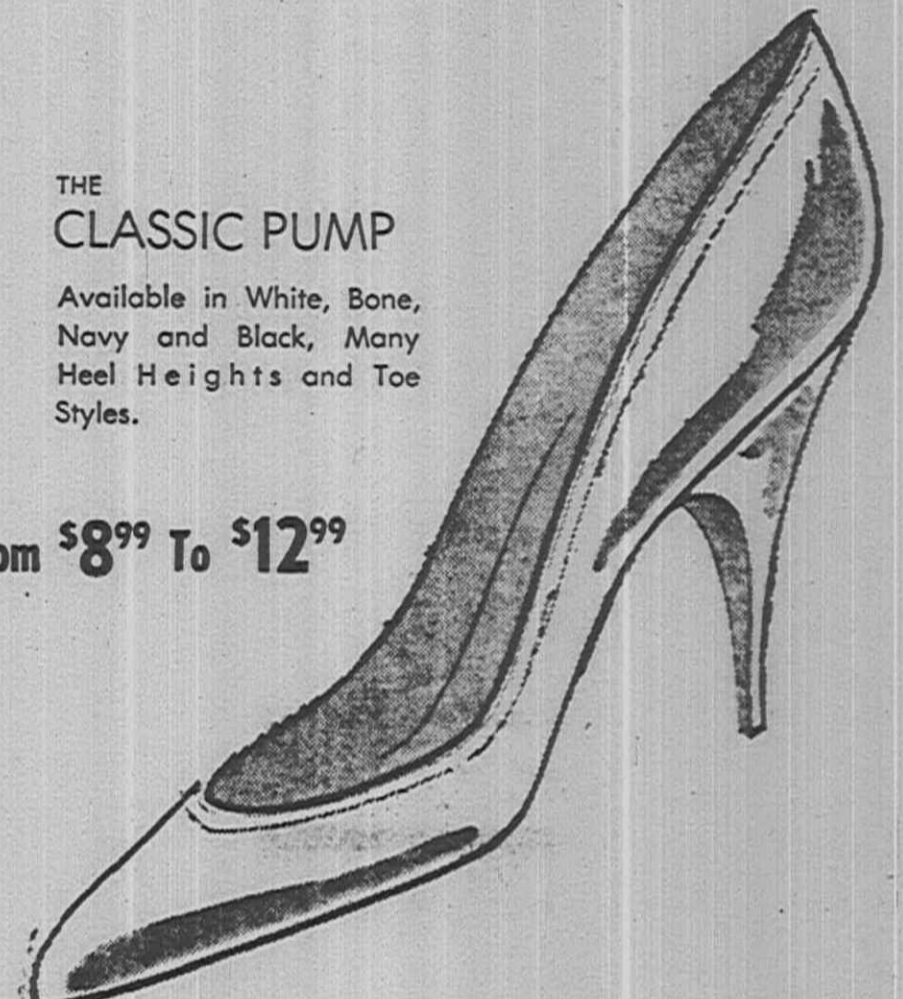
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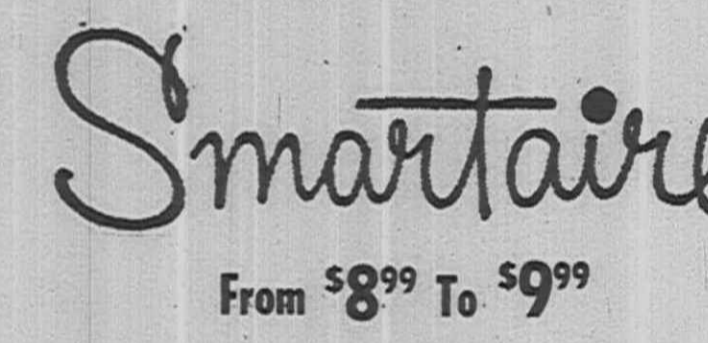
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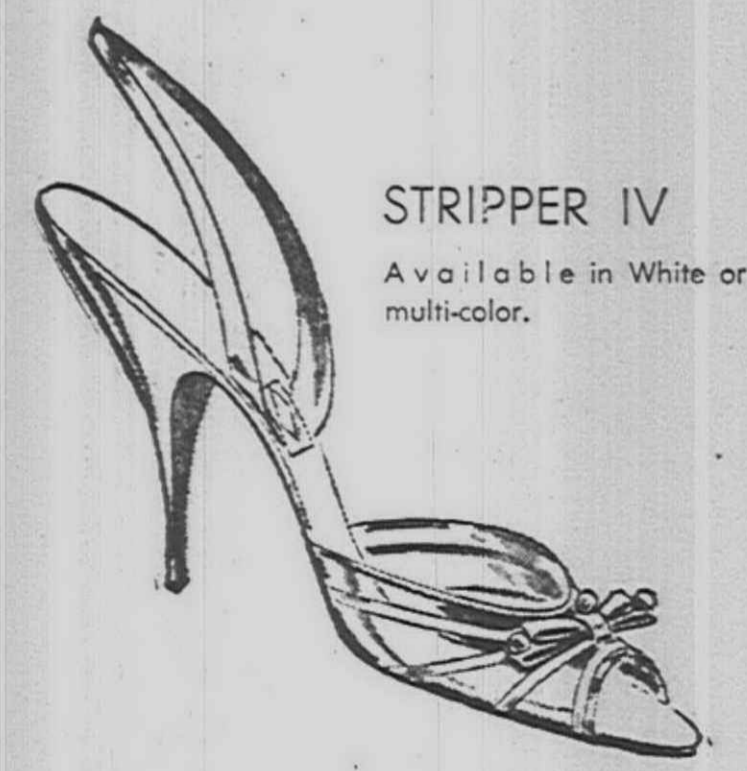
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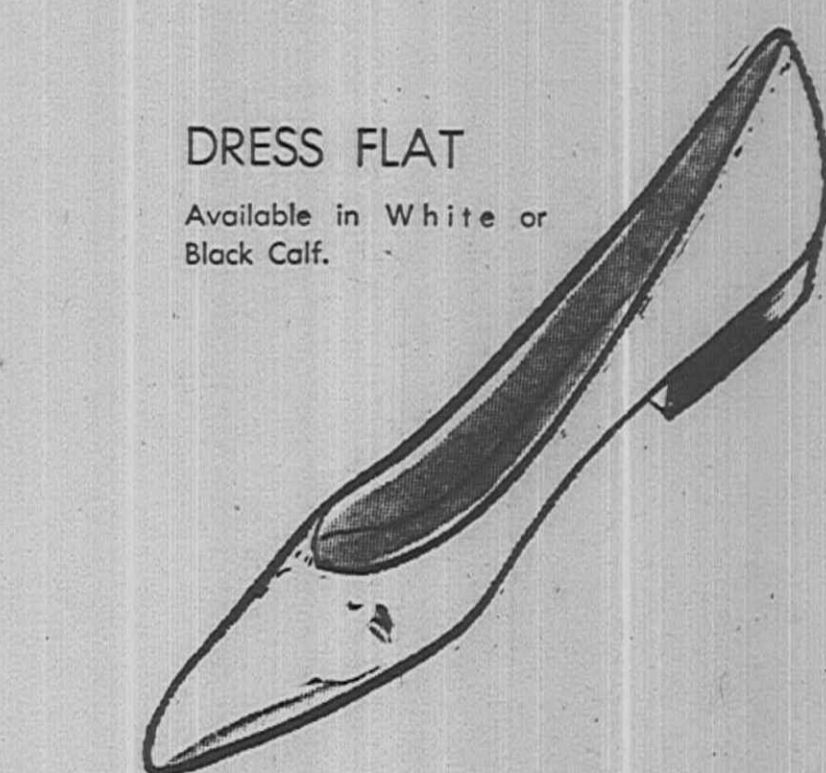
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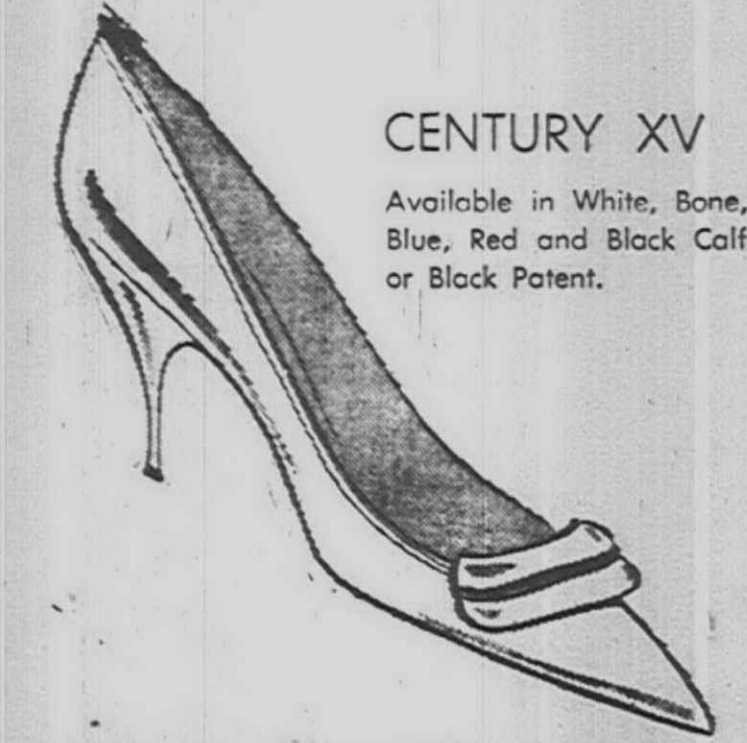
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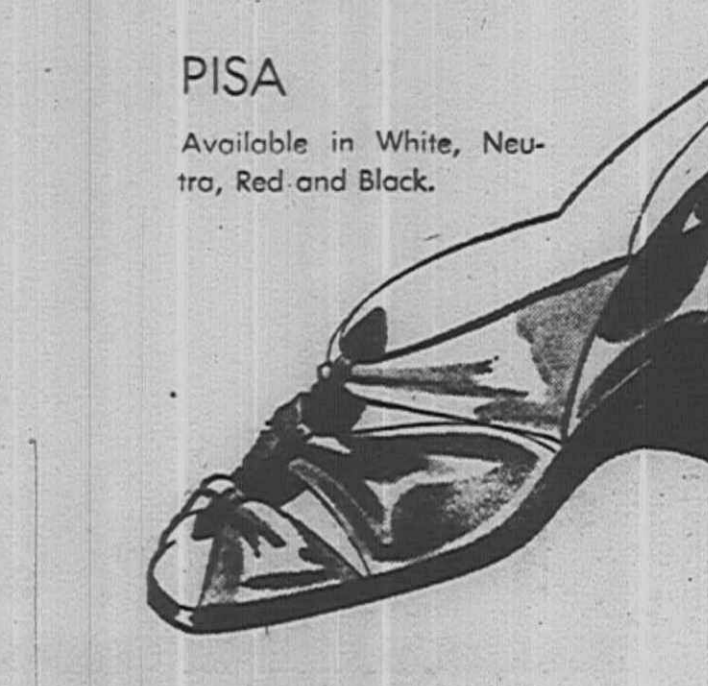
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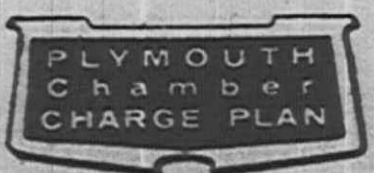
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# Holland's Tulip Festival Lures Cantonites

fore World War I. His name was nationally known as a close friend and lieutenant of Hoffa. They met 30 years ago. When Jimmy Hoffa became president of the Teamsters in 1957, Mr. Brennan became one of the 13 vice-presidents.

He was also president of Local 137 in Detroit and a member of the joint Council. He was also interested in horse racing and was a past director of the United States Trotting Assn. and a director of the Michigan Harness Horseman's Assn.

Approximately \$500,000 will come into the area from State aid and other outside contributions. There has been some negative propaganda as to how many students would use the college—some of the knockers attempting to paint an image that "it isn't needed."

Fact: After the most exhaustive, careful survey of high school students in the six districts, a crew of experts estimated that the enrollment would be 2,000 full time students and 6,000 part-time students at the outset.

And these same critics have been whispering menacingly about "cost."

Fact: No tax request is involved in the June 12 election. It simply would set up a "District" composed of Redford Union, South Redford, Garden City, Livonia, Clarenceville and Plymouth. And the only suggested tax request (which would come up as a separate ballot issue next fall) is one for \$5 a year on the average home. Tuition and state aid will pay 67 percent of the cost.



## THE MAIL ATTITUDE

BY PAUL CHANDLER

In recent days our citizens have heard about the educational value of a Community College; how it can help make a useful life for thousands of local youngsters who require education beyond the 12th grade if they are to find a decent job.

There is another overpowering recommendation for the College. It would mean dollars for this area. For instance, home values—they will certainly go up in the general area of the campus, and they will increase by a far greater amount than the sliver of millage that would be collected annually.

And for students attending the school, it means a savings of at least \$1,000 per year in room and board, as compared to attending a distant campus.

To the general economy of the area, it promises \$2,500,000 to be spent locally, rather than somewhere else.

Its main purpose is to provide each teacher a fuller range of courses. Classroom aids are used in the programs that most schools could never afford to employ.

Dewey School is a busy place these days. Last Thursday was a delegation from Farmington. A teacher representing Plymouth observed there Wednesday.

Wayne, Livonia, Belleville, Ann Arbor and many other school districts in the area have definite plans to outfit at least one school on a test basis.

Most schools also install a closed-circuit TV system. With this there is a TV camera provided. The principal, for instance, can talk to all of the pupils and also be seen on the school TV.

Of course, much testing will be done to determine if TV is actually increasing their learning process. Surprisingly, many parochial schools are adopting airborne TV as rapidly as the public schools. The cost, of course, is a factor.

To wire up a school with 25 outlets, erect the master antenna system and add the closed circuit TV, costs around \$3,000—half a teacher's annual salary. Receivers cost around \$145 each extra.

Many Plymouth people will remember the CBS special program last November, "Schools of Tomorrow, Today" in which Truett Callaway used to film how airborne TV will work.

Some of Plymouth classrooms have already employed educational TV by using some of the programming from University of Detroit's Channel 56.

Next year, the airborne program expects to offer courses on six channels at one time. Why use an airplane to send out signals?

The plane at 23,000 feet can send out a signal at a fraction the power as a ground-based antenna and yet cover a radius of 200 miles, while the ground antenna is effective only 75 miles. The area covered by the plane's effective radius has around 5 million pupils. These pupils are located in all of Indiana and parts of Ohio, Michigan, Illinois and Michigan.

we are going to learn something about birds." And during the next 20 minutes, the TV teacher, one of the few selected from a field of 300, used many visual aids on bird identification. When she asked how many have ever seen a blue jay, hands shot up.

Using handbooks provided by MPATI, the teachers discuss the lesson both before and after the TV program.

All 12 classrooms in Dewey are equipped with the receivers linked by a coaxial cable to a master antenna on the roof. Clover donated its services and its supplier, Jerrold, donated equipment for the two test schools.

What else is taught? The two channels, operating at the same time from tapes in the plane, beam out such courses as college chemistry and ninth and tenth grade biology, sixth grade arithmetic, high school American history, American government, French and Spanish for fifth and sixth grades, college algebra and world history and geography.

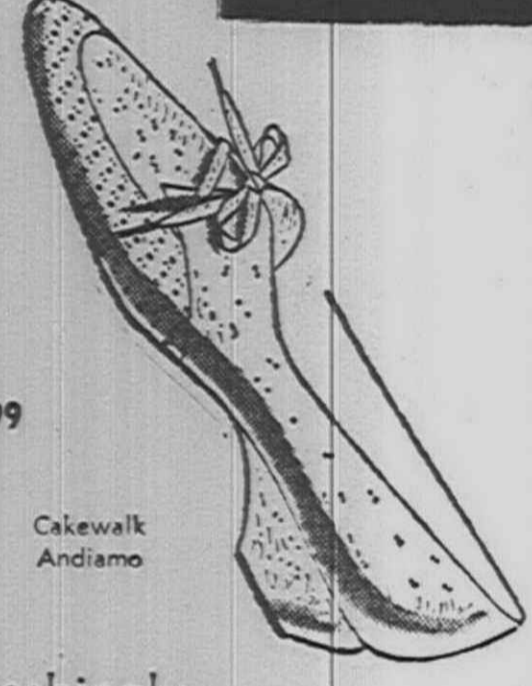

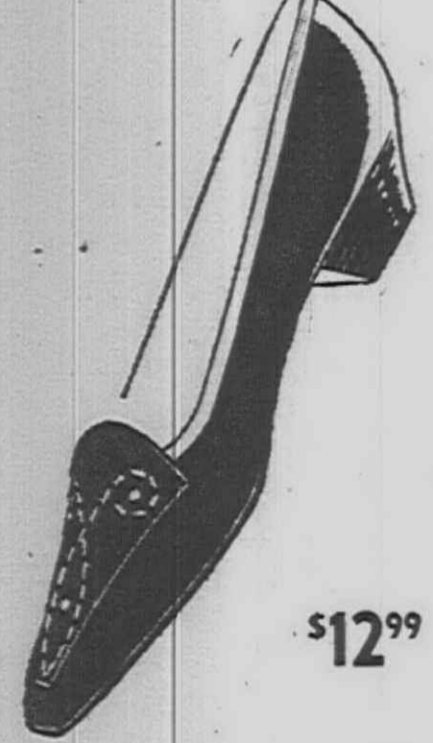
