

## College Formation Wins, 3-1

### Fund Effort Reaches 45%

At the end of the first week of a three-week campaign, the Plymouth Community Fund has achieved 45 per cent of its \$44,347 goal, it was learned at a report luncheon Monday noon.

The total amount reported in cash and pledges so far is \$19,550.

Chairmen of the divisions were present at the luncheon to report their progress. The amounts from each division so far are:

- Advanced gifts, \$6,068.
- Business Division, \$3,800.
- Residential Division, \$2,999.
- Industrial Division, \$7,088.
- Professional Division, no report yet.

Urey Arnold, who is assisting General Chairman Russell Isbister in leading the campaign, was chairman of the report luncheon. The luncheon was a "plus" contribution of the Detroit Bank and Trust Co. and was held at Hillside Inn.

Arnold commended the campaign workers, especially the 200 women volunteers who went from house-to-house last Thursday night.

The campaign opened Oct. 16 and is scheduled to close Nov. 3. There are 11 local agencies participating in the appeal and 22 agencies on a statewide level.

### Moehle, Kirkpatrick, O'Neil Win At-Large

Wayne County Superintendent of Schools Charles Brake will preside at a meeting in the near future at which the Board of Trustees for the proposed Western Wayne County Community College will organize and settle down to the involved business of planning a college for the four school districts of Plymouth, Livonia, Clarenceville and Garden City.

With a 3 to 1 margin, the proposal to form a community college was given the nod by electors in the four districts at a special election Tuesday. The vote total was 7,695 voting for the proposal; 2,600 against.

### Commission Denies Dystrophy Drive

A request by the Muscular Dystrophy Assn. to conduct a house-to-house drive in the City of Plymouth in December was denied by the City Commission Monday night.

In a letter to the Commission, the national agency asked that its volunteers be allowed to conduct a house-to-house solicitation on Dec. 5 from 7 to 9 p.m.

A year ago, the Commission sent a letter to the association strongly hinting that the request would be denied this year and that the Muscular Dystrophy Drive be conducted in conjunction with the Plymouth Community Fund.

At Monday night's meeting, all but one of the commissioners present voted to reject the request.

"When people are asked to give once for all, they should not be bothered again," Commissioner Carl Shear declared after he made the motion to turn down the request. Commissioner William Hartmann said that he would have no objection to the use of canisters in stores, but is against such separate house-to-house solicitations.

The only "no" vote on the question came from Commissioner Robert Beyer who felt that the City cannot stop such solicitations. Commissioner James Houk was not present.

Last year, permission was granted with the suggestion that before another year goes by, the Muscular Dystrophy Assn. should appear before the Plymouth Community Fund to join the united appeal.

Last year, volunteers collected \$1,146 in the house-to-house drive.

This is not the first time that the muscular dystrophy effort has run into some resistance here. In 1956, City and Township firemen were invited to conduct the campaign.

City firemen decided a few days before the drive to participate since the Plymouth Community Fund had offered the Muscular Dystrophy Assn. \$1,500. And just before the Plymouth Township firemen were ready to begin their march, they also voted not to participate.

The association turned back the \$1,500 check, however. (Continued on page 10)

In Plymouth, 1,031 cast "yes" votes and 429 voted "no."

Plymouth will have two residents serving on the seven-member Board of Trustees. Harold Fischer, who ran unopposed, will represent the Plymouth Community School District on the Board. Elected to a trustee-at-large position and leading the field of six candidates was Mrs. Jane K. Moehle, 1297 W. Ann Arbor Trail, a housewife and former educator. Livonia will have two at-large members. Here are the trustee at-large results in both Plymouth and the four-district total:

 Harold E. Fischer received 1,093 complimentary votes as Plymouth's representative on the Board. Actually, he received 63 more votes than there were "yes" votes on the proposal.

There were 1,496 voters going to the polls in the Plymouth District.

As was anticipated, the vote on the proposal this time was not as great as last June when it was defeated by voters in the two Redford school districts. In June, 12,863 people voted on the issue from the four school districts while Tuesday there were 10,295 voting.

Approval of the formation proposal and the vote on trustees does not assure that the college will be built, however. The next step will be a ballot proposal asking for millage to build and operate the college. All indications are that this millage will be placed on the regular June school ballot and that it will ask for one mill.

The last meeting of the Executive Committee of the Community College was held Wednesday night. This was the group appointed by the four school boards to spear-

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### New 'Heights' Charter Written

A new charter for the proposed City of Plymouth Heights has been completed by the Charter Commission and it may be adopted at a meeting of the body this Friday night.

James Garber, chairman of the nine-member charter Commission, said this week that the Commission has until Nov. 2 to submit the charter to the governor's office.

Elected last July, the Charter Commission has been at work every Friday night and also on a few extra days to get the charter drafted, Garber said. The completed document is basically the same as the one adopted by the first Charter Commission several years ago. It provides for a strong mayor-council type of government.

But there were numerous changes, Garber said, so in deference to the first Charter Commission, they were invited to last Friday's meeting to explain why the changes were made.

The revised charter is now being typed and the Commission is expected to adopt it at its meeting this Friday. Garber commended the commissioners for their interest and excellent attendance at the meetings. "At no time did we have fewer than eight attending," he noted.

### Hines Drive Collision Takes 2 Lives

A head-on collision between two cars on Edward Hines Drive in Plymouth Township early Saturday morning took the lives of two men.

Killed were Harry A. Snyder, 32, of Milford, and Clayton E. Johnson, 33, of 8235 Perrin, Nankin Township.

There were no witnesses to the accident, sheriff's deputies said. It occurred at 1:30 a.m. near Haggert Rd. Snyder, who leaves a wife and an eight-year-old son, was driving west while Johnson, who is survived by a wife and four small children, was going east. There were no skid marks indicating which driver was on the wrong side of the road, authorities said.

George Lawton has been re-elected as president of the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce by its board of directors.

Lawton, who is treasurer of the Plymouth Community Federal Credit Union, is one of the few Chamber presidents who has had successive terms. The Board election was Monday.

Frank Palmer, general manager of Paul Wiedman, Inc., was elected vice-president; John Herb, secretary-treasurer of the American Hospital - Medical Benefit, was elected secretary; and Albert Robinson, branch manager of the Detroit Bank and Trust Co., was re-elected treasurer.

In a recent election by the Chamber membership, one Board member, George Lawton, was re-elected, and three new members were named. The new members are Palmer, Herb and John Witte, partners in the Community Pharmacy. All are for three-year terms.

The Bronson Building is one of the structures located in the Central Parking Lot that will be razed during the next few weeks to provide for an enlarged parking area. The Youth Club has used the building since it started some five years ago for archery and rifle shooting.

It is now estimated by the Detroit Metropolitan Area Regional Planning Commission that Plymouth Township's population is 8,600 and the City of Plymouth's population is 9,000. In the April 1960 census, the Township had 8,364 and the City, 8,766. The new count is based on building permits and other factors. It is estimated that Canton Township has increased from 5,313 to 5,350; Livonia, from 66,702 to 71,000; Northville Township, from 7,673 to 7,800; Northville City from 3,967 to 4,170; and Salem Township, from 2,097 to 2,120.

**NEW STREETS:** Approval was given Monday night to two new street paving jobs that will border the forthcoming subdivision in the southwest corner of the city. Only one homeowner from each project showed up for the public hearing. One is Evergreen, from Ross to Harborside, and the other is McKinley, from Sutherland to Palmer. The paving may be laid yet this year.

### Civil Defense on the Home Front

## What Happens If Bomb Falls?

(EDITOR'S NOTE: With many Plymouth builders to-day receiving requests for bomb and fall-out shelters, it is apparent that the population is again becoming concerned with the possibility of enemy attack. Many believe such preparation is fruitless, but nevertheless, some local civil defense preparations have been made. This is the first in a series of articles exploring the CD picture in Plymouth.)

 It's a typical golden autumn Saturday, energizing to the point of turning householders' minds to thoughts of readying for winter.

Dad might be putting up storm windows in an effort to prepare for the cold winter days ahead. Mother could be busy getting winter clothes in wearing order and then suddenly the irrevocable moment of truth strikes.

Supposing for the sake of illustration the first warning has hailed its way into the second alert and you are now listening to the final three to five minute steady stream of sirens.

You've had 15 minutes now, 20 at the very most, if you're lucky.

What are you going to do? Where will you run? What have you prepared to do in case of enemy attack?

It could easily be that there would be no chance for survival because of Plymouth's nearness to a target area such as Detroit. But what if there is just a serious fall-out from a bomb that hit in Chicago, or the blast here was not as bad as expected? If one hasn't the least idea of what to do, the mild disaster could be turned into a devastating one because of pandemonium.

While Civil Defense is fairly well planned here in Plymouth, it cannot be successful unless each citizen knows precisely what to do and how to care for himself until the first wave of pandemonium has passed.

If you are at home when disaster hits, you can go to the southwest corner of the basement (if you have a basement.) This area could offer protection against house collapse and shield the occupants against radiation.

Adequate shielding may be accomplished by employing the use of such materials as concrete, masonry, sandbags or boxes of earth.

Situated in or near your shelter you should have a stock of blankets, warm clothes (for cold weather), pliers or wrench, heavy gloves, paper plates and cups, flatware, extra bulbs and batteries for your flashlights and a portable radio to receive Conelrad instructions.

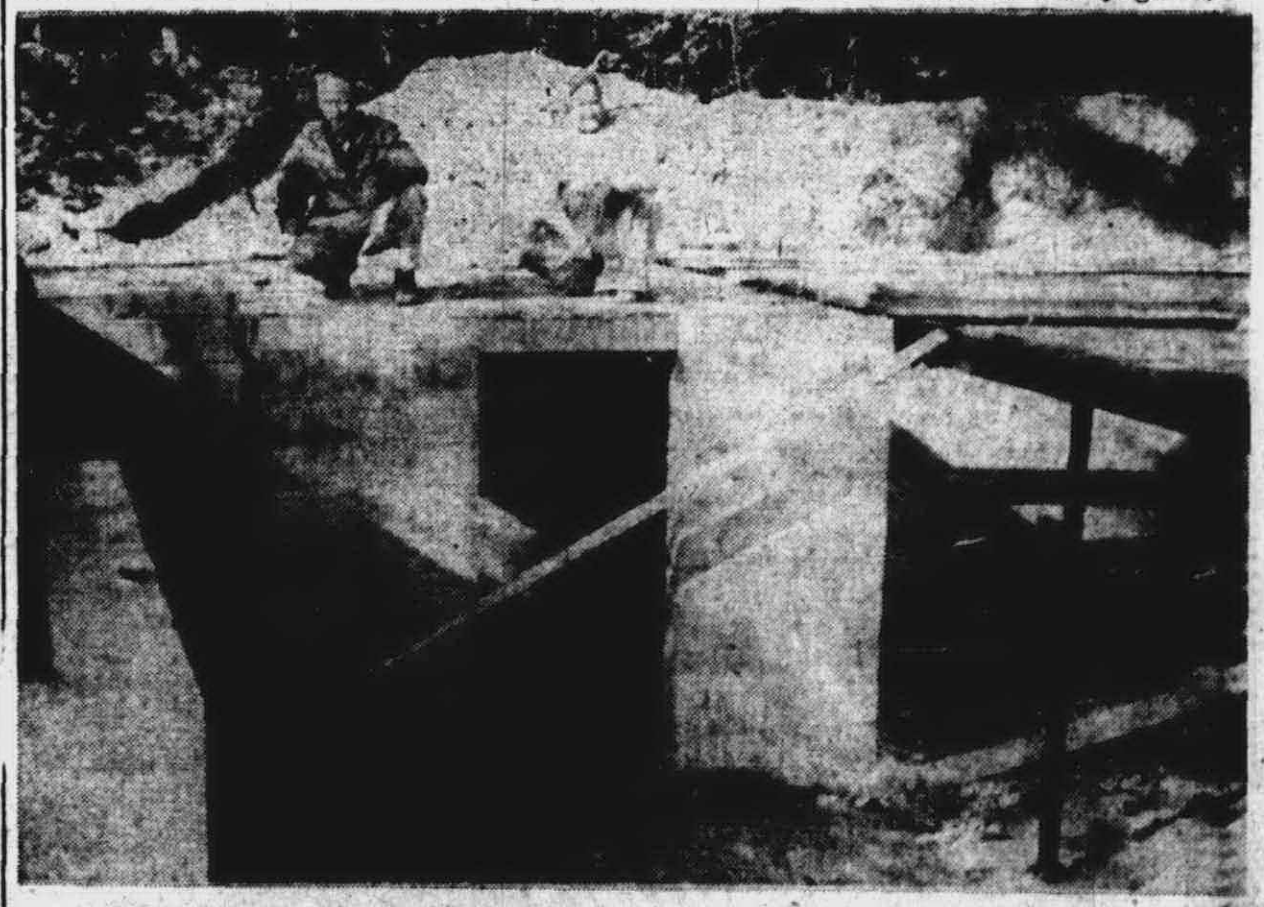
Also on hand should be a supply of old newspapers, a covered pail, and escape tools including a pick, shovel, crowbar and axe. And stores of washcloths, towels, soap, matches, an opener and canned heat should be handy.

Emergency food supplies might include canned fruits and juices, vegetables, soups, milk, instant drinks, canned meat and fish, raisins and

# Expect More Flu, Says Health Chief

Michigan residents can probably expect an increase in flu cases this fall and winter, warned State Health Commissioner, Dr. Albert E. Heustis, who urged people considered poor health risks to consult with their physician about flu shots.

He recommended immediate vaccination of persons with heart or pulmonary disease, diabetes and other chronic illness; persons over 65; and pregnant women. Those who have not had previous influenza shots should have a second injection in two months.

People in these categories were the primary victims among the 657 deaths attributed to the flu during the past four years in Michigan, the commissioner explained. In a great many other deaths, the onset of influenza was a significant contributory factor.

"Many of these deaths could have been prevented by vaccination," Dr. Heustis said. "But once influenza appears in the community, it is too late to protect high risk groups."

"The various strains of influenza usually strike in fairly consistent cycles, but we are overdue for Type B flu outbreaks, which come in four to six year cycles, and we may be in for a major assault from Asian flu, which usually strikes every two to three years."

The commissioner recommended routine annual immunization against influenza for high risk groups.

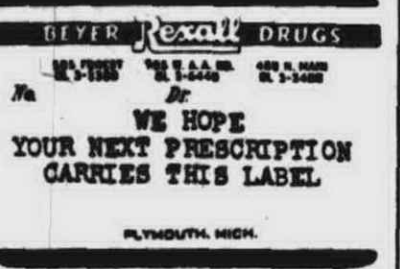

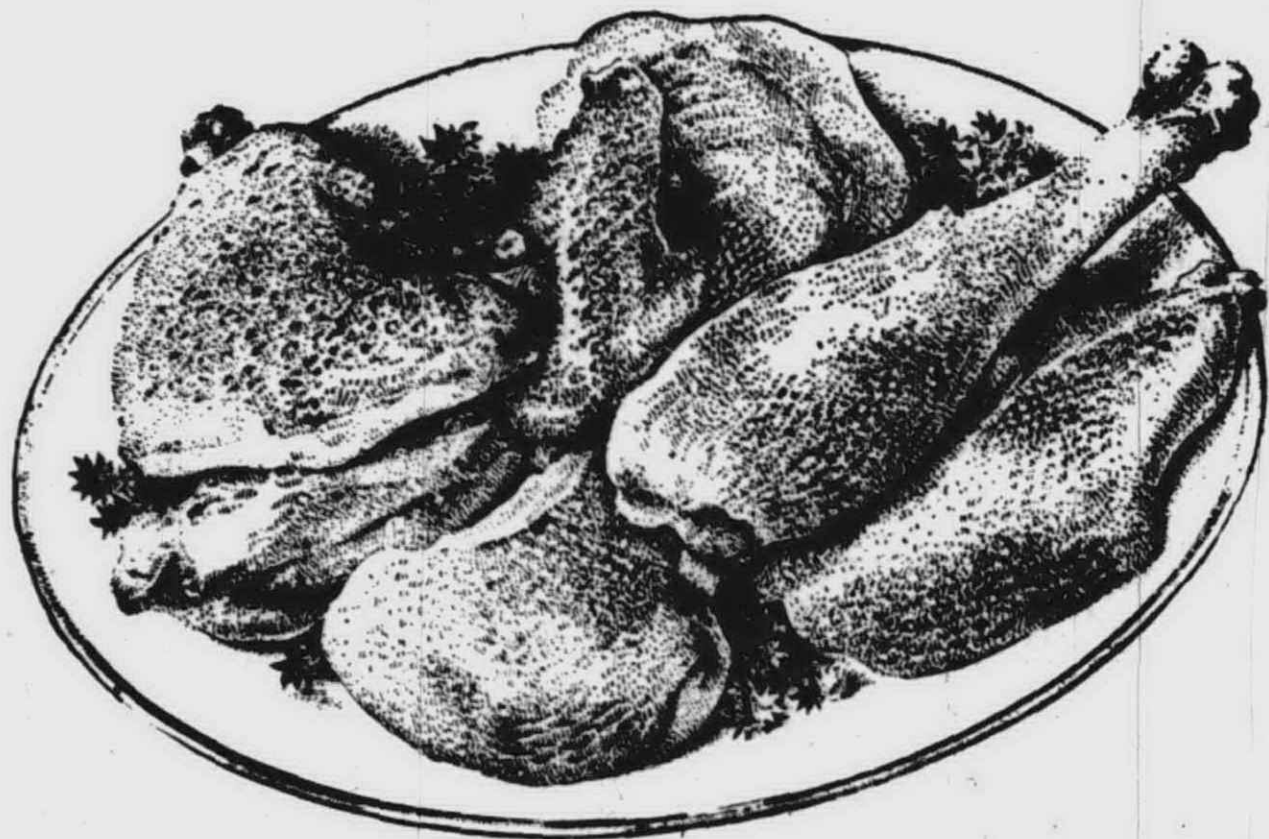

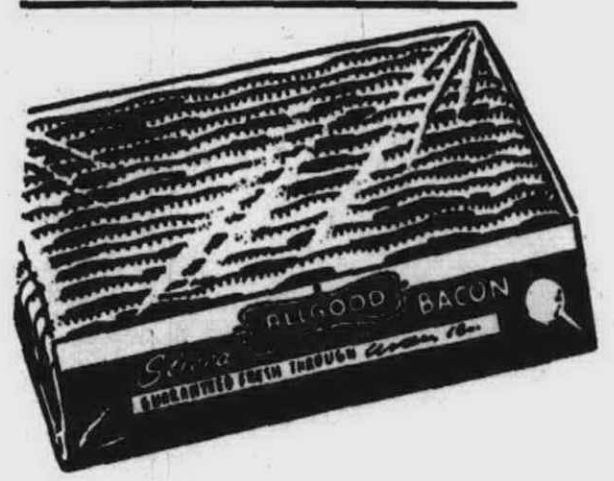

Trenton came charging back from its own 30 after the kickoff. In two plays the Trojans picked up two first downs and moved to the Plymouth 37. On the next play fullback Collins bulled into the line for five yards, but fell on his arm and broke two bones.

It was the first of several injuries that sidelined six Trenton first stringers during the game and sent two to St. Mary Hospital in Livonia.

On several occasions during the rough, but noticeably clean game, Trenton players were sighted wandering aimlessly around the field in a kind of daze. It was actually that rugged. When Collins was injured the game was delayed for 10 minutes while a doctor performed an emergency service on the field.

The junior varsity football team scored six points in the second quarter against Bentley last Thursday and held on to win 6-0 for the fourth JV win against only one loss.

Two plays earlier Wilhelm scooted 25 yards to mave the ball into scoring position. The pass for extra point went awry, but Plymouth's six points stood up the entire game. The JVs play at Trenton at 4 p.m. Thursday.

**THE BOOM, THE BOOBS AND THE BABBITS**  
Book buyers this fall are hearing voices from the past, a pair of raucous voices from the 1920's.

H. L. Mencken and Sinclair Lewis are back in style.

Publication of Mencken's Letters reminds us that the terror of the Twenties is being read more today than at any time since his fall from favor in the Thirties. He has made the paperbacks. **A Carnival of Buncombe: H. L. Mencken on Politics** (Vintage, \$1.45) is a glorious collection of pieces on the American political scene during Mencken's heyday.

His heyday was the boom period between war and depression when both quackery and the economy flourished and the only things in short supply were taste, intelligence and statesmanship. The time was made for Mencken. He had no positive political ideas of his own but he knew hokey when he saw it. **Buncombe** opens with the election of Harding in 1920 ("Tomorrow the dirty job. I shall be on my knees all night, praying for strength to vote for Gamieliel," he wrote on election eve), and ends with a sad post-mortem on F.D.R.'s slaughter of Landon in 1936. In between passes as gaudy and incredible a political scene as any in our history.

A wider view of the man is found in **The Vintage Mencken** edited by Alistair Cooke (Vintage, 95 cents). Except for the classic Coolidge obituary and a dispatch from the Wallace convention of 1948 (H.L.M.'s last journalistic work before being felled by a stroke) this book avoids politics. The first few pieces are from that most enjoyable of American reminiscences, **Happy Days**, Mencken's recollections of his boyhood in the Baltimore of the 1880s. Last in the book is the epitaph Mencken wrote for himself: "If, after I depart this vale, you ever remember me and have thought to please my ghost, forgive some sinner and wink your eye at some homely girl."

Mencken was no more a thinker than was, say William Jennings Bryan, but he was an exciting reporter, a most zestful humorist, the Boswell of boobs in high places. A thoroughly destructive critic he was nevertheless a serene, friendly and happy man.

It was otherwise with Sinclair Lewis. Gaunt, homely, ill-tempered, Lewis didn't fit in with the Babbitts; unlike Mencken, he rather wished he did. When this Nobel Prize-winning novelist died ten years ago he was pretty much forgotten. Though he had written much during the Thirties and Forties, it was feeble stuff. The Twenties were his time, too, and it was then that he created the three or four novels that still live.

This month on a wave of new interest in Lewis, his big books are being reissued in paperbacks. Available are: **Main Street** (1920), the story of a girl's attempt to bring culture to a Midwestern village; **Babbitt** (1922), the classic treatment of small town provincialism; **Arrowsmith** (1925), a study in the conflict between idealism and the marketplace in the medical profession. (All Signet Books, 75 cents.)

**Babbitt** is probably Lewis' best, most enduring novel. Surely it demonstrates his two virtues to the fullest: his photographic accuracy in reporting the way these people lived in Zenith at that time and the perceptive satire of an unimaginative, money grubbing society.

Both Mencken and Lewis had glaring prejudices and their judgments were often ridiculous, but they possessed high virtues also. The writing they left behind is worth reading; it can make us see more clearly what it was like to be alive, to be an American, way back there in the far-off Twenties.

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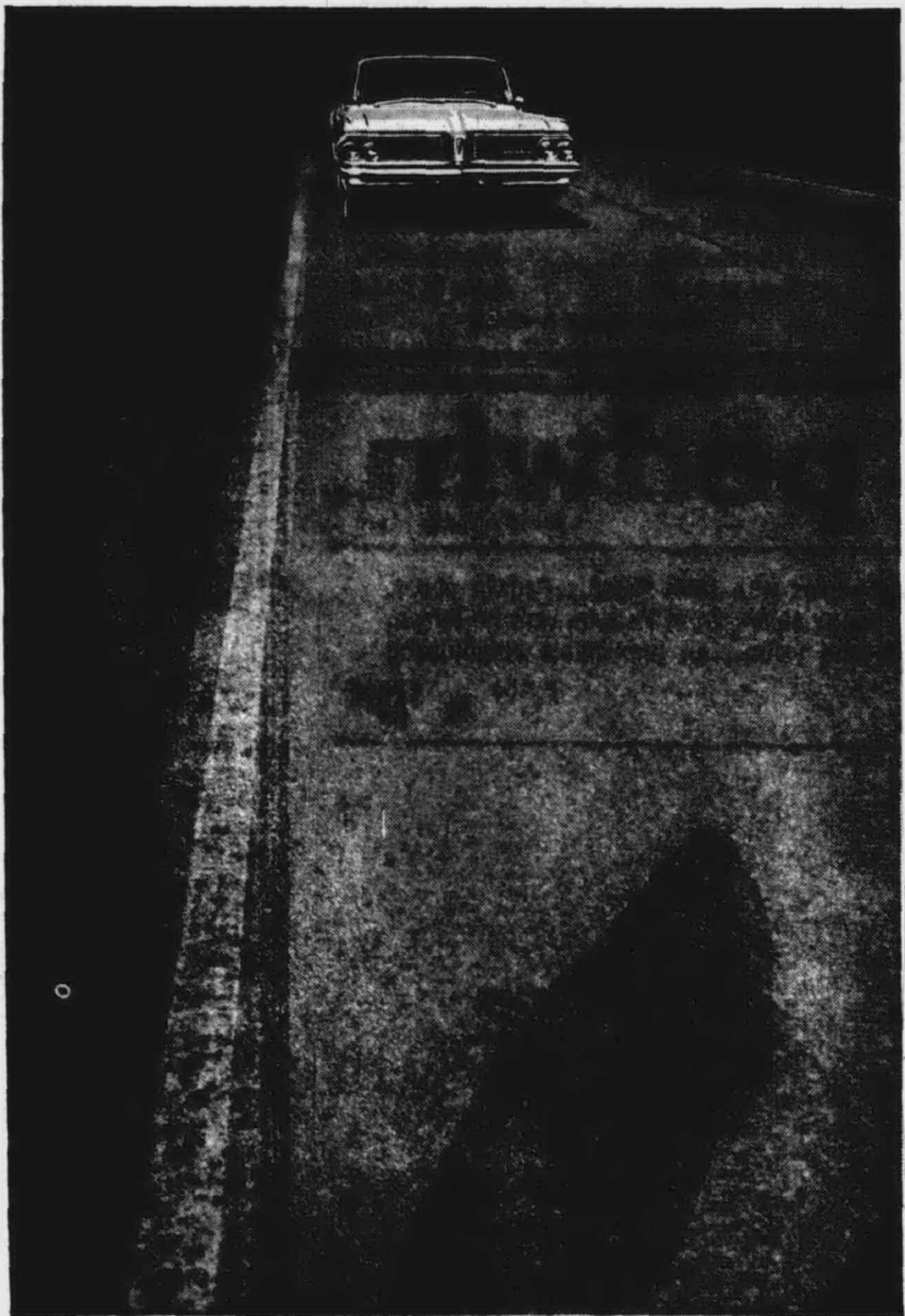

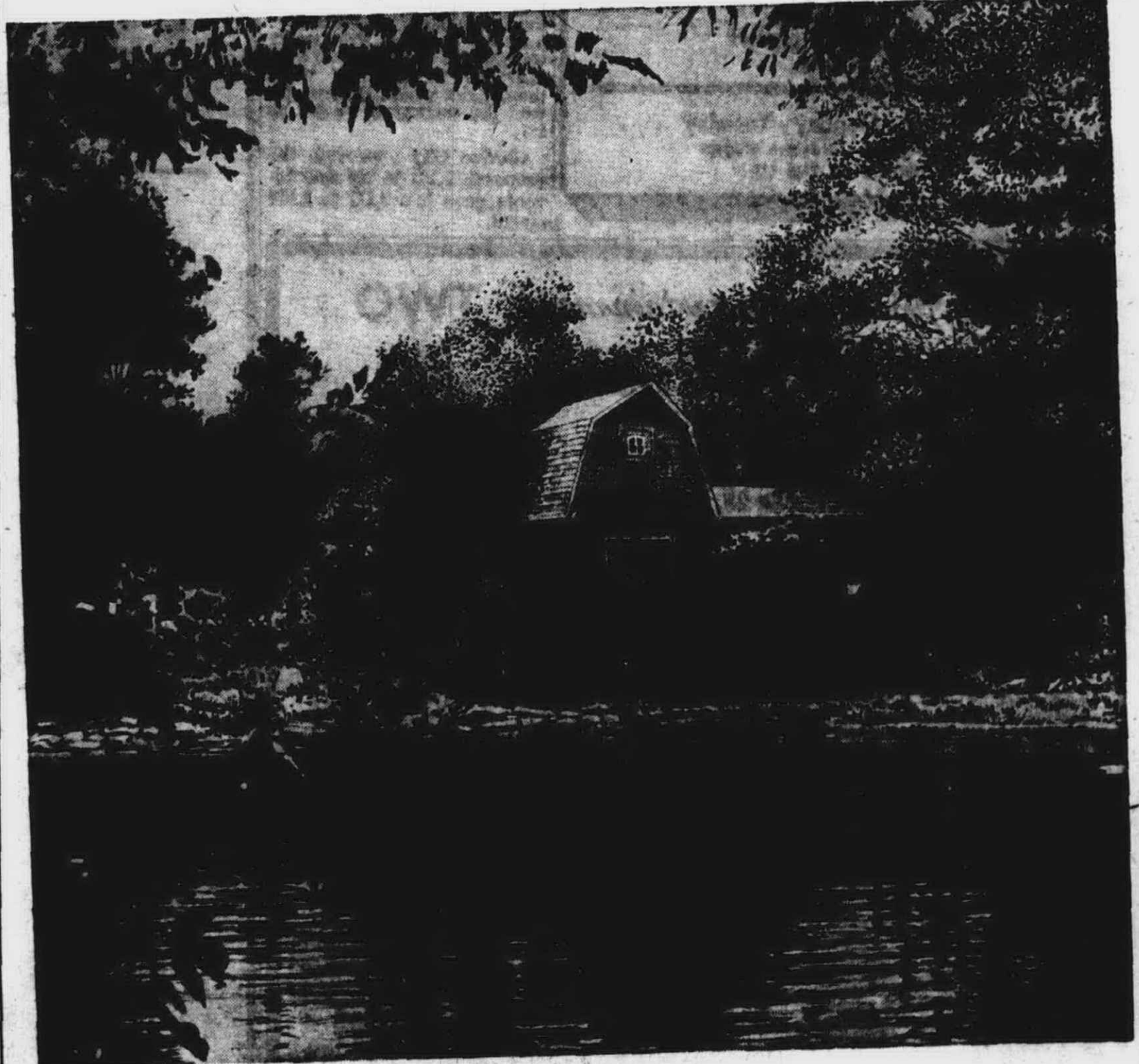

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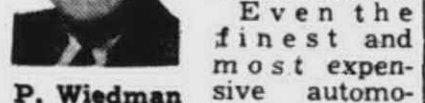

three gallons for each child under three.

Obviously the best means of protection against nuclear attack is distance from the target area.

While target areas can only be a matter of conjecture, we should acquaint ourselves with a knowledge of the effects of nuclear attack.

Atomic or hydrogen bomb effects fall generally in four categories.

The central or, bulls-eye area (A-Ring), would deliver utter destruction. Neither people nor property would have much likelihood of survival. Plymouth could well be within this area if a bomb hit central Detroit.

B-Ring, a belt three times as large as A, would cause heavy damage. Injury and devastation would be severe but not total.

C-Ring, a still larger belt emanating from the blast, would cause moderate to light damage.

The fourth range, or D-Ring, is the area where damage would be light. However, it is here that the greatest effects of fall-out and radiation would be felt.

Radiation assumes two forms; that which occurs at the time of the explosion and the residual radiation including fall-out.

Initial radiation is generally considered to constitute no serious hazard beyond the target zone.

Effects of radiation on the human body depend on the type of radiation received and

the extent of the body exposed, duration and intensity.

The greatest hazard from nuclear attack is from fall-out.

When an atomic or thermonuclear bomb is loosed, masses of pulverized debris is sucked into the air over the target, reaching altitudes sometimes exceeding a height of 16 miles.

Some of these particles are from the bomb and others from the radioactive infested target. These elements when released condense on other particles and can drift hundreds of miles from the original explosion.

Patterns and area of fall-out depend largely on the direction and velocity of the winds at various altitudes.

Shelters three feet below the earth, with two feet of concrete and three inches of lead would afford adequate protection from radiation and fall-out. Maintaining a clean air supply is another subject.

After the initial detonation the greatest danger to man, animals and plants lies then, in radiation and fallout.

Probably the most terrifying aspect facing the citizenry on the subject of thermonuclear war is combating the unseen and lethal contamination.

Without a working knowledge of the subject, unheeded panic and mayhem would be the likely result and ultimately would do more to aid the enemy than any other single factor.

The facts are available for the asking. In the city of Plymouth reams of printed matter can be obtained in the office of City Manager Al Glasford, who is also Director of Civil Defense. Similarly, material may be obtained by Township residents in the Plymouth Township Hall.

A prepared country-wide nomenclature can be as big a deterrent to war as arms.

## Easter Seal Society Aided 463 In Area During Year

The annual report of the Easter Seal Society of Western Wayne County, just released to the community by the Board of Directors, shows that service was given to 463 physically disabled persons in Western Wayne County between Sept. 1, 1960 and Aug. 31, 1961.

The report, describing both individual and group services

to disabled children and adults, also pays tribute to the many volunteers who assisted in supporting the program both financially and personally, helping to keep the program in operation. Plymouth last year gave \$3,978 for support of the program, highest in the area. The Easter Seal Society, emphasizing that services are

available to any person disabled by any illness or accident, points out that more than half of the individuals served suffered from disabilities for which other national agencies are trying to find causes and developing treatment. This group includes persons with Cerebral Palsy and other birth defects; poliomyelitis; Multiple Sclerosis;

Muscular Dystrophy and cardiac ailments. This kind of interrelationship between national health agencies assures direct case service while research goes on, the report points out, is not generally understood.
