Pennsylvania Crash Fatal To Local Woman

While accompanying her newly married son and his bride to Pennsylvania last Saturday to visit her father, Mrs. Edna Margaret Beaver, of Plymouth, was fatally injured when the car in which she was riding left the road and struck a tree. She was 54.

Mrs. Beaver, who lived at 2123 Marie St., Plymouth (a Plymouth address in that Township), died at the scene of the crash of a broken neck five miles south of Brockway, Pa. on Route 28. Her son, Morris T. Beaver, of Plymouth was driving when the car drifted off the road and hit the tree. The convertible was heavily damaged.

Morris, 29, received contusions of the chest, a fractured breast bone and lacerations of the throat. His bride, Mary Lou, suffered a concussion of the brain, multiple lacerations of the face, neck, mouth and legs. The three were enroute to Brockway to visit Mrs. Beaver's father, Morris Lewis, for Father's Day.

Mrs. Beaver was born Aug. 20, 1907 in Cicero, Ind. Surviving her are her husband, Clyde Thomas; her father; four sons, Morris of Plymouth, Donald Beaver of Livonia, Ronald of Garden City, Lewis of Garden City; one daughter, Mrs. Nancy Keller of Ferndale; two sisters, Mrs. Sarah Festine of Brockway, Mrs. Lillian Young of Johnsonburg, Pa.; and seven grandchildren.

The funeral was held from Schrader Funeral Home June 20. Rev. Eskil Fredrickson officiated.

Interment was in Cadillac Memorial Gardens Cemetery.

Constitution Crusader R. Roy Pursell Dies

R. Roy Pursell, who had gained national recognition as a crusader for strict adherence to the U.S. Constitution, passed away Saturday afternoon at St. Mary Hospital, Livonia, at the age of 56. Mr. Pursell admitted was up against great odds in his battles, "but it's the last battle that really counts," he maintained.

Funeral services were held at 1 p.m. Tuesday from the Schrader Funeral Home with David Baldwin officiating. While Mr. Pursell was well-known as owner of Pursell Optical Supply in Plymouth, his name became known on a broader scale because of his tireless interest in world and national affairs. Last November he was candidate for governor on the Independent American Party ticket in Michigan. He was also president of the Congress of Freedom, and many times had traveled to Washington, D.C. to testify at Congressional committee hearings on proposed legislation.

He was also active on the local political scene, not as a candidate, but as a close observer of legislation. He often appeared at City Commission meetings to discuss proposed actions and his final appearance was only two weeks ago when he spoke against fluoridation of City water. Born Feb. 19, 1905 in Unionville, Mich., Mr. Pursell was the son of Orlando and Elizabeth (Burroughs) Pursell. He was united in marriage with Doris Perkins on July 11, 1931 and is survived by Mrs. Pursell, a son, Carl D. Pursell of Northville, two daughters, Mrs. Cordia Mae Huettner, Mrs. Joanne Marie Smith, both of Livonia, and three grandchildren. The Pursells moved to Plymouth from Detroit in 1931 and two years later Mr. Pursell was the first printer in the state to reject the National Recovery Act (NRA). Blue Eagle sent him by the government. He refused it at the Post Office because he claimed it was wholly unconstitutional. Because of his stand on this, the Master Printer's Federation elected him its president with a promise to support his position. Later the NRA was declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court. But he did not fare as well on some of his other stands. He had battled the federal government on Social Security, which he also claimed unconstitutional. He delivered

Notice of Legal Action On Parking Lot Given

A letter of intent to file suit against the City of Plymouth to prohibit them from collecting a special assessment for enlarging and improving Central Parking Lot was handed to City Commissioners Monday night. The letter was given by Dr. Charles Westover, one of the property owners included in the special assessment area. But both he and City Commissioners expressed hope that they could settle their differences without court action. Less than half of the \$118,900 cost will be specially assessed against property owners in the area. Dr. Westover, whose office is at Harvey and Ann Arbor Trails, claims that he will receive very little benefit from the project in comparison with businesses. While he recognized that more off-street parking is necessary for downtown survival, he felt that a more equitable method of paying for the project should be evolved. Expanded Township Water System Open for Business

First Six Streets Ready for Tap-ins

Properties along six Plymouth Township streets can now tap the new Township water mains, it was announced this week at Township Hall, and more streets are expected to be added to the list each week. Streets now given approval for taps are Wilcox Dr., Clemons Dr., Finch Dr., Hammill Dr., Bradner Rd. and Lakeland Ct. Township Treasurer Elizabeth Holmes, whose department handles the sewer and water program, said that notice will be given as other streets are approved. Ground was broken early this year for the expanded Township water system. Until now, the only water system was located in Lake Pointe Village. Then came approval by the Detroit Water Board for use of Detroit water. This subsequently brought approval of a bond issue for the project. Thorough testing of each water main must be completed before it is released for use. This includes testing for impurities. Property owners wanting to tap the mains must make application at the treasurer's office at Township Hall. The water that now flows in the mains is well water from the Township system. Detroit water will be flowing by mid-August when the connection at Schoolcraft Rd. is made. The cost of the tap depends upon the width of the road. These costs range from \$125 to \$190. In addition to the tap charge, there is a charge of \$3 per front foot to help pay for the main itself. On existing buildings this can be paid in full when applying or can be billed at \$3 per bi-monthly billing period on the water bill for a total of \$18 a year until paid. On existing buildings, there is also a \$5 permit for inspection of the change-over. On new buildings, all charges will be paid in advance. Tap-in Charges These are the tap-in charges for the streets involved. The variation is due to the street widths: Schoolcraft (between Eckles and Wilcox) \$190. Eckles, Five Mile, Plymouth Rd., Haggerty, Ann Arbor Trail, Ann Arbor Rd., Lilley Rd., Joy Rd., Main St., Schoolcraft (Wilcox to Five Mile), \$165. Bradner, Wilcox, Park Entrance Drive, \$145. Russell, Morgan, Brownell, Francis, Ferguson, Gilbert, Butternut, Southworth, Gold Arbor, Micol, Burger, Eastside, Hammill, Marilyn, Marlin, Bruce, Lakeland, Finch, Clemons, Morrison, Rocket, Ball, Corinne, Northern, Oakview and Brookline, \$125. These charges are for three-quarter inch residential service only.

Reports Sales Are Up

Plymouth stood out as a stronger market than most during the past year, with a level of income and spending above that found in most parts of the United States. Its relative position, in terms of business activity, is brought out in a new, copyrighted "Survey of Buying Power" produced by Sales Management. The 762-page survey reveals, for every county in the nation and for many of its cities, what their earnings and their retail sales amounted to in 1960. It shows that consumer spending in Plymouth, despite the half year of business slump that prevailed generally, was on a big scale. Local retail stores, as a result, had a sales volume of \$29,543,000, an increase over the prior year's \$28,742,000. For a community of its size, this was more than might have been expected. Retail business locally should have amounted to .0050 percent of the national, on the basis of population. It exceeded that quota, however, producing .0134 percent of the total. NEWS BEAT

A safe, money bags and 100 canceled checks—the remains of a theft several weeks ago from Arlan's Discount House in Warren—were found last week beside a creek at Haggerty and Warren Roads in Canton Township. Two boys playing in the area found the items and reported it to neighbor Julius Brodie who called State Police. Warren police picked up the items.

PROGRESS: Neighbors living in the area of Burroughs and Evans Products have received assurance from Plymouth Township officials that the two industries are studying the complaint about soot and fly ash from their smoke stacks. Air pollution experts and Supervisor Roy Lindsay met with industry officials recently. SEWER BAN: The absolute ban of further building permits for buildings that would utilize sanitary sewer facilities (reported last week) has brought about protests from local builders. The proposed Plymouth Bowl lanes on Plymouth Rd. had not yet received its permit, but may try to use septic tanks. The City reports that nine property owners who were almost taken to court because they

have failed to attach to the sewer, will still have to make the connection. The nine have been still using septic tanks. The state said that they will allow the tap-in for these nine. ANOTHER STEP: The City's Urban Renewal project along S. Mill St. moved still another step closer Monday when the City Commission passed a resolution authorizing the filing of an application for a federal loan and grant. Of the \$280,000 project, the government will furnish all but \$94,000. Eighteen families will be relocated. Three industrial sites will be carved from the area. HEARING SET: A hearing on recapping Sheridan Ave.—from Sheldon to McKinley, has been set for 8 p.m. on July 3. The two-inch bituminous surfacing would cost \$1 per front foot.

College's Future Up To Boards

Boards of Education of the Plymouth, Livonia, Farmington and Garden City School districts will meet jointly next Monday to set a date for another election at which citizens will again be asked whether they want to form a community college. The Executive Committee of the Proposed Northwest College has held several meetings since last week's community college election when the citizens of Redford Union and South Redford districts voted down the proposal. At the executive committee meetings, a "scaled down" plan to fit the needs of the remaining four school districts has evolved, according to Harold Fischer, chairman of the committee. Both Redford Union and South Redford districts have dropped out of the community college picture—at least for the time being. Should the remaining four districts vote to form the college, it would be possible for the two Redford Districts to ask its voters to annex their districts to the community college district. This would also require approval of the college's board of trustees. It is believed that all four of the remaining board of education will decide to move ahead with the college formation. They will learn of the Executive Committee's new proposal at the meeting held Monday held in the college's office in old Newburg School.

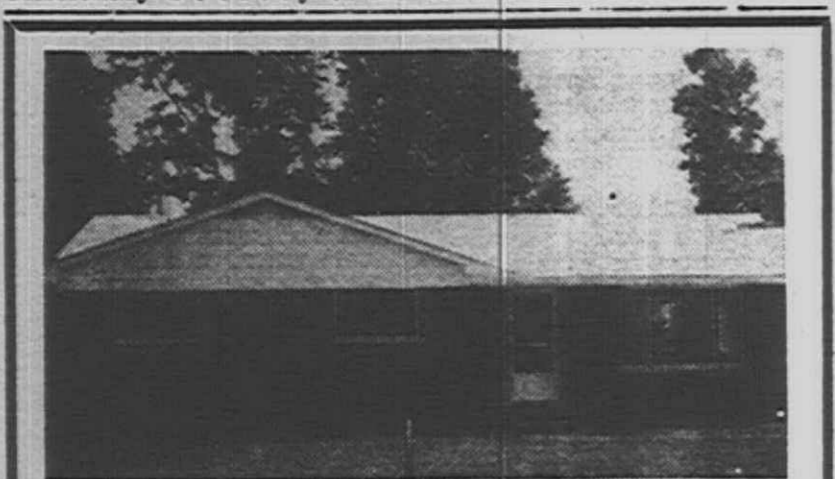

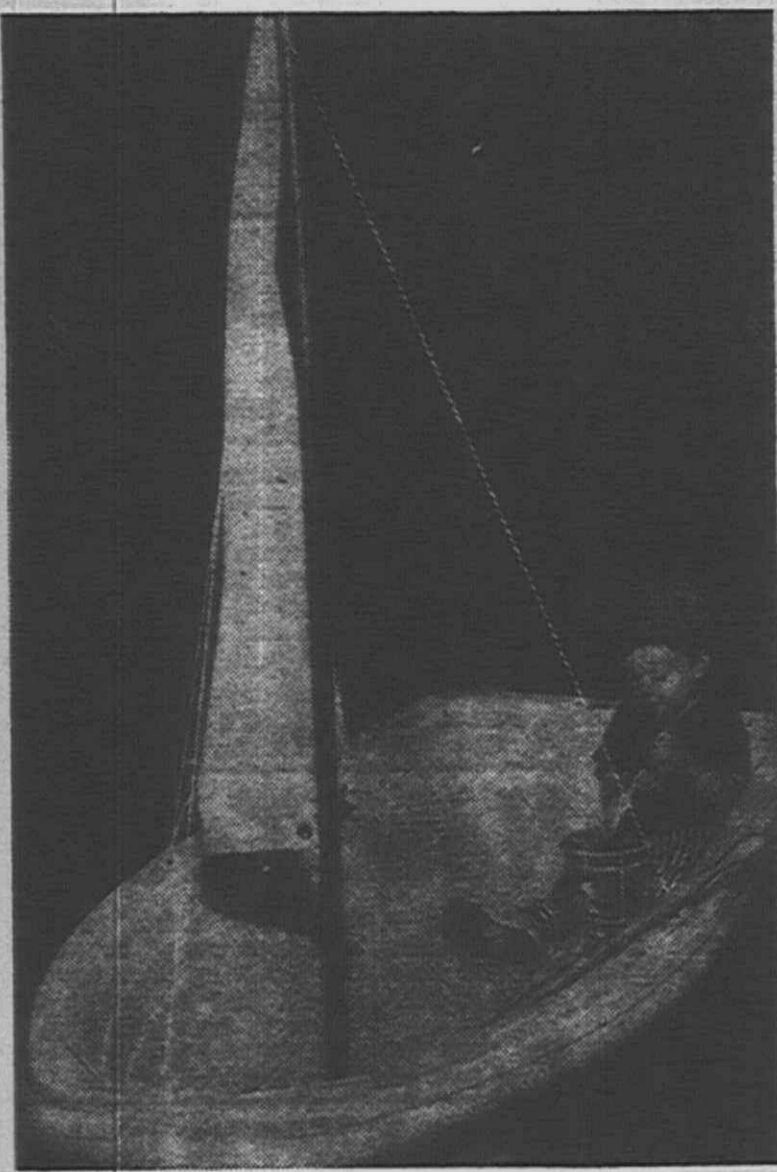

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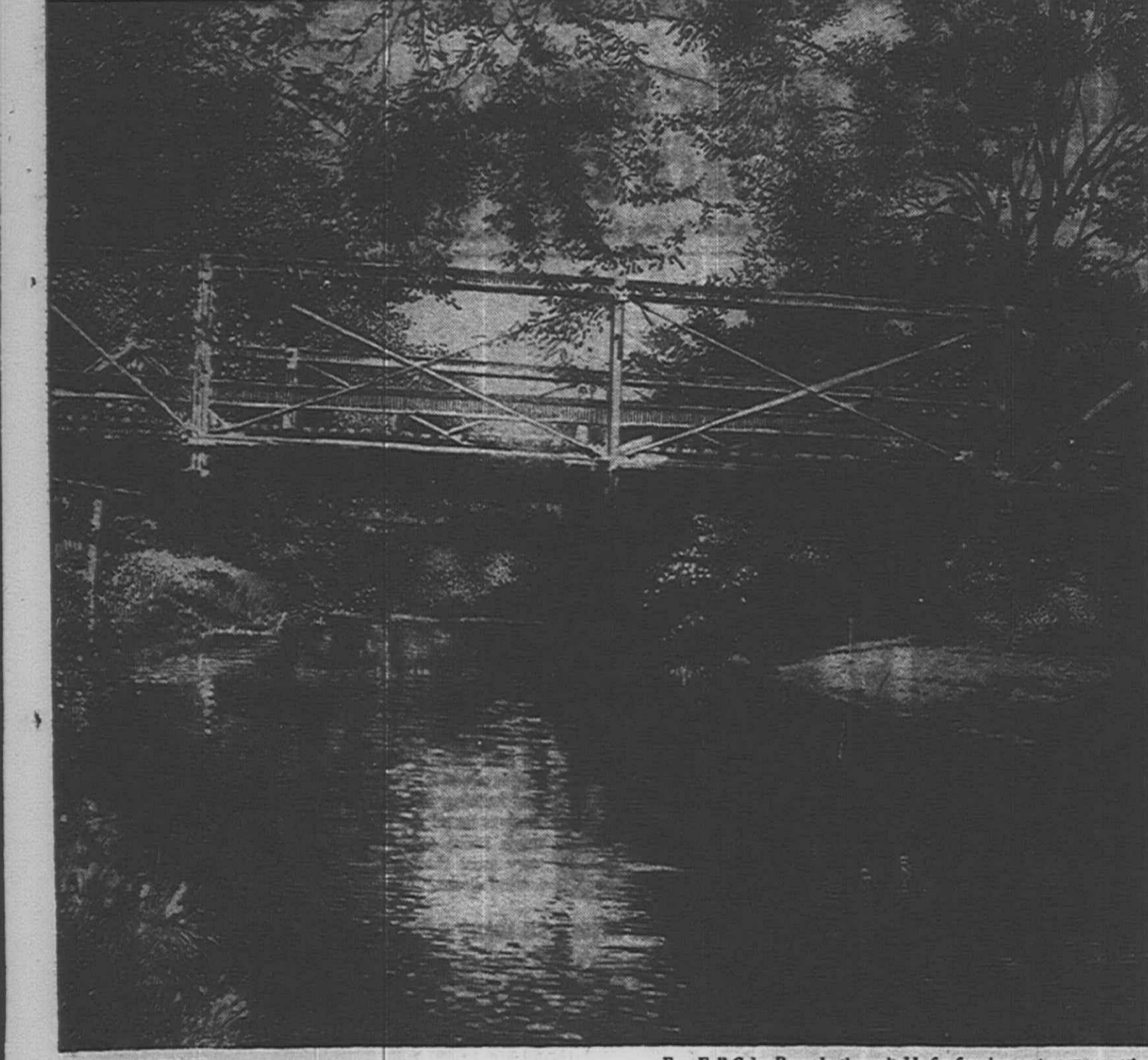

Also in the interests of increased safety, a double bar helmet instead of the present single bar. There is some opposition to this proposal, however, because there is some evidence that the bars cause neck injuries in tackling.

The rules committee also stiffened up the penalty for pass interference. Intentional pass interference now will result in a 30-yard penalty instead of 15. Fifteen yards will still apply where the interference is not judged to be intentional.

Another safety rule will prohibit the lining of grid-

Local Youths Help Form Make-Believe 51st State and Wolverine Boys' State

A make-believe "51st State" has been formed at Michigan State University by 1,080 boys from all parts of Michigan. The boys are learning "democracy-in action" during their eight day stay at the American Legion sponsored Wolverine Boys' State.

Included in the group are six boys from Plymouth High School. They are Jim Kropf, Rusty Bowers, Forrest Morgeson, Mike Horvath, Bob Winterhalter and Harold Fischer. They are sponsored by the Kiwanis, B.P.O. Elks and Optimist Club.

For the 24th year, a magic new world for these 15 to 18-year old youths is opening with this chance to learn by doing, lessons in civics and government. All is not work, though, as Wolverine State goes beyond politics to include glee club performances, organization of a newspaper, softball games, swimming clinic, and many other activities. Boys' State is not a school room activity, but is designed as a practical experience in the problems of self-government.

The group has been broken up into 20 "city groups" so they can be better acquainted and start their campaigns for city, county and state elections. These elections will be over and the office holders tabulated by Sunday. Voting machines have been provided and set up for the elections by the Mechanized Voting Systems, Inc., of Highland Park, with instructors from this firm and the Detroit Election System. At their first General Assembly, Boys' State citizens were addressed by Governor John B. 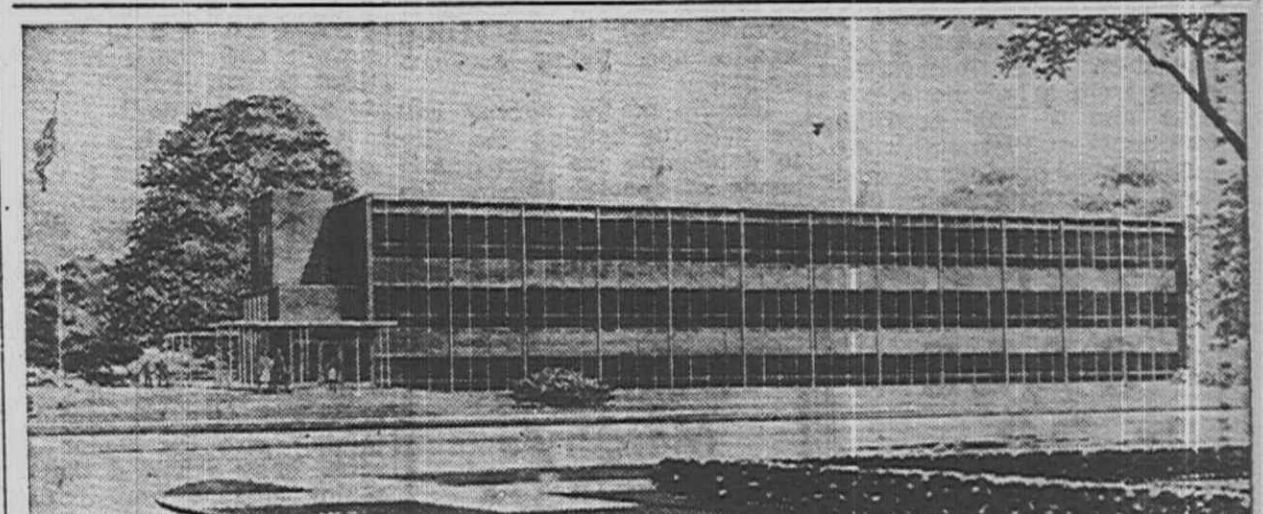

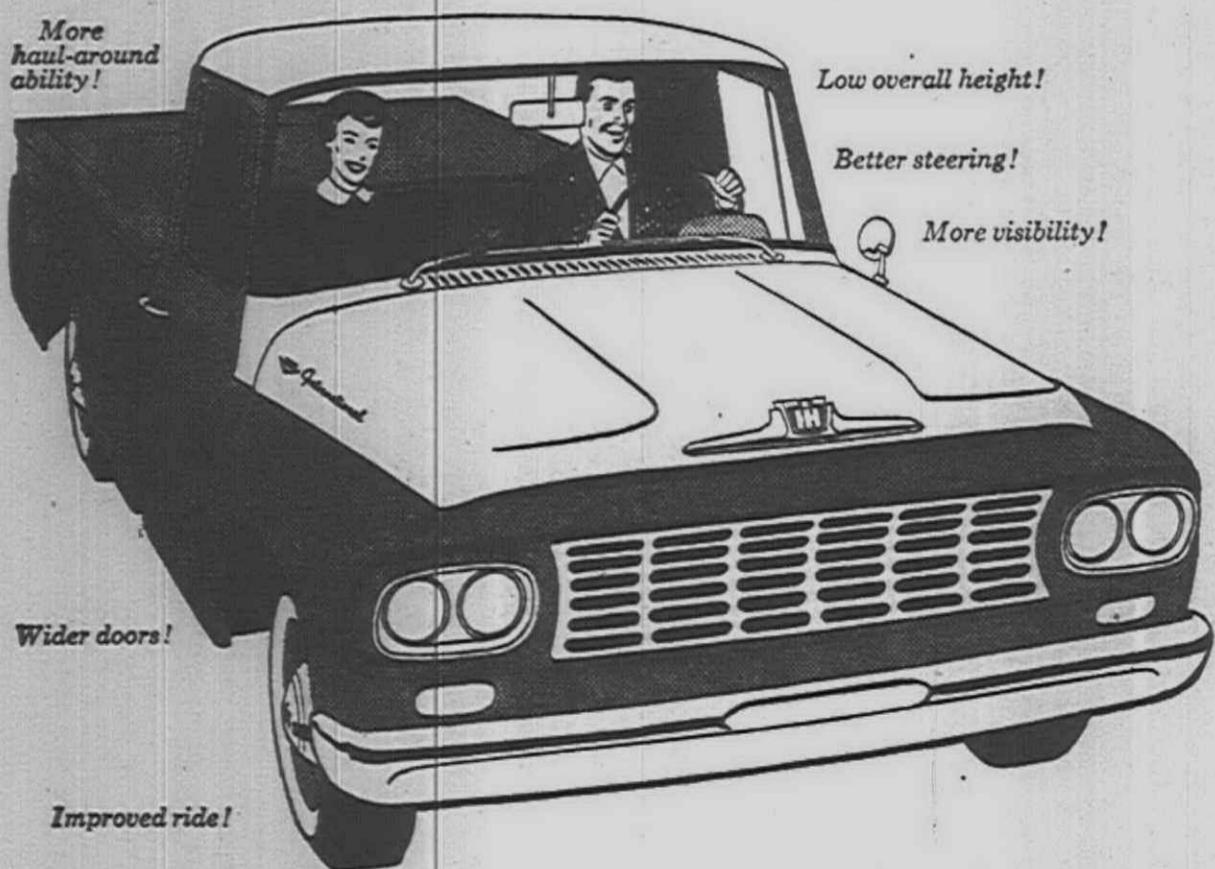

Senior Citizens Give Full Cooperation to City Survey

A survey of 55 Plymouth senior citizens is now being tabulated and interpreted by the University of Michigan Department of Gerontology and a report will be ready by Sept. 1, it was announced this week.

The survey was conducted recently by 33 volunteer interviewers representing local churches. The interviewers spent from a half hour to an hour and a half recording comments of Plymouth's citizens aged 62 or older on questions concerning their com-

munity, their leisure time, health and living arrangements.

Results of the survey will be used in helping the City to determine the wants and needs of special housing for older people.

Many of the people were very content with their life and their community, according to Carl Glassford, U of M

student who coordinated the survey. Not uncommon were comments such as: "church has a good program for old people"; "pleasant town to live in"; "manage to keep busy enough in my free time"; and "hope every retired person enjoys himself as much as I do."

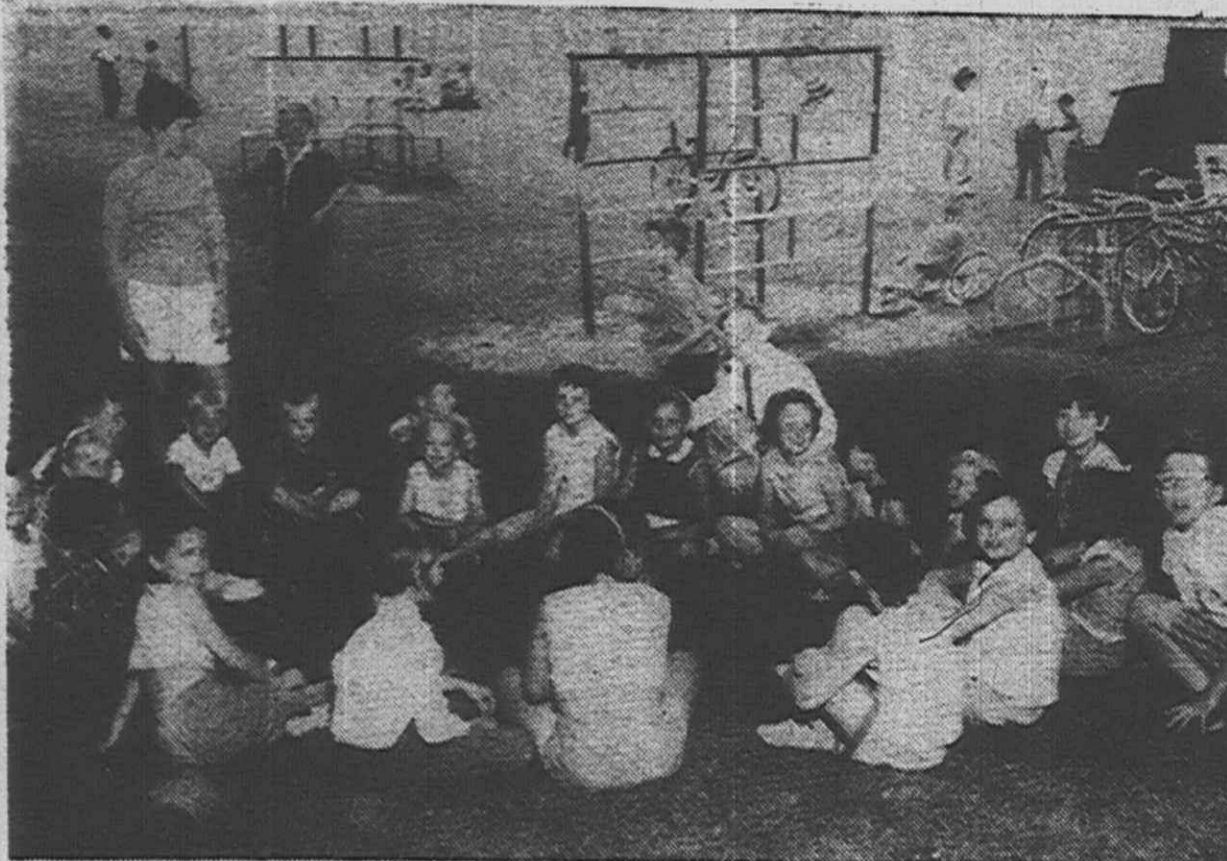
Other comments not so favorable were "taxes too high, can barely make ends meet"; "house is too big, income too small"; "everyone is too busy to notice me"; and "medicine is so much more expensive than in former years. I can't afford it."

In general, the interviewers were very successful in talking with the senior citizens. They reported that the senior citizens were friendly and anxious to cooperate.

This was the first time that people over 62 have been given the opportunity to express their minds to the community in which they live.

(Continued from Page 1) large part of last year had its effect on the summing public. It was noted in the way they altered their spending pattern.

There was a shift away from hard goods and in the direction of soft goods and services. The survey suggests that the trend also indicates a change that is occurring in family needs, what with the post-war baby crop now reaching the teen years.

The bigger spending in Plymouth stores is attributable to the fact that local residents had more money available to them.

The report shows that the community's effective buying income, which is the money remaining in consumer hands after payment of all Federal, state and local taxes, amounted to \$20,741,000 in 1960. It was \$20,067,000 the previous year.

This total, divided arithmetically by the number of households in the city, gives \$7,152 as the average net income per household.

Locally, retail sales were greater than income, showing that people come in from other areas to shop in the city.

Just how well individual communities compare with others in business vitality, taking into account population and rate of consumer buying, is shown through an "index of sales activity."

Plymouth is given an index rating of 268, or 168 percent higher than the national average.

Ada and Barton Rogers

This fall Barton and Ada Rogers will move on to new adventures in Oaxaca, Mexico. Retiring from teaching and social work, after many dedicated years, they are realizing dreams and plans which have been in the making for some time.

Mr. Rogers has been teaching reading improvement classes in Plymouth High School for the past 10 years, making a total of 36 years spent in the field of education.

The grandson of the first high school principal in Wisconsin, and son of a newspaper editor, he was born to a life of community service, in Racine. His mother was a miniature portrait painter of note, having studied at the Art Students' League in New York and was a member and guest exhibitor at the Chicago Art Institute and the Century of Progress.

Mr. Rogers was graduated from Oshkosh High School and first attended Wisconsin State Teachers' College, before going on to the University of Wisconsin where he received both his master's and bachelor's degrees in philosophy a few years apart. He has also attended Harvard, Wayne State, and the University of Michigan.

He had only been teaching two years in his first assignment at Crystal Falls, Mich., as junior high science teacher, when he became principal of Forest Park Elementary and Junior High School in the same city. Three years later, he moved on to principalship in Oconomowoc, Wis. at Lincoln Elementary and Junior High. He remained there for 15 years before becoming the first principal of Bentley High School in Livonia, a position he held for five years.

Like most principals, he wanted to get back into the classroom, so he went to Northville to teach social studies for one year before coming to Plymouth. Near-sightedness kept him

out of World War I, and since his age prevented him from active duty in World War II, he was nevertheless a most active participant selling war bonds, issuing food ration stamps, and teaching first aid as a Red Cross instructor.

He was president of Oconomowoc Community Men's Club, secretary of the Kiwanis Club and member of the Oconomowoc Chamber of Commerce for about 25 years and has been chairman of various committees in the Plymouth branch of the Kiwanis Club.

Thirty years of active service in Boy Scout work, included everything from Tenderfoot to district commissioner in various councils in Wisconsin and Michigan. His last assignment was in the Sunset District of the Detroit Area Council where he held various leadership offices until December of 1953.

In the field of education he has been a tireless worker in many organizations on both the national and state levels in both Wisconsin and Michigan. He was a charter member, first treasurer and president of the Wisconsin Elementary School Principals Assn. In addition to N.E.A., Wisconsin Education Assn., Michigan Education Assn., and local education organizations, and the offices held in most of these groups, he has had an active interest in the International Reading Assn. His honor society is Phi Delta Kappa.

Mrs. Rogers was also a graduate of Oshkosh High School and likewise received her B.A. degree from the University of Wisconsin. She was the recipient of a scholarship for graduate study in social service at Bryn Mawr College where she studied for one year, doing her internship in Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston.

She did additional graduate study at the University of Chicago, the University of Michigan and Wayne State University.

She has held various positions in relief departments in several Wisconsin communities and was child welfare consultant in the State departments in Wisconsin for seven years.

She is currently an adoption case worker at the Michigan Children's Institute, a state agency, and will have completed 14 1/2 years there when she retires in August.

The Rogers have two children, John and Nancy. John has his master's degree in mathematics from the University of Michigan, was Phi Beta Kappa, and is presently employed as programmer in the electronic computer field for the Systems Development Corp. at Santa Monica, Calif. He has two daughters.

Nancy attended University of New Mexico for two years and also Wayne State University for two years. She spent a year in Mexico as a teacher with the Friends' Society, and studied in Germany and Austria for six months. She is a talented folk dancer.

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Citizens Sound Off About City

A survey conducted by The Plymouth Mail to determine the grievances of City citizens has turned up a contrasting set of replies that lists, practically every category from "poor" to "satisfactory."

The survey asked readers to check off how they would rate the various City services, such as the police and fire departments, water, sewer, street lighting, street sweeping, and maintenance, parks and playgrounds. It also asked opinions about the City Commission and complaint handling by City offices.

While only a small percentage of readers replied to the survey, it did give the City Commission an insight into the thinking of some of its citizens. The "satisfactory" side of the ledger received the largest number of votes. But only one person checked everything as satisfactory.

It was the space for "other suggestions" that provided the greatest interest. These are some of the comments: "My clothes are as yellow as butter," said one reader in commenting about the water.

"No care in re-covering garbage cans," said another. "Stop light needed at Wing and Main."

"More parking needed," one commented. But another said: "We do not need more parking. The lot is never full. We need stores that can sell at better prices. People won't trade here as long as it's \$5 to \$10 cheaper at Wonderland."

Concerning the Police Department: "Need of a larger police force is imperative." "Police courtesy, very poor." "Police courtesy, excellent." "Fire Department efficiency received a high volume of 'satisfactory' votes."

The City Commission itself got a majority of "satisfactory" check-marks, but there were some comments: "Local merchant - controlled and oriented." "Need mayor-elect type of government." "City Commission and officials are to be commended for their fine work." "City Commission, stinks." "City manager should be kicked in the pants."

"Revise charter about posting on bulletin boards. It's outmoded as the Town Crier." (This concerns the required posting of notices on three bulletin boards.)

The Department of Public Works received some attention too: "Sweeping does more harm than good, throws stones on lawns and hurts lawnmower." "Side streets should be swept weekly." "Union St. needs blacktop, not oil."

There were also these comments: "Water rates are too high." "Too much vandalism in area by teenage beats with no parental supervision." "Brown water is a disgrace." "Need more parks." "Music and orchestra is needed in our park."

Area Bendix Plant To Build Space Laboratory

Roy J. Sandstrom, general manager of the Bendix Systems Division, Ann Arbor, announced that a contract to construct an addition to the existing Bendix Environmental Laboratory Building has been awarded to Barton-Malow Construction Company of Oak Park. The combined structure of 35,000 square feet will house the new Bendix Space Laboratory.

Social Security Changes Noted

"As a result of changes in 1960, disability benefits may now be paid to workers at any age," said Harry Baltuck, manager of the Detroit-Northwest Social Security office at 18500 Grand River Ave., Detroit 23, Mich. In addition to having a severe physical or mental illness which will show up in a medical test, it is necessary that the worker have covered employment or be self-employed five years out of the

Evans Will Try Acquisition Of Stock Again

Edward S. Evans, Jr., president of Evans Products Company, of Plymouth, Michigan, has announced that the Evans board of directors has voted to submit to stockholders a new plan for the acquisition of Aberdeen Plywood and Veneers, Inc., of Aberdeen, Washington.

A stockholders meeting to approve this new plan has been called for Aug. 3.

The new plan contemplates an exchange of Evans common stock for Aberdeen common stock on the basis of six-tenths of one share of Evans common for each share of Aberdeen common and 1 1/2 shares of Evans common for each share of Aberdeen \$25 par value preferred.

The call for the meeting also includes a proposal to amend the by-laws to eliminate staggered terms for directors which two stockholders have indicated they will present.

"The major stockholders of Aberdeen indicated they will accept the new plan," Evans said.

"The amount of Evans common stock to be issued remains the same as that which would ultimately have been issued over a five year period under the earlier proposal. The Evans preferred stock which was to have been issued initially has been eliminated."

At the meeting in May over 72 percent of the stock voting voted in favor of the authorization of the new class of preferred. However, the statutory requirement of a majority of the outstanding stock was not obtained.

"The acquisition of Aberdeen will add to the Evans Facilities in the plywood and related building materials field, two plywood specialty mills located on the West Coast and nineteen wholesale distribution warehouses," said Evans.

The college conferred honorary doctorates on Williams and Lt. General Emerson L. Cummings, a Ferris alumnus who is now commanding general of the Fifth Army.

Wins Commission

Wayne F. King, 14401 Ridge Rd., received a U.S. Navy ensign's commission at commissioning services at the University of Michigan Saturday, June 17.

There were 67 U. of M. ROTC cadets receiving commissions at the services. U.S. Navy Rear Admiral John A. Tyree, Jr., was the main speaker. He is former commander of the U.S. Seventh Fleet.

When completed in October of this year, the facility will be available for the development, fabrication, assembly and test of complete, full-sized spacecraft at a single location under one roof. Construction will begin in one week. The architect is Harley, Ellington, Cowin, and Sturton Incorporated of Detroit, Michigan.

Highlighting the Bendix Laboratory will be the High Altitude Chamber Room which houses the spacecraft thermal vacuum test chamber. This 20 by 27 foot chamber will simulate an altitude of 800,000 feet. One end is a full-opening removable door which allows spacecraft and associated test equipment to be installed. The rigors of outer space will be simulated in the test chamber.

An array of carbon arc and infrared lamps will subject the spacecraft to the sun's heat. Plates cooled by liquid nitrogen will then simulate the chill of space darkness when the sun is eclipsed. Ultra violet radiation will be intro-

duced through quartz lenses mounted on one end of the chamber. Thirty-two access ports will allow probes, instruments, and vibration exciters to be attached to the spacecraft under test.

The Bendix Space Laboratory will also be equipped to test spacecraft for static and dynamic loading, multi-environment exposure, stabilization and control operation, and thermal conductivity. The entire building will be air-conditioned and certain portions of it will be environmentally controlled as required for specific operations.

The administrative offices, the division's technical departments and service groups, and engineering, research and design laboratories are housed in a 132,700 square foot building on Plymouth Road. In addition Bendix maintains another 35,000 square feet in downtown Ann Arbor on a lease basis.

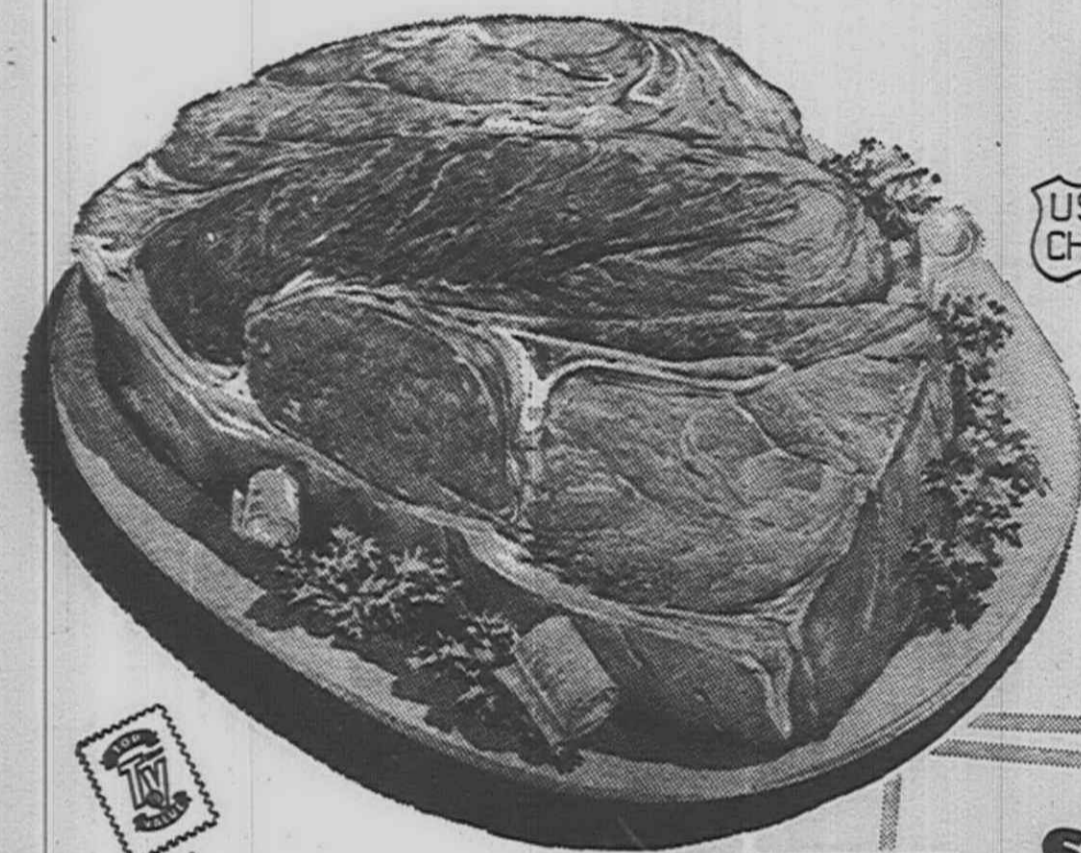

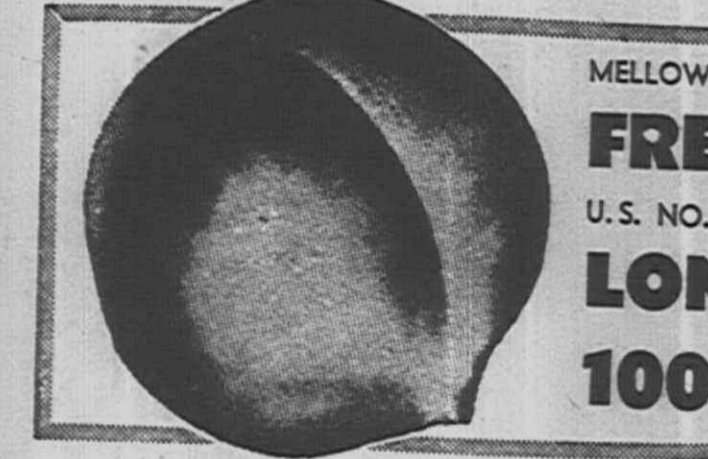

Our Guy in the Sky

It Had to Happen - - the Landing

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the fourth in a series of articles written by The Mail's managing editor who is trying to find out if the average man in the street can become a man in the air—with plane, of course.)

Things were going along pretty nice until last week. My flying instructor, Alan Finney, was doing the take-offs and landings while I was doing the rest. It was quite a nice arrangement.

But when I phoned to make an appointment for last week's lesson, Al nonchalantly mentioned that it was time I try take-offs and landings.

Somehow, I just had a hunch he would get around to that some time. Arriving at his Mettetal Airport office the next day, he also announced that we were going to try instrument flying too! And to top it off, we were not going to take the Piper Colt as usual. We needed a plane with more instruments and we were going to take the Piper Tri-Pacer.

"The situation's getting out of hand," I said to myself. The thought of take-offs and landings was bad enough. But to fly blind and in a strange plane — all in the same hour of instruction — seemed to be carrying things too far. But like so many other things, the thought of it was much more terrifying than the actual doing. The four-place Tri-Pacer was only slightly different than the smaller Colt. I

soon learned as we taxied out to the runway.

"You take it off." Al declared as I swung the plane around down the runway. Ordinarily, I happily relinquished controls at this moment. "Give her steady throttle," he added.

As the ship moved ahead, I gradually pushed forward the throttle. It started toward the left side of the runway, so I pushed down the right rudder pedal. It then meandered to the right side, so I gave it left rudder. Had I been driving down a highway, I would have been ticked for reckless driving.

"Pull her back." Al directed, and I steadily pulled back the control wheel. The plane suddenly lifted off the runway and within a few seconds we were sailing over Joy Rd.

Making a left climbing turn across the City, I headed the plane toward our favorite flying grounds west of Northville. I was already familiar with most of the instruments, but there were three new ones.



We've seen editors wearing eyeshades, but this is ridiculous! Our flying editor was given this device to block out his vision with the exception of the instrument panel.

One was a rate-of-climb indicator, which simply told how many feet per minute the plane was climbing, or dropping. Another was a gyro-compass, which is a more accurate type of compass than the magnetic type, also found in the plane. The third was an interesting gadget called an artificial horizon. It appeared to have a little "airplane" floating in the middle that could tell you at a glance if you are flying even with the horizon or whether one wing or both are above or below the horizon.

Reaching into the back of the plane, Al handed me a black plastic hood. I didn't know if I was expected to do some welding or rob a bank.

"Try this on for size," he declared as I fit it on my head. It was like looking down a tunnel and all I could see when looking straight ahead was the unscenic instrument panel. This was the general idea.

"Keep the plane straight and level by just looking at the instruments," he asked. I complied — to the best of my feeble ability. "Now, 90 degrees to the right," he continued.

Then, during the next 20 minutes, I maneuvered the plane in turns, climbed up and down and traveled over many miles of unseen territory. Surprising even myself, the maneuvers were quite normal by just looking at the instruments.

Heading back to the airport, it was now time for my first landing. First, there was a check with the wind direction indicator ("socks" are going out of style, I guess) to make sure the wind hasn't changed since we left. Nope, it hadn't.

Flying parallel with the runway, but opposite of the landing direction, the plane is put into a glide. This is called the "downwind" leg.

After passing the airport, a left turn is made into what is called the "base leg." Finally another turn is made directly toward the runway and the throttle is cut further.

"How in Hannah's hat will I ever hit the end of that runway?" I thought hurriedly as the plane nosed down further. The blacktop strip now grew larger and larger. If I followed instinct, I would pull the nose up 50 feet above the plane 50 feet off the ground they say.

So further down it went and finally, under Al's instructions, I pulled back on the control wheel. "Power off — all the way," Al commanded. The plane settled more.

"Further back... further back..." Al said. I thought now the plane would do a stand on its tail.

Suddenly there was a little jolt and the plane was on the ground!

"Keep her straight," Al continued as the ship sped down the strip. Again, I would have pocketed another reckless driving ticket if this were Main St.

Taxiing back to the parking area, I was quite proud of myself, but a little skeptical that I had actually landed the ship. "Just what per cent of that landing did I do?" I finally inquired of Al.

"Why, all of it," Al replied reassuredly. "I just kept my hands on the wheel, just in case."

Although still skeptical, I didn't pursue it further. Flying instructors have to be good psychologists to boot, and giving the student confidence is half of this game.

Of course, I won't let him know that I know this.

Warn Against Water Pollution Problems

It's becoming increasingly hard to get a decent drink of water.

In many suburbs, wells and modern detergents make septic tanks plus viruses and conditions ripe for epidemics, according to Drs. Walter L. Mallmann and Walter N. Mack of the Michigan State University microbiology and public health department.

Cities which draw water from rivers also have a problem. Small but increasing amounts of detergents, insecticides, weed killers and other chemicals are being found in their water, reports Dr. C. Fred Gurnham, head of chemical engineering at MSU.

Drs. Mallmann and Mack recently reviewed hundreds of studies they and other scientists have made relating to contamination of underground water. Disease-causing bacteria travel through the ground with sewage for up to 100 feet or more, they report.

What's more, they suspect, viruses travel even further than the much-larger bacteria and that syndets (synthetic detergents) give both more mobility.

They know that in many suburban areas, syndets from septic tanks have entered wells and cause a head of suds to appear on water as it is drawn from the tap. These syndets, they believe, carry microbes in suspension.

"Without question," they say, "a health problem exists... Unless recognition is given to the problem and proper specifications are formulated, based on research... health hazards may result."

Dr. Gurnham, on the other hand has been concerned with city water supplies.

He is on a committee advising the United States Public Health Service in its effort to find a solution to the problem of trace chemicals in city water.

"Each drop of water," he explains, "is used and re-used many times during its journey to the sea."

"Sewage and industrial waste treatment cleans up the used water before discharge—but not perfectly. Water purification plants make the water clean for re-use—but again not perfectly. Some chemicals are not removed by any reasonable known treatment."

"Chemical contaminants are present in city water only in trace amounts—as little as one or two parts per billion—but they could be dangerous. We don't know yet."

"But even though many of these chemicals have been present for generations, everyone would like to have them removed."

The task of purifying water to the extent of removing all trace chemicals, the MSU professor notes, may be more difficult and expensive than that of freshening salt water.
