## Millage Issue Studied

A special meeting of the Plymouth Board of Education at which they will review a millage proposal for the June 11 ballot will take place Thursday, May 10.

Held in the Junior High School library at 8 p.m., the meeting is open to the public, Board President Harold Niemi announced. The final proposal must be approved at the Board's regular meeting on Monday, May 14 in order for it to appear on the June 11 ballot.

Niemi said that the Board has had several reviews of the budget to determine how much money and millage will be required.

Monday night the Board held a special meeting to give some study to the budget and also to pass a resolution stating the intent of the Board to place a millage proposal on the ballot in June. The resolution is required by election laws.

## Set Two Dog Clinic Dates In Township

Two dog clinics — which make it easy for owners to buy new licenses and obtain rabies vaccinations for the dogs all at one time — will be held during the next two Saturdays at the Plymouth Township Hall.

Township Clerk Fred L. Miller said that the clinics on May 5 and 12 will be from 9 a.m. to noon and 1 to 5 p.m. Cost of the two-year immunization is \$3. Licenses for male dogs and spayed females is \$2 and the cost for females is \$4. After May 31, the cost jumps \$2. Dogs not licensed by June 1 will be in violation.

If a dog received the two-year immunization last year, no shot is needed this year but a slip indicating last year's immunization must be shown before a new tag is issued.

## To Explain Mysteries of Assessment at Meeting

Are assessments in the City of Plymouth higher than in the Township? Is equalization really making taxes equal?

These are two of the questions that those interested in assessing and equalization can expect answered when the City's representative to the Board of Supervisors, Arch Vallier, will explain during a public meeting on Monday, May 14. The meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. at City Hall.

"There has been much misunderstanding about assessments and equalization, especially in relating them to the City and Township of Plymouth," Vallier declared.

The supervisor has just completed weeks of special sessions as a member of the Tax Equalization Committee of the Board of Supervisors during which they made a tax study of each political subdivision in Wayne County.

## Few Show Interest In Budget Hearing

Only two persons appeared Monday night for the City's annual budget hearing with one of the citizens taking the City Commission to task for spending so much money.

Bruce Woodbury, 1462 Sheridan, declared that back in the days when Perry Cook-ingham was city manager (around 1935) the City budget was \$70,000. This year's proposed budget is \$618,010.

Woodbury pointed out that the raise in budget is way out of line with the amount of inflation and city growth and that only the minimum amount of services should be offered.

Another citizen also stressed that the City should provide "only the base necessities" and should not consider a complete snow removal service for the entire City.

The Commission is this year considering snow removal for all sidewalks. This would cost an estimated \$15,000.

# Electronics Firm to Build Manufacturing Facilities

## Employment Of 300 Estimated

Announcement is expected within the next few days by one of America's major electronic manufacturers of their plans to purchase land here and build a new modern building to house their manufacturing facilities.

Present plans call for the immediate construction of a building containing 50,000 square feet of floor space to house their specialized precision equipment. Present site of the building under consideration is on Plymouth Rd., on the City's eastern edge.

A total immediate investment of one half million dollars will be made and when in operation the company will employ in the neighborhood of 300 people. According to officials of the company, final closing should be made within the next few days at which time a formal announcement will be made.

Locating of the plant in this area is the result of many hours of effort on the part of several local civic leaders.

The company has requested that details of the impending purchase be withheld until negotiations are completed.

## Big Trees Crash Into Picnic Area

A Plymouth man and the four-year-old Nankin Township boy he tried to rescue are both recovering from injuries they received Sunday afternoon when two huge trees crashed into an Edward Hines Drive picnic and playground area.

Still in critical condition is Raymond Travis, 4, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Travis, 29943 Hazelwood, Nankin Township. He is suffering a severe skull fracture.

Returned to his home after treatment for a broken collarbone, two cracked ribs and numerous bruises is Walter Sandnes, 32, 11705 Francis St., in Robinson Subdivision.

There were over 20 persons in the picnic and playground area when the accident happened at 3 p.m. Sunday. The area is located a quarter mile east of Haggerty Rd. on the north side of Middle Rouge River. It is reached by a foot bridge.

Both the Sandnes and Travis families were there to give their children rides on the swings and slides. Others in the area were having picnics.

They got their first indication that something was wrong when a limb from one of the trees fell to the ground. A minute later there was a loud cracking and the people started to scatter.

Both trees were around three feet in diameter and approximately 60 feet tall.

"I grabbed our kids and ran the other way," Mrs. Sandnes related.

But Mr. Sandnes saw a boy half way up the small slide and ran to get him off.

"I remember grabbing hold of him but then we got hit," he related this week from his bed. "It knocked both of us down."

Mr. Sandnes, still conscious, was pulled out by others. A limb had struck Raymond on the head and he was unconscious. Some observers believed that Raymond was not breathing.

An unidentified woman picnicer who had recently completed a first aid course administered mouth-to-mouth artificial respiration. Raymond later began to breathe, then cried.

## Local Donation Is First To State Student Loan Fund

A \$1,000 check from the Plymouth Rotary Foundation presented to State Superintendent of Public Instruction Lynn M. Bartlett and Governor John Swainson last Friday morning became the first donation in the state to a new student fund created by the Legislature two years ago.

The governor signed into law two years ago a bill passed by the Legislature establishing a statewide student loan plan. The act establishing the "Michigan Higher Education Assistance Authority" charged it with the responsibility of making it possible for every qualified boy and girl in Michigan to obtain assistance in financing his or her college education.

A budget request of \$89,452 was submitted, but because of the lack of State funds, only \$15,000 was appropriated.

Last month, the authority decided to seek funds from private sources. It was determined that if \$50,000 could be raised, this would establish enough collateral to borrow enough money from banks to create a student loan fund totaling a quarter million dollars.

Members of the Plymouth Rotary Foundation read a newspaper account about the need and at their next board meeting donated \$1,000. The second donation of \$1,000 was later announced by the Samuel High Camp Foundation of Jackson.

Last Friday, the \$1,000 check was presented to Dr. Bartlett and Governor Swainson in the governor's office. The Rotary Foundation selected Miss Edna Allen to make the presentation and she was accompanied by Mrs. Perry Richwine, whose husband is a member of the Plymouth Rotary Foundation board.

Miss Allen was selected because she has been a frequent contributor to the Plymouth Rotary Foundation — an organization formed by the Rotary Club through which anyone can contribute to a charity. The Rotary's own Student Loan Fund is now part of the Rotary Foundation and during the past 10 years this fund has helped send 58 local youths to college. It now has around \$9,000 loaned out.

Miss Allen, a teacher since 1906, was Plymouth High School principal from 1918 to 1940. (Continued on page 8)

## Draugelis Named City Attorney

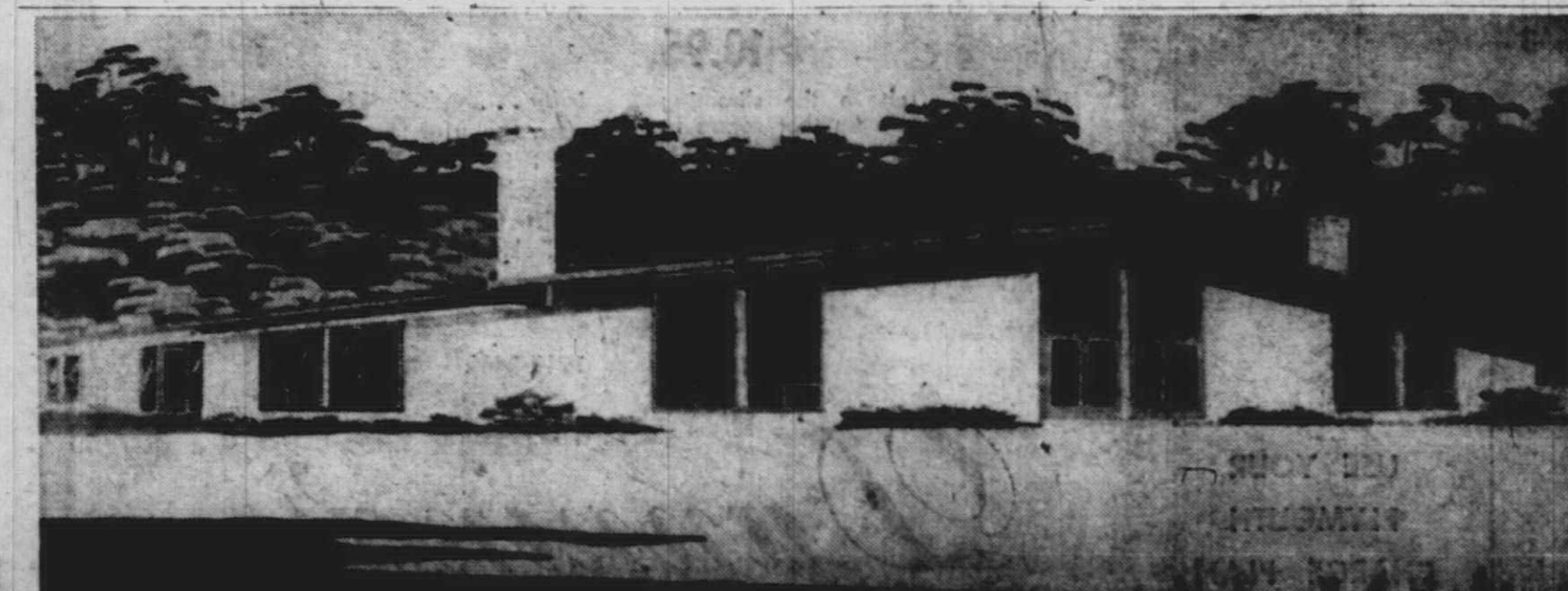
Edward Draugelis was appointed Monday night by the City Commission as City attorney.

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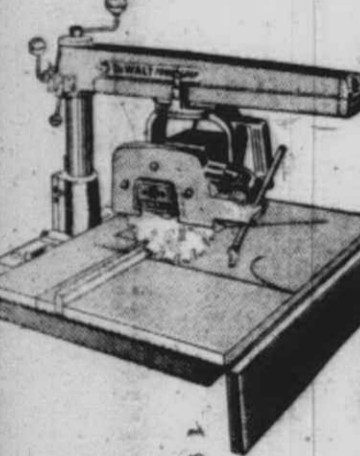

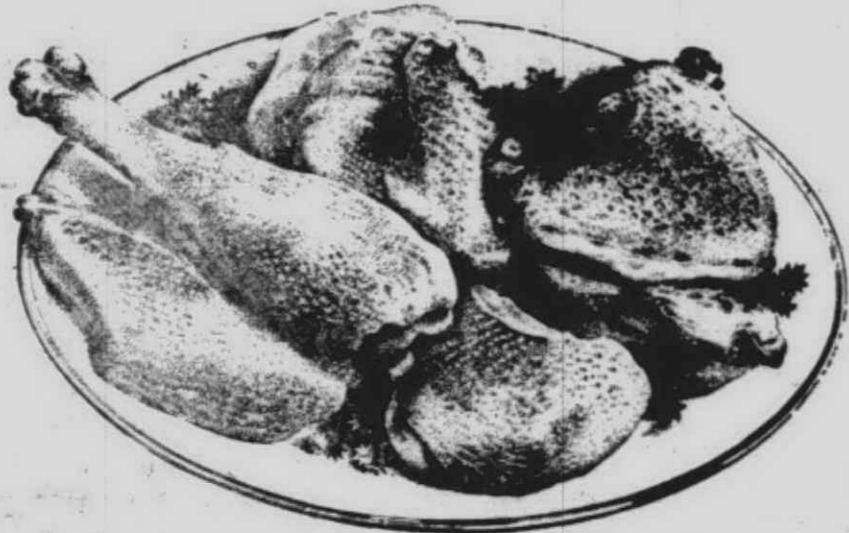

# SPORTSEEN

Bob Hitt, no newcomer to sports circles by any means, is back in the headlines once again in his role as captain-manager of the Minneapolis Twin-Cities Skippers, a member team of the struggling National Bowling League.

It happens that Hitt's Skippers are pitted against the Detroit Thunderbirds in a best-of-five meeting, being billed as the "first world series" of professional bowling. The series opens Friday, May 4, at the Thunder Bowl Arena in Allen Park.

Depending upon the success enjoyed by either team, the match will conclude, if necessary, with a single match May 7. The schedule calls for single matches Friday and Saturday, a double-header Sunday and another single match Monday, providing the latter competition is necessary to determine a world champ.

At any rate, Bob Hitt, a master craftsman in the world of professional bowling and a onetime milkman, will undoubtedly perform well, whether the Thunder Bowl Arena

is literally crammed with spectators (which is extremely doubtful, unfortunately for the National Bowling League) or whether it is only lightly sprinkled with paying guests (which is considerably more probable).

Bob Hitt will do well . . . Just as he did at 14 when — in 1936 — he captured his first of three consecutive Michigan State Horseshoe pitching crowns.

Just as he did as an outstanding three-sport athlete (football, basketball and baseball) at Plymouth High more than two decades ago.

Just as he did as a combat marine on the island jungles of the South Pacific during World War II.

Just as he did immediately after the war when he helped manage Parkview Lanes here, under original owner Mike Schuster.

And just as he did during one eight-game stretch in 1946 when he rolled five perfect 300 games.

The latter trick, which was not one at all as bowling fans know, was termed "fantastic," "impossible," and "uncanny" by the experts. Bob Hitt was only 24 years old.

But when the experts made it a point to see the young Plymouthite in action, they came away convinced that they

had witnessed the work of a future bowling great. Since then, Bob has added sufficient fuel to the fire and there remain today no doubters as to his bowling ability.

Now 40 and a resident of neighboring Livonia, Bob has compiled an impressive record as a bowl-for-booty professional. Included on his list of accomplishments are three sanctioned and 15 non-sanctioned 300 games, a considerable share of 299's and of course an adequate income, sufficient so that he has long since given up his Twin Pines milk route.

The milk route created a tough before-dawn to well-after-dusk routine for Bob, but it kept him going through a surprisingly few number of so-called lean years.

His bowling efforts led him to the top with impressive speed. In quick succession came a team member's spot with Helin Tackle and a lucrative series of personal appearances and TV performances.

Currently, he gives instructions at three bowling establishments in the Detroit metropolitan area. He flies around the country each week to keep his various dates with teammates on the Twin-Cities squad.

The Skippers' hopes of becoming the first world's champion bowling team rest heavily on the performances of the stocky, soft-spoken Hitt. It was greatly due to his efforts that enabled the Skippers to win the NBL's second half crown by five games after finishing second to the Detroit Thunderbirds in the first half of the season.

Hitt carries a 217 average in the league. One of his most awesome bowling performances, however, was a non-sanctioned three-game series, some years ago, when he

fashioned two 300's and closed with 299 for 899, one pin shy of a perfect series.

His highest sanctioned series is 794. A professional since 1947, when he first received the nickname of the "Bowling Milkman," Hitt was a member of the 1959 ABC championship Pfeiffer team which won with a 3243 count, greatest up to that time. Bob contributed a 654 in the final match.

Today, when he's not on the road with the Skippers or instruction at a bowling establishment somewhere, Bob is at home with his wife, the former Virginia Behler of Plymouth.

They live at 31022 Hathaway in Livonia and have three children, Lowell, 15, Julie, 11 and Janice, who is 7.

Bob's father Vern lives at 671 North Evergreen here and his wife's mother also resides in Plymouth. Bob graduated from Plymouth in 1940, the same year he started bowling.

# 8 Teams Sign For 'B' Softball; Deadline May 3

Eight teams have already signed up for the Plymouth recreation Class B, slow-pitch softball league, with indications there may be additional entries.

Tuesday, May 15, has been named as the opening day in the Class B league, while Monday, May 21, is the tentative starting date for teams in Class A.

A maximum of 16 players per team is allowed in Class A, but there is no maximum number of players for Class B teams, Woolweaver said.

There are openings for teams in both leagues at present, not only in the fast-pitch Class A division.

Supervisor of the Plymouth recreation softball program this summer will be Earl Gray, well known in Plymouth for his many years of work in area baseball and softball leagues.

# Chips from the ROCK

What can you write about when you're in and out of a hospital and feeling lousy? Not much, except perhaps a few words about the hospital where your main interest is concentrated at the time.

To while away the hours of this examination, I did manage to garner a few facts about the great University Hospital that I hadn't known before and they may be interesting to you.

The U. of M. Hospital was the first chartered university hospital. It is mainly a referral hospital where doctors throughout this part of the country refer specialized cases for specialized diagnosis and treatment. However, it does maintain an emergency service where anyone may go, of their own volition, at any time. Findings of University doctors are relayed back to the referring physician and general information of interest to the profession is relayed to all doctors from time to time.

It lacks nothing in the way of equipment and will compare favorably as one of the best equipped and finest/staffed institutions of its kind in the world. It sees on the average of 1,000 patients a day and has on its regular staff three employees for each patient. It provides beds for 1,017 patients, and during the last few months its facilities are over-taxed and there is a waiting period for admittance. Room costs average from \$20 to \$40 a day.

The hospital operates on a 15 million dollar budget of which 65% goes into payroll. The total operation is self supporting except for new buildings and the neuropsychiatric department. These are subsidized by the state.

In addition to serving 3,000 patient meals a day the hospital provides food for some 4,500 employees and visitors who eat in the cafeteria or snack bar. To give you an idea of the immensity of the food quantities we learned through Mrs. Hugh Jarvis, head of the instruction department for dieticians, and incidentally, the wife of the new owner of Papes' Gift Shop here in Plymouth, that food in the following quantities is used in the kitchens. About 520 pounds of coffee a week, and by the day 2,700 half pints of regular milk and 900 half pints of other milks, 140 loaves of bread, 75 dozen rolls, and for desserts some 5,000 Dixie cups a week.

The University laundry does four million pounds of laundry a year for the hospital, and nurses and doctors use well over a half million hypodermic needles each year on their patients. (We can account for three in our several days there.)

The hospital has its own compounding pharmacy and such items as camel's hair and pig's hair and dandruff are in regular demand for allergy extract serums.

Blue Cross now pays over 50% of the total patients' bills, and, because of insurance, more and more people are looking to hospitals for services. In the last 40 years hospitals have become curative institutions. Previously it was almost unheard of for a woman to go to a hospital to have a baby and most people sent to a hospital were there to die. Today this whole program has changed. Almost all women have their babies in a hospital, and hospitals now return the majority of patients to health with the aids of modern methods and drugs. A hospital visit is frightening to most of us but, most certainly if one is ailing, the earlier the visit the better the chances for recovery. If, in your case, an examination is recommended or a physical examination is due, don't put it off.

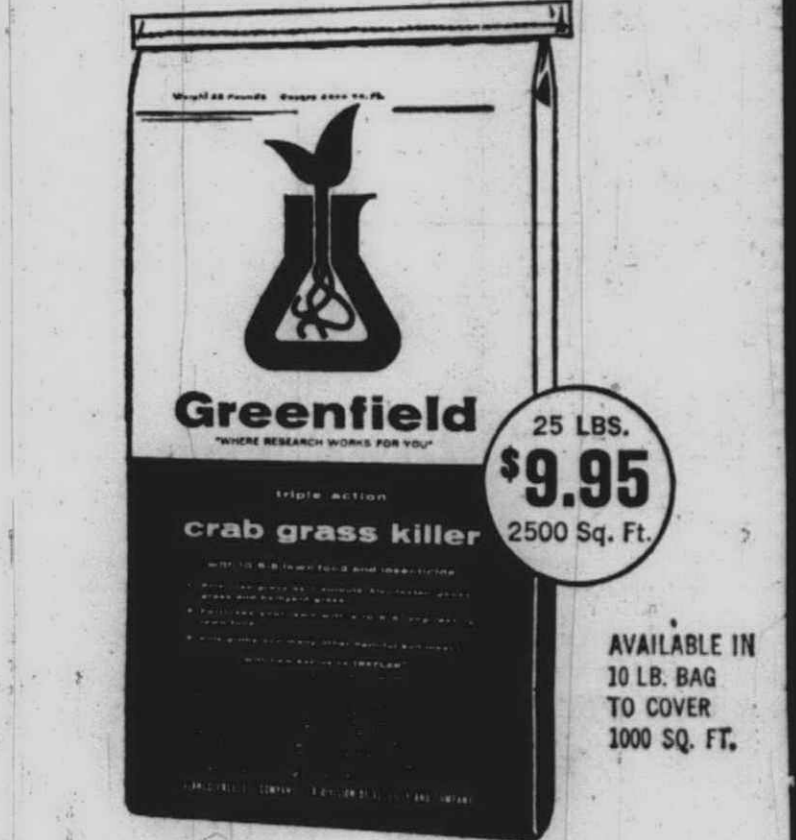
