

College Future Up to Voters Tuesday

Must Decide on Formation Issue, Trustees



THE MAIL ATTITUDE

There is no point in dwelling at any length on the Community College proposal which will be offered voters of this district next Tuesday, Oct. 24.

Exactly the same principle is involved as when a similar measure was given stout voter support in June. The size of the college district has been reduced since then, to eliminate the two Redford Township districts. Remaining are Plymouth, Livonia, Clarenceville and Garden City.

No millage is involved in Tuesday's election. Any such request would have to go to the ballot, and that would happen later.

Tuesday's election would authorize the district. Voters also will select a Board of Governors.

The need for education beyond the 12th grade in our present society long ago became obvious. The most economical way to provide it is with a Community College under local control, close enough to residences so that board and room costs will be unnecessary.

The College will provide the first two years of academic work for those who aspire to a college degree. They would transfer to another institution for the final two years.

It also will offer trade courses for those who have no desire or aptitude for academic college, but who realize that there is hardly any place in business today for unskilled labor carrying just a high school diploma.

And the Community College will greatly enlarge the scope of work available to men and women who wish to fill their spare time in creative "Adult Education."

The college "campus" will enrich the local landscape, provide a cultural headquarters for the area, and indirectly increase the value of homes.

This newspaper again urges an enthusiastic "Yes" vote.

As to the candidates running for the board of governors, the voter must pick three "at large" and one more from his particular district.

Each district has only one man running as the local representative, so the choice is automatic. In Livonia, it's Ward McCain; in Plymouth, Harold Fischer; in Clarenceville, Paul Mutnick; in Garden City, Clarke Oldenburg. All are earnest, qualified, sincere lay educators.

A contest does exist, however, in the "at large" election. Six are running for three seats. Our three recommendations are:

Jane Moehle, 1279 Ann Arbor Trail, Plymouth. Charles B. Kirkpatrick, 31838 Delaware, Livonia. James O'Neil, 9840 Ingram, Livonia.

They led the race in the June election and are entitled to a "repeat victory." Which isn't to downgrade the opposition. The other three running, Herbert Kagen (Clarenceville), Fred Morris (Garden City) and Dr. A. Leo Speer (Plymouth), all are in-

Electors in four school districts—Plymouth, Livonia, Clarenceville and Garden City—will journey to the polls next Tuesday to once again decide if they want to join together to form a community college district.

This will be the second time in four months that they have been asked to make the decision—and if the same people go that voted the last time and if they haven't changed their minds, a community college district will be formed.

Four months ago voters in these four districts each approved formation of the Northwest Wayne County Community College. But two other districts, Redford Union and South Redford, rejected the proposal 2-1. As a result, the proposal failed. Since then, the four school districts where the vote ranged up to 8 to 1 in favor have moved ahead to form the college district.

Besides being asked to decide on a college formation, electors at Tuesday's election will also vote on four candidates who would serve on a board of trustees should the college be formed.

Each district has but one person running for trustee as representative for their districts. This means that these four men are elected without opposition.

But all voters will also be voting on candidates who are competing for the three trustee at-large openings. There are six candidates running for these three jobs.

Each voter will therefore be asked to vote for a total of four people—one from his own district and three at-large.

There will be no vote this Tuesday on millage or any money propositions for the college. If the district is formed, the trustees will decide upon the millage and set an election. (School boards in the four districts generally favor a community college millage election next June.)

Polls will open at 7 a.m. Tuesday and will close at 8 p.m. All registered electors are eligible to vote on both the issue and the candidates.

Here are the six at-large candidates, for which voters will vote for not more than three:

James O'Neil, 9840 Ingram, Livonia, planning and programming manager for auto styling office.

Dr. A. Leo Speer, 9400 S. Main, Plymouth, chiropractic physician.

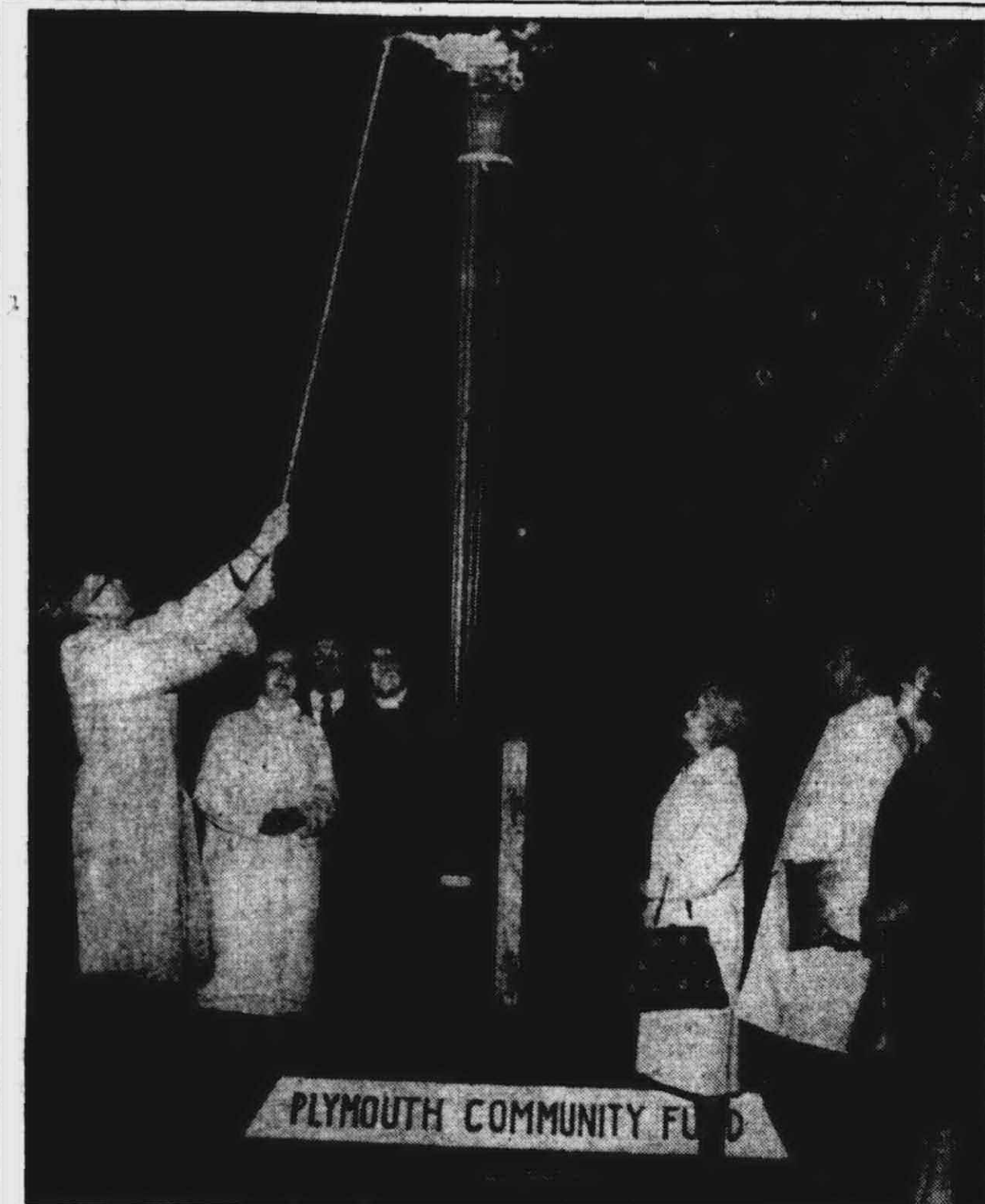

Community Fund Drive Launched!

Tenth of Goal Already Met

Plymouth's 1961 Community Fund campaign opened Monday with one-tenth of the \$44,347 goal already achieved—but with still a big job lying ahead for volunteers and donors.

A Kick-off Luncheon was held Monday noon at the Mayflower Hotel at which 50 volunteers heard drive chairman Russell Isbister outline the job that is ahead.

Donations and pledges of \$4,428 were reported by the Advanced Gifts Division headed by Floyd Kehrl. This division makes contacts with major individual contributors. The \$4,428 represents one-tenth of the goal.

This Thursday, some 200 women will make house-to-house calls in the Township and City to seek pledges and donations from those who will not be contacted at their place of employment. Most of the household calls will be made between the hours of 7 and 8 p.m., according to Mrs. George Bauer, chairman of the Residential Division.

Many of these volunteers attended Monday's Kick-off Luncheon, which was a "plus" contribution of the National Bank of Detroit. A welcome was given by Hugh Griffin, president of the Commu-

nity Fund Board of Directors. Griffin noted that requests this year were up over 30 per cent over last year and that the goal has been upped 20 per cent. As evidence that Community Fund money is at work, he showed a

group of checks amounting to \$7,000 that will be paid to some of the agencies as their last quarter allotment this week.

General Chairman Russell Isbister pointed out that the job facing Plymouth is not nearly as great as that facing some of its neighbors. In Ann Arbor, there are 60,000 people with a goal of \$53,000. This represents a per capita need of \$7.50. In the Detroit Metropolitan area where 3 million people will have an \$18 million goal, the per capita share would be \$6.

The Plymouth community has 16,000 people with a goal (Continued on Page 10)

Plymouth Colony, Arbor Village To Get Sewer System

Approval to obtain bids on a sanitary sewer for Plymouth Colony and Arbor Village and purchase of a rescue vehicle for the Fire Department were two of the items handled by the Plymouth Township Board at their monthly meeting last week.

Engineer Herald Hamill was instructed to advertise for bids for a sanitary sewer that will serve the two subdivisions, Plymouth Colony on Sheldon Rd., and Arbor Village on Ann Arbor Rd. Some residents from both areas have petitioned for sanitary sewer. Plymouth Colony especially has reported "bad situations" where septic tanks are not performing properly.

The Township has \$130,000 remaining from its original sanitary sewer bond issue which will use for laying the two extensions. The engineer estimates the Plymouth Colony job at \$86,000 and the Arbor Village sewer at \$43,000, for a total of \$129,000.

If a water permit, the sewers will be laid yet this year.

Two bids were received for a 1962 stationwagon that will be used as a rescue vehicle by the Fire Department. The rescuator and other rescue equipment are now carried by one of the pumper trucks, which makes such runs more cumbersome.

The two bids were from E. J. Allison (Chevrolet), \$3,017.77; and Paul J. Wiedman, Inc. (Ford), \$2,878. The Wiedman bid was accepted.

Fire Chief Howard Holmes said that by the time that the car is delivered and it is outfitted, it may be the first of next year.

The Board approved a resolution to take over water systems now operated by the City of Plymouth in Green Meadows and Plymouth Gardens (at Five Mile and Schoolcraft) Subdivisions. At a joint meeting of the City Commission and Township Board two weeks ago, the City offered the Township the opportunity to assume ownership of City water mains in the Township.

Engineer Herald Hamill was asked to conduct a study of costs to the Township for taking over all lines in the Township now served by the City where there is no contract specifically asking for City service.

A resolution approved by Romulus Township asking for a revision in state law that regulates the publishing of Board minutes has also been given the endorsement of the Plymouth Township Board.

The resolution, which will be sent to legislators for their consideration at the next session, states that publishing proceedings of Board meetings is as outmoded as many other laws passed years ago.

NEWS BEAT

A .22 caliber slug embedded in the back of Harmon B. Holt, 29, of Taylor Township, will not be removed because it is too close to the spinal column, the Wayne County Sheriff's office reported this week.

Holt was walking along Edward Hines Drive west of Haggerty Tuesday night of last week when he complained of back pains. Taken to St. Mary Hospital, the slug was found. Holt and two companions, Cecil Burns of Dearborn Township and Donald Warnick, Livonia, had gone out drinking after work, deputies said. Holt's condition was considered serious. Detectives said that there are no new leads concerning the source of the gunshot.

KEEPS GROWING: Lake Pointe Village, which will have over 1,000 homes when completed, will soon open Subdivision No. 5. This subdivision will have 100 lots and extends along the west side of the development as far north as Five Mile Rd. Sewers are now being laid.

EXODUS: The move of Continental Can Co. from its Junction Ave. plant has now been completed. The corrugated container firm has moved to a more modern and larger building in Melvindale. Sixty-five persons were employed here and will continue their jobs at the new location.

POLICE BEAT: A rumor that police are starting a drive against jaywalkers isn't true, but it is true that two youths were ticketed last week for jaywalking on Main St. near the library. Police said that they recklessly walked across the street, almost causing an accident and bodily harm to themselves.

Richard Groth, 18, received bruises last Wednesday when he drove his motorbike from the City Hall driveway across Main St. in the path of a car. It happened during a fire alarm.

FUTURE PLANS: Application to obtain federal financing for planning a new City water department project has been approved by the Commission. Tentative plans call for building a 2 million gallon reservoir around the Five Mile and Beck Rd. area and eliminate the two elevated tanks in the City. Pressure in the northwest section is reported so low that it is difficult to obtain good pressure on the second floor. The reservoir site would be higher than the City.

BAND AT LIONS GAME: Plymouth High School's band will be one of the three stars performing at the half-time ceremonies this Sunday at the Lions-Baltimore Colt game in Tiger Stadium. Director Jim Griffin and the young musicians will leave here at 9:45 a.m. and will rehearse at 11:30 on the field. They will return at 6 p.m. The Royal Oak Dondero and Farmington High School bands will also perform. Unfortunately, home games are blacked out on Detroit TV but those getting Channel 6 out of Lansing may find the local band on their tubes.

The once-a-year dinner meeting will be held at the Junior High School starting at 7 p.m. Tickets are now on sale.

Sylvester Cooper, general chairman of the program, said that there will be a limitation of 200 tickets.

Also being razed will be the Bronson Building and another building known as the Richwine Building which has been occupied by the Presbyterian Church Women's Thrift Shop.

For the past five years, the Plymouth Police Youth Club has been located in the Bronson Building. Exactly what will happen to the program after the building is removed is not yet resolved, but several plans are being discussed.

The Plymouth Tomorrow Committee, a committee appointed by the mayor, will meet next Monday night with the City Commission to discuss solutions.

Following U.S. 112 through Ypsilanti and Clinton one finds the historic Irish Hills. The many lakes tucked in the valleys, the stage coach day taverns and the old churches are all most appealing when framed in fall colors.

Kensington Park and Kent Lake offer many attractions for the visitor. The multitude of marked nature trails, starting from the Nature Center Building, are at their best this season. From the deck of the Island Queen, the Mississippi-type stern wheeler on Kent Lake, the brilliant Staghorn Sumac and Flowering Bogwood and Red and White Oaks may be seen along the shore.

Of special interest to the fall fisherman, says Mr. Thomson, is a drive to the fine fishing areas of Anchor Bay, Lake St. Clair and St. Clair River which are famous for their muskies, pickerel and bass. In the same locale the camera enthusiast will find the Blue Water Bridge and the Fort Gratiot Lighthouse likely subject material.

While visiting the unique city of Mount Clemens one can see at the mouth of the Clinton River thousands of beautiful swans. These swans, arriving in early November, remain all winter, keeping amiable company with the thousands of ducks that also make this their winter abode.

Crosswell, in the Black River area, teems with pheasants, rabbits, coon and fox and is Utopia for the small game hunter.

There are other areas in southeastern Michigan which offer delightful, exhilarating trips, but often the greatest beauty is to be found off the highway and along the winding side roads and colorful by-ways.

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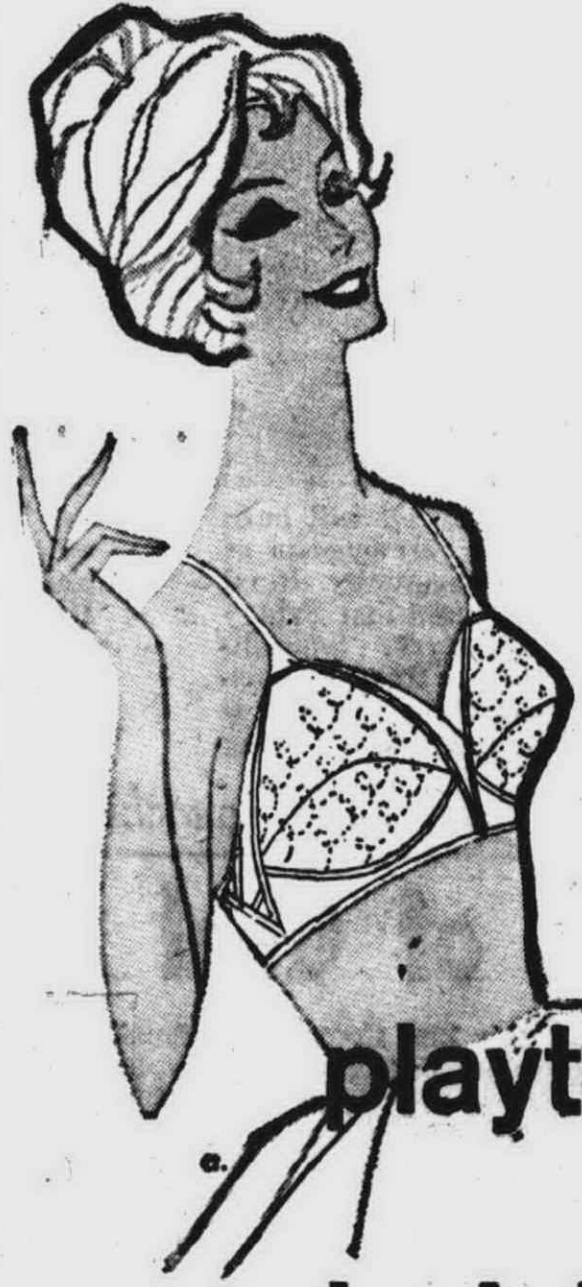

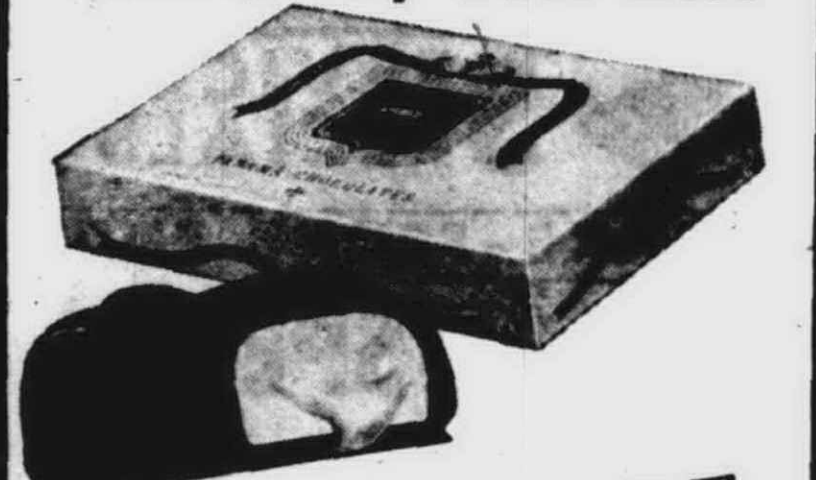

Sunday's Symphony Concert Was Delightful Day of Firsts

Sunday was a day of "firsts" for the 100-piece Plymouth Symphony Orchestra conducted by Wayne Dunlap, as it opened its 16th concert season.

For its first performance of the series, the orchestra accompanied a first-rate, highly-accomplished cellist, Paul Olefsky. It played for the first time in America Antonio Vivaldi's Concerto in D Major for Violoncello and Orchestra and for the first time at these concerts Symphony in B-flat Major, Opus 20 by Ernest Chausson. And another special "first" was the presentation of a composition by one of its own members, Bruce Wise of Plymouth.

Mr. Olefsky performed Tchaikovsky's Variations on a Roccoco Theme and was also featured in the Vivaldi work. In each case, he gave a moving performance skillfully executed and with great polish. The "rococo" theme is a graceful 18th century melody in the style of Mozart, consisting of an introduction, a theme and seven variations interwoven with cadenzas and for the cello and the interlude sections for the orchestra. The Vivaldi concerto is cast in a three-movement plan with an introductory movement, a middle movement and a lively finale.

Mr. Olefsky's accomplishments include principal cellist positions with the Philadelphia, Robin Hood Dell, Chautauqua and Detroit Symphony Orchestras. He has studied with Platingorsky, Primrose and Pablo Casals and in 1950 at the age of 24, he appeared as soloist at Carnegie Hall with the Philadelphia Orchestra under Eugene Ormandy. He is currently artist and conductor in residence at the State University of Iowa. He appeared here in 1957 at the Plymouth Colony Concerts and performed the Tchaikovsky work at that time.

Mr. Wise's composition, "Overture for Orchestra," was completed in 1954 and is a gay and festive work which was received with considerable enthusiasm by the capacity audience at Sunday's concert.

Mr. Wise, a pianist, has been a member of the orchestra for two years. He was born in Detroit in 1929, received his A.B. degree from Wayne and his M.A. from the University of Michigan. During 1959-60, he studied at the Academy for Music in Freiburg, Germany, under a German Government Grant and in June of 1961 he received his Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Michigan.

He has studied composition with Ross Lee Finney and

Wolfgang Fortner. His compositions include Sonata for Flute, Two Groups of Songs, A String Trio, Four Piano Pieces, Two Pieces for Piano and Chamber Group and Patterns for Orchestra. Mr. Wise is on the staff of U of M's School of Music.

Sunday's program opened with the colorful and dramatic Overture to "Egmont," Opus 84 by Beethoven. This overture was heard in Plymouth on two previous occasions, in 1949 and 1951, when it was performed by the Sym-

Conductor Dunlap has chosen an interesting theme for each of the concerts to be presented in the current series. The next concert will be Nov. 19 with William Boot, pianist, as guest artist. He will play Brahms' Piano Concerto No. 1 in D Minor.

The other concerts are scheduled for Dec. 19, Jan. 28, March 4 and April 8. All are open to the public free of charge and are held at 4 p.m. in the Plymouth High School auditorium.

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Rocks Fly 25-0; Top League Alone

Will Test Trenton Friday Night

The Plymouth football team nearly reached perfection last Friday as it defeated Bentley 25-0 for its fourth consecutive win against one opening game loss.

The Rocks exploded in the 4th period against the Bulldogs to score 19 points and establish themselves as sole proprietors of first place in the close Suburban Six League Race.

While Plymouth was winning its third league game without defeat, Trenton suffered its first loss of the season, 25-0 to Allen Park. The Rocks entertain Trenton at 8 p.m. Friday.

At Bentley the Rocks just glittered.

There were several big plays, of course, but the biggest came from Quarterback Dick Schryer. Bentley began to move early in the fourth period on a pass from quarterback Steve Powers to Greg Mapes. The Rocks led only 6-0.

Then Schryer leaped on the Plymouth 27 yard line to grab a deep flat pass and lug it 73 yards for a touchdown. Nobody touched him until a desperation dive was made on the one-yard line.

The interception provided the Rocks with a 12-0 lead with only 50 seconds gone of the fourth period. When Bentley was unable to get a first down after the kickoff,

Plymouth began to move in again.

Plymouth moved from its own 24 in nine running plays to score again. Halfback Jim Dart, who had a terrific night, carried on several plays, chalking off gains of five, nine, 10 and 18 yards. His last effort was an 18-yard drive for the touchdown.

He bulled the last seven yards, pushing three tacklers into the endzone with him. This amazing run provided Plymouth with an 18-0 lead. There were five minutes left in the game.

After Bentley again was unable to move against the strong Rock defense, Plymouth moved from its own 28 to the 50, largely on a 14 yard run by halfback Buzz Smith. A penalty set the Rocks back on the 24. With third and 15 to go, halfback Jeff Fraser slipped through tackle and burst into the clear. He scampered 74 yards for the final score. Fullback Mike Kisabeth ran for the extra

point and Plymouth had the ball game 25-0.

There was yet another exceptional play for Plymouth. Early in the second half a center pass sailed over the head of Schryer, while he was back to punt. He chased the ball around, finally picked it up on his own 10 and booted it 70 yards to the Bentley 20.

It won't show in the records, however, because a Bentley player roughed the kicker and Plymouth was given a first down on the 43. The penalty gives you some idea how close the tacklers were when Schryer kicked on the run.

Neither team was able to get a sustained drive going the first time they handled the ball. But midway in the first period Rock fullback Mike Kisabeth picked off a short Bulldog pass on the Plymouth 40 and returned it 27 yards to the Bentley 33.

Plymouth went in to score in eight plays, overcoming a 15 yard penalty in the process. Key plays were a 15

yard run through tackle by halfback Hugh Sarah and a 22 yard gain by Kisabeth on a left side screen pass from Schryer.

End Jim Dart scored for Plymouth from the three yard line after taking a short two yard toss from Schryer on the Bulldog five yard line. It was a fourth down play and staked the Rocks to a 6-0 lead with only 41 seconds left in the first period. Tackle Jim Gavigan's kick was wide.

There was no scoring in the second period, but Plymouth backs looked strong during this time as did Schryer's passing before time ran out on him with Plymouth on the Bulldog 10 yard line.

With 43 seconds left in the half the Rocks moved from midfield to the Bentley 10 on a pass to Dart for 19 yards and another to Egloff for 27 yards after a penalty had set the Rocks back to the 37.

Then came the second half, Schryer's interception and the brilliant Rock fourth quarter performance.

Where the Plymouth coaches gather this week, the conversation has to be pleasant. Everybody won last week, except the junior varsity cross-country team.

The three Rock football teams have missed a season's total of 10 wins and two losses. The freshmen are unbeaten in three games, while the varsity is 4-1 and the JVs are 3-1. The varsity cross-country team is unbeaten in five starts.

Plymouth's offense got going against Bentley and controlled the ball for most of the game. But it was a defensive play — the 74 yard pass interception and return by Schryer that broke Bentley's heart.

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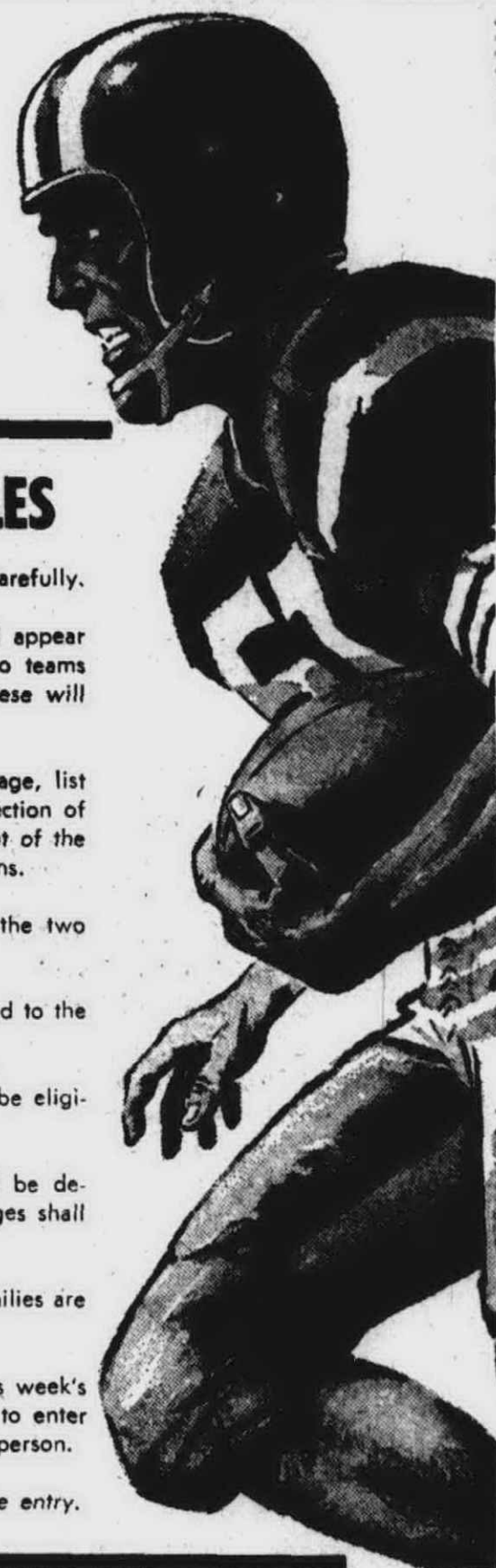

The chairman commended the volunteers for donation of their time, "which in these days is as valuable as donation of money." Not one person asked to serve as a chairman turned down the request, the school superintendent said.

This year's goal of \$44,347 is \$936 less than that raised last year. Last year's goal, however, was exceeded by \$7,000. terested and volunteering to serve in an unselfish way, if the voters choose to pick them.

Mrs. Moehle, Kirkpatrick and O'Neil all have been strong workers for many months in getting the College plan to the ballot stage, and it is this reporter's opinion that their long efforts should be rewarded.

Practically our entire television watching diet consists of the Jack Paar show in the late, late evening. It's live and real, something hard to find on the square box.

Paar has been fascinating in recent days. He was in Berlin recently, you'll recall, and kicked up something of a storm for deploying some American soldiers to the satisfaction of his cameramen at the East-West boundary there.

For this, Jabbin' Jack was roasted in the American papers, censured in the U.S. Senate, and otherwise made a notoriety.

In his turn, Paar has turned upon the American press with fierce attack. It's gone far beyond the "Paar incident" in Berlin. Now the TV viewer has been asked to weigh the merits of the American press, in general.

This editor is delighted. We believe the big metropolitan papers are highly vulnerable and long have been overdue for some really critical public analysis. And until Paar came along, there really was no effective, mass medium where it could be done tellingly.

Obviously, the press is not going to turn upon itself. So you weren't going to read it there.

Paar accuses American newspapers of intellectual dishonesty. They pretend "neutral" treatment of people and controversial issues, when the neutral pose is a disguise.

We always have been suspicious of papers who purport to "go down the middle" in news and editorial treatment. It is humanly impossible to write anything on paper and not guide the reader's thought in one direction or another. It's done by the choice of language, the tone of the sentence, the time devoted to the subject, the blackness of the headline, and by many other subtleties of which the author may not even be conscious.

The best and most honest system would be to have all newspapers frankly opinionated, slanted, and plain spoken. There should be enough newspapers to represent all major points of view. They all should be available to all citizens at all times. Then, let the reader examine the case, even as a judge does after hearing the opposing attorneys, and make up his mind.

Because of economics, such a plan is difficult to achieve. But it's fooling ourselves to say that today's American newspapers are doing a completely honest, or completely true job of informing the American public.

Another area of weakness is the shallowness of coverage and interpretation of international affairs in American papers. People of the United States, despite our high literacy rate, are incredibly uninformed and stupid about the rest of the world. Ninety nine percent of our reading time is centered on ourselves and the trivia close to home.

Newspaper editors are much to blame for this. That's the way they play the news, it's how they direct the reader's attention. Important foreign news is dumped into newspaper wastebaskets by the bush-elfull.

Yet at this very moment our survival, our national destiny will be determined by the things happening overseas. We should be 100 times more interested (and informed) on the upward progress of the Chinese farmers, for instance, than in the marital mischief of American movie stars, for instance. But we aren't.

Thus it is, all too often, that big international developments drop on us with total lack of warning, shock and surprise. Like Castro, who was brushed off as a harmless nothing in our papers until almost the very hour when he was a victorious leader of a country a few miles off our southern shores. And like President Rhee of Korea, who was a "good guy" in all our minds, a benevolent leader loved by his people, right to the moment the Koreans tossed him out of office for corrupt ways. We had no background, no warning.

Paar has one of the most amazing egos in all of show business. But his mind is clear, and he has found a soft spot in his wrangles with the press.

He's got us reading the Christian Science Monitor again — probably the best paper in the United States, by the way.

Governor Supports College

Editor: An unheralded phenomenon of the Twentieth Century in America has been the vast expansion of equality of opportunity for young people to receive a higher education. While there is some need to view with alarm the increasing numbers of students seeking college degrees, much of the problem has been blunted by a relatively new public institution.

This institution is the Community College. The Community Colleges of Michigan are steadily increasing their share of the educational services provided to our citizens in the fields of higher and terminal education. This is quite evident in the ten year growth of these institutions.

In the Fall of 1950, there were 5,795 students enrolled in ten Community Colleges. By 1960, there were in excess of 27,000 students in attendance in sixteen Community Colleges. This is an enrollment increase of over 425 percent. I wish the proponents of the Community College for Northwestern Wayne County every success in the forthcoming election.

ARRIVES: Registration forms for obtaining 1962 license plates are now available at the Secretary of State's branch office on Liberty St., Manager Doris Root declared. Tags, however, will not go on sale until Nov. 1. They have green numerals with white background. Meanwhile, comparatively few people are bothering to apply for the 35 cent refund that they are due for paying last year for reflectorized plates that they never received.

SHAREHOLDER: The City of Plymouth has assumed the unusual role of becoming a stockholder in a company. It came about when the Detroit Underpinning Co. of Ann Arbor Rd., filed for bankruptcy and was \$25 behind in its water bills. Now reorganized, the firm paid off its water bill in stock.

SKATING AHEAD: The City Commission has granted a two-inch water tap to the

Wayne County Road Commission for use in a shelter house that will be built along Wilcox Lake. The heated building will be for ice skaters who in past years have crowded around wood stoves in two small temporary shacks. Rest room facilities will be provided in the new structure.

EXEMPT: City Attorney Edward Draugelis has advised the City Commission that the ordinance prohibiting the selling of goods from house-to-house does not apply to a local religious body which often sells magazines. A state Supreme Court ruling stated that ordinances such as the City's which require identification badges and license fees does not apply to members of the Jehovah's Witnesses. The local members, however, have agreed to submit an identification list of their members so that when complaints are received at City Hall, members can be identified.

Buyers Radios

Eighteen radios for Fire Department personnel were purchased by the Township. Twelve of the alarm receivers have been in use on a trial period for the past three months. These 12 and six additional units have now been purchased.

The receivers, in use by City volunteers for several years are installed in the volunteer's home. When there is an alarm, the Fire Department can notify any or all of the volunteers of the fire and tell them where it is so that they do not need to rush to the fire department stations first.

In other business, a resolution was approved asking the County to turn over jurisdiction of Robinson Subdivision

 The college would generally have three functions—serve as the first two years of college for those wanting to continue onto other colleges; serve as a two-year technical school for students who would end their education at this point; and would serve as a night school for adults who cannot continue their education at any other time. It would also be a cultural center for the area.

One of the advantages that advocates stress is the cost of attending a community college. Students are able to attend while remaining at home, thus cutting the cost of room and board considerably. Students living in the four school districts would be given first chance at enrolling. Only if there is additional room would pupils from other districts be allowed to enroll.

CONTRACTS AND THE LAW

It has always surprised me how otherwise sensible people, who wouldn't cross a busy street blindfolded, or sign a blank check in a business deal, won't hesitate to endorse an uncompleted contract when they're buying a car.

Fortunately, in most cases where this occurs due to a shortage of time or some other cause in the sales transaction, no harm results because the dealer is an honest and reputable businessman. But it is a bad practice. The buyer should know exactly what he is buying, on what terms, and in writing which he should understand before he signs.

Out-of-town buyers who THOUGHT they were buying on such-and-such finance terms, or specific optional equipment, are the usual victims of misrepresentation of this sort. In most cases they didn't receive a completed contract until weeks after they had taken delivery of their car and their first finance payment was due.

Reputable dealers frequently lose sales by honestly stating the monthly terms, only to have an unscrupulous competitor verbally underbid them with figures that bear no resemblance to those later filled in on the contract.

Effort to Attract Industry Pays Off

New Auto Debuts Keep DSI Humming

A little more than three months ago, the once bustling Daisy Manufacturing Company's nine-acre complex on Union St. stood idle and unwanted by all except flocks of pigeons with 60 years of squatters' rights.

Today the pigeons are still there, as fat and indifferent as ever. But now they look down into the windows of Distribution Service, Inc., and two affiliates, Scott Associates and the Institute of Applied Training.

What has happened is known in a general way.

A group of civic-minded Plymouth citizens had formed the Plymouth Community Development Corp., dedicated to bringing new industry to town. The No. 1 project was returning the old Daisy plant to productivity.

The committee (now supported by over 100 investors in Plymouth's future) "sold" the community and the former air rifle plant to DSI and associates, although the group already operated two modern facilities in Southfield and Oak Park.

From both a community and company point of view the marriage has been a happy one. DSI proved a good provider and Plymouth an ideal helpmate.

In witness thereof these facts:

— Since moving to Plymouth, DSI has provided jobs for some 75 city and area residents and brought to town an annual total payroll projected for this year at about \$350,000.

— Despite the need for extensive modernization and alterations, the "new" plant facilities have proved to be ideal for the diverse packaging, world-wide distribution, storage, office and creative needs of the company.

— DSI operations this year will add approximately \$300,

000 revenue for the Plymouth post office. This, along with an impressive volume of freight and truck movements by DSI has also contributed to the making of more jobs and more community prosperity.

— The coming of company executives and skilled workers into the area has brought new customers for services and consumer goods.

— An important new taxpayer, a volume purchaser of local services and materials has been added. Local purchases this year will exceed \$100,000.

Despite its impact upon the community, few Plymouthites are genuinely familiar with the true functions of the DSI enterprises. To many they remain "that mailing company," a description so inadequate that it never fails to draw a slight wince from William C. Scott, DSI president.

Actually, the nature of the three organizations now housed at 101 Union Street is suggested rather accurately by their names. Distribution Service, as implied, is a highly developed handling organization for centralized distribution. Scott Associates operates in the field of sales training and marketing programs. The Institute of Applied Training (I. A. T.) organizes and applies manpower development programs for industry.

To a large degree, all three reflect Mr. Scott's background as a sales, marketing and promotion executive.

The big employer is DSI, which, according to a company prospectus, is engaged in the business of "supplying those services required in connection with effective and economical utilization of marketing programs and materials . . . these services grouped under three categories:

1. "Creative planning in connection with the development, timing, scheduling, packaging and transportation of materials for marketing and merchandising.

2. "Centralized distribution in the form of receiving, assembling, storing and packing and relaying of materials to transportation facilities.

3. "Research encompassing the storing of facts, figures and results of experiences in connection with Items 1 and 2."

Much of its business is done with the automotive industry. This year, for example, there is a better than fair chance that the new model literature at local dealer showrooms arrived there via DSI.

Chances are that the sev-

eral pieces arrived in a single shipment and this fact is the stock in trade of the local company . . . centralized distribution. This is how it works:

The vendors supplying printed matter, novelties and display materials for the new car and truck models ship the finished product to DSI (instead of directly to dealers piece-meal and individually.) Here the items are coordinated into a single package — often specially designed — thus assuring prompt, coordinated delivery attended by

substantial cost savings because of application of bulk transportation rates. Although DSI president Scott is relatively new to Plymouth, he is already an enthusiastic booster.

"We were originally attracted to Plymouth because of its excellent road, rail and air facilities, and its location outside of congested traffic and living areas," Scott said.

"Since becoming a part of the community we have learned of an even more important fact . . . that the quality of the employees hired from the Plymouth area has been outstanding."
